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Citrus College's Veterans Success Center Director Named a Woman of the Year

GLENDORA—The director of Citrus College's Veterans Success Center has been named a Woman of the Year by Assemblyman Roger Hernandez.

Dr. Monica Christianson was honored at a special ceremony designed to recognize strong and inspirational women who have made lasting contributions within the 48th assembly district. She received her award alongside 14 other women from the communities of Azusa, Baldwin Park, Covina, El Monte, Glendora, Irwindale, and West Covina.

One of two honorees from Glendora, Dr. Christianson was selected because of her dedicated leadership and commitment to empowering students and veterans at Citrus College.

"On behalf of the entire college community, I would like to extend my sincere congratulations to Dr. Christianson," said Dr. Geraldine M. Perri, superintendent/president. "As the director of our Veterans Success Center, she has played an instrumental role in expanding the services offered to student veterans. Her commitment to this important population and continued contri-

meet with other veterans organizations.

In recent years, Citrus College's efforts to promote the success of student veterans have received national recognition. In addition to being voted a Military Friendly School® for six consecutive years by G.I. Jobs magazine, the institution's veterans program was also featured in a video shown at the White House Summit on Community Colleges, and was selected to receive a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. Citrus College also created the nation's first student veteran transitional course, "Strategies for College Success - Veterans Emphasis."

As a result, the enrollment of student veterans at Citrus College and the number of student veterans who are completing college has increased dramatically over the past ten years.

"I am a product of a community college, and I believe in everything that community colleges are able to do for students," Christianson said. "Citrus College is a student-serving institution, and working here connects me with many veterans and stu-

dents who need help and advocacy. That's what I do best: I advocate for those in need of support."

Christianson has assisted diverse, underserved populations for several decades. Holding a doctorate degree in psychology, she worked as an educator and counselor in jails, where she taught classes and facilitated support groups to help inmates overcome difficult experiences and pursue future success. She has also served as a counselor in substance abuse treatment facilities, guiding patients through the pain and rewards of rehabilitation.

"Dr. Christianson's strong desire to meet the needs of the community is inspirational," said Mrs. Susan M. Keith, president of the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees. "The fact that students from the Veterans Success Center nominated her for this incredible honor speaks volumes about the contributions she has made to Citrus College. Dr. Christianson's continued service to the institution and its student veterans is invaluable."

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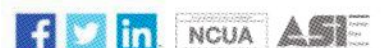
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Assemblyman Gatto's Legislation to Protect Children From Identity Theft Clears the Assembly

SACRAMENTO—The California State Assembly passed legislation by Assemblyman Mike Gatto (D-Los Angeles) and Assemblywoman Jacqui Irwin (D-Thousand Oaks) to protect children from identity theft, by a 76-0 vote. AB 1580 will allow parents to freeze their children's credit with the three credit bureaus, to prevent identity thieves from opening fraudulent credit accounts and ruining credit scores.

"In an era where hackers have stolen millions of records including names, birth dates, and social-security numbers belonging to children, AB 1580 will give parents needed tools to protect their child's financial future," said Gatto, a member of the Privacy and Consumer Protection Committee.

Current law only allows parents to freeze a child's credit only after the child has become a victim of identity fraud. However, since children don't typi-

cally have financial accounts or check their FICO score, the damage by fraudsters is often not discovered for years, when a child applies for a student loan, a job, or a credit card. Twenty-three states including, Idaho, Texas, and Maryland, have successfully passed and implemented laws similar to AB 1580.

"Children start out with a clean slate, which has made them the most sought-after target for

cybercriminals. In fact, a recent child-identity theft study found that 10.2% of the children in the study had someone else using their social-security number, a rate 51 times higher than adults in the same population sample," said Cybersecurity Select Committee Chair Jacqui Irwin.

"California needs to protect its youngest citizens. This change is long overdue," said Gatto.

