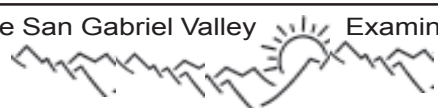

# West Covina City Council Votes Away Benefits

WEST COVINA - West Covina Councilman Lloyd Johnson worked on fulfilling one of his campaign platform promises to review and to eliminate many of the benefits that the Council receives.

There were 13 items that he wanted to address which included health insurance, auto allowance, deferred compensation, dental insurance, retiree dental, vision insurance, term policy, life insurance benefit which would be for the retirement, military buyback, retiree medical, section 125 plan, and tuition reimbursement.

At the February 2 city Council meeting the city Council voted 4-1 to eliminate health, retirement and other benefits that the city Council gets yearly.

Johnson contended that even though being a councilmember is considered a part-time job it is still a very time-consuming job and it stated that they receive \$765 per month plus various allowances, including a car allowance of \$300 per month. After a councilmember has been on the Council for five years, presently they can receive many lifetime benefits, not only for themselves, but for the entire family. It had been argued that full-time employees must work with the city for 20 years to be eligible for the same type of benefits. Council addressed a number of the issues and modified the car allowance to be \$150 per month. It was also argued that many of the councilmembers have other jobs or their spouses have jobs, and they already have insurance in place.

During council discussion, Councilman Tony Wu was concerned that some people may not want to run for council with these new restrictions in place. He feels that these benefits would make running for the City Council an attractive endeavor would get good people to run.

The city Council voted 4-1 to eliminate or

modify the benefits. Councilman Tony Wu was the dissenting vote. The adjusted benefit package will go into effect after the next election and does not presently affect any councilmembers that are now sitting until after the next election.

The Council then made a motion which was seconded so they could open it for discussion, the councilmembers could purchase the same benefits through the city of West Covina. This was passed 5-0.

During Johnson's campaign he talked about eliminating these benefits that he would bring it to the table if elected. Although concerned that he is just one vote, he had hoped that if elected that the Council would be behind him on this issue. Within weeks of him taking the seat he was already fulfilling that campaign promise. This will be a big savings for the city, and the savings could help with the hiring of new police officers for the city.

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## Small Business Owners Award Huff with Perfect Score

*Name Senator Huff a "True Friend of Job Creators"*

SACRAMENTO - Senate Minority Leader Emeritus Bob Huff (R-San Dimas) has been awarded a perfect score from the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB California) in the latest voting record compiled for the 2015 legislative session. The 100-percent score follows on the heels of a perfect ranking awarded to Senator Huff by the California Chamber of Commerce last year. He earned top honors in the Chamber's "Best Business Votes" category.

Senator Huff earned the NFIB's high score by supporting or opposing "bills that significantly impact small business." He supported business-friendly measures designed to create jobs and opportunities, and opposed measures that sought to increase the cost of doing business in California.

"Every legislator claims to be a friend of small business, but our voting record puts them to the test," said Tom Scott, Cali-

fornia Executive Director for the National Federation of Independent Business/California. "I am delighted that Senator Huff has once again shown his commitment to small business and new job creation by compiling a perfect score. He understands the need for new jobs in California and knows the business-friendly steps that need to be taken and policies that need to be adopted to realize this goal."

The NFIB Legislative Voting Record for 2015 contains key votes on 13 bills, and the NFIB says Senator Huff's voting record on these measures "serves as a vital reality check to separate the true friends of job creators from political rhetoric."

Senator Huff earned his NFIB ranking by supporting measures that sought to create a program for small businesses to obtain low-interest loans to bring their facilities into compliance with the Americans with

Disabilities Act (AB 1230) and legislation that allows flexibility to California's strict 100 percent standard on labeling a product "Made in the U.S.A." to businesses that must outsource an insignificant part of their product (SB 633).

He also opposed measures that would have increased the cost of obtaining worker's compensation insurance (AB 305) and legislation that would have allowed local governments to raise their portion of the sales tax by another cent (AB 464).

"According to the latest California information from the U.S. Small Business Administration, almost all firms with employees are small," said Senator Huff. "They make up 99.2 percent of all employers in the state. Lawmakers should be taking actions to support and encourage our small business owners. Instead, many times this Legislature takes those contributions for granted."

## Mobile Home Fire Claims One Life

GLENDORA - On February 4, 2016 at 1132 hours, Glendora Police Officers and the Los Angeles County Fire Department responded to a structure fire at the Tropics Trailer Park, 428 E. Route 66, in Glendora. Upon officers' arrival, the mobile home was fully engulfed in flames. It took firefighters from the Los Angeles County Fire Department approximately thirteen minutes to extinguish the

fire. One mobile home was severely damaged and a 5th wheel trailer was completely destroyed in the fire.

The initial information from the joint investigation indicated there were two victims. Upon the arrival of the Los Angeles County Coroner, the search of the trailer continued and only one victim was located.

