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Heroic Actions by Cub Scout Bear William Kurutz Led to Saving His Moms Life

MONROVIA - On the morning of Tuesday, March 1, 2016, at 7:15 a.m., William's mother, Gina, suffered a grand-mal seizure in the shower of their home. William heard her fall through the shower curtain in the bathroom and let himself in. With her seizing, unresponsive and face down on the tile bathroom floor, William tried in vain to flip his mother who was stiff and jerking between the floor and the lip of the bathtub. After trying to revive his mother, William went outside to see if his father was nearby, as he was out walking the family dog. Fortunately, his father was within sight and William came running up to him. Crying, but not panicking, William told his father that "Mom fell" in the shower. William's father ran into the bathroom and told William to "call 9-1-1". William immediately went to the bedroom and calmly did as his father instructed. This freed his father up to begin resuscitation. William conveyed the information to the 911 operator and returned to his father. Upset, but calm, William helped get blankets to position his mother. In

addition, he comforted her as she came around, while his father met the Paramedics on the street. William's Mother Gina has had epilepsy since the age of 14, and although William has heard about seizures and his Mother's overall condition, he had never witnessed it firsthand. William's parents helped teach him to memorize their address at a young age and also taught him to what to do in an emergency situation such as "Mommy falling down". His mother's seizures have been un-

der control by medication for a very long time and she never thought that William would be in the position he found himself in the morning of the incident. William's Mother is beyond grateful that he and his father were home at the time of the incident, and very proud of William's calm demeanor, which in turn made her less anxious.

At the Monrovia City Council meeting, April 19th, 2016 Monrovia Fire & Rescue commends William's courage, quick action and calm demeanor in the face of trauma. His actions led to a rapid resolution of his mom's life threatening situation. William is commended for stepping up for his life saving actions and being a family hero. William was awarded a certificate of commendation from Chief Brad Donovan from Monrovia Fire & Rescue, for his heroic actions that led to his mom receiving the medical treatment that saved her life. Chief Donovan and the MFD gave William a Fire hat and tee-shirt and Chief Donovan stated that "this commendation is a future job application to the Monrovia Fire & Rescue Department". Following this commendation, the Monrovia City Council, Pro-tem Mayor Larry Spicer presented William with a special commendation from the City of Monrovia for his actions. When the presentations were over the Monrovia FD gave a special tour for William and his fellow Cub Scouts of the fire station.

The Greater Los Angeles Area Council on April 25th presented

Nearly 100 Azusa Unified Parents Attend Forum on Student Success and College Preparation

AZUSA - Parents from Azusa Unified School District gained insight on strategies to support their children in school and prepare them for success in college as part of the 11th Annual Parent University Forum on April 23.

Hosted at Azusa High School, the event focused on encouraging, supporting and informing parents on how to take a more active role in their children's education. Nearly one hundred parents in attendance took advantage of workshops that focused on methods to help children be successful in mathematics, improve study habits, combat bullying, plan for college and more. A handful of the workshops were taught by parents themselves, exemplifying the extent of growing parent leadership within the district.

Superintendent Dr. Linda Kaminski spoke to parents about the importance of their roles in the success of their children.

"Just you being here today

is an example of how you are helping your children achieve their dreams," Kaminski said. "Our goal is to remind you that you have a support system behind you every step of the way."

Azusa Mayor Joseph Rocha also extended words of advice to parents.

"This city and this school district are here to support you," Rocha said. "Your children are our children and we share the responsibility to help them be successful."

Originally established as a supplement to an instructional program for English learners, the annual event evolved to serve all families district-wide seeking to address the concerns and needs affecting children in school.

Azusa Unified parent Maria Rodriguez makes it a point to attend the forum each year to support her daughter Sandra Covarrubias, an eighth-grader attending Center Middle School. Rodriguez had just finished working the graveyard

shift, but instead of going home to sleep she decided to attend the forum.

"I want my daughter to have opportunities that I did not have when I was growing up," Rodriguez said. "I want to see her go to a university and will do everything I can to help get her there."

Between three sessions of workshop training and a resource fair, parents were also treated to a skit put on by fellow parents, which depicted a scenario about a mother's struggle in understanding the sacrifices required to support her child in preparing for college.

"I want to thank all of our parents who continue their education, as it encourages and sets an example for their children's educational journey," Board of Education President Yolanda Rodriguez-Peña said. "Our students at AUSD will look to them as a model for their own education, and stay active in their own learning."

Status Of The San Gabriel Mountains National Monument Explained At Museum Talk

DUARTE - In a state of flux and uncertainty, the status of the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument is a bit difficult to comprehend. The

many obstacles and the few strides were presented by Nathan Judy of the U.S. Forest Service in a presentation at the Duarte Historical Museum

in Encanto Park on April 15.