Huff Legislation Helps Porter Ranch Homeowners Hurt by Gas Leak

SACRAMENTO - Members of the Senate Governance and Finance Committee took unanimous action today to pass legislation authored by Senator Bob Huff (R-San Dimas) that could provide taxpayer relief to some Los Angeles County homeowners. SB 1304 will allow homeowners hurt by the Aliso Canyon natural gas leak in the Porter Ranch subdivision to apply for and receive property tax reassessments, which could possibly lead to a reduction in property tax bills.

"As legislators we have a responsibility to enact preventative measures and react to disastrous events by offering solutions that help our citizens," said Senator Huff during the committee hearing. "We've already received a number of documented reports of lingering health issues from this gas leak, but there is also unknown damage to property."

Current state law permits any property owner to apply for a reassessment of their property if the property was damaged or destroyed in a disaster. It also authorizes a property tax reassessment if the Governor declares a "state of disaster." Current law does not include a "state of emergency" declared by the Governor, which took place following the Aliso Canyon gas leak. It also doesn't include damage from environmental contamination.

SB 1304 expands current law to include Governor declared states of emergency and adds "environmental contamination" to the eligible causes of damage for reassessment. It will also apply, retroactively, to the Porter Ranch neighborhood affected by the methane gas leak.

"The Legislature has been focusing its attention on policies that will hopefully prevent something like this from ever happening again," said Senator Huff. "My legislation provides an opportunity to aid Porter Ranch families during their time of hardship."

Over a period of four months before it was finally plugged in late February, the Aliso Canyon natural gas leak forced the relocation of more than 8,000 families and spewed nearly 100,000 metric tons of methane into the atmosphere.

The legislation has the support of Board of Equalization member George Runner and Los Angeles County Assessor Jeffrey Prang. Co-Authors include Senate President pro-Tem Kevin de León, Senator Sharon Runner (R-Antelope Valley) and Senator Fran Pavley (D-Sherman Oaks). There is no known opposition.

SB 1304, which is an urgency measure and will take effect immediately upon the Governor's signature, next faces a full Senate Floor vote.

Duarte USD Is Hosting The Special Olympics Spring Games

DUARTE - More than 300 Special Olympics athletes from the East San Gabriel Valley will be competing at Duarte High School Friday, May 20 in an all-day event coordinated through the Duarte Unified School District (DUSD).

Organizing the event for DUSD are adaptive physical education teachers Greg Saris and Tracy Hall in partnership with Special Olympics Southern California.

"This grew out of an event that Special Olympics held last year at San Marino," explained Saris. "There were more than 300 athletes there and we were unable to participate, so we did our own private event. This year, we invited a few other districts and partnered with Special Olympics, so this is the East San Gabriel Valley spring event."

Athletes, coaches and volunteers will be at Duarte High School's track and field for the day, with events including running (25 to 200 meters) and relays, plus modified field events such as the long jump, tennis and softball throws.

"A lot of our kids (in special education) don't get the opportunities to play sports, like little league, or organized basketball," said Saris. "So this is their chance to shine in an environment that

is highly supportive and modified to accommodate their needs. On Friday, they'll have a chance to compete, to have fun and to be part of a special program."

Additionally, the Special Olympics connection means funding and sponsorship support, and shows the athletes what is possible through sports.

"Special Olympics athletes are children and adults with intellectual disabilities who are like other athletes - they love to train, compete and do their best, whether they win or lose," explains the mission statement of Special Olympics Southern California (SOSC).

"All the programs offered in Southern California provide athletes with the chance to develop physical fitness, sports skills, social skills and self-esteem. By joining Special Olympics an athlete can meet new friends and experience great rewards in achieving the best that they can."

Saris works with Special Education students at all of the DUSD schools, from the high school, middle school, and the 5 elementary schools.

"This gives us a chance to promote healthy living," he explained. "It also gives these students a chance to meet other athletes and compete against them."

Involved in Friday's events are

students from seven different school districts, including one non-public school, at all levels, from elementary to high school.

DUSD Superintendent Allan Muccerino and Deputy Superintendent Miriam Fox will kick off the pre-event festivities that start at 9:45 a.m. and special education student and accomplished athlete Eric Little will lead the pledge of allegiance. General education student Christine Wheeler will sing the national anthem and there will be a band and other special guests.