The investigation into the cause of the fire is ongoing;

however there are no obvious signs of foul play at this time. The victim's identification will be released by the Los Angeles County Coroner's Office when positive identification is made, and next of kin is notified.

The Red Cross is currently assisting the displaced residents with temporary housing.

## DUI Driver Kills Motorcyclist

IRWINDALE - A woman suspected of drunk driving was arrested after she was involved in a traffic collision with a motorcyclist who was killed.

Pamela Ramirez, 23, of Baldwin Park was involved in a traffic collision on Friday evening February 5 at the corner Longden and Myrtle avenues. The 29-year-old man on

the motorcycle was traveling north on Myrtle on his 2009 Yamaha. Ramirez was driving her 2008 Chevy Malibu south on Myrtle when she made a left turn on Longden Avenue into the path of the motorcycle. The motorcyclist, who was not identified, was thrown from the bike and critically injured. Paramedics transported him to Los Angeles County - USC Medical

Center where he died a short time later.

Ramirez was detained at the scene and was given a field sobriety tests. At that time officers suspected she was a DUI driver, and was arrested for felony DUI. Later this charge was elevated to gross vehicle manslaughter. Her bail was set at \$100,000. Ramirez has pending court dates.

## Covina Police Arrest Man with Guns, Mask and Cash

COVINA - Around 5 PM on Saturday, February 6, the Covina police observed a passenger in a vehicle drinking a beer at the intersection of Citrus Avenue and Rowland Street. The vehicle had a female driver and a female pas-

senger as well.

During the stop, the Covina police officers, found that the man, identified as, Thomas Michael Mulero, 28, of Ontario was on felony probation for an assault conviction. He was out in the streets because of Assembly Bill 109 which allows

felons to be released on what they call a Post-Release Community Supervision.

When the police continued their investigation, they searched the man's backpack. In the backpack they found two semiautomatic pistols and one revolver. They also found a ski mask and cash. He was arrested for weapons violation, investigation of a robbery, and also receiving stolen property. The two women with the suspect were not arrested and released.

Bail for the Mulero was set at \$50,000. The investigation continues to find out more information on where the guns and the money came from. If anyone has any additional information, they are welcome to call the Covina Police Department.

## Assemblyman Mike Gatto Announces Legislation to Restructure the Public Utilities Commission

SACRAMENTO - Assemblyman Mike Gatto (D-Los Angeles), chairman of the influential Utilities and Commerce Committee, announced a constitutional amendment to restructure and reform the constitutional protections currently given to the scandal-ridden California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). Chairman Gatto was joined by his joint authors, Assemblymember Scott Wilk (R-Santa Clarita) and Marc Levine (D-San Rafael) who believe now is the time to reassess the CPUC's role as a regulator.

"After hearing about how the clear warnings of the impending Aliso Canyon gas leak were lost in the shuffle, I concluded that we need to rethink the way we regulate utilities in this state," said Gatto. "Our con-

cern is that the CPUC is too big to succeed; it is time to hit the reset button."

The Public Utilities Reform Act will reform the Public Utilities Code to modernize the CPUC, reassign regulation of industries unrelated to the CPUC's core functions to more appropriate state agencies, and provide greater accountability to Californians.

The act recognizes that the 21st Century no longer requires the CPUC be enshrined in the California Constitution, placing an initiative before voters to repeal the constitutional mandate and authority of the CPUC. In order to ensure a continuum of regulation and oversight, it will preserve certain critical authorities and functions in the Public Utilities Code, but these provi-

sions will sunset July 1, 2018. In the interim, the Legislature will have the opportunity to reallocate the functions of the CPUC to existing departments and agencies, or to a successor entity.

"The people of California are deeply concerned by the CPUC's failures in recent years," said Gatto. "You have folks in the Bay Area justifiably concerned after a pipeline explosion, Orange County worried about nuclear waste, Sacramento and the Central valley on edge with oil trains, and of course, Angelenos deeply concerned after a gas leak."

The legislature has made several attempts to reform the commission in past years, but those advances were met by the Governor's veto pen.

## Consumer Protection Bill Introduced On Unreasonable Health Insurance Rates

SACRAMENTO - Senator Ed Hernandez, O.D. (D - West Covina), Chair of the Senate Health Committee, introduced SB 908, a consumer protection bill that will require health plans and health insurers whose rates have been determined to be unreasonable or unjustified by a California regulator, to notify the purchaser of this determination and provide them an extra 60 days to shop for more affordable coverage.

The Department of Managed Health Care and California Department of Insurance have been reviewing rates for individual and small employer health insurance since 2011. However, the purchasers of coverage are not always aware that their rate was found unreasonable or unjustified, which can result in the purchaser being locked into an

unreasonable rate.

