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Los Angeles County's Top Teachers Named

Two Local Teachers Named as 2020 - 21 Los Angeles County Teachers of the Year

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - Ten educators were announced October 1 as the 2020-21 Los Angeles County Teachers of the Year, representing the best of the profession in the state's largest honors competition for K-12 educators.

Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) Superintendent Debra Duardo presented the outstanding educators in a virtual ceremony broadcast on social media.

"During this time of extraordinary challenges to our school communities, it is especially important that we pay tribute to our outstanding teachers who, in the face of a pandemic, are bringing care, compassion and ingenuity to their virtual classrooms," Duardo said. "I am truly impressed by their innovative practices and the partnerships they are building to keep students learning and thriving."

The winning educators, comprised of seven women and three men, teach a range of grades and subjects at a diversity of school locales, including: Azusa, Baldwin Park, Burbank, Gardena, Los Angeles, Norwalk, Palmdale, Pearblossom, Redondo Beach and Santa Clarita. public-school teachers for this academic year, the 10 educators serve as standard-bearers for the teaching profession and their

72,000 classroom colleagues countywide. Each will receive a cash gift of \$1,000 from the California Credit Union, the program's main sponsor. Additional sponsors include Presenting Partner Arizona State University and Lakeshore Learning.

The 10 were selected from a field of 48 teachers representing 44 districts who participated in the 39th annual Los Angeles County Teachers of the Year competition, organized by the Los Angeles County Office of Education. All participants were recently selected as teacher(s) of the year by their respective school districts.

In addition to being interviewed, contestants submitted essays, lesson plans and other materials to judging panels comprised of peers. At all levels, "TOY" contests are designed to focus public attention on teaching excellence and to honor exemplary dedication, compelling classroom practices, positive accomplishments and professional commitment.

winners automatically advance with other county titlists from around the state to the California Teachers of the Year competition this fall. The state is scheduled to announce its five co-winners in October. But only one of those state co-winners will be chosen to represent California in the National Teacher of the Year contest next spring.

The Los Angeles County Teachers of the Year Program is the largest local competition in the state and nation, and is part of the oldest and most prestigious honors contest in the U.S. for public-school teachers.

Supervisor Kathryn Barger and the Dept. of Public Social Services Provide Backpacks, School Supplies and Books to Local Students

ALTADENA - Los Angeles County Supervisor Kathryn Barger joined Department of Public Social Services Director Antonia Jiménez and DPSS Toy Loan Program staff on Monday to distribute backpacks and school supplies to local children ages 5 through 17 at Farnsworth Park in Altadena.

Observing the requirements to wear masks and social distancing guidelines, participating families remained safely in their vehicles while DPSS Toy Loan staff placed the backpacks in their trunks.

"It's a privilege to equip the youth in our communities with the essential tools they need to be successful this school year," Supervisor Barger said. "Preparing a child for school can be costly for families, especially during these challenging times."

Barger acknowledged the fifth annual Backpack Giveaway's support of low-income families in L.A. County. She also commended the 85-year-old Toy Loan Program for its well-earned reputation as the largest and most successful free toy-lending library program in the nation.

Similar to book loans from a library, the program allows children to borrow toys by checking them out and returning them for a new one.

"The Board of Supervisors has supported the program since its creation in 1935 during the Great Depression as a free service to enrich the lives of low-income children," Barger said. "Children who participate develop a sense of responsibility by observing an honor code and merit system that rewards them when toys are returned on time and in good condition."

Toy Loan Program serves approximately 30,000 children annually at more than 50 toy lending libraries housed at after school programs, community centers, nonprofit organizations and libraries throughout the county. There are five Centers located in the 5th Supervisorial District, including the Antelope Valley Kidz Connection, Covina Public Library, Glendale Didi Hirsch Mental Health Services, Mission College Child Development Center and the Santa Clarita Valley Community Center.

DPSS Director Antonia Jiménez added that all backpacks and school supplies were donated

by County of L.A. employees, L.A. Public Library, private and corporate donors, and through a partnership with Amazon, which allowed online donations by visiting the Toy Loan Program's Amazon Smile wish list. Trader Joe's and Grocery Outlet Altadena were also on-site providing snacks to families and Shoes That Fit donated brand name footwear to every child in attendance. "Our department recognizes the increasing support that children need during this pandemic," Jiménez said. "We want to ensure they are prepared with the tools necessary for a successful school year."

Kamron King started Kings Fitness in 1995, now celebrating 25 years. He is at the gym most of the time. He also has many personal trainers on hand to assist his members.

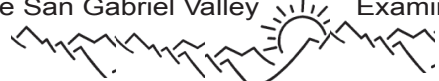

How the November 2020 Election is Different and What We Can Do To Protect Our Votes

In California, voting for the Nov. 3rd Presidential Election will be different from previous elections in several regards. A ballot will be mailed to every registered voter in the State of California. Voters will still have the ability to vote in person, but polling place locations and the voting dates will be different.

It is a concern that every registered voter will receive a mailed ballot because it increases the opportunity for fraud. Voter rolls have not been purged of those who have died, moved, or are some way incapacitated. Every person who receives a valid California driver's license is added to the voter rolls unless they state that they are not U.S. citizens or ask to opt-out. Such willy-nilly mailing of ballots provides the opportunity for someone else to use these ballots. Those who have passed away, moved, or don't wish to vote, will receive a mail-in ballot this year which provides the opportunity for someone else to use it.

Ballot harvesting was allowed by the California Legislation before the 2018 midterm elections. The law allows any representative to gather or "harvest" ballots. Both assistant living facilities and college campuses are ripe for harvest. The Los Angeles Times editorial board, along with others, has called for the law to be fixed or repealed, saying it "does open the door to coercion and fraud."

The danger of Ballot Harvesting is a bi-partisan concern. On September 17, 2020, Congresswoman Tulsi Gabbard, Democrat-Hawaii and Congressman Rodney Davis, Republican-Illinois, introduced The Election Fraud Protection Act in Congress. Rep. Gabbard wrote: "The strength of our democracy lies in the integrity of our elections. Ballot harvesting allows third parties to collect and tamper or sway an election for or against a certain candidate or party. No one should get in between a voter and their vote." Rep. Davis wrote: "We've seen ballot harvesting widely used in states like California and a recent court case in North Carolina outlined the clear opportunities for fraud and coercion with the ballot harvesting process." This bill will prohibit federal funding for states that allow ballot harvesting, thus encouraging all states to stop this practice.

