Baldwin Park Unified Celebrates Nearly 850 Graduates in Class of 2020

BALDWIN PARK—Baldwin Park Unified honored the Class of 2020 — lauded for its academic achievement and resilient spirit — with socially distanced celebrations that culminated in an unconventional school year.

Nearly 850 graduates from Baldwin Park, North Park Continuation and Sierra Vista High Schools were celebrated through senior recognition days, drive-thru ceremonies, social media shout-outs and virtual celebrations, ensuring seniors received a memorable send-off while adhering to public health guidelines.

“The Class of 2020 is a truly remarkable group of students, who have inspired us all with their accomplishments as they persevered through many unforeseen circumstances,” Superintendent Dr. Froilan N. Mendoza said. “We are proud to honor their success and wish the Class of 2020 all the best as they embark on new academic and professional journeys.”

Baldwin Park High School kicked off commencement activities on June 4, conferring diplomas to more than 400 students during a drive-thru celebration. Baldwin Park High’s Class of 2020 is led by valedictorian Kendra Nguyen and salutatorian Zaia Rodriguez.

Nguyen, a member of the BPHS space club and humanitar-

ian club, earned the Ramona Burnham and College Board Opportunity scholarships for her academic excellence. She will major in physics at Pomona College, and hopes to one day work at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory and win a Nobel Prize in Physics.

Rodriguez, a member of the National Honor Society (NHS), Humanitarian Club and Adelante Mujer Latina, was awarded a Baldwin Park Organization of Supervisors and Administrators (BPOSA) scholarship. She will attend Cal State Fullerton and

study nursing, with goals to be a bilingual nurse anesthetist to support quality healthcare.

Sierra Vista High School valedictorian Jose Antonio Martinez and salutatorian Cindy Yan were among more than 360 Sierra Vista seniors honored with drive-thru and virtual celebrations on June 5.

Martinez’ academic achieve-

ment, maintained while playing tennis, serving in the school’s robotics club and competing in Science Olympiad, earned him national recognition as a 2020 Gates Scholarship recipient. The scholarship will cover the cost of Martinez’ studies at the California Institute of Technology.

Scholar-athlete Yan excelled in and out of the classroom, com-

peting in volleyball and lacrosse while also serving in National Honors Society (NHS) and the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) club. Yan will continue her education at UCLA in the fall.

North Park Continuation High School’s Class of 2020 featured more than 80 graduates, including Michell Aguilera and Ezdra Esparza, who received scholarships in recognition of their excellence.

Aguilera earned the Woman’s Club Scholarship and Red Cross Scholarship; Esparza was awarded a Baldwin Park Organization of Supervisors and Administrators (BPOSA) scholarship and Woman’s Club Scholarship. Esparza, who served as a BPOSD Student Board member during 2019-2020, aspires to work in immigration or criminal law or as a high school counselor.

North Park graduates concluded their high school experience with a drive-thru celebration on June 10. Clad in masks, graduation gowns and boldly decorated caps, students received their diplomas and turned their tassels as their families cheered them on from their vehicles.

Citrus College Bond Refinancing to Save Community Millions in Future Taxes

GLENDORA — Local taxpayers are estimated to save over \$7.7 million after the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees recently approved a plan to refinance outstanding voter-approved general obligation bonds.

Earlier this month, board members voted to take advantage of the nation’s current low interest rate environment by refinancing portions of the district’s Measure G bonds. These bonds, which were originally issued when interest rates were higher, will now be refinanced at current market rates. As a result, the remaining repayment period of the refinanced bonds will now be reduced by five years and property tax assessments will be lower over the long term.

“When voters approved Measure G in 2004, it was a pivotal moment for Citrus College. We want to assure community members that their investment has been a wise one, and that the district has taken great care to prudently manage resources,” said Dr. Geraldine

M. Perri, superintendent/president of Citrus College. “While the bond refinancing does not directly impact the college’s own finances, it will be beneficial to those residents who have continuously supported our mission of providing quality educational experiences that lead to college completion and student success.”

This will be the third time that Citrus College has refinanced Measure G bonds, with previous refinancing taking place in 2013 and 2015. As a result, the cumulative combined estimated savings to taxpayers is nearly \$15 million.