Boundaries were drawn when President Obama designated a SGMNM covering 346,177 acres of the Angeles National Forest. However, funding is not yet available and details are sketchy.

Fielding dozens of questions from the audience, Judy's general response was that the Monument is in the planning phase and input from experts and the general public is being gathered before a comprehensive plan is finalized.

A free map of the designated area is available at the Museum, 777 Encanto Parkway in Duarte. The museum is open Saturdays 1-4 p.m. and the first and third Wednesday of each month from 1-3 p.m. Admission is free.

GLENDORA – Community College League of California (CCLC) President and CEO Larry Galizio, Ph.D. recently visited Citrus College to engage in discussions with college leaders and tour the college's programs and facilities.

This was Galizio's first visit to Citrus College since being appointed to head up CCLC in July 2015. Before accepting the position as CCLC's CEO, Galizio served as president of Clatsop Community College in Oregon for five years.

Following breakfast, the group took Galizio on a tour of the entire campus. Highlights included the Veterans Success Center, Student Services, the Nursing and Dental Programs, the STEM Center and the college's athletic

fields. The group also stopped off at the Campus Center where students and staff were participating in the annual Cesar E. Chavez Blood Drive Challenge.

Board President Keith said it was very gratifying to see Dr. Galizio's reaction to the college's programs and services.

"Dr. Galizio demonstrated a genuine interest in Citrus College's programs that are directed at supporting students and helping them be successful in reaching their college goals," she said. "I believe he was very impressed with Citrus College, and we were impressed by his knowledge and enthusiasm."

Duarte High Receives High Praise From Accreditation Team

DUARTE – A visiting team from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) left Duarte High School (DHS) this month with a positive reaction and indications of a return to the highest possible accreditation status.

WASC is an accrediting commission for high schools and colleges, and the accreditation process assures the educational community, the general public, and other agencies that a school has clearly defined objectives and is on track to implement improvements.

The WASC three-day visit to DHS provided a chance for administrators from other districts to learn about the school, probe the things it is doing right, ask questions about past concerns, and look at the school's plan for the future.

"The chairman of the WASC team said it was a tremendous visit," said Principal Mark Sims

of Duarte High School. "She said the school has changed considerably since the last visit two years ago.

"She also said to keep doing what we're doing, and to keep pushing (for improvement)."

WASC visits result in a school's accreditation for future years, and this can range from as little as one year to as long as six years, which is the goal of all schools. Any accreditation term shorter than that suggests improvements that must be made.

Dr. Allan Mucerino, superintendent of schools for Duarte USD, said, "Accreditation is integral to a school's perpetual cycle of assessment, planning, implementation, and monitoring, based upon student achievement. At the conclusion of the three-day visit, the WASC team synthesized their findings in an oral report to the staff and members of the community.

"The WASC team was effusive

in their praise of Duarte High School. They reported that the school demonstrated the capacity commitment, and competence to support high-quality learning and ongoing student improvement."

Principal Sims said the positive oral report from the WASC team was "great news for the staff, and gratifying to everyone at the school. It's one of the most important steps in our efforts to change the perceptions of Duarte High School."

Sims added that preparing for WASC was a school-wide project, and "required a lot of effort from a lot of individuals to make things work. I'd like to salute the entire team for their efforts with WASC."

The Duarte High staff can expect to receive the final written report in late May or early June, at which time the school can formalize the celebration.

Assemblywoman Chang Pushes Legislation to Close California's Growing Workforce Gap

SACRAMENTO—Assemblywoman Ling Ling Chang (R-Diamond Bar) successfully moved her legislation forward today that will help close California's growing workforce gap. The Assembly Higher Education Committee unanimously approved Chang's AB 2412 which establishes an incentive grant to boost funding for community colleges that produce graduates with industry recognized credentials.

"This is a bill that I am proud to work on because it is something that is so important to every region in California," said Chang. "The community college system can play a significant role in keeping California's economy driving forward and lowering unemployment but there are obstacles in their way. My bill will help them circumvent those obstacles."

The Public Policy Institute of California released a report that California would face a shortage of workers with less than a

Bachelor's Degree by 2025. With California's unemployment sitting at 5.7%, it is imperative that the state promote the growth of the workforce by increasing availability to career technical education in the community college system. However, the Legislative Analyst's Office released a report on higher education funding and identified some of the road blocks community colleges face for career technical programs. They found the costs of career technical education programs are so high that they can act as a disincentive for community colleges to expand those programs.

"I think I have come up with a straight forward proposal here," added Chang. "The Community Colleges will work with commu-

nity and business leaders to determine what industry credentials are needed based on individual regions. Then, for every student a community college graduates with those credentials, they will earn additional funding to put back into these programs."