Voting in person is the best way to ensure that your vote will be counted. Take your mailed ballot with you to your polling place, "surrender" it to

the polling authority who will then give you an in-person ballot, cast your votes on-site, and place your completed ballot in the secure box provided.

Counties will vary on how they operate in-person voting and how they manage mail-in ballot processing. Your polling place will be listed on your ballot, or you can find it at your county's Registrar of Voters website.

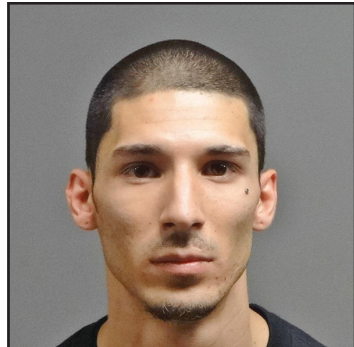
The Election Integrity Project is a non-partisan, non-profit 501(c)(3), public benefit corporation with the goal of enabling citizens to become active participants in the entire election process, from overseeing the integrity of the voter rolls to ensuring that each lawfully cast vote is counted and counted fairly and that all processes are in compliance with federal, state and local laws, statutes and regulations. For over nine years, it has trained over 10,000 citizens to observe, document, and research California elections.

Election Integrity Project suggests that voters:

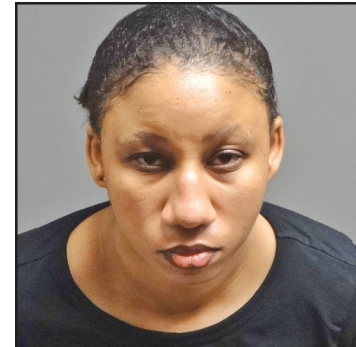
- Check your registration at your county registrar's website and <https://voterstatus.sos.ca.gov>. Report any problems to EIPCa
- Sign-up to track your ballot at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov. This will help you prevent having your ballot used by someone else
- Mark your calendar: you should receive your ballot in the mail NO LATER THAN October 14
- If it has not arrived, call your Registrar's office IMMEDIATELY, report your ballot missing, and insist that it be cancelled and that you be mailed a new one; verify the mailing address
- Vote in person, if possible. It remains the best method to ensure that your vote is counted.
- If you cannot vote in person, turn your ballot in only to a staffed drop box that is emptied daily, a polling location, or your county elections office.

EIPCa needs volunteers to observe at the polls and to observe the mail-in ballot tabulating process. To volunteer, contact Election Integrity Project Ca at <https://www.eip-ca.com/volunteer/>. EIPCa is offering volunteer training that is no more than 90 minutes long and is conducted through zoom conference during election season.

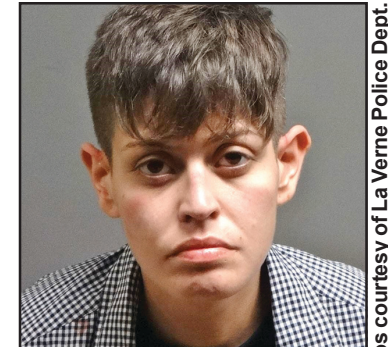
Burglary Suspects Arrested by La Verne Police

LA VERNE - In the early morning of Sept. 29, La Verne police officers located three suspects in the process of burglarizing a business in the 1100 block of Foothill Blvd. Shortly thereafter, another commercial burglary was reported in the 700 block of Arrow Hwy. Video surveillance from the Arrow Hwy location confirmed

that the same suspects were responsible for both burglaries. The suspects, Oscar Flores (27 years old from La Verne), Serenity Dupree (21 years old from Pomona), and Alexis Frenes (26 years old from Pomona) were arrested, booked, and released on citations for burglary.

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With Credit Upgrade and Stable Outlook from Standard and Poor's City of Azusa Issues \$70.1M in Pension Obligation Bonds - to Save Taxpayers over \$54M

AZUSA - Standard & Poor's ("S&P") upgraded the City's credit rating on September 9 from "A+" to a "AA-", with a "Stable" outlook, amidst a global pandemic. The credit upgrade is a result of several strategic actions taken by the Azusa City Council to correct the City's structurally imbalanced budget and ensure financial obligations are met for years to come. S&P's stable outlook reflects their "view that the city's very strong reserves and management's focus on working toward sustainable budgetary balance will enable the city to maintain the current rating..."

Over the past 18 months Council received reports regarding the City's five-year budget forecast and Staff's ongoing Fiscal Sustainability Assessment efforts performed to ensure the City is: capturing all revenues per contractual agreements; maximizing revenue potential through contracts and franchise agreements;

and running its operations as lean as possible without negatively impacting services to Azusa residents and businesses. In addition to successfully renegotiating contracts, Azusa residents voted and passed Measure Z on March 3, providing an additional \$4.5M in annual sales tax revenues. Passage of Measure Z helps the City maintain good financial standing and helps deliver essential services to the Community while weathering the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

A major part of the Fiscal Sustainability Plan involved tackling long-term, costly retirement benefits. Yesterday the City paid off its \$80 million Unfunded Accrued Liability "UAL" pension retirement debt to the California Public Employees' Retirement System "CalPERS" by issuing \$70.1 million in general obligation bonds, and used cash on hand to fully fund its Utility Enterprises' (Electric, Water, and Sewer) debt of \$10.7 million to reduce

the amount of issuance. "Altogether, the issuance will generate average annual savings of approximately \$2.7 million and overall savings of \$54.1 million over the next 20 years. Savings will allow the City to tackle other long-term liabilities such as retiree medical and set funds aside for future increases in UAL," said Administrative Services Director, Talika M. Johnson.

City Staff provides regular financial updates to the City Council and forward-looking projections in order to get policy direction and maintain a proactive approach in meeting Community needs. "We are pleased to see that our financial discipline, good planning and hard work is reflected in an improvement to our credit rating," said Sergio Gonzalez, City Manager. "Furthermore, a stable outlook designation during these uncertain times, says a lot about our City's financial position."