Approximately one-third of the 300-plus enrolled athletes are from DUSD. In addition to the competing athletes in the K-to-12 categories, there will even be events for pre-school athletes. Students from DHS, as well as parents, teachers and others are volunteering to help put on the event.

"The entire district has been very supportive in putting this together," said Saris. "We are looking forward to a very special event that should be very important to our students."

City of Monterey Park Observance of National Police Week May 15-21

MONTEREY PARK - In recognition of law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others

The City of Monterey Park observed National Police Memorial Day and National Police Week by flying flags at half staff at all city facilities to honor and recognize the service and sacrifices of U.S. law enforcement.

National Police Week, which occurs each year during the week in which May 15 falls, was established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962 and pays special recognition to those law en-

forcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others. This year, National Police Week is May 15-21.

The City of Monterey Park gives special recognition to Officer George Elder who was killed in a shootout with robbery suspects in 1961; Officer William A. Guidera who was killed in the line of duty in a traffic collision in 1927; and DEA Agents Paul Seema and George Montoya who were killed in a shootout with narcotics traffickers in 1988 while working a narcotics case with Monterey Park Police De-

partments.

Officer Guidera's death had been lost in the history of the department and was only recently discovered while an officer was doing research on the department for the city's centennial celebration. Guidera will be honored by having his name placed on the Los Angeles County Peace Officers' Memorial on Wednesday, May 18.

The City of Monterey Park is proud of its officers past and present and the sacrifices and services that they provide our community.

Assemblyman Gatto's Legislation to Reduce Traffic Congestion Cruises Past Assembly

SACRAMENTO—Assemblyman Mike Gatto's (D-Los Angeles) legislation to encourage the use of more reversible lanes in California received the green light from the California State Assembly, passing by a vote of 76 to 0.

This transportation planning concept, which is widely used in other parts of the country, allows for a lane in which traffic may travel in either direction, and is an effective method to reduce congestion during peak hours.

"We don't need to reinvent the wheel in order to increase traffic flow during peak periods," added Gatto. "AB 2542 encourages what California is often

known for, continued innovation in our great state."

Today, few areas in California utilize reversible lanes, failing to recognize the benefit that this transportation model can bring to California's roadways. San Diego has a reversible lane on the Interstate 15, and San Francisco's majestic Golden Gate Bridge operates a reversible lane; both have been successful at handling peak periods of traffic.

AB 2542 will require the California Department of Transportation and all regional transportation agencies to consider reversible lanes for major street realignments or capacity-increasing projects as viable solu-

tion to reduce traffic congestion. California's resources for transportation are severely limited, and reversible-lane implementation instead of lane expansion will free up funding to allow other projects to be built.

"Too often, Californians have experienced sitting in traffic while lanes in the opposite direction sit empty," Gatto stated. "This measure will ensure transportation agencies plan better on certain highways and streets where it makes sense, to make communities a little easier for hard-working Californians."

The measure will now head to the Senate Transportation Committee.

Collisions in West Covina Kills Two Pedestrians

WEST COVINA - West Covina Police Department has reported that two men who were pedestrians were killed in two separate collisions late Thursday, May 12, and early Friday, May 13, at two different ends of the city.

The accident on Thursday occurred around 9 PM on Azusa Avenue, south of Fairgrove Avenue. A man said to be from Covina, Victor Aguirre, 62, was pronounced dead at the scene. Apparently Aguirre attempted to run across the traffic lanes and was struck by a sedan in the southbound number one lane of Azusa. There was extensive damage to the sedan and the driver was not cited, however, this accident is

still under investigation. The expectation is that the driver will not be charged with anything as Aguirre was not in a crosswalk.

The Friday morning accident occurred when the pedestrian, who was in a crosswalk, was hit by a pickup truck at Sunset and Rowland, just after 7 AM. The victim was a man between 50 and 60 who was crossing Sunset when a southbound pickup truck struck him. The unidentified victim was taken to the hospital where he later died from his injuries. This accident closed down Sunset in both directions for quite a few hours while officers conducted their investigation.