"Consumers don't know what they don't know," said Senator Ed Hernandez, "Many times they get locked into an excessive rate, because they had no idea it was found unreasonable by a California regulator - consumers should know they could do better by switching plans."

Senator Hernandez remains adamant about better informing individuals so they can make the best decisions for themselves and their families. He has repeatedly said, "In a world where we compel people to purchase health insurance, we must empower consumers to make accurate and informed decisions about the plans and policies they are choosing."

In a recent press release intended to inform the public

about an unreasonable rate determination made on a product filed by Aetna, "Shelley Rouillard, Director of DMHC said, "I strongly encourage small employers subjected to these unreasonable rate increases to explore more affordable health coverage options."

According to the California Public Interest Research Group, consumers and small business owners have saved more than \$350 million in rate reductions since 2011 as a result of our current rate review system.

Senator Hernandez is confident that his colleagues in the Legislature will agree that better informed consumers, make for a better functioning health care system in California.

The bill is sponsored by Health Access California.

## Los Angeles County To Study Marijuana Processing Ban

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich has directed county departments to enact a 45-day moratorium on the cultivation, manufacturing or laboratory testing of medical marijuana in the county unincorporated areas while the impacts of a ban can be studied.

While the County has banned the dispensing of medical marijuana from storefront locations through its zoning code, the use of land for the cultivation, manufacture and laboratory testing of medical marijuana is

not specifically banned. The Board continued an item proposed by Antonovich which would have placed a similar moratorium on mobile sales and delivery of medical marijuana which has been associated with criminal activity.

"Medical marijuana activities involve issues that adversely impact the public and we have a fundamental obligation to protect the quality of life in our unincorporated neighborhoods and communities," Antonovich said. "For the County to make

an informed determination whether to allow, regulate, or ban these activities, a study to determine the impacts of these activities on the County's unincorporated communities should be conducted."

Additionally, outdoor cultivation is often associated with violations of local, state, and federal environmental laws and pesticide regulations, threatening harm to local waterways and groundwater quality, and endangering the public health and safety.

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# The Religion We Still Need - Part Two

Last week I turned loose the often-neglected right side of my brain and suggested the sort of religion I believe we still need, using the words of the 14th century Sufi poet, Hafiz. I promised this week to offer a few specific examples of what this religion might look like. That is obviously an impossible task for the limited words at my disposal. Three of you suggested that I might consider writing a book detailing what I thought. I know the energy and time that takes, and alas, I have neither these days. So for this week I am only making a few suggestions that are no more than fingers pointing down to the depths of the human experience, not up to some celestial being or realm. Obviously I am not suggesting a specific religion or religious structure, but only offering a few clues as to what any adequate religious commitment might look like. So here goes. The sort of religion we still need

would include:

- A serious confrontation with the Mystery that surrounds our existence. How do we talk or even think about it? Does life have meaning or is it, "a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing"? The symbols, rituals and structures of most common religious traditions already deal with these questions. But religion goes sour when we worship what are only proximate signs and symbols. In the West deification of the

Bible or any of its doctrines, or affirming the infallibility of the church, define the sort of religion we no longer need. But the religion we still need must encounter the unfathomable we can only approach prayerfully.

- Any notion of God as a super, powerful, all-knowing being governing things from the heavens, and violating the natural world if we only ask Him (sic) to do so, is no longer a helpful image. The image we still need involves the Holy as an everywhere present reality in all events and in all things. Not that God and the natural world are one and the same, but that God is in all existence as the dynamic presence, thus honoring what we now know or shall know about the natural world is theologically important. All nature is sacred. It does not describe what exists just for us to use or even to use up. Science is a colleague, not an ad-

versary. The discoveries of science are where we find God continually at work. God may be the energy in all things and in all events.

- Religion must center on building bridges, not doctrinal cages either for protecting the righteous or walling off the unrighteous. Authentic religion is automatically inter-faith. Any religious system which believes itself to be the only avenue to the Holy is by definition no longer of value. At the same time religion must always be open to avenues of hope beyond itself. Truth is found in the great conversation among the self, the world's religions and all the so-called secular disciplines such as history, philosophy and other serious avenues of rational discourse.

- Every authentic religion must have at its core values including compassion, justice, the celebration of peace and the re-

duction of violence. While a separation of official religious structures and governing institutions is essential, there can be no division between religion and those political, economic and social systems that are centered on the dignity and worth of every person.

- Religion must take the plight of the individual seriously. Tragedy, suffering, grief, loss and death are only some of the human conditions any vital religion must confront. Comforting the afflicted is as important as afflicting the comfortable. For many, religion is their only safe harbor.

- The kind of religion we still need provides communities of people bound together for mutual support. While it is entirely possible to be spiritual without being religious, authentic spirituality involves intimate supportive relationships among people who find it impossible to

make it alone in this increasingly complex world. It is still true that "no man is an island entire of itself." We all still need each other, and therefore some form of organized community remains vital for most of us.