Senator Chang Cracks Down on Price Gougers During Pandemic

Bill Stops Price Gouging on Essential Items

SACRAMENTO - Legislation to combat price gouging, co-authored by Senator Ling Ling Chang (R-Diamond Bar) and sponsored by Orange County District Attorney Todd Spitzer and San Diego County District Attorney Summer Stephan, was signed into law. SB 1196, tightens California law to assist law enforcement officials in prosecuting instances of price gouging that are committed by new sellers during an emergency.

"It's unconscionable to use a state of emergency for a quick buck," said Senator Chang. "I'm grateful the governor supported this bill, helping law enforcement prosecute perpetrators of price gouging. Californians shouldn't have to pay inflated prices for toilet paper or hand sanitizer. This bill ensures that price gougers cannot prey on consumers' in need of essential items."

"Exploiting the public's fear

and panic is not a defense to engaging in criminal activity," said Orange County District Attorney Todd Spitzer. "Existing law left a loophole that allowed opportunists to take advantage of a crisis and overcharge customers for a product just because they had never sold that product before. This important legislation closes that loophole and ensures that those who shamelessly exploit people's vulnerabilities during a time of emergency are prosecuted. In this case we do not reward 'entrepreneurship.'"

Under current law, price gouging is illegal and punishable by law during a declared state of emergency. However, the code hasn't been revisited in nearly 30 years, and while it prevents established sellers of specified goods from committing price gouging, it is silent to new sellers in a market place.

Vote by Mail Ballots Mailed for the Presidential General Election

LOS ANGELES COUNTY — The Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk (RR/CC) began mailing Vote by Mail ballots to all registered voters for the Presidential General Election.

A Vote by Mail ballot will be sent to every registered voter to ensure safe and accessible voting options during COVID-19.

Voters can track their ballot with Where's My Ballot. This easy-to-use tracking tool sends voters automatic notifications when their ballot has left the post office and provides an estimated time of arrival.

We encourage voters to safe-

ly participate in this election returning their mail-in ballot early. There are several safe return options available:

- Return by mail, no postage required – must be postmarked by Election Day
- Drop off at any Vote by Mail Drop Box – October 5-November 3
- Drop off at any Vote Center – October 24-November 3

Voters can visit the RR/CC Norwalk Headquarters to safely vote early in-person. All public health and safety guidelines will be followed, and voters will be required to wear a facial covering.

Shooting in Motel Parking Lot Investigated

WEST COVINA - West Covina Police are requesting that if anyone has any information on a shooting in a parking lot of a motel in West Covina to give them a call and fill them with what you may know to help them get a picture of what happened.

Officers were called to the area of Fairfield Inn & Suites, 3211 E. Garvey Ave. North for a shooting around 5:45 p.m. on Saturday Sept. 26. Once they arrived, they did not see any sub-

jects that could have been involved. However, they found 10 spent shell casings at the scene and they were recovered as evidence.

Police believe that the shooting occurred between the occupants of two vehicles. As for any descriptions of the vehicles, they were not released. At this time, there have been no reports of injuries at any of the hospitals.

The investigation is continuing hoping that someone will shed some light on what happened.

Public Health Announces Timeline for Sector Re-Openings

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health), in consultation with the Board of Supervisors, will revise the Health Officer Order to allow for limited in-door operations at nail salons and shopping malls, outdoor operations for cardrooms, re-opening of outside playgrounds and the school waiver program for grades TK-2.

The following sectors and program will be allowed to reopen on the following dates under the following restrictions:

Nail Salons - October 1 - In-door services may resume at 25% capacity. Outdoor services should continue as much as possible.

Schools (TK-2) Waiver Program - Applications can be submitted on October 5 - Limited to 30 schools per week.

Cardrooms - October 5 - Outdoor operations only. Food and beverages may not be served at the tables.

Indoor Shopping Malls - October 7 - Occupancy limited to

25% capacity; all food courts and all common areas remain closed.

Outside Playgrounds - At the discretion of cities and L.A. County Parks and Recreation - Face coverings and physical distancing are required.

Public Health is consulting with County Counsel to determine the process and date for re-opening outdoor operations at breweries and wineries serving a meal. We anticipate this process will be completed in a week.

Beginning Monday, October 5, school waiver applications for in-person instruction for students in grades TK-2 will be available online at publichealth.lacounty.gov. Applications will be received and reviewed by Public Health in consultation with the State. Schools must follow all required school re-opening protocols for infection control, distancing, and cohorting. Students will be in cohorts of no more than 12 children and two supervising adults in each classroom. This group of students and adults will need to stay

together throughout the entire day for all activities. Every school that re-opens will receive a site visit from Public Health. Public Health has a dedicated team of specialists providing technical assistance and disease management control to all schools that are re-opened or re-opening.

Comprehensive protocols for all sectors that reopen will be posted online to ensure the continued health and safety of workers and the community. Businesses are required to implement the protocols for infection control and distancing prior to re-opening to ensure they are in compliance, and to avoid citations, fines and possible closure. Businesses have a duty to protect employees, customers and residents from COVID-19 as much as possible and to follow Public Health protocols and directives. It is important for everyone to follow the directives and to do their part every day to keep everyone as safe as possible.

Board Approves Supervisor Barger's Motion To Explore Creating A Veteran Suicide Review Team

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Board of Supervisors approved a motion by Supervisor Kathryn Barger and coauthored by Supervisor Sheila Kuehl to begin sharing data about veteran suicides between the Department of Veterans Affairs and Los Angeles County and explore the possibility of establishing a countywide veteran suicide review team.

"I am grateful for the collaboration of our community and government partners who are working every day to ensure we help veterans and their families access services that save and enrich their lives," Supervisor Barger said. "Destigmatizing mental health issues is a crucial step in order

to stop veteran suicide in Los Angeles County."

The Department of Veterans Affairs notes that nationwide, 20 veterans die by suicide every day. Los Angeles County needs additional data to better understand how this issue affects veterans locally.

"It is an anguishing reality that men and women who have put their lives at risk as veterans of the U.S. military are at high risk of suicide as civilians," said Supervisor Sheila Kuehl. "Data collection and data sharing among all agencies addressing veteran suicide is crucial to effectively providing the best possible mental health services for LA County veterans."

The Board of Supervisors sought to address this issue by allocating funding for the Veteran Peer Access Network through the Department of Mental Health.