The need for industry recognized credentials in the state varies based on region and therefore it is more beneficial for individual colleges to teach different skills. AB 2412 creates a collaborative process for defining what skills are most beneficial for a particular region and will lead to certification.

AB 2412 was passed by unanimous decision in the Assembly Committee on Higher Education and will next be heard in the Appropriations Committee.

Legislation Approved to Put State Cyber Security Back on Track

SACRAMENTO—Assemblywoman Ling Ling Chang (R-Diamond Bar) announced that her legislation to put California's troubled cyber security system back on track was approved by the Assembly Privacy & Consumer Protection Committee. On the heels of a troubling audit of the state's cyber security program, AB 1881 will ensure the state's Chief Information Officer (CIO) establishes minimum security controls for state departments and agencies. California is vulnerable to thousands of hacking attempts per month but has a porous information security operation.

AB 1881 will require the

State Chief Information Officer (CIO) to develop baseline security controls (minimum security requirements) for all state agencies and departments. The CIO would further be required to report on compliance to the Legislature. Security controls are procedures -- sometimes performed by people rather than IT systems -- that reduce the risk of security vulnerabilities such as password procedures, personnel access, or data disposal.

In 2015, the California state auditor outlined an extensive assessment of the Department of Technology's oversight of California's State's information security operations. The results

Innovative Highway Funding Bill Passes Key Policy Test

Huff Measure Could Provide Millions for California Roads

SACRAMENTO - A unique highway funding measure authored by Senator Bob Huff (R-San Dimas) has gained the support of the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee, a policy committee approval that will send the measure to its next hearing. SB 1397 would enact the Highway Safety and Information Act, allowing the California Department of Transportation (CalTrans) to sell advertising displays on changeable message signs (CMS) located on or near state highways.

Through a pilot project and ultimate full implementation, the CMS public-private partnership could generate new revenue of \$200 million or more annually for road maintenance and repair by using the CMS network for commercial advertising purposes when Caltrans is not using it for public and emergency com-

munication.

"This is a win-win scenario for California taxpayers," explained Senator Huff. "It won't cost taxpayers a dime. It will be funded through a public-private partnership and the existing CalTrans CMS network would be upgraded to provide state of the art responsive, high definition information capability for enhanced statewide emergency and traveler communications."

As Senator Huff pointed out during the committee hearing, taxpayers would benefit from the investment and upgrade of California roads, highways and bridges. Highway system repair and maintenance is underfunded by \$5 billion annually, and local street repair is underfunded by \$1.8 billion a year. Currently, \$1 billion in truck weight fees that are designed to maintain roads have been diverted into the gen-

eral fund annually since 2010.

"My legislation makes it clear that Caltrans will have control of the type and location of ads that are placed, control of brightness, time of use and emergency messaging would always have priority over any advertising message," said Senator Huff. "The pilot project also allows for an evaluation of any driver distraction issues. Finally, SB 1397 will require Federal Highway Administration approval of the demonstration phase before the program can be initiated."

SB 1397 is sponsored by the Transportation California and has drawn the support of the Associated General Contractors, California Construction and Industrial Materials Association, California Nevada Cement Association, California Sign Association and the California-Nevada Conference of Operating Engineers.

Assemblyman Gatto's Legislation to Increase Use of Reversible Freeway Lanes Passes First Test

SACRAMENTO—Today, few areas in California utilize reversible lanes, failing to recognize the benefit that this transportation model can bring to California's roadways. San Diego has a reversible lane on the Interstate 15, and San Francisco's majestic Golden Gate Bridge operates a reversible lane; both have been successful at handling peak periods of traffic.

This is why Assemblyman Mike Gatto (D-Los Angeles) has decided to introduce legislation to encourage using more reversible lanes in California. Gatto's legislation received a green light from the Assembly Transportation Committee, passing by a vote

of 15 to 0. This transportation planning concept, which is widely used in other parts of the country, allows for a lane in which traffic may travel in either direction, and is an effective method to reduce congestion during peak hours. California's resources for transportation are severely limited, and reversible lane implementation instead of lane expansion will free-up funding to allow for other projects to be built.

AB 2542 will require the California Department of Transportation and all regional transportation agencies to consider reversible lanes for major street realignments or capacity-increasing projects as viable solu-

tion to reduce traffic congestion.

"Too often, Californians have experienced sitting in traffic while lanes in the opposite direction sit empty," Gatto stated. "This measure will ensure transportation agencies think outside-of-the-box to solve capacity issues in their communities, so we don't wave our fist in the air when we are stuck in traffic."

"We don't need to reinvent the wheel in order to increase traffic flow during peak periods," added Gatto. "AB 2542 encourages what California is often known for, continued innovation in our great state."

The measure will now head to the Appropriations Committee.