- There are hundreds of millions of people who find purpose and meaning in already established religions. For me it is the Christian experience centered in the life and teachings of Jesus. For many others any organized religious system is unhelpful. The "spiritual," those who no longer are or never were religious, may, however, find meaning without any traditional religious organization.

I only suggest the above as clues by which we may address the Mystery that confronts all of life. These images are only the vessels whose role is to transport the sacred.

## Initiative Proposes Potential Increased Water Costs

We have a new initiative being proposed for the November ballot and it is proposed and supported by League of California Cities (LCC), California State Association of Counties (CSAC), and Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA).

California Water Conservation, Flood Control and Stormwater Management Act of 2016 was created after a challenge to San Juan Capistrano's tiered water rate schedule was ruled unconstitutional because

it violated Prop. 218. Voter-approved Prop 218 requires government agencies not charge consumers more for a service than it actually costs to provide that service and requires a simple majority of the voters to approve the rate increase.

LCC, CSAC and ACWA are the authors and proponents of this initiative that that would allow a tiered rate water structure to encourage conservation and meet the state and federal mandates leveled on local governments. To meet those standards is costing local governments a huge amount of money

and not meeting those regulatory mandates could cost locals big bucks in fines.

The 1972 Federal Clean Water Act established something called National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) to regulate sources of pollution from getting into various water sources. That even included monitoring and correcting rain water from parking lots due to the potential of oil polluting that rain water.

In 1990, Federal EPA created additional regulations called the MS4 Permit requirement and through the L.A. County Re-

gional Water Quality Control Board required Storm Water Management Plans from each city and county. The goal: reduce pollutants to the maximum extent possible, and created a new acronym called MEP.

Additionally, under these federal mandates locals are to provide:

- Public education outreach
- Illicit discharge detection and elimination
- Monitoring of construction and post construction
- Monitoring of municipal operations

Sounds mundane and quite environmentally sensitive doesn't it? But it is costing huge amounts of money long-term ... general fund money ... from

local government pockets. Millions of dollars in fact to establish monitoring stations to determine if pollutants are escaping into various water sources.

This new initiative proposes funding sources:

- Allowing water rates for customers to be set to encourage water conservation, prevent waste and discourage excessive use of water.

- It would allow fees or charges to be levied for flood control and management of stormwater to protect coastal waters, rivers, lakes streams, groundwater and drinking water.

- Allow user fees or charges to reduce water and sewer fees for low-income customers.

The initiative does require notice of a public hearing to advise ratepayers of the proposed rate increases, why the jurisdiction is making this proposal and exactly what they will be doing with the increased revenue.

Both NPDES and MS4 are eating up a huge amount of staff time and costing literally millions of local dollars, but how much of what Federal EPA and Regional Water Board are requiring of each city and county is actually necessary and realistic in maintaining a clean safe water supply? And, now, it appears, the federal mandated buck is being passed on to the rate payer once again.

## The Ensuing California Water Challenge

Over a hundred years ago Mark Twain coined the phrase "Whiskey is for drinking and water is for fighting over".

These words have never been as true as they are today. Faced with exponential population growth, drought conditions, sustainability, federal mandates and the need for government to enlist more control with a thirst for new funds sets up a challenging phase for the residents of California.

For decades government has been challenging individual water rights all the way to the California Supreme Court. There are two main rights in California as it pertains to who owns the water and one key word. The two rights are Pueblo Water Rights which only affect Los Angeles and San Diego giving them basic unfettered water access and Riparian Water Rights which come from English Common law giving water rights to the owner of the land for which the water flows through. The key word is "beneficial" meaning the land owner can use the water for their needs. The State of California through a Supreme Court ruling also said the state has beneficial uses for the water as well which can set up a conflict of rights.

In September 2014 Governor Jerry Brown signed in to law a string of new legislation that mandates water conservation, water storage, and water quality control mimicking Federal EPA rules and beyond that will cost Californians billions over the next several years. On the heels of this historic legislation President Obama added the San Gabriel Mountain range to the National Monuments in October of 2014. The Presidential Proclamation of 2014 states "The establishment of this monument is subject to valid existing rights" Then goes on to say "Nothing in this procla-

tion shall be construed to alter the valid existing water rights of any party, including the United States." The key factor in adding the mountain range to the National Monuments is the water. The Federal government owns all water on Federal lands as stated in Federal law.

The San Gabriel Mountains have been an important watershed for Glendora for decades and Councilwomen Judy Nelson was the only Glendora government official sounding the emergency bells to save this important resource for the citizens of Glendora.

Over the coming months and years cities and municipalities will have to put into play water conservation rules, mandates and plans to cover all of the above legislation from water storage to monitoring groundwater contamination, testing, storm water diversion and cleaning prior to percolation into the ground water within the City limits. The City of Glendora is estimating to spend over \$233 million over 23 years alone as well as added expensive and inflexible permitting processes.