In collaboration with community organizations and the United States and California Departments of Veterans Affairs, Los Angeles County is working to amplify existing efforts and gain clarity on the mental health crises veterans face in our region.

A suicide review board would enable Los Angeles County to expand prevention efforts and services with the help and recommendations of experts in diverse fields.

Governor Newsom Signs Senator Susan Rubio's Coercive Control Bill, Increasing Domestic Violence Protections

SACRAMENTO - Gov. Gavin Newsom passed a bill by Sen. Susan Rubio (D-Baldwin Park) that would expand protections for domestic violence survivors by allowing them to use descriptions of psychologically damaging and abusive behavior, referred to as coercive control, as supporting evidence in California family court hearings and criminal trials.

Senate Bill 1141 would add "coercive control" to the Family Code. This behavior of coercive control includes: Isolating the victim from friends, relatives, or other support; depriving the victim of basic necessities; controlling the victim's communications, daily behavior, finances, economic resources, and many other be-

haviors that cause severe emotional distress.

"I'm grateful to be at the forefront of such groundbreaking domestic violence policy, and I look forward to working with my partners and allies to spread coercive control legislation across the nation," Senator Rubio said. "I thank Governor Newsom for signing this bill. My hope is that it empowers victims to come forward, and it becomes something that our society understands and recognizes as domestic violence."

"SB 1141 advances the rights of domestic violence victims under State law. My office was proud to sponsor the legislation, and I thank the Governor for signing the bill," said Los Angeles City Attorney

Mike Feuer.

The bill was sponsored by the Los Angeles City Attorney's Office, and supporters include: Crime Victims United of California, Elizabeth House, Free-From, Pathways for Victims of Domestic Violence, Peace Over Violence, StrengthUnited, and the YWCA of San Gabriel Valley.

In addition, Gov. Newsom signed SB 1276, by Senator Rubio, which removes the 10 percent cash or in-kind matching requirement for state grants awarded to domestic violence programs that provide essential resources. In addition to state requirements, domestic violence service providers must also meet match fund requirements for federal funding sources.

Senator Chang Enhances Protection for Domestic Violence Survivors

SACRAMENTO - Legislation to expand protections for survivors of domestic violence, coauthored by Senator Ling Ling Chang (R-Diamond Bar), was signed into law. Senate Bill 1141 expands the definition of domestic violence in the law to include threatening force or intimidation, deprivation of basic needs, and coercive control.

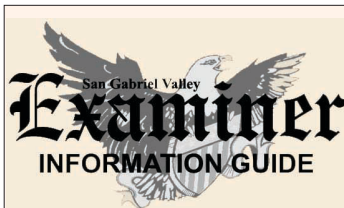
"Unfortunately, we've seen horrifying spikes in domestic violence during this pandemic," said Senator Ling Ling Chang. "Like COVID-19, domestic abuse isn't always visible or

limited to physical violence and it's time we updated the law to reflect that reality. I'm pleased the governor signed this crucial piece of legislation that provides much needed legal tools for survivors."

Senate Bill 1141 would add "coercive control" to domestic violence law. Examples of coercive control include: Isolating the victim from friends, relatives, or other support; depriving the victim of basic necessities; controlling the victim's communications, daily behavior, finances, economic re-

sources, and many other behaviors that cause severe emotional distress.

Before and during the pandemic, Senator Chang has advocated on behalf of the most vulnerable, authoring SB 1123 to help law enforcement agencies respond to elderly abuse. She also urged the Legislative Audit Committee to approve a comprehensive audit of the California Health and Human Service Agency as it relates to their oversight of Skilled Nursing Facilities.

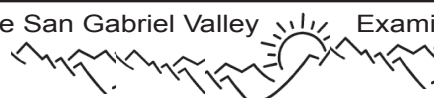

S.F. Mayor, City Attorney Endorse Jackie Lacey

Los Angeles County voters will be making a critical decision on the November 3rd ballot. Return a law and order - tough on crime incumbent, Jackie Lacey, to the District Attorney's Office or someone who subscribes to the Open Society Foundation, George Soros platform, of soft on crime and, a drug policy that supports eliminating the war on drugs and switching to a policy of protecting the "safety and health of users, rather than suppression" like challenger George Gascon?

Soros and his PACS have contributed \$2.5 million to Gascon's campaign against Lacey.

San Francisco Mayor, London Breed and City Attorney Dennis Herrera, have endorsed Jackie Lacey for L.A. County District Attorney over their former District Attorney George Gascon. Herrera has announced lawsuits against drug dealers in the Tenderloin area to stop "the open-air drug dealing" that caused a 70% increase in deaths during Gascon's term.

George Gascon has left San Francisco mired in high crime numbers. Michelle Hanisee, President, Association Deputy District Attorneys, says, "He's proud ... he diverted young adults up to age 25 away from prison, expunged their past marijuana convictions and therefore reduced incarceration rates."

- San Francisco's murder rate was higher-5.7 per 100,000 compared to L.A. County's 6.4 per 100,000.

- San Francisco's violent crime rate was 715 per 100,000 compared to L.A. County's 577 per 100,000.

- San Francisco's property crime rate was 6,168 per 100,000 compared to L.A. County's 2,443 per 100,000.

The huge difference in property crime rates are indicative of those on drugs trying to find the money to support that habit.

Tony Montoya, President, San Francisco Police Officers Association, said, "We are praying for

the residents of Los Angeles, hoping that George Gascon does not do to their city what he did to San Francisco during his tenure: double-digit increases in crime, author of Proposition 47 that created our criminal justice revolving door, cars broken into by the thousands and neighborhoods ravaged by open air drug markets and crime."

George Gascon was co-author of Prop 47 reducing felonies to misdemeanors, including possession of heroin, cocaine and methamphetamine, and allowing persons already convicted of crimes to petition for early release from incarceration reducing prison population by 13,000 and putting them back on our streets.

George Gascon has Gov. Gavin Newsom to thank for his rise in politics.

- 2009, San Francisco Mayor, Gavin Newsom, appointed him as San Francisco Chief of Police.

- 2011, Newsom appointed him San Francisco District Attorney

With 2 1/2 months left in his term as San Francisco's D.A., Gascon resigned to "explore" a run for L.A. County D.A. San Francisco Chronicle reported just days before Gascon's resignation, an independent expenditure committee started the "Run George Run" campaign with a billboard outside Jackie Lacey's office. That committee had already raised "six-figures-plus" to back Gascon.