“With interest rates currently near an all-time low, this is a great opportunity to save money for our taxpayers,” explained Claudette Dain, vice president of finance and administrative services at Citrus College. “We always strive to be good stewards of district and community resources.”

Nearly 16 years ago, local residents invested in the future of Citrus College students when they voted to support the \$121

million Measure G general obligation bond. Since that time, many capital improvements have been made on the Citrus College campus. Completed construction projects include the Campus Safety Building, Mathematics/Sciences Building, Center for Innovation, Technician Development Center, Student Services Building and Visual Arts Building. The remaining Measure G funds are earmarked for the Educational Development Center modernization project.

“As the college prepares to begin work on the final Measure G project, the board of trustees and the college community continue to be grateful to our partners and neighbors who supported this bond, thus allowing Citrus College to complete a number of capital improvement projects,” said Dr. Patricia A. Rasmussen, president of the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees. “I am happy that this refinancing enables us to give back to our community.”

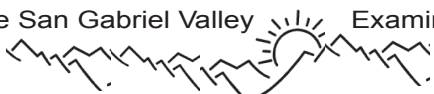

The flexibility of online instruction allows students to organize their study and class times, thus maximizing work schedules, and students with children can avoid much, if not all, of the cost of daycare.

But students aren't the only cost savers. Taxpayers save too.

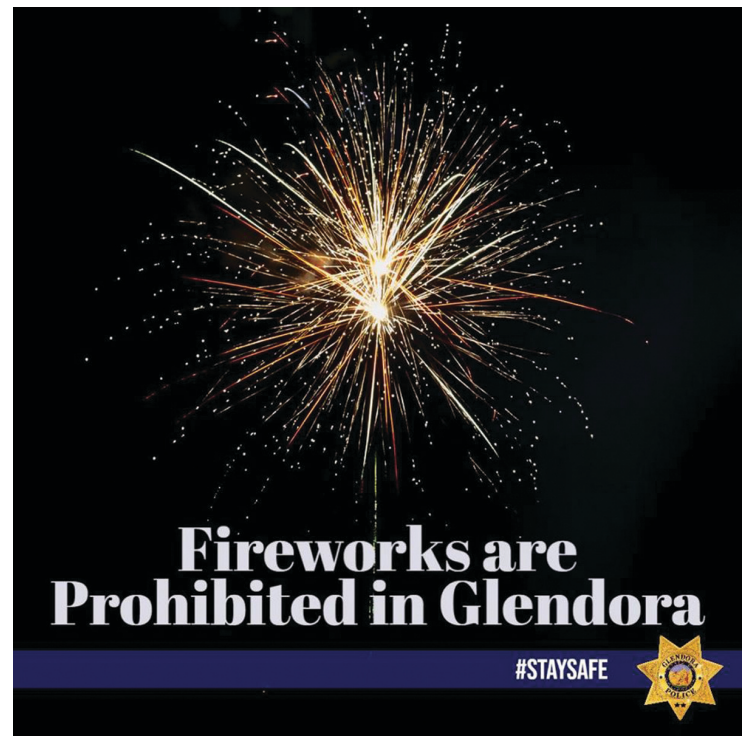
Fireworks Are Prohibited in The City of Glendora

If you are caught in possession of fireworks, they may be confiscated and you may be issued a citation. Possession of fireworks in Los

Angeles County is a misdemeanor, and the fine can be up to \$1,000 per violation or a county jail sentence not to exceed six months.

This applies to ALL types of fireworks, even those designated as "safe and sane."

Let's keep this season safe for everyone.