Our already cumbersome building permit process and fees will undoubtedly become more challenging pitting citizens against Government unless we promote transparency, accountability and unity of purpose. Creativity and a sense that we are all in this together as well as eliminating the political cast system will help us weather the oncoming storm. A key to Glendora's success is to implement "best practices" schooling ourselves on what other municipalities do best towards governing their Cities.

There are discussions of further assessment to the Citizens of California to help fund all of the mandates that are not covered by the initial Bonds authorized by the voters. The State Water Bond passed in 2014 covers almost none of the costs of

the Water Quality Control Act" and its mandates. It allots \$230 million for storm water projects. The cost for LA Co. is over \$20 billion; the cost for Glendora is over \$233 million, more than the entire amount allotted from the bond to put this matter into contrast.

Although it's a laudable goal for safe and abundant drinking water there are more creative ways to achieve these goals. San Diego is currently installing the largest desalination plant in California with various other Cities in the planning stages along with other municipalities and many Cities that are using reclaimed water for landscaping our common green belts. There are also newer technologies that draws water from the air (atmospheric water generators) producing millions of gallons annually and special water hyacinth (water plants) that can clean our water and waterways that some of our theme parks use to name a few.

We must be diligent in holding our elected officials accountable to the funds entrusted to them in carrying out the new mandates and not see these funds reprogramed for other uses as we have seen in the past as well as not trampling on our basic rights. We also must push back on the size and scope of the unfunded mandates as to not bankrupt our future and the future of our children. Creativity, the private sector and quality politicians are the key in solving our many issues that Californians are facing.

And that's also what happened to both prisoners and distressed dogs who were videotaped being brought together in a program called [Dogs on the Inside](#). The effect on both the mistreated and homeless dogs and the distrustful prisoners was amazing. Dogs and inmates were able to learn to trust and overcome past experiences, and when they did so their demeanor and behavior noticeably softened and changed.

There – in prison – the healing and transforming power of love was found.

This power of love has a surprising connection to the world of science. Most view science as analytical answers and measurable facts, while love's power is by its very nature intangible and unquantifiable. But Albert Einstein, one of the most forward thinking scientists who ever lived, disagreed. According to letters released by Einstein's daughter Lieserl, Einstein once wrote, "When I proposed the theory of relativity, very few understood me, and what I will reveal now to transmit to mankind will also collide with misunderstanding and prejudice in the world. ... There is an extremely powerful force that, so far, science has not found a formal explanation to, it is a force that includes and governs all others, and is even behind any phenomenon operating in the universe and has not yet been identified by us. What a healing gift to give to yourself and all you meet this Valentine's Day and every day of the year!

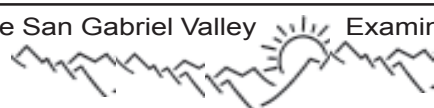

## January Employment Data Disappoints

Friday's jobs report was very significant, in part because jobs have become an important sticking point for the Fed. Several FOMC members have acknowledged recent ugliness in measures of demand, including Q4 GDP and consumption, but they were hung up on the fourth quarter's strong job creation.

The U.S. economy created just 151,000 jobs in January, well short of the 190k consensus. This is the latest sign that growth is slowing, though the federal government's unemployment rate fell to 4.9 percent.

Amid volatile financial markets and signs of contraction in manufacturing and corporate profits, the job engine slowed as well. However, despite the disappointing jobs number, wages grew and more Americans joined the labor force.

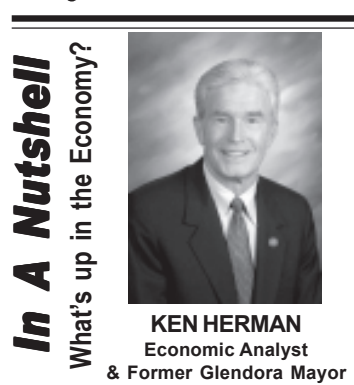
Friday's report comes a month after the Federal Reserve approved its first interest rate hike in nine years and as Wall Street speculation intensifies over what the central bank might do in the future. Fed officials have indicated a desire to hike rates as many as four times in 2016, though market expectations are for fewer or even no interest rate increases in 2016.

"This is the first time that the unemployment rate has dipped below 5 percent in almost eight years," President Barack Obama said in an afternoon speech touting the jobs report. "Americans are working. All told, over the past years our businesses have added 14 million new jobs. Seventy-one straight months of private sector job growth extends the longest streak on record."

Unfortunately, the President forgot to mention how many millions have dropped out of the labor force. While the headline U-3 rate measures all unemployed workers currently seeking employment as a percent of the civilian labor force, the more inclusive U-6 includes more. The U-6 rate includes "persons marginally attached to the labor force, plus total employed part time for economic reasons" plus all marginally attached workers.