Hernández Urges Support for Assembly Democrats Plan to Address Housing Affordability Crisis, Alleviate Poverty

SACRAMENTO - More than a dozen members of the Democratic Assembly Caucus unveiled a plan that would deliver relief to California families struggling to keep up with skyrocketing rents, lack of access to homeownership and funding to assist the homeless and those in substandard housing.

Assemblyman Hernández has been working closely on crafting the investment plan to make sure no one is left behind. While housing is an issue statewide, Assemblymember Hernández is acutely aware of the housing challenges faced by his constituents, especially those in need of senior housing.

State and federal funding for the development and preservation of affordable homes has plummeted by 79 percent since the elimination of redevelopment

agencies in 2012 and the exhaustion of state housing bonds. The result is a \$1.7 billion per year loss in state startup money that leverages federal matching dollars and private loans necessary to make affordable developments feasible. While other critical state programs cut during the Great Recession have since been restored, affordable housing funds are not among them. When housing costs are factored in, California has the highest poverty rate in the nation.

"The California budget is our state's biggest commitment to the health and well-being of our constituents and our economy. Safe and affordable housing for our families and workforce is not a lofty aspiration for the eighth largest economy in the world. The state has a moral responsibility to step up during this crisis," said Assemblymember Roger Hernández (D-West Covina).

The Assembly Democrats' plan represents a one-time budget investment in five priority areas to meet the range of housing needs for working, lower-income fami-

lies and Californians who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless:

- Rental housing for lower income working families;
- Homeownership opportunities and rental housing for working families;
- Affordable housing for rural California, including for farmworkers and their families;
- Seismic retrofit of "soft-story" homes; and
- Housing assistance and production for homeless individuals and their families.

The Assemblymembers present noted that while ongoing investment is needed to address a housing affordability crisis that leaves 1.5 million families without a secure place to call home, a one-time investment of surplus funds in this year's budget is a sound investment for California that will reduce the future costs of homelessness and healthcare. What's more, with the poorest 25 percent of Californians spending more than two-thirds of their income on housing, creating affordable places to live is a crucial step toward reducing poverty.

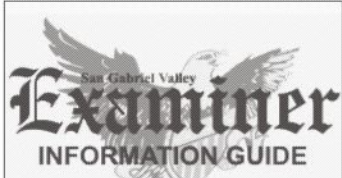
Assemblyman Hernández to Host Veteran Job and Resource Fair

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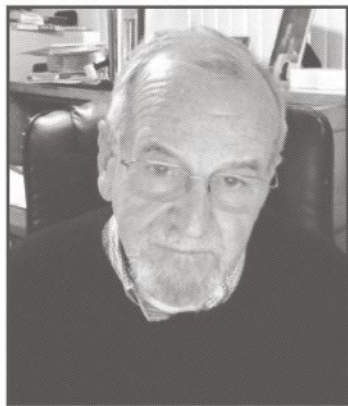

our political correctness, I know that my laughter defangs what was meant to be an attack.

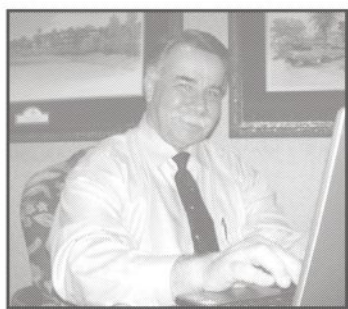

Master Fear to Conquer Age Decline

I recently spent a weekend with a delightful couple who at one point expressed concern about the concept of aging. Of the two, my male friend seemed especially concerned. Here was a man who had successfully mastered the financial and political world – but was unsure how to master what he perceived as the onslaught of age. He instinctively felt age shouldn't be a guaranteed downer, but wondered how he could reverse or resist the decades of aging theories he had mentally digested. He commented that when he was in business, his greatest successes were achieved when he refused to accept limitation – even if it appeared inevitable. The foundation for his success? Cultivating a close relationship with God – listening spiritually for divine guidance in his business and personal affairs.

Now he feels this humble approach of listening for divine guidance can help him in the aging arena, too.

And my friend is not alone in seeking a new perspective on aging. Dr. Bill Thomas, a Harvard-trained medical geriatrician, holds that happiness is very much a straight line from youth through the 100s, not a "hill" with some type of decline or decrease in happiness as we age. Ashton Applewhite, author of *This Chair Rocks*, takes this idea one step further by saying that it is fear of

aging that appears to affect happiness and satisfaction in life.

"From childhood on, we're barraged by messages that it's sad to be mature," she says.

Instead of taking these downer messages to heart, Applewhite suggests removing the fear of aging by debunking accepted aging stereotypes.