It is possible that charges may be filed in this incident.

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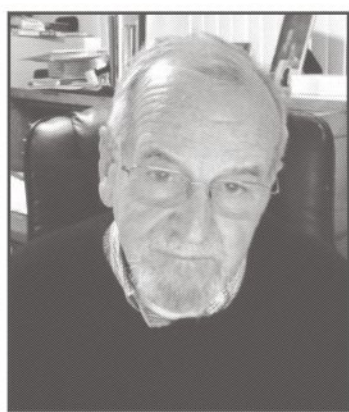

The Unthinkable

There is not a doubt in my mind! Democracy is by far the best political system that can be used to govern a nation. "Of, by and for the people." is a superior principle. It would be a far fairer, safer world if every nation had that as its organizing objective. The destructive tyranny inherent in other systems is spelled out on almost every page of modern history. Is it not the role of a democracy like ours to fight the brutality of dictatorships anywhere in the world we find them, and to instill a love for participatory democratic rule? It would seem unthinkable to sit back and watch the world around us sink under the weight of tyranny.

So following the horrific events of September 11, 2001, President George W. Bush set out to generate a love for democ-

racy in the Middle East. It was to be a new version of the domino theory. We would take one nation at a time, and convince its people to rid themselves of their long-time dictator, and adopt a democratic form of government. Having seen the worth in what we had brought to that nation, an adjacent

nation would catch the vision, and democracy in that second land would result. In due time other oppressive governments would fall and a brave new democratic world would emerge. That was the theory Bush articulated and which formed the basis of his project to rid the world of terror and tyrants.

It would begin by taking out Saddam Hussain, and with the celebration that would ensue from our having deposed this ruthless dictator, the people of Iraq would not only welcome what we had kindly brought to them but would also spread the good news to others in the neighborhood. In short order, Syria, Iran, Afghanistan, Lebanon, Bahrain, Oman, Morocco, Jordan, Qatar, Kuwait, and who

knows what other nations would fall like dominos, form a cluster of democracies, and the world would have become a kinder, gentler, more peaceful place. If you think I am making this up, Bush gave a number of speeches outlining this notion.

Herein lies one of the worst, most destructive presidential decisions in American history, backed by an intimidated Congress. Instead of spreading democracy, what our invasion of Iraq and actions which have flowed from that calamity have done is generate a totally unstable, dangerous world. Iraq is in shambles. Hundreds of thousand deaths have resulted. Terror has increased everywhere and we have birthed a serious crop of democracy haters. What is more,

the devastation produced in that part of the world has spawned a refugee flood numbering in the millions, which is having a deleterious effect on the stability of Europe.

As desirous as it might be to see democracy flourish in the Middle East, it has not happened and will not happen no matter how many boots on the ground and planes and drones in the air we put into the effort. The blowback from our action has put a hole in the peace of the world that cannot and will not be quickly repaired.

Although it is a bitter pill, and contradicts everything we think about the blessings of democracy, perhaps the nations we sought unsuccessfully to change might have been better led by the

strong men we so thoroughly detested, beginning with Saddam Hussein.

If there is any hope for those nations it may only come when they see in the democracies of the world, including the United States, the positive results that accrue from liberal governments. But it will never come when what they see in us is the greatest military force in world history seeking to recast everyone else in its image by using its mammoth destructive power.

This is not a call for a new era of isolationism, but for the use of every peaceful American resource to bless and benefit a world hungry for peace and stability.

Los Angeles County Safe Neighborhood Parks, Healthy Communities and Local Water Resources Measure

Well, if nothing else, they certainly hit all the hot buttons in the title of this new November 8th ballot proposal in an effort to try to push through another tax on our annual property tax assessment bill. Who doesn't want safe neighborhoods or neighborhood parks with reduced gang activity? Personally, I'd like to see the gang-bangers eliminated. And why wouldn't we want healthy communities? I would like to see 'healthy' defined before voting. And, in this drought we've been dealing with, a local water resources measure that includes rivers and creeks is appealing to all, especially if it increases our water availability. But with the Feds handing cities a bill none of them can afford through U.S. EPA's MS4 monitoring to make sure only water clean enough to drink hits the ocean, I am a little gun shy on this part. Even so, do we all really get all this and at what price?