This more meaningful U-6 rate for the unemployed, the underemployed and the discouraged remains stubbornly above prerecession levels.

The U-6 rate remained un-

changed at 9.9 percent in January. Overall, the U-6 has been more volatile than the U-3 rate. It's down 1.4 percentage points over the past year, versus a 0.8-point drop in the U-3.

### THE FED IS WORRIED ABOUT LOW INFLATION

The Fed's biggest concern when considering the pace of tightening in 2016 might be the risk of lower inflation. They are right to be worried. Already, its 2016 inflation forecast is under pressure. The Fed has consistently overestimated inflation for years. But this year, with tightening underway, being wrong would be more painful than when it was leaving rates near zero.

### THE FORECAST

According to the Fed staff's economic briefing, inflation will rise in 2016 in part because "energy prices and prices of non-energy imports were expected to begin steadily rising." In fact, the minutes reveal the Fed staff thought inflation would be well on its way to 2% by now because oil and import prices were supposed to bottom last summer. It didn't happen in 2015, and, while the year is young, this year has not exactly gotten off on the right foot for inflation increases, either. Oil prices tumbled to new decade lows and have only rebounded to around \$30 per barrel.

Another reason the staff expects higher inflation is a belief that American inflation expectations have not fallen. The staff is sanguine about inflation expectations, in part due to a bias toward whatever measure best supports their forecast.

Not everyone on the FOMC is as blasé about inflation expectations as the staff. Some think the survey and market evidence is proof expectations may have already fallen. Of course, on the face of it, even this is a little absurd. Think

about it:

Survey Q: What do you think the average inflation rate will be over the next 5 years?

Survey A: Lower than I thought last year, that's for sure!

Fed Conclusion: Hey, look at that. That consumer's inflation expectations might have fallen.

The Fed is not being deliberately obtuse, but they are being deliberate. That is, they likely know inflation expectations have fallen, but don't want to do anything to make them fall further still. The two biggest institutional mistakes in the Fed's 103-year history were tightening in the 1930s and tolerating inflation in the 1970s. The weird refusal to admit inflation expectations are running counter to what helps achieve their forecast likely stems from a belief the Fed itself was the primary cause of run-away inflation in the 1970s. Inflation accelerated once people realized the Fed was not going to do anything about it.

The Fed may be denying falling inflation expectations because Fed officials fear they will cause inflation expectations to fall further if acknowledged, especially because the decision to start tightening is aimed at preventing inflation from rising.

Bottom Line: If you believe inflation will remain stubbornly low this year, as most on Wall Street do, the essential question is: When will low inflation affect policy? The answer is: when it diverges from expectations enough to force a change in the Fed's outlook. The discussion throughout the rest of the minutes makes clear the essential change is in the expectation 2% will be achieved by late 2017 or early 2018, which means it's very unlikely the outlook will change enough to affect policy unless inflation is still stubbornly low toward the middle of the year. Until then, it's more likely the Fed's excuse for altering policy will be in reaction to unexpected weakness in employment or market volatility.

*I don't want to come across like a cheapskate on Valentines. (I'm trying to pay off my credit cards.) How can I save, and stay out of trouble with my Valentine?*

It's the thought that counts, not the price of the gift(s). It should mean more to your Valentine that you took the time to think about, and plan a fun, memorable, yet inexpensive way to show your love. Look for a community concert, take a hike, enjoy a romantic picnic, write a love letter and read it in a romantic location.

*I'm 53 years old, and am the only employee in my own business. I pay myself \$150,000 per year. Is there a retirement plan for me?*

What you need to look at is a one-person defined benefit plan. There are pro's and con's to this type of plan. It allows the individual to build a retirement account fast, and can be a tax deduction for the business. However, it is expensive to make any changes in the plan. This is a problem if there is a lack of funds due to a down year in business. Instead, you might consider buying a life insurance policy with living benefits. The cash account of this type of life insurance can be used by you for anything, and does not have the government RMD (required minimum distribution) rule that hits at age 70-1/2.

*Is there a way for us to avoid paying taxes on our Social Security income because we*

*earned too much interest and dividends on our investments?*

You could minimize your reportable earned-income, (thereby distancing yourself from the Social Security income threshold), by moving your investment dollars to a tax-deferred product. Using a tax-deferred product, the compound interest helps your investment balance grow faster, too. There are even tax-deferred products that offer a bonus on all money you move there. Perhaps this would be a way for you to recoup some of the taxes you have to pay this year.

*My husband has told me that he will take care of me when I get old rather than sending me to a nursing home. But, what happens if he dies before me?*

And, what if he needs care first, and is alive and unable to care for you? Talk to him about these concerns. Good idea to do some planning, just in case. Call around and find out the costs

for Assisted Living and Nursing Homes. Learn the rules for Medicare, specifically with regard to assets. And, get quotes on long-term-care insurance.