The same could be said for many age-related diseases, according to Mary Baker Eddy who wrote extensively on the relation of health and spirituality in the late 1800s and early 1900s. That is, she showed how it is fear about disease that allows it to become an obstacle to expressing an ageless identity that we all reflect from God. Eddy offered an answer to our present concerns about aging when she wrote in the 1889 *Christian Science Series*: "...expecting an increase of usefulness and vigor from advanced years with as much faith as you look for decrepitude and ugliness, a favorable result would be sure to follow. The added wisdom of age and experience is strength, not weakness, and we should understand this, expect it, and know that it is so, then it would appear."

Eddy's basis for expecting us to be able to find and express this favorable result is that she per-

ceived life as spiritual, without beginning or end (more like a circle) as opposed to the straight line of materialistic life we are so relentlessly asked to believe in. Understanding this unlimited concept of our divine identity promotes the expression of agelessness.

Once this circle idea of life is embraced, fear is countered naturally and the limitations of age are defeated. Even in the Bible there is mention of God's fearless support for man: "And the Lord, he it is that doth go before thee; he will be with thee, he will not fail thee, neither forsake thee: fear not, neither be dismayed."

I know these spiritually based truths can help anyone – including my friends – in the quest for a new and renewing recognition of their spiritual identity that is ageless and unlimited.

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Headwinds

GDP rose 0.5% in the first quarter, less than the 0.7% consensus and the slowest in 2 years, after growing 1.4% in Q4. Consumption growth slowed to less than 2% for the first time since last year's first quarter. Business spending fell outright, exports fell and if not for government spending, GDP would have grown just 0.3%.

Weakness in commercial real estate and business equipment spending spread beyond the oil patch in the first quarter, as six consecutive quarters of falling profits have taken a toll. So far, companies are still investing in human capital, but ongoing employment growth cannot be a sure thing given the extent of the weakness in business investment.

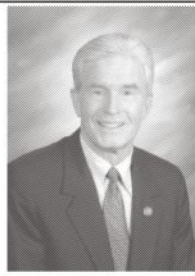
There are two possible silver linings. First, inventories have corrected significantly in the past three quarters and will stop detracting from growth if they stabilize. And, second, durable orders appear to be stabilizing, suggesting business equipment spending could stop detracting from growth as soon as Q2. In other words, there is reason to expect Q2's growth will be better than Q1's. Still, there is not yet anything in the data to suggest any rebound will be anywhere near as strong as last spring's. For now, the Fed is right to be cautious.

Now that interest rate normalization has begun, theories about the neutral rate carry real world consequences. Get it wrong, and the Fed funds rate could be higher-or lower-than the long-term breakeven point. Though, given the past several years track record, the odds of it being too low are pretty small.

Here's how Yellen explained it in the press conference: "The federal funds rate is likely to remain, for some time, below levels that are expected to prevail in the longer run. This expectation is consistent with the view that the neutral nominal federal funds rate—defined as the value of the federal funds rate that would be neither expansionary nor contractionary if the economy was operating near potential—is currently low by historical standards and is likely to rise only gradually over time."

She then explained the FOMC's forecast: "The low level of the neutral federal funds rate may be partially attributable to a range of persistent economic headwinds that weigh on aggregate demand, including develop-

ments abroad, a subdued pace of household formation, and meager productivity growth. There is considerable uncertainty regarding the evolution of the neutral funds rate over time.

However, if these headwinds abate, as we expect, the neutral federal funds rate should gradually move higher as well."

Credibility

At the press conference, CNBC's Steve Liesman pointed to GDP growth likely to be 2% in Q1 and back-to-back increases in inflation and asked if the Fed has a credibility problem because it says it will do something under certain conditions but then, when the conditions are realized, it doesn't do anything.

Yellen's response was not entirely coherent, but makes sense in terms of the neutral rate: "...the paths that the participants project for the federal funds rate and how it will evolve are not a pre-set plan or commitment or promise of the Committee. Indeed, they are not even the median should not be interpreted as a Committee-endorsed forecast. And there's a lot of uncertainty around each participant's projection. And they will evolve... those assessments of appropriate policy are completely contingent on each participant's forecast of the economy and how economic events will unfold. And they are, of course, uncertain, and you should fully expect that forecast for the appropriate path of policy on the part of all participants will evolve over time as shocks, positive or negative, hit the economy that alter those forecasts."

Shocks = headwinds. If there are more headwinds, or if headwinds persist longer than expected, the neutral rate will be lower and a lower path of fed funds will be appropriate despite an as-expected economic forecast. As Charles Evans explained, the "outlook numbers weren't really all that different, "yet the new, lower path of fed funds looked

"pretty good."

As for the Fed's credibility, yes, they said policy would be data dependent, but it is not only dependent on growth, employment and inflation. It is also dependent on the perceived neutral interest rate.