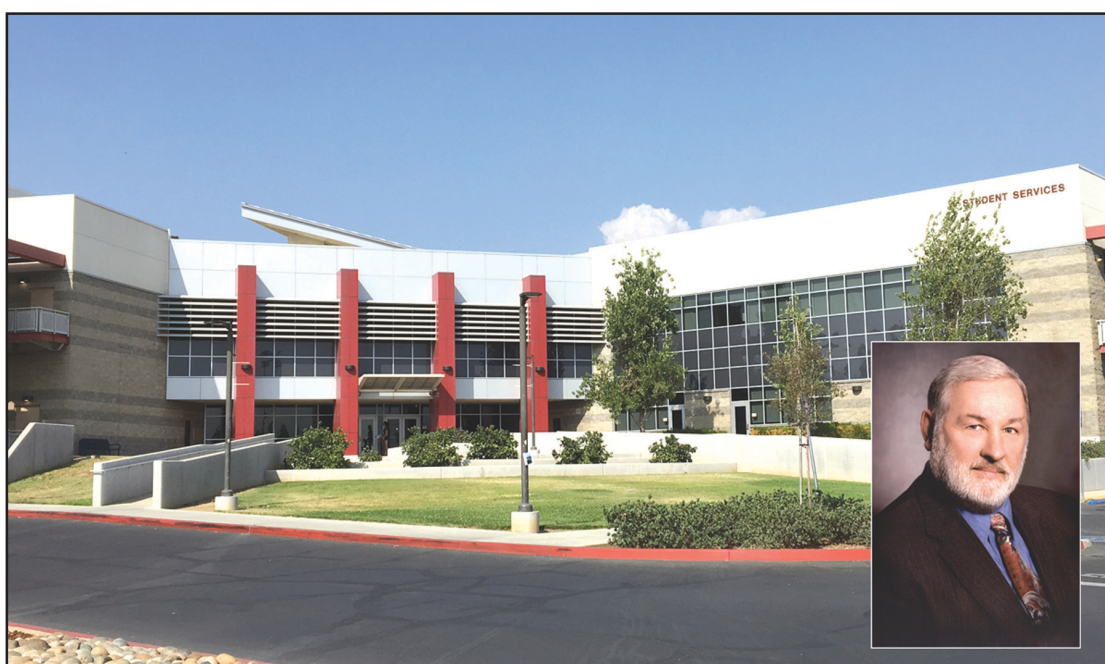
Santa Anita Family YMCA To Open Summer Day Camps For Youth!

Responding to COVID-19 Economic Crisis, Revised Los Angeles County Budget Includes Program Cuts And Potential Layoffs

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - In the wake of the unprecedented economic crisis sparked by COVID-19, Los Angeles County's 2020-21 Final Changes budget includes a wide range of curtailments affecting virtually every County department.

The \$34.9 billion budget, which will be presented to the Board of Supervisors for budget deliberations on Monday, June 29, represents some of the most challenging fiscal decisions in recent County history.

The cuts are needed to address a projected \$935.3 million budget gap, mostly due to sharp revenue declines at the same time the County also is investing in major response and reopening activities to support its communities during the pandemic.

"I am very disappointed to report that significant cuts in County programs and personnel will be needed as a result of the seri-

ous economic downturn caused by this ongoing public health emergency," said Chief Executive Officer Sachi A. Hamai. "This is not the outcome any of us wants to see, especially as our County staff continues to serve with great commitment during this crisis. I want to wholeheartedly thank our more than 100,000 employees for their incredible dedication to public service at this difficult time."

She expressed hope that the cuts can be mitigated in the Supplemental Budget, which will be submitted to the Board in September.

"This budget marks a point in time, not the finish line," Hamai said. "I remain hopeful that we will be able to obtain additional funding from Washington and Sacramento, and we also continue to work with labor on cost-saving measures that could help preserve jobs."

The cuts in the proposed budget include \$453.5 million in departmental curtailments and \$59.3 million in management cost reductions. To bridge the gap, the budget will also draw on \$351.6 million in one-time funding from departmental trust accounts.

An estimated \$70.9 million drop in Measure H sales tax revenues will be offset with state Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program funding of \$22.6 million, with other sources of funding expected to be identified in the Supplemental Budget.

Overall, the proposed depart-

mental curtailments result in the elimination of 3,251 positions—2,596 vacant and 655 potential layoffs. No layoffs would take place prior to October 1.

The proposed curtailments represent an across-the-board cut of 8% for departments funded with what is known as Net County Cost, or NCC—the portion of the budget that is funded with sales tax and other locally generated revenues.

Because the largest share—40%—of NCC goes to the County's public safety departments, including the Sheriff's Department, these departments are most heavily affected by the cuts. These departments also receive a large share of the state realignment sales tax revenues, which have declined sharply as well.

"These proposed cuts are not intended to penalize any department, or to diminish the importance of their work," Hamai said. "Rather, these curtailments are part of an equitable process of cost reductions that will affect all County departments."