First, we need to understand how the County expects us to pay for all these improvements in our lives. The first option put forth is a flat per parcel tax. Using the number of parcels in L.A. County (2,346,578) and then estimating the financial need to fund a list of proposed acquisitions/improvements, the dollar assessment is established.

Another option is a square footage tax at an established rate per square foot as was done with the Trauma Tax. The Trauma Tax some will remember was Measure B approved in 2002 and lev-

ied at a rate of 3 cents per square foot of each structure to provide "funding for the countywide system of trauma centers, emergency medical services, and bioterrorism response". This rate may be increased by a majority vote of the Board of Supervisors based on the medical component of the Consumer Price Index and will continue in perpetuity.

The Report refers to the 2014 parcel tax measure on the ballot to "support development, acquisition, improvement, restoration and maintenance of parks, recreational, cultural and community facilities, and open space lands" within the County. That proposition, known as P authorized a \$23 tax per parcel to replace the 1992 parks bond proposition and failed to get the 2/3 vote required for passage.

The charts in the report give varying amounts and choices and, of course, County will be evaluating the chances of passage. The flat tax chart estimates a \$26 per parcel tax on each of the 2,346,578 will generate \$60,000,000. Upping the parcel tax to \$50 per parcel will generate \$120,000,000.

The chart on a square foot tax starts at 1.5 cents with an average cost of \$22.50 to each assessed unit and generates \$95,527,500 on an estimated 6,358,500,000 square feet in L.A. County. The rate goes up to 4 cents a square foot and generates \$254,740,000 in revenue for the County with an average of \$60 on each assessed unit.

The report to the Board of Supervisors titled, Conservation

Finance Feasibility Study, January 2016, Los Angeles County, The Trust for Public Land, Land for People, reviewed and analyzed the voting public and was able to come up with an assessment that recognized seniors as a high voting segment of each community, but a segment on a fixed income not improving much due to ongoing economic conditions in this county and state, and a group that might not want to support an additional tax burden. It is proposed they will be exempt from this assessment.

This report however did not address the ability of our young people coming out of college trying to pay off college loans, start a family and be continually faced with the increased cost of housing. This additional tax just adds one more reason to the "why it's not affordable" list and they will be expected to pay up the full amount when that is determined.

Local small businesses have just been confronted with the new state law that increases the minimum wage on a sliding upward scale. Some have made the choice already to leave California as a survival decision. But now small business owners will be confronted not only with the new minimum wage law, but a 35 year county assessment to fund a park bond issue, one that could be permanent and adjusted periodically.

How many of us are really willing to take on a new tax guaranteed to last 35 years that could be adjusted periodically by 3 members of the Board of Supervisors?

"Never Trump" Has One Last Chance. Take It!

Prematurely acknowledging Donald Trump as his party's nominee, Paul Ryan has offered to step down as chair of the Republican national convention. Ted Cruz won't campaign in California even though his name is still on the ballot. Other mainstream Republicans shake their heads in disbelief, acquiescing in an inevitable Trump nomination.

They've all given up too soon. The "Never Trump" movement has one more opportunity to stop a nomination that will embarrass the party faithful for years to come. Yes, Minnesotans can elect a Jesse Ventura and Californians can put Arnold Schwarzenegger in the governor's office. But astute Americans won't send Donald Trump to the White House in November.

How can Republicans stop the Trump juggernaut? It won't be easy but there is a way. Challenge the pro-Trump state delegations and individual delegates on the convention floor this July.

Six months ago, before any voter had cast a ballot or a single caucus had met, this column foresaw the likelihood of Trump's triumph over his Republican rivals. To prevent that, Republicans were urged to run slates of delegates in each state pledged to vote for what was once called a "favorite son," a popular state politician who was not a serious candidate for the nomination but who could beat Trump in the caucus or primary. That would have kept Trump from getting the necessary 1237 delegates, permitting the party's national convention to choose a

truly representative Republican nominee.