What to Expect: The Fed from Here

There's no question the doves won the day at the last FOMC meeting. The new, lower forecast median was achieved. The four 2016 rate hikes implied in the December forecast suggested the neutral rate rising from just below zero to about 1.0-1.5%. The new forecast is consistent with a neutral rate of 0.25-0.75%.

But we have come to the point where all but one FOMC member expects to hike rates at least twice this year. The sole holdout expects one hike. By the end of next year, the four most dovish member's expect five hikes from the current level of fed funds. The FOMC is fully committed to "normalization."

There is still one strong case for a lower path for fed funds, however. Economists at the Bank of England published a paper in December refuting Yellen's headwinds premise. That is, the low neutral rate is not the result of a series of cyclical headwinds at all. Rather, it reflects persistent secular changes including demographics, heightened income inequality and precautionary saving by emerging markets. If the

Bank of England's economists are right, the long-term neutral funds rate could be quite a bit lower than the Fed thinks.

This secular argument makes a lot of sense, especially considering how interest rates have plunged not just in the US but throughout the developed world. As a result, the FOMC will likely continue to give ground in their future rate projections. For the time being, however, we should expect the next quarter-point hike in May or June, before the neutral-rate forecast has a chance to shift very much. A second hike in October or December depends on what happens to credit growth in the interim.

Financial - Ask Julia

Happy Mother's Day!

Make this a special day for someone! Do you know of someone whose mom has passed? A mom who's had a miscarriage or has had a child pass way too early in life? A mom in a nursing home whose children are too far away to visit? A single mom? A mom who might feel single because her spouse is serving in the military? Give a happy mother's day!

I'm a retired teacher, collecting my pension. My husband is also retired, collecting Social Security. If he dies, I will not get any of his Social Security. This will greatly impact the budget. Can you help me plan ahead for this possibility?

It might come as a surprise to readers of this column to find out that teachers, and others with a 403-b retirement savings plan, are not entitled to their spouse's Social Security benefits, but it's true. It will take some saving and safe investing now to plan ahead for the possibility of a drop in household income. There will be other options to consider, too, like downsizing your housing, or getting a reverse mortgage when the time comes.

In the simplest way, please explain how inflation can hurt the value of the dollar?

Let's just say that inflation hits an estimated average rate of just 8-percent. A loaf of bread would double in price every 9 years. Now let's say that inflation hits double-digits like it did in the 1970's. At 18-percent, a loaf of bread would double in price every 4 years. Here's the formula for what is called the Rule of 72:

72 divided by ___ (percentage rate) equals the number of years it takes to double. (For investments, you can use this to calculate how long, at a specific interest rate, it'll take to double your money.)

My husband puts the maximum amount allowed into a qualified plan with pre-tax dollars so that it grows tax-deferred. I'm thinking that we'd get a better tax advantage in the long run by paying the taxes now and being able to take our investment money in retirement with minimal taxes. Who's right?

If the money he's putting into a qualified plan is being matched by his employer at a high percentage, it's probably a good idea to put as much there as allowable. Review your allocation of funds. Many folks lost up to half of their retirement savings when the stock market took a dive in the early 2000's, when the dot-com's crashed. We are still recovering from the Great Recession. Some employee retirement plans allow you to take some money out, once a year, and transfer it to an-

other IRA. Some of these IRA products offer a 5 - 10 percent bonus credited immediately, accompanied with tax-deferred growth.

Another option would be to put some post-tax money into an insurance product that grows a cash value, has funds that are accessible while the insured is alive, and which is tax-advantaged for you and your beneficiaries.

I'm ready to move my money. You've talked about safe investments; some with a bonus. Do you have any of those to offer now?

Yes. Of course, a high priority is determining which safe investment, with or without a bonus, is suitable for you. As always, these investment products include guarantees against the loss of principal and credited interest, and the reassurance of a death benefit for beneficiaries. Some carry the benefit of guaranteed lifetime income. These guarantees are based on the strength of the insurance company.

WHAT YOU "AUTO" KNOW

Your Computer On Wheels And Malware

Like any piece of software, connected cars are vulnerable to malware. Cars' computers are very necessary as they control everything from brakes to our "infotainment systems". This is a market hackers are eager to

explore and exploit.

When you or any driver in Glendora, get in your car you don't have to log on first, you don't have encryption or other ways to verify you are in command of your car's computer system. Hackers can access your vehicle a number of ways by Wi-Fi, Bluetooth and Internet. Just think about it...your laptop and mobile devices are actually more securely protected at this time than your vehicle. That doesn't make drivers feel very secure, now does it?

Controller Area Network (CAN) Bus makes it possible for a car's ECUs (Engine Control Units)...and cars can have over 100 of these, depending on the make and model) to communicate with each other. They work hard to make sure your car is ready to go and quickly. Last year researchers showed just how easy such an attack is by getting "inside" a Jeep Cherokee. They disabled the brakes and controlled the steering remotely. Chrysler had to recall 1.4 million vehicles and "patch" this loophole.