*In 1995, when we were 20, we each bought a 30-year term life insurance policy. We're still in good health. Could we save money by buying a new life insurance policy now, or should we just wait until the 30-year policy runs out?*

Do not let your current life insurance policy run out. It's usually not a good idea to wait. Once you have life insurance in place, you'll have it for the full term of that insurance policy, regardless of changes in your health. When you get a good quote, apply to see if you qualify. If you decide to buy a new policy, cancel your old policy only after the new policy is fully active.

WHAT YOU "AUTO" KNOW

## Oil Filter Warning

The oil filter is one of the most important parts of the engine. Its job is to filter out any contaminants created by the normal wear and heat of the engine. When your car has the oil changed, most likely the oil filter is also changed, at least I hope so.

Years ago, we all knew that the oil and filter was changed at 3,000 miles, it was just the way it was. Enter the new age of cars, oils and filters; especially synthetic oils which last much longer as stated in some of my previous articles. Many oil changes can last 5,000 to 10,000 miles depending on the type of car, type of oil and how many quarts of oil are in the oil pan.

Back in the day when we recommended the 3,000-mile service, any oil filter would easily protect the engine for that mileage, but not many oil filters would protect your car for more

than 5,000 miles. If you are driving longer than 5,000 miles between oil changes and using a low cost oil change shop, you may be damaging the engine and not even know it.

Let me explain. Oil filters all look the same on the outside, but are very different on the inside. The difference lies in the amount of filtering material used and type of drain back valve used inside each filter. Less expensive filters, as you would suspect, have less filtering material and a less reliable drain back valve.

This may seem insignificant, but the results can be catastrophic. When you drive longer than 5,000 miles on one of the low cost filters, the filter starts to lose the ability to keep the contaminants contained and they slip into the engine bearings, causing premature wear. The eventual outcome is engine failure. It does not pay to have

an inexpensive oil change and an inexpensive oil filter put on your newer model car.

Currently, there is not a standard or law that says what part or quality of part, needs to be put on your car. If you have an engine failure that should be covered by a warranty, and you have been using cheap oil/filter, this is not only scary for you, the consumer, but it could get downright ugly as the manufacturer may deny the claim. Ultimately, the consumer should be aware of what is going on with the car and use a service center you trust.

A cheap oil change may save you money short term, but will not save you money in the long run.

Carrillo noted that Wilson's program was offered a few times a week at that time, but it drew as many as 300 students, prompting the gymnastics coach to gradually develop a broader vision and setting for her young athletes.

Just over two years ago, Wilson was able to acquire the stand-alone facility along Baldwin Park Boulevard, allowing her to bring both her competitive teams and recreational programs together in one place. Although she offers team training independent from the city's programs, Wilson has continued to provide a variety of classes - in-house and at a discounted rate - through Baldwin Park's community services department.

"Now kids have access to gymnastics classes seven days a week. With [Wilson] moving in, it's been a very good partnership toward our goal of providing programs and increasing the quality of life for residents," said Carrillo.

Currently, classes offered through the Stars Gymnastics partnership are ongoing, with a new session beginning on the first of every month. Gymnasts are welcome to join a new class each month, and they may renew courses every month to keep building their skill, according to Wilson. One-hour sessions include Mommy & Me gymnastics, along with tumbling, cartwheel, and various introductory gymnastics classes that are designed for toddlers through pre-teens. New to the schedule this year are Parkour-Tumbling-Free Running courses, where children age 6 and older can learn

specific jumping, climbing, diving and running combinations.

Wilson encourages prospective gymnasts to enroll quickly, as classes offered through the city collaboration are limited in quantity and space. More serious gymnastics hopefuls are also welcome to check out Stars' competitive teams, which are separate from the city's recreational programs.

Carrillo hopes the Stars Gymnastics programs will continue serve as an extension to Baldwin Park's recreation outlets. He also hopes Wilson's ongoing collaboration with the city will attract residents toward participating in gymnastics, and that it would additionally draw youth who may not be from Baldwin Park, but are interested in learning more about the sport.

"If we could provide as many services as possible, it will give kids a taste of what it is and then they can see if they like it or not," he said. "The end goal is exposing children and their parents to gymnastics."

"We want to provide a positive experience, and this is a great way to collaborate and leverage our resources."

Registration for Stars Gymnastics courses - via the city's recreation department - are available at the Esther Snyder Community Center, 4100 Baldwin Park Blvd. Monthly fees are listed at \$40 per month for Baldwin Park Residents, and \$45 monthly for non-residents. Discounts are also available for families who enroll siblings for the gymnastics program.