At that point, Trump had 16 challengers, none of whom were willing to join a "Stop Trump" effort. All still had visions of winning the nomination and saw no reason to endanger that possibility by suspending their campaigns.

By the time Ted Cruz and John Kasich realized that Trump would get the nomination unless they united, it was too late. Their humiliating loss to Trump in Indiana seemingly marked the end of the Never Trump movement.

Not quite. A Trump aide unintentionally revealed the way to beat Trump when he threatened to challenge the pro-Cruz Colorado delegation on the convention floor.

If the anti-Trump element is willing to fight Trump at the convention, they can prevent his nomination on the first ballot. That can be accomplished by making the Republican convention look like a Democratic convention of a few years ago. Older voters will remember how entire delegations were challenged at Democratic conventions in the early days of the civil rights movement as liberal delegates fought to seat blacks in all-white southern state delegations.

The "Stop Trump" faction should challenge pro-Trump state delegations, particularly those from caucus states. Seating an alternate delegation would not only detract from Trump's attempt to reach the needed 1237 votes, it would also guarantee nomination of a real Republican.

Delegations can be challenged on a variety of grounds: irregularities in the voting at caucuses, incorrect allocation of delegates to the candidates, caucus rules that benefited one candidate over

the others, and similarly valid objections.

In states that held primary elections, the number of delegates awarded to each candidate should be questioned. Those numbers were apparently determined prior to the verification by state election officials, opening the door to claims that the distribution was inaccurate.

Voting snafus, such as lack of ballots, insufficient precincts, or even an inaccurate vote count would surely apply in some states.

In addition to challenging entire delegations, serious "Stop Trump" advocates ought to go after individual delegates, whose loyalty to the Republican party is in question. How many of the Trump delegates were Democrats until Trump appeared as a candidate? Are the "independents" on the Trump slates really Republicans and entitled to sit in a Republican convention?

If these challenges are successful, Trump will not have 1237 votes on the first ballot. That assumes that the Republican hopefuls who "suspended" their campaigns during the course of the of primaries insist that their delegates must vote for them on that first ballot.

What happens after that first vote produces no winner? If Republican leaders are wise, they will convince Trump's sixteen rivals to withdraw in favor of someone more electable. House Speaker Paul Ryan should get the nomination on the second ballot.

Trump's supporters will vote for Ryan in November, if only to prevent Hillary Clinton's election.

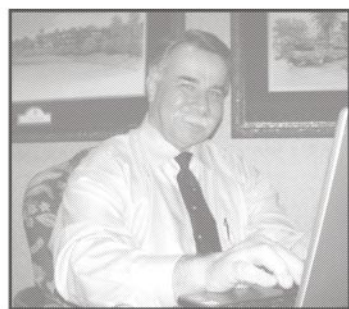
Dress Like a Slob and Ask For a Job

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Weak Q1 GDP Makes Q2 Bounce Essential

GDP growth was weak in the first quarter, but it was weak in the first quarter of 2014 and 2015, too. A solid second quarter rebound should give the FOMC confidence to resume raising rates, while a break with the past and further weakness will keep the Fed sidelined. But it's not just the Fed that depends on a pick-up in demand. US companies could use a boost, too.

GDP is effectively a measure of the economy's top line growth rate, and top-line weakness has added another quarter to a lingering profits decline.

A second quarter GDP rebound is very important to companies' ability to resume capital spending growth and to continue growing payrolls.

NOTHING NEW, EXCEPT IN THE DETAILS

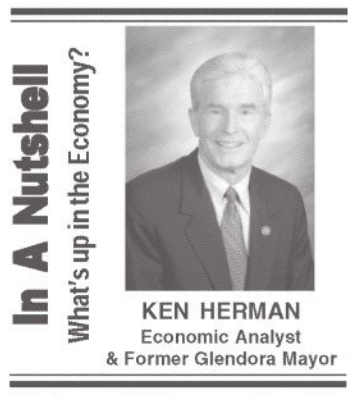
Weak first quarter growth is nothing new. This is the third consecutive year to start on a bad note. But this year differs in a few important ways.