Since protecting a vehicle with a firewall is not the answer as it

slows down the ECU so it can't control safety functions quickly enough when you start your engine, a company in Ann Arbor, Michigan called Karamba Security is looking for another way. They recently introduced anti-malware. It will provide security by protecting the gateways to the externally connected controllers. This anti-malware knows what should be running on these ECUs and should a hacker introduce another "code" not on the list, the anti-malware will stop it in its tracks.

This works well with the codes supplied to Karamba from the manufacturers. The difficulty comes, however, when a driver decides to add aftermarket devices to their vehicles. The FBI and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has issued a warning about this very thing.

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Rio Hondo College to Offer California's First Degree for Hybrid/Electric Vehicle/Fuel-Cell Auto Technicians

WHITTIER – Rio Hondo College's groundbreaking Automotive Technology Program received approval April 27 to offer California's first Associate of Science degree in hybrid/electric vehicle/fuel-cell technology, a high-demand career field.

The approval from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office came in just 22 days – an incredibly quick turnaround that acknowledges the strength of the program, said Professor John Frala, who designed the Associate of Science degree.

"Companies are calling me about employees already," Frala said. "These cars are in heavy demand in California and there is a shortage of qualified technicians out in the field are safely trained to work on high-voltage vehicles."

Rio Hondo College is recognized for its trail-blazing efforts in automotive technology.

In spring 2015, Rio Hondo was chosen to offer a Bachelor of Science degree in automotive technology as part of a historic venture at the state community colleges. The degree becomes available in fall 2016.

Frala, who worked on the BS program, began developing the concept for the new AS degree

four years ago as part of his focus on alternative-fuel technology. A pioneer in the field, Frala sits on the Green Team, a state advisory group dedicated to creating a series of hydrogen refueling stations known as the California Hydrogen Highway.

California's 21st hydrogen station opened on April 27 with about 80 stations expected to be open by December.

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

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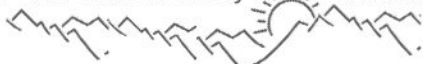

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How Medicare's hospice benefit works

Choosing to enter hospice care can be a wrenching decision for yourself or a loved one.

Hospice is intended to help terminally-ill people live out their lives as comfortably as possible. Hospice doesn't focus on curing disease and it's not only for people with cancer.

Medicare's hospice benefit covers your care, and you shouldn't have to go outside of hospice to get care except in rare situations. Once you choose hospice, your hospice benefit should cover everything you need.

If you qualify for hospice care, you and your family will work with your hospice provider to set up a plan of care that meets your needs.

You and your family members are the most important part of your medical team. Your team can also include doctors,

nurses or nurse practitioners, social workers, physical and occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists, hospice aides, homemakers, and volunteers.

A hospice nurse and doctor are on-call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to give you and your family support and care when you need it. You can also include your regular doctor or a nurse practitioner or your medical team, as the attending professional supervising your care.

The hospice benefit allows you and your family to stay together in the comfort of your home, unless you need care in an inpatient facility. If your hospice provider determines that you need inpatient care, your hospice provider will make the arrangements for your stay.

To find a hospice provider, talk to your doctor or call your state hospice organization. The

National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization has a website that allows you to look up local providers based on your zip code, at www.nhpco.org/find-hospice.

You can get hospice care if you have Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) and you meet these conditions:

- Your hospice doctor and your regular doctor (if you have one) certify that you're terminally ill (with a life expectancy of 6 months or less);
 - You accept palliative care (for comfort) instead of care to cure your illness;
 - You sign a statement choosing hospice care instead of other Medicare-covered treatments for your terminal illness and related conditions.
- You have the right to stop hospice care at any time. If you choose to do so, you'll go back to the type of Medicare coverage you had before you chose

a hospice provider, like Original Medicare, a Medicare Advantage plan, or another type of Medicare health plan.

Your Medicare benefits include a one-time-only consultation with a hospice medical director or hospice doctor to discuss your care options and management of your pain and symptoms. You can get this consultation even if you decide not to get hospice care.

Depending on your terminal illness and related conditions, the plan of care your hospice team creates can include doctor and nursing services; medical equipment (like wheelchairs and walkers); medical supplies (like bandages and catheters); prescription drugs; hospice aide and homemaker services; physical and occupational therapy; speech-language pathology services; social worker services; dietary counseling; grief and loss counseling for you and your family; short-term inpatient care (for pain and symptom management);

and any other Medicare-covered services needed to manage your terminal illness and related conditions, as recommended by your hospice team.

If your usual caregiver (like a family member) needs a rest, you also can get inpatient respite care in a Medicare-approved facility, such as a hospice inpatient facility, hospital, or nursing home. Your hospice provider will arrange this for you. You can stay up to 5 days each time you get respite care.