Mayor London Breed appointed candidate Suzy Loftus, to fill Gascon's vacated seat until after the election. Loftus lost that election to Chesa Boudin, 85,950 votes to 83,511. The Chronicle reports on Boudin's background saying Boudin's parents, members of the Weather Underground, were jailed for murder after taking part in an ar-

mored car robbery leaving him raised in Chicago by Weather Underground leaders Bill Ayers and Bernardine Dohrn. Boudin went on to work for Venezuela's now-deceased socialist President, Hugo Chávez, before coming to San Francisco.

George Soros, 90-year old Hungarian immigrant, has taken millions of his \$8.3 billion fortune to promote his political philosophy by funneling campaign donations through tax-exempt groups and PACs. His top priority has been challenging district attorney offices nationwide and is now targeting the L.A. County D.A. race and Jackie Lacey.

Erika D. Smith, Sacramento Bee, 5/18/18, reported: "During the last election cycle, Soros dumped more than \$3 million on district attorney candidates in six states, flipping seats in Louisiana and Mississippi. In 2014, his Open Society Foundation gave the American Civil Liberties Union a \$50 million grant to elect progressive prosecutors in big cities with large jail populations."

Soros became involved in Sacramento County's D.A. race when incumbent Anne Marie Schubert contributed \$23,194 in 2018 to support the initiative fixing "flaws" in Prop. 47. Her opponent, Noah Phillips, received \$400,000 from California Justice & Public Safety PAC, a Soros organization. Schubert did win that race, but the initiative, Violent Crime Definition, DNA Collection, and Parole Initiative, failed to qualify for the ballot because several county registrars were not able to verify the signatures in time for the ballot. The initiative is back as Prop 20 on the November ballot.

In 2018, San Diego, Republican Interim D.A., Summer Stephan, faced the same onslaught from PACs supporting Democrat Genevieve Jones-Wright. San Diego Union Tribune reported Soros and his California Justice & Public Safety PAC contributed \$402,459 in TV ads, campaign mailings with final numbers in support of Jones-Wright reaching \$848,853.50.

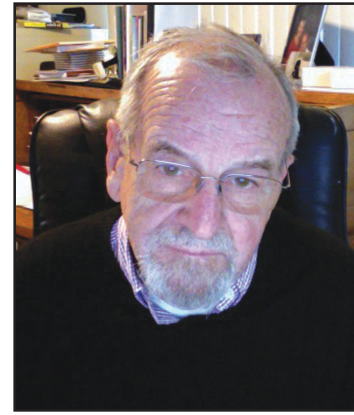

A break from the election Wendy and I have a long-time affectionate relationship with the sea. Wendy was born and grew up in a seaside community south of Melbourne, Australia. I lived in Philadelphia, but year after year we spent the week of Dad's vacation at Ocean City, New Jersey. A couple of other times Dad and I would fish for flounders in Barnegat Bay, renting a rowboat for a dollar.

When my Son, John Mark, was a Junior in high school, he was able to spend the year on a three-mast ocean-going schooner. I had taken a very part-time job recruiting faculty for "The Oceanics," (an alternative high school.) My salary consisted of a berth for John. What a deal!! When John graduated from a public high school the following year, he attended a merchant marine college. Following graduation he worked as a mate on a great LNG (liquid natural gas) ship. I lived in constant fear that he would be killed when the thing blew up somewhere in the Persian Gulf where we were engaged in a very dangerous war. But no, during his yearly vacation John and two cousins were killed when their rented airplane crashed on takeoff. While that has been almost forty years ago, I still grieve. John lives just beyond my right shoulder and at unexpected moments appears--and my grief is renewed.

Years later Wendy and I found ourselves in northwest Missouri, as far as you could get from the sea. One summer when Wendy was visiting her daughter in a village on the coast of Maine, she called about a wooded acreage which was on the Penobscot

Bay. We agreed to buy it and planned to build a modest sea-coast cabin. There is an eight-foot tide in that part of the world, and Wendy had seen the property at high tide. When I saw the property at low tide two years later, instead of the sea I was confronted with a great mud flat. That year we were able to sell the acreage at twice our purchase price.

The week of the sale I encountered a lobster fisherman who told me that he was about to move from his simple seaside house to a nearby mobile park. That afternoon we purchased his house, and for the next few summers we journeyed from Missouri to Castine, Maine where we also became owners of a 26-foot sailboat we renamed the JOHN MARK.

When subsequently I retired from my marvelous Missouri pastorate, we became missionaries assigned to teach in an Australian theological college. After a five-year assignment we decided to return to the USA where we were to take up residence in a church-oriented retirement community. We made the trip home aboard a container vessel that took twenty-nine days to cross

the Pacific.

Now we were back in California, an hour from the ocean, but alas, in these twenty years we only rarely got to see it

My older daughter, Carol, had become a psychiatrist, retired early, and lived with her partner on a sailboat on Catalina Island off the southern California coast. A few years ago she died of lung cancer doubling my grief.

But I still remain fascinated by the sea. I have painted a series of American lighthouses, and used them in a community vesper service. I still resonate with John Masefield who wrote;

I must down to the seas again, to the lonely sea and the sky,

And all I ask is a tall ship and a star to steer her by;

And the wheel's kick and the wind's song and the white sail's shaking,

And a grey mist on the sea's face, and a grey dawn breaking.

I must down to the seas again, for the call of the running tide

Is a wild call and a clear call that may not be denied;

And all I ask is a windy day with the white clouds flying,

And the flung spray and the blown spume, and the sea-gulls crying.

I must down to the seas again, to the vagrant gypsy life,

To the gull's way and the whale's way where the wind's like a whetted knife;

And all I ask is a merry yarn from a laughing fellow-rover,

And quiet sleep and a sweet dream when the long trick's over.

What are we doing to the sea? Tune in next week.

Urgent Plea To Left, Right: No Civil War

As this country stands on the brink of a civil war, one that will decimate a divided United States, we appeal to activists, left and right, to avoid that war no matter what.

Not since 1861 have Americans faced such a calamity. But the destruction that took place in that Civil War was confined largely to the South. This time, every hamlet, town and metropolis in America will be ravaged in the fighting that follows the turmoil over this presidential election if either side resorts to force in response to an electoral outcome they won't ac-

cept.