1. The winters of 2014 and 2015 were unusually cold. Janet Yellen blamed cold weather for most of the weakness in 2014 and she cited bad weather as a factor last year, too. But the winter of 2016 was the warmest in 120 years of records. Indeed, mild weather boosted some sectors.

2. The distribution of growth in each quarter was a problem. In Q1-14, inventories, trade and consumption were weak, but business spending was strong. In Q1-15, trade and consumption were unusually weak; other categories were ok. This time, business spending was awful, consumption was weak and there was no significant offset with the exception of residential investment, where future problems may already loom.

Wall Street expects some sectors will pick up in the second quarter-consumption especially-but others are likely to flounder, resulting in an initial forecast of 1.5% GDP growth.

I am not buying into economic commentaries along the lines of: Don't worry, Q1 always stinks and Q2 is always better. Rather than assuming a rebound in growth just because it happened two years in a row, however, I have looked at each major GDP component, assessed what happened in Q1 and considered what is likely to follow in Q2. In quite a few cases, the outcome is

likely to differ considerably from last year's.

For now, Wall Street expects only a modest acceleration in spending, because this year's picture differs from last year's in several important ways:

1. Consumer confidence reached its cycle high in Q1-15. It fell for a year through Q1-16. Consumers are in a wary mood.

2. Durable goods spending is the first to pick up when consumers are more eager to spend and the first to weaken when they grow cautious. Durable goods spending fell in Q1 and has fallen in three of the past four quarters.

3. Rising auto loan defaults and, perhaps, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau's crackdown on auto lending, has cast a chill over auto sales. They are down 9.2% since October. On the brighter side, U.S. new car and light-truck sales returned to the fast lane in April, setting a monthly high that bodes well for Detroit auto makers aiming for record 2016 profits.

4. In 2015, real consumption growth averaged 0.13% in the first quarter. March's 0.3% pop was the strongest month of the quarter, paving the way for a nice Q2 rebound. This year, real consumption growth averaged 0.10%, and March was flat (0.0%). Barring revisions, it is hard to predict a liftoff for Q2 this year.

Given the above, one might wonder why Wall Street expects a rebound. There are a couple of reasons:

1. Members of top income groups are very sensitive to changes in stock prices. The collapse of stocks in the first six weeks of the year likely explains some of the weakness in spending. The equity recovery in the second half of Q1 should bolster spending by these high-income households.

2. Oil prices are recovering. Normally, low oil prices boost spending, but since the 2014 oil-

price peak the negative effects of job losses and economic uncertainty associated with the collapse undermined confidence and likely contributed to consumers' decision to increase saving. At \$45, or even \$50-60, oil isn't going to spark a resurgence of exploration, production or employment, but it may stem the losses and loan defaults.

BOTTOM LINE: Wall Street expects a GDP bounce in Q2, but not like last year's. At the moment, it looks like we may post just 1.5% GDP on the heels of Q1's 0.5%, and half of that may come from government and inventories.

In the meantime there's a ton of data between now and July 29 when the second quarter advance GDP report will be released. Here's a few things to watch which will determine which way the forecast is likely to be revised:

1. Retail sales and consumption: The biggest GDP component has the highest odds of moving the needle. Wall Street expects second quarter consumption growth will be modestly better, but a recovery in confidence and drop in the saving rate could mean a bigger bounce.

2. The financial markets: Another round of chaos like the first six weeks of the year would chill consumption and business investment. On the other hand, further improvement in stocks would instead go a long way toward restoring confidence. Keep an eye on stocks, commodities and foreign exchange rates.

3. Corporate earnings: Another quarter of falling profits would be devastating for business spending and the economy. There's not much more room in investment for cost savings. Employment is the next place to cut.

4. The Fed: If monthly data were to improve enough over the course of the quarter, the Fed may dare raise rates in June. If they do, it is likely to be accompanied by a forecast of still more rate hikes this year. That might not be enough to hurt growth in the second quarter, but it will certainly ice growth in the second half.