"Thanks to our County's longstanding tradition of responsible budgeting, historically high credit ratings, and investments in rainy day reserves, we are in a better position than some other local governments to respond to this crisis," Hamai said. "Los Angeles County has always been able to overcome every challenge in our path, and I am confident we can emerge from this crisis stronger than ever to serve the vibrant and diverse communities that make up our great County."

Celebrate The Fourth Of July Responsibly

AZUSA - The Fourth of July is a time to be with family and friends and to celebrate our country's independence. As the Fourth of July draws closer Azusa City Councilmembers, Azusa Police Department and Los Angeles County Fire Department would like to remind residents to use caution to ensure a safe Fourth of July Holiday. If your celebration is going to include fireworks, only use the Safe and Sane variety in legally designated areas of the city.

The Azusa City Council has made a significant change to the Azusa Municipal Code regarding illegal fireworks. They have imposed a zero tolerance for illegal displays and have increased the fines to \$1,000 for each infraction. Firecrackers, bottle rockets and mortars are all illegal! The discharge of these types of displays is strictly prohibited in Azusa.

Safe and Sane fireworks may only be discharged on July fourth

from noon to midnight and only in residential zones. It is against the law to discharge fireworks north of Sierra Madre Avenue, in City parks, parking lots, alleys or in schools. To purchase safe and sane fireworks, you must be at least eighteen years of age.

The Azusa City Council would like to remind residents that the city has a strict fireworks ordinance that restricts the use of safe and sane fireworks and imposes severe penalties for any violations. On July Fourth, the Azusa Police Department will be enforcing all applicable city and state laws and issuing citations for administrative fines beginning at \$250 and up to \$1,000.

Violation of State fireworks laws are a misdemeanor and punishable by fines or up to one-year incarceration in county jail.

The 4th of July is a time to be with family and friends, please celebrate safely and responsibly.

The stagnant water sources in our yards and patios are fueling a potentially busy year for mosquitoes. There are simple things everyone must do now to prevent mosquitoes from taking over our neighborhoods:

1. TIP stagnant water weekly from all containers
 2. TOSS out any unused containers that can collect stagnant water
 3. PROTECT yourself with repellent to stop mosquito bites
- Public health official recommend using mosquito repellents

Update on the Implementation of Body-Worn Cameras by the LA County Sheriff's Department

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The rollout of the body-worn camera program that will ensure greater accountability of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department is on target for mid-to-late July, following months of collaborative efforts between the County and the Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff's Department will be able to equip 5,200 deputies and security officers with devices over the next two years utilizing the nearly \$35 million that the Board of Supervisors set aside last year specifically dedicated for this program.

The Los Angeles County Internal Services Department has been working with representatives from the Sheriff's Department on the solicitation and negotiations with proposed vendors since October 2019. During that time, both departments worked closely to review various proposals and onboard the selected vendor to supply the Department with the long-awaited cameras and technology to support this program. Thus far, the Sheriff's Department has received approximately \$8 million dollars to begin the infrastructure work needed at the patrol stations designat-

ed for the initial rollout.

The Board of Supervisors has prioritized greater transparency and accountability from the Sheriff's Department for several years, developing key policy initiatives and identifying appropriate funding and staffing to allow for the swift implementation and operation of the body-worn camera program. The Board's history of steadfast support in making this program a reality included the following:

- Approved a motion authored by Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas to implement the recommendations on the need to curb excessive uses of force (which included the use of body-worn cameras) as part of the Citizens' Commission on Jail Violence in 2012. The Board also approved subsequent motions.

- Enlisted the help of the Office of Inspector General (OIG) in September, 2015 for a detailed analysis of the proposed body-worn camera policy prompting the County to begin a lengthy process of assessing the cost of such a program.

- Directed the Sheriff to implement the body-worn camera program and appointed the OIG

to monitor implementation in September, 2019.

- Engaged the OIG and Civilian Oversight Commission (COC) to give specific feedback to update and strengthen policies that would enhance the use and efficacy of body-worn Cameras, such as the review and release of camera footage.

The Civilian Oversight Commission and the Inspector General have also given specific feedback and recommendations to the Sheriff's on how to improve the proposed policies on body-worn cameras, around topics such as the reviewing and releasing of camera footage, aimed at bolstering community trust in this new technology. These issues remain unaddressed.