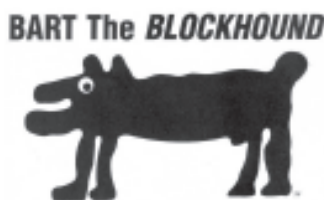

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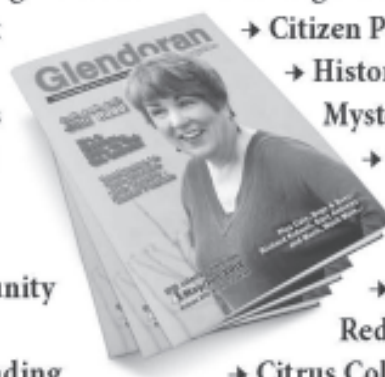

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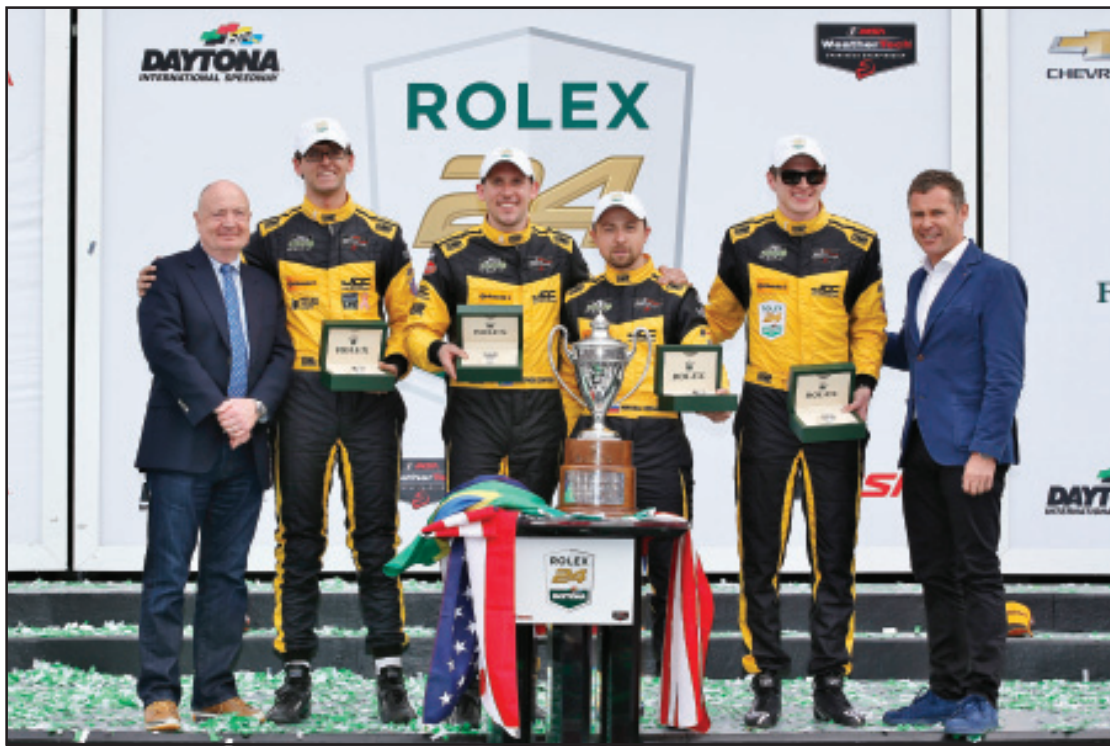


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# Glendora Native Kenton Koch wins Rolex 24 Hours of Daytona

- 1. Create an emergency kit, today!** If you've already got an emergency kit prepared, check it regularly.

- 3. Check your house.** Clear your outdoor drains and gutters of any leaves, dirt or debris. Secure trash, recycling bins and any other items that have the potential of blowing or floating away. Have weakened trees inspected by an arborist.
- 4. Got flood insurance?** Consider purchasing flood insurance. Keep in mind, most flood policies have a 30-day waiting period.
- 5. Use sandbags.** Sandbags can be utilized to help protect your home and property before a storm.
- 6. Don't risk your life.** During significant storm events, avoid waterways, flood control channels and the ocean, which can all rapidly swell and become extremely dangerous. NO PLACE outside is safe when lightning is in the area!
- 7. Have Emergency Alerts sent to your mobile phone and email.** Register at [lacounty.gov/emergency](http://lacounty.gov/emergency), or simply search "Alert LA County" on the web.
- 8. Download "The Works,"** LA County's FREE app for iPhone and Android, to report storm-related problems.
- 9. Prevent stormwater pollution.** Rain washes everything into storm drains that lead to our rivers and ocean. Secure household hazardous waste with tight-fitting lids and store these items in covered areas.
- 10. Capture rainwater.** Prepare your landscaped areas to capture and retain more water by using compost. Collect rain that falls on your roof by installing rain barrels.

**3. How do I know that you're delivering the same comfortable mattress that I tried out in the showroom?**