In 2000, Al Gore wisely, though prematurely, chose to concede to George Bush as a means of preventing violence.

The stakes are much higher in 2020 and the potential for violence is far greater. But can we expect either a Biden or a Trump to follow the precedent set by Gore and concede, coupled with a call for peace?

That's not the Trump style. He has refused to agree to a peaceful transition of power should the election go to Biden, implying that such a victory for the Democrats would come only from a rigged election. That's a virtual call to arms, and the right-wing militias have already demonstrated their dedication to armed force by marching in the streets. Even one of Trump's advisors has urged the president's followers to arm themselves and buy ammunition.

But the violent actions - fires, looting, and barricades - that have followed peaceful protests over police use of unnecessary lethal force point to a left that will not passively accept a Trump electoral victory they will see a usurpation.

Biden may not be able to control his outraged supporters if Republicans state legislatures refuse to certify Biden electors, throwing the election into the House where Trump has a majority of state votes. Or, if the electoral college does choose Biden and Trump refuses to leave office, it is unlikely that Democrats will allow him to stay there by peacefully accepting a fait accompli.

Regardless of what scenario takes place on and after election day, the animosities that have arisen between Americans right and left in the past few months have made the likelihood of war greater than the present danger from Covid-19. We've lost over 200,000 Amer-

icans to the virus. We will lose millions in the coming civil war if it is not prevented by wise leadership, left and right.

Our great cities will be in ruins. Industrial production will cease. Starvation will be rampant. Those who today are dismayed because kids can't have in person teaching at the schools will find that there are no schools at all. Neighbors will turn on neighbors. No section, no community will be spared.

Better dead than Red or Blue? Tell that to the millions of dead Syrians! Here it may be tens of millions of dead Americans.

Left wing cities like San Francisco, Los Angeles and New York will be decimated, but so will Trump places like Idaho Falls, Gatlinburg and Abilene. We may not have used A-bombs in foreign wars after 1945, but don't bet against their use, along with lethal gas, against our own people.

Canada's population will double almost overnight as Americans flee north. Mexico will become the home for many Americans who had denounced refugees seeking asylum in our country.

The nation will be in chaos for years to come if the leadership of left and right do not call for calm. Trump supporters must accept a Biden victory without resorting to obvious sham efforts to block his inauguration. Biden voters must accept the constitutional rules for deciding a presidential election, regardless of how they feel about the winner.

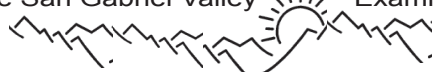

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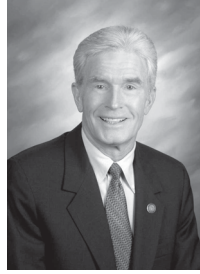
Don't Forget How Good Things Were Before the Pandemic

Thanks to the Wuhan (Covid19) virus, combined with social unrest, everyone I talk to says they will not miss 2020. America was well on its way to unprecedented growth among all strata of society until the China virus invaded the world. Even if 2020 turns into somewhat of a lost year due to the Wuhan Virus lockdowns and related economic challenges, hopefully America can pick up in early 2021 where we left off in early 2020.

Friday's news that President Trump as well as First Lady Melania both tested positive for COVID-19 is not good. While this development will certainly impact his re-election campaign for the next two weeks, hopefully they will both recover fully and return to important in person events during the second half of this month. While our President recovers most of us should still be able to remain focused on America's economy and protecting our cherished personal freedoms. Considering all that the Trump administration has accomplished since his election in November 2016, what letter grade would you give the Trump Administration for their accomplishments through January 2020? I personally think they should receive an A. Consider just a few of the accomplishments this exceptional team has achieved!

Median 2019 household income was \$68,703, an increase of 6.8% from the 2018 median of \$64,324. The \$4,379 increase in 2019 was greater than the entire eight years under Barack Obama's Presidency. This also was the fifth consecutive annual increase in real median household income for family households. More importantly, 2019 real median incomes of all ethnic categories significantly increased, with gains by Blacks (+7.9%), Foreign-born (+8.5%),

Asians (+10.6%), and Hispanics (+7.1%), all of which exceeded percentage gains by Whites (+5.7%). Also, median earnings increased +7.8% for all employed women compared to +2.5% for men, closing the gender gap.

The official poverty rate in 2019 was 10.5%, down 1.3 points from 11.8% in 2018. This was the fifth consecutive annual decline in poverty! Since 2014, the poverty rate has fallen 4.3 percentage points. The recent 10.5% 2019 poverty rate is the lowest rate observed since estimates were first published in 1959. The poverty rate for Whites decreased 1.0 percentage point to 9.1%. The poverty rate for Blacks decreased by 2.0 percentage points to 18.8%. The poverty rate for Hispanics decreased by 1.8 percentage points to 15.7%. The poverty rate for Asians decreased 2.8 percentage points to 7.3%. The poverty rate for people under age 18 decreased 1.8 percentage points to 14.4%. While there is still a poverty gap between races, that gap was the smallest ever and is closing fast!

There is another recent myth that the fake news folks are trying to sell us - that the middle class is disappearing. Well, it's half true, since many people considered to have been in the middle class have been moving up to the richer segment of society, not

falling into poverty. Adjusted for inflation, those earning \$100,000 or more in 2019 dollars grew from barely 10% in 1967 to 34% in 2019, with a significant bump in the years 2018 and 2019. There was an equal drop in the number of poor and middle class in both 2018 and 2019! That upward economic movement is very good news, but you will never hear it from Bernie Sanders.

Consider the dramatic increases in American's take home incomes since the December 2017 tax rate cuts took effect in 2018. Economic gains during 2018 and 2019 dramatically promoted many middle-class people into higher brackets, as well as reducing poverty levels! As a result of a stronger economy and lower tax rates, 2019 enjoyed a record-high 43.8 million U.S. households (34.1% of all households) earning \$100,000 or more, while also accomplishing a record-low 25.4% of households earning \$35,000 or less. This has to be seen as great progress. Do you recall reading this good news anywhere in any newspaper or Web outlet or cable news outlet recently?