Once the implementation takes effect next month, the Sheriff's Department will have the responsibility to roll out body-worn cameras with monitoring and input from both the OIG and COC.

The Board is grateful that after many years of persistent effort, body worn cameras will be implemented by the LA Sheriff's Department.

Legislation to Combat Cybercrimes Moves Through Senate, Heads to Assembly

Bill Comes as More Californians Work and Live Online During the COVID-19 Pandemic

SACRAMENTO - Senator Chang's Senate Bill 922 left the California Senate with bipartisan support before moving to the Assembly on Wednesday. SB 922 gives prosecutors the tools to address the growing epidemic of hacking and cybercrimes by reforming the statute of limitations for felony computer hacking. The bill allows for prosecution three years after the date of the discovery rather than the date of the offense.

"In normal times, cybercrimes have become a growing threat to

people, businesses and governments," said Senator Chang. "Today an unprecedented number of Californians have been asked to work and study from home, giving cybercriminals plenty of opportunities to commit cybercrimes leaving a trail of digital destruction costing millions of dollars to businesses and consumers."

According to the FBI, there are an average of 300,000 cybercrime related complaints filed every year. Apart from being a

rampant problem, it is also a costly problem. In 2018, the annual cost of cyberattacks in the United States was \$27 million and expected to rise. Unfortunately, the current COVID-19 pandemic has given cybercriminals even more opportunities to take advantage of remote workers and students.

SB 922 will provide recourse for victims of cybercrimes and hold cybercriminals accountable for the trail of digital destruction that is left in their wake.

L.A. County Prevails In Legal Action To Temporarily House Vulnerable People Through Project Roomkey

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The County of Los Angeles prevailed today in litigation that allows Project Roomkey to continue serving the most vulnerable residents during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The cities of Bell Gardens and Lynwood have been dismissed from a lawsuit brought by the County of Los Angeles. These cities had previously enacted legislation to bar local hotels from participating in Project Roomkey and related temporary housing programs run by the County of Los Angeles. The County sought to block their efforts.

Lynwood has rescinded its

moratorium and Bell Gardens allowed its moratorium to lapse.

"Without a vaccine, physical distancing is our best line of defense. Since the start of this pandemic, L.A. County has always been intent on protecting and sheltering our most vulnerable residents to minimize their exposure to this highly contagious virus," said Los Angeles County Supervisor Hilda L. Solis. "Project Roomkey and our medical sheltering sites have saved lives, and our commitment to these initiatives reflect the moral character of Los Angeles County and its residents."

"Project Roomkey and its re-

lated medical sheltering program has protected thousands of our most vulnerable residents and protected our communities. These programs are also helping us as we move forward on the road to reopening," said Tiana Murillo, Los Angeles County's Temporary Supervisory Administrator overseeing and coordinating the County's emergency housing efforts. "We're grateful for the partnership of our cities and their leaders as we work together to respond to an unprecedented pandemic."

The litigation is still ongoing against the City of Norwalk.

Azusa Police Arrest 5 for Racial Attack

AZUSA - Azusa police pulled a car over on Friday morning June 26 around 1:15 a.m. for speeding. The car was filled with teenagers. While the police were conducting an interview with the driver, they overhear a radio call.

A short distance away in the 300 block of E. Foothill Boulevard, 2 girls flagged down a police officer and told them that a car load of people drove by and yelled racial slurs and threw eggs at them. One of the girls was struck by an egg. Both girls are African-American.

The traffic stop was at Alameda Avenue and Fifth Street which was only a few blocks away from the incident.

As the broadcast went out with the description of the car, the officers that were conducting the traffic stop realized that the car that they had pulled over was the one that was involved in the racial attack.

Apparently, the 2 girls were simply walking down the street when the 5 teens drove up on them and started yelling racial slurs at them and tossing eggs in their direction.

The officers then removed all the occupants from the car only to find that one of the male subjects had a gun on

him. The only adult in the car was identified as Gabriel Omelas, 18, the rest were all young teenagers. The adult subject will be charged with child endangerment as well as possible hate crimes. One teen under 18 will be charged with gun possession. The other 3 teens will most likely be charged as well with one for battery and the rest for being out after curfew. All 5 are subject to being charged with hate crimes which enhances the penalty. The vehicle was also impounded.