Discount Health Plans are NOT Health Insurance. These health plans contract with health care service providers to offer discounted health care services to plan enrollees. However, an enrollee in a discount health plan must pay the entire amount of the discounted services. For legitimate discount health plans, go online to: www.CalStarBenefits.com/28485.

I don't want to be a nosy neighbor, but is it okay to go to open houses around my neighborhood to get a better idea about the value of my home?

Attending open houses around your neighborhood is a very good way to get a better understanding of the prices. Also, you get a chance to see what improvements (or lack of) that these folks have made in order to optimize the chance of selling their house. Then, you can take a more honest look at your own home to make wiser decisions about its value, and what changes you may want to make. How much the houses in your neighborhood have SOLD for is the most im-

portant fact to know in seeking the value of your own home. As you have more questions, feel free to ask.

My banker said that I should only invest my 401k money into an IRA through the bank because other investment companies, like insurance companies, are not FDIC insured. Is that true?

Your banker needs to read his own bank's disclosure statement which clearly says that bank investments (including the one he/she works for) are NOT FDIC insured. Although insurance company products (life insurance, long-term care insurance, fixed annuities, equity-indexed annuities, etc.) are not FDIC insured, they come under a set of regulations that, among other things, demand that each insurance company have enough assets to cover their issued products. As you can see, this can easily exceed the FDIC's limit. Caution: Less regulated Private Equity companies are buying up insurance companies. There may be some regulatory differences. Make sure you know the facts.

DMV Offers Improved Voter Registration Options

SACRAMENTO—The California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) now offers two convenient options to register to vote when renewing or applying for a driver license or identification (ID) card. Customers can either visit a DMV office or go online at www.dmv.ca.gov.

TouchScreen Terminal: Customers renewing or applying for a driver license or ID card at a DMV field office can now complete their voter registration using a TouchScreen Terminal. The improved option involves a simple process that is more efficient. Customers who indicate on their driver license or ID application that they want to register to vote, will be directed to a TouchScreen monitor to confirm their U.S. citizenship, choose their party preference, select language preference, whether they would like to vote by mail, and if they want to volunteer on Election Day. Voter information is then electronically sent to elections officials for processing.

DMV Website: Customers renewing their driver license or ID online will have the opportunity to register to vote after completing their DMV transaction. These individuals will be directed to the Secretary of State's official website where their DMV information will prepopulate the voter registration form.

Customers who do not receive their voter notification card within four weeks of registering to vote should contact their local county elections office where voter registration status can also be verified. For information

Additional voter registration options for customers will be available in the future pursuant to Assembly Bill 1461, the New Motor Voter Act, signed into law by Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. in 2015. 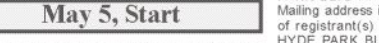

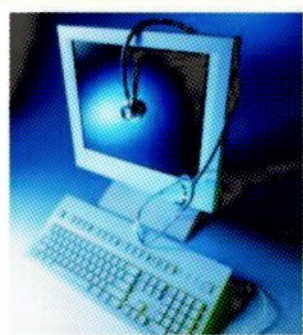

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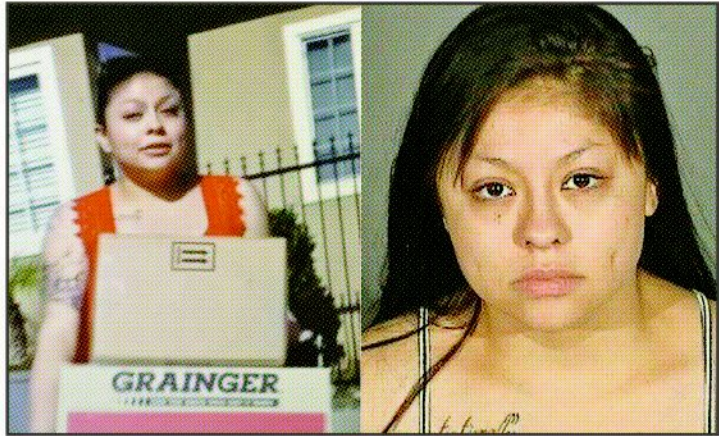