Based on this array of data, it was likely that Donald Trump would have easily won re-election next month. But then a certain bug out of China had other ideas. Americans may return to this 2018 and 2019 winning formula in 2021 if Trump is reelected - or not. But however you vote, don't believe the scaremongers who say the middle class has been disappearing into poverty during the Trump administration!

Your Money - Ask Julia

What are my choices on what to do with an IRA I'm inheriting?

The SECURE Act has changed the rules for IRAs inherited in 2020 and thereafter. This is important for those planning to leave an IRA to a beneficiary, as well as for those inheriting that IRA. If you are inheriting this IRA from a spouse, you have the most choices. If you are NOT one of the exceptions (spouse, minor child, disabled, chronically ill, not more than 10 years younger than the deceased), you will be required to receive payouts over a maximum of 10 years. Find out, as soon as possible, their RMD (Required Minimum Distribution) status. If there is a large amount in the IRA, this will probably bump you into a higher tax bracket. Consult with a CPA.

All of my retirement savings is in my 401(k) at work, and is all in the stock market. I'm stressed about what the economy could look like in the next 4 years. I'm close to retirement, so I don't have time for my retirement account balance to recover from a big loss. Partial withdrawals are not allowed, so I cannot move the money. What can I do?

Contact your HR department and get connected with a financial professional of the investment company that actually holds your 401(k). Among other things, it might be suggested that you re-allocate (from riskier to safer). You could consider the option to stop adding money to your 401(k), pay the taxes on that additional income while you are employed, and save the differ-

ence. This savings could be put into a savings account, CD's, a fixed or fixed-index annuity, or a fixed-index life insurance policy.

My CDs mature this month, and the taxes on the growth means I net zero earnings. I want my money to be safe, I want more growth, and I want to pay less taxes. Do you have anything that can give me what I want?

Banks now hold billions of dollars in CD funds. Folks invest in bank CDs for the safety - CDs are FDIC insured and people trust their banks. As you have discovered, the rate of return is low, and you must annually pay taxes on the growth. An alternative to investing with your bank is investing with insurance companies. The strength of the insurance company plays an important role in the safety of your investment dollars. Independent agencies, like A.M. Best and Standard & Poor's, rate and make public "grades" on each insurance company. Insurance companies offer a product that historically may outperform a CD because of higher rates along with the bene-

fit of deferring taxes until accessing those funds. Also, there are ways to access funds in certain life insurance policies, tax free, while you are living.

How can we be more financially prepared for disasters?

Putting aside, for a moment, the emotions and basic physical needs of food, water, shelter, medical care, and personal protection, it is also important to think about being more financially prepared in case of a disaster. In the case of loss of life, there are always survivors who wish their loved one had more life insurance. In the case of 'natural' disasters (hurricanes, tornados, earthquakes, fires, etc.), homeowners or renters insurance helps. It can also be helpful to have an easily accessible stash of cash. (ATMs use electricity and can run out of money.) It's also good to stockpile supplies (e.g. toilet paper, coffee, first aid items) to trade for items someone else has available. Keep in mind that if this nation's economy, or even the global economy crashes, we're all going to be in the same survival situation.

Supervisors Allow Breweries and Wineries to Re-Open for Outdoor Service

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved a motion authored by Supervisor Janice Hahn and co-authored by Supervisor Kathryn Barger which will allow breweries and wineries to begin outdoor service in one week, in accordance with current State health orders.

The State of California has allowed breweries and wineries to reopen for outdoor service if they partner with a third-party permitted food vendor. However, the County of Los Angeles has not permitted breweries and wineries that do

not have restaurant licenses to resume service. While several breweries and wineries do have restaurant licenses and small kitchens, many do not and have been struggling to survive.

"This is an important step forward for businesses and employees throughout the County," said Supervisor Kathryn Barger, who co-authored the motion. "As our case numbers have decreased, I have championed for breweries and wineries to reopen safely with necessary health protocols and guidance in place. I am pleased to have the opportunity to col-

laborate to seek solutions that will help support our communities."

Supervisor Hahn's motion, which was read-in during the Board meeting, allows breweries and wineries to re-open in alignment with the State's health order in one week. The reopening shall abide by strict safety guidelines, including but not limited to: outside operations, limited hours of operation, required reservations, appropriate social distancing, and all appropriate safety measures. The motion passed with a vote of 3-2.

California Bill Requiring Diversity on Corporate Boards Signed into Law

SACRAMENTO - Governor Newsom signed landmark legislation that requires diversity on corporate boards in California. The bill, AB 979, is joint authored by Assemblymembers Chris Holden, Cristina Garcia, and David Chiu, with Assemblymember Eloise Gomez Reyes and Senator Ben Hueso as principal co-author. The bill requires publicly held corporations headquartered in California to have at least one director from an underrepresented community by the close of 2021.

"The new law represents a big step forward for racial equity," said Assemblymember Chris Holden. "While some corporations were already leading the way to combat implicit bias, now, all of California's corporate boards will better reflect the diversity of our State. This is a win-win as ethnically diverse boards have shown to outperform those that lack diversity."

Soon after the social unrest following the killing of George Floyd, many corporations publicly stated their support for diversity and Black lives. Researchers, however, have

pointed out that this public support for social justice movements often does not lead to long-term structural change in hiring and retention policies of a diverse staff and leadership. The current statistics are quite stark. The Deloitte Missing Pieces Report: The 2018 Board Diversity Census of Women and Minorities on Fortune 500 Boards found that out of 1,222 new board members of Fortune 100 companies, 77% were white.

"The lack of diversity on California's boards and upper level corporate positions is a challenge we urged corporations to address on their own during our time in the Legislature," said Assemblymember Christina Garcia. "However, it is clear we can no longer wait for corporations to figure it out on their own. By ensuring diversity on their boards, we know the corporations are more likely to both create opportunities for people of color and give them the support to thrive within that corporation. I'm excited this bill is signed and look forward to California continuing to lead the way in our fight for racial equity in

general."

"This measure recognizes that including the perspectives of underrepresented groups in leadership roles will result in more innovation, improved productivity, and better economic outcomes," said Assemblymember David Chiu, Chair of the Asian Pacific Islander Legislative Caucus. "I applaud Governor Newsom for signing this important bill to ensure corporate boards reflect the diversity of our state and are able to truly serve California's diverse population."