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America's Christian Credit Union Celebrates Growth At Annual Meeting

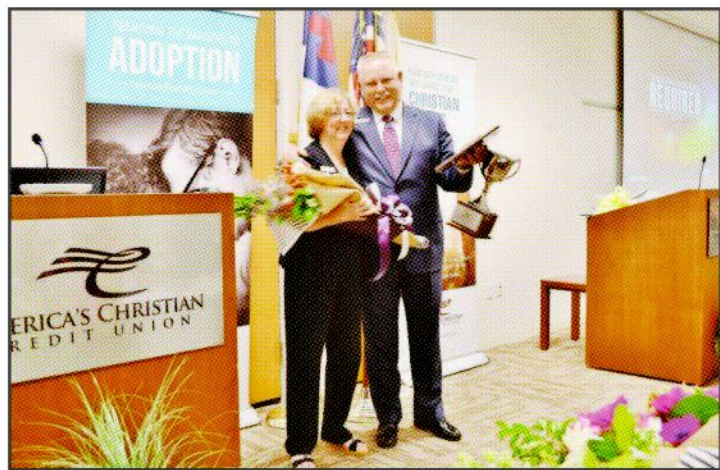

This year's annual Fashion Show "Colors of Spring," was

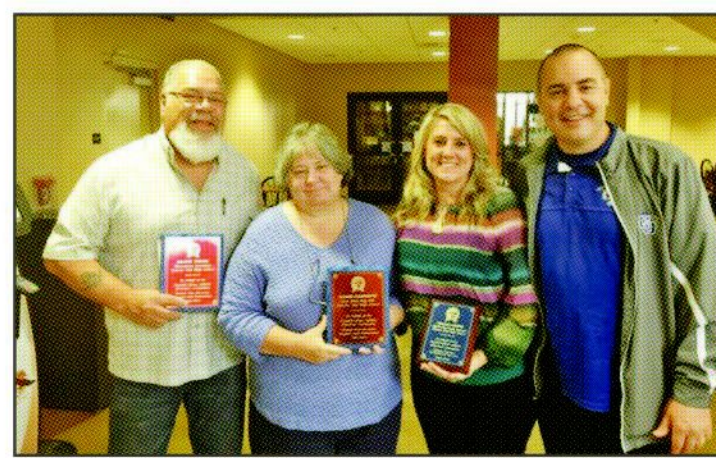

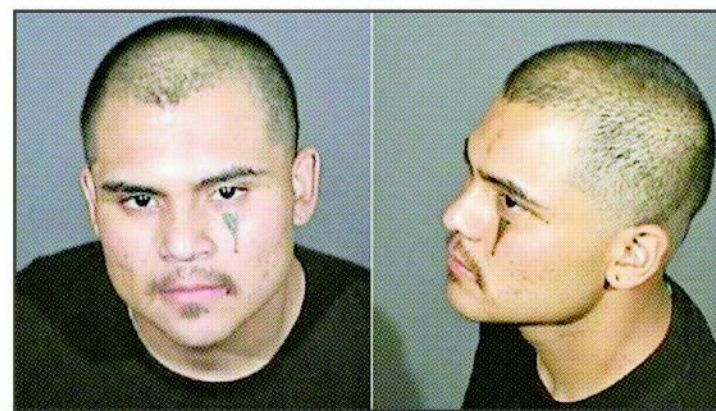

Career Criminal and Gang Member Arrested After Police Chase

EL MONTE / BALDWIN PARK - A career criminal and gang member who was wanted for domestic violence a few days earlier, was seen driving like a manic, recklessly and erratically on Saturday evening, April 30, around 8:00 p.m. As El Monte police attempted to pull him over, he took off. They found the vehicle they were chasing was stolen.

The chase took them through El Monte and into Baldwin Park where he lost control of the stolen Black Acura Integra and crashed into a tree at the intersection of Los Angeles St. and Bresee Ave. in Baldwin Park. From here, the suspect, identified as Cesar Antonio Bobadilla, 23, of El Monte, took off on foot and ran through the back yards of residential homes. Police officers from El Monte and Baldwin Park surrounded the area and he

was soon found hiding in a backyard in the 13900 block of Belgate Street. This is where he was arrested.

He was treated at the hospital for his injuries from the car crash and charged with domestic violence for severely beating up his girlfriend, auto theft, evading police, hit-and-run and resisting arrest.

Since he has been in the United States since 2014, he has

become a gang member and a career criminal. He has had numerous arrests over the last few years and has been sentenced to 3 years in jail, only to get out after serving only 9 months and being released in January of this year because of the AB 109 which release criminals back into the community because of overcrowding. As a career criminal gang member, he has had over 25 charges filed against him.

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