In addition to the 2021 benchmark, AB 979 also requires corporate boards to include two members from underrepresented communities for corporations with more than four members, while corporations with more than nine must have a minimum of three by 2022. The bill defines a director from an underrepresented community as an individual who self-identifies as Black, African American, Hispanic, Latino, Asian, Pacific Islander, Native American, Native Hawaiian, or Alaska Native, or who self-identifies as gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender.

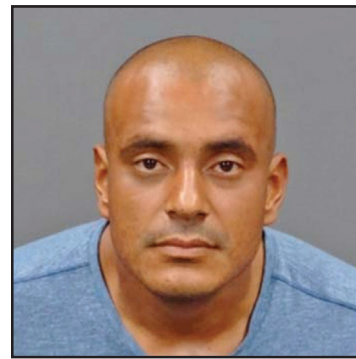

Habitual Criminal Arrested Again

IRWINDALE - Back on Sept. 4th, the Irwindale police responded to Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission Church, 16239 Arrow Hwy to find Noel Alejandro Rivera damaging the historical statues outside of that church. The statues were located in front of the church and when officers arrived, they found one of the statues ripped from its foundation and thrown into the roadway.

Once officers tried to approach and talk with the man, he became totally uncooperative and combative. He fought with police and was charged accordingly. At that time, he was taken into custody and was booked on suspicion of vandal-

ism and resisting arrest. The damage was high enough to declare this to be a felony, yet he was released pending a fu-

ture court date.

Since that release, he has been arrested two more times, with one being a felony and bail set at \$55,000. Again, he was released without posting bail on both of the arrests. He was arrested 17 times in less than two years with 55 different charges against him. He has been in the area less than two years.

Police are concerned that he will eventually hurt or kill someone, but there is nothing that they can do about it.

Walnut Valley USD Delivers an Estimated \$15M in Lower Interest Cost to Local Taxpayers

WALNUT - Walnut Valley Unified School District has taken advantage of the current historically low interest rate environment with the sale of \$47.9 million in Measure WV Series B Bonds.

At a competitive sale held August 12, the District received six bids from financial institutions around the country. Bank of America Securities was awarded the 30-year bonds at an average fixed interest rate of 1.89%,

which is significantly lower than the originally forecast 4.00% rate.

District officials estimate the financial transaction has saved local taxpayers \$15.5 million in reduced interest costs.

"These extraordinarily low interest rates can be attributed to two main factors: wise market timing and the school district's extremely high credit rating," said Financial Advisor Timothy Carty from Piper Sandler. "That

credit rating is a testament to the strength of the entire Walnut Valley community as well as the steady leadership on the part of the school district Board and Administration."

Proceeds from the sale of Measure WV Series B Bonds will continue to fund construction and improvement projects at school sites throughout the community.

Measure WV received voter approval during the November 8, 2016 election.

BALDWIN PARK - As one of the 31 cities in the Bike Share program, the City of Baldwin Park kicked-off the socially-distanced ribbon-cutting ceremony for the regional #GoSGV Bike Share Program launch Thursday morning, October 1.

The event included a brief bike ride to launch the new regional bike share program. The program is part of a collective effort led by the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments (SGVCOG) GoSGV bike-share initiative. This regional program offers an accessible and affordable transportation option to residents of Baldwin Park and the San Gabriel Valley through shared-use electric-assist bicycles.

The GoSGV program and launch of the Gotcha bike-share services throughout the San Gabriel Valley align perfectly with the City's commitment to serving as a regionally recognized bike-friendly community.

This multi-city partnership compliments various city-wide key projects that continue to improve the mobility infrastructure of our community, including; the Maine Avenue Complete Streets Project and Streetscape Design Guideline Elements Project at major intersections, corridors, and entry points of the City.

Starting with an initial outlay of 45 bikes in the City of Baldwin

Park, #GoSGV will expand to 840 bikes stationed at bike share hubs in half of the 31 cities and unincorporated communities in the San Gabriel Valley.

Download the Gotcha Mobility App to rent pedal-assist bikes. It costs \$2 to unlock and \$0.10 per minute of ride time. These bikes offer an easy way to take short trips around town while avoiding traffic and reducing emissions from single-occupancy cars.

Electric-assist bicycles are similar to regular bikes but have pedal assist which help riders by boosting their pedaling efforts, making it easier to climb hills, travel longer distances and assist individuals with physical limitations that prevent extended cycling. GoSGV bikes can be returned to stations, or elsewhere for a small fee. Gotcha is responsible for ensuring that e-bikes are maintained at stations.

Glendora Historical Society Gifts Glendora Woman's Club With 1914 Magazine featuring Woman's Club's New Clubhouse

GLENDORA - At the Glendora Woman's Club meeting on April 2, 2019, Glendora Historical Society's Executive Vice President Steven B Flowers, was a special guest. During his visit, he presented Woman's Club historian Rose Myers a gift of a magazine from 1914.

The November 1914 edition of The Countryside Magazine and Suburban Life that Flowers had found online, featured the Glendora Woman's Club and clubhouse.

The magazine article featured three photos, titled "A Woman's Club Small Clubhouse - Simple, Home like, Practical" that described the Glendora Woman's Club and the recent completion of its clubhouse in 1912.

The photos in the 1914 Woman's Club story included an exterior photo of the Woman's Club new clubhouse, an interior photo, and a floor plan. The club's recently purchased 1905 Kimball baby grand piano can be seen on the left side of the stage area.

The magazine article was written by Dora Summers Wamsley (Mrs. T Victor) who was a Woman's Club past president and charter member.

Additional history of the club's first club house in 1912 was available in the club's archives. Information included the club's first meeting in the newly completed clubhouse held on the November 5, 1912. Also, the Glendora clubhouse was located, as it is today, at 424 N. Glendora Avenue, present name of the street that had been re-named. Listed as the builder of the Glendora

Woman's Club's first clubhouse in 1912 was the R.M. Goebel Co. of Glendora, with plans prepared by TW Wamsley.

During the years since the Woman's Club's clubhouse was built, both major and minor improvements have been made to the building. In 1955-56, the entire clubhouse was remodeled, with John Harmon, Jr of Glendora as the architect. Over the years, the Glendora Woman's Club has continued

its regular philanthropy work, and has also continued to service the community by maintaining a clubhouse.