Budget Approved; Recall Petitions Ready

For the third time in 18 months, a conservative group is initiating a Recall Gov. Gavin Newsom effort and this time is seriously organized. They need 1.5 million signatures, but are shooting for 2 million to cover any discounted for errors. They feel this effort will be successful because they have spent time to organize and structure the effort knowing they need grassroots support gathering signatures and support from others in fundraising efforts. All signatures have to be received by county registrars before November 17, 2020.

Reasons for initiating the recall are "Unaffordable housing, record homelessness, rising crime, failing schools, independent contractors thrown out of work, exploding pension debt, and now, a locked down population while the prisons are emptied." We can take those reasons and become more specific with actual events in our communities leaving us anxious to see this effort succeed.

Orrin Heatlie, retired Sergeant, Yolo County Sheriff's Department, and lead proponent in this effort, said, "There is an urgent need to send a strong message to those who govern. And that message is, 'They must be held accountable to the people they serve and this rogue Governor has lost sight of that and must be recalled!'"

Gov. Gavin Newsom's response to the recall and Heatlie's message was first, a warning about the cost of a recall election at \$81 million, and, as in the last recall effort, blame President Trump's "hateful attacks on California and the political extremists that support him."

Newsom's statement doesn't tout any real accomplishments, only says he is working to fix education, housing, health care, water infrastructure, roads and bridges and preparing for more wildfires that have already devastated this state. Working on "it" is not the right answer when you have a one-party state, with a majority of Democrats in the Assembly and the Senate and been in office two years to come up with some solutions.

California has a budget deficit estimated by Gov. Newsom to be \$54.3 billion. The Legislative Analyst, last report, set budget deficits in the \$18 to \$31 billion range. Quite a spread, but the Legislative Analyst analyzes the budget and does so based on what the legislators do and Newsom is willing to sign off on. What has become an issue for the legislature - both sides of the aisle - Gov. Newsom's spending spree without their approval while they were absent on COVID leave from the Capitol.

There will be a \$4.4 billion temporary tax increase on businesses making \$1 million a year. That hits small businesses not yet recovered from the virus shut down.

The pea under the pod game has been played with water bonds. Legislators have taken money approved by the voters on one bond and shuffled that money around to another bond. With this deficit, there may be some real pea shuffling going on here.

What we see are dollar signs on that budget. What we haven't seen are the policy proposals tucked away in the budget bills that could have a large impact on our lifestyles and perhaps the ballot initiatives on the November ballot. Remember that gas tax that went sailing through the legislature in the middle of the night a few years back?

The budget, as I hear from various sources including boots on the ground, will fund education at the same level as last year meeting the Prop 98 school funding law. But those sources say that \$12 billion in the budget won't reach school district bank

accounts until next year. That procedure is called a deferral. One source said districts can take out loans to retain their teachers or use their reserves or begin layoffs.

Always mentioned is the \$14 billion the federal government will be sending as part of the CARES Act. If it is sent before October 10th it can be parceled out by legislators as they chose. If that money arrives after October 10th, there must be hearings and committee discussions. \$6.3 billion is targeted for education and has to be spent before the end of the year. That could mean the deferred money to education this year would be reduced by half and would receive \$5.4 billion.

School districts are required to budget out 3 years to ensure they have adequate resources for their students. Declining enrollment has hit small school districts hard and they don't have the resources to fund the State's budget shortfall. If districts begin layoffs, it is the youngest and newest teachers that will be lost. Tenure, a union process, gives teachers there the longest priority to be retained, and the newest are routed out. If we lose the newest and youngest, will they be there when funding is fully restored?

Recall Gavin Newsom 2020 is about lack of leadership and bad decisions made with our tax dollars. The criminal justice system is all but gone as we see felons, including illegals not turned over to ICE for deportation, roaming our streets. Mental health and drug addiction intervention is non-existent.

Newsom's affordable housing solution is to eradicate local zoning ordinances and environmental review and plant density units anywhere while Central Valley farmers are fighting outdated environmental laws to get enough water to raise our food.

Important on Newsom's bucket list has been funding health insurance for illegals; Motel 6 deals to house homeless; and, billion-dollar facemasks from a Chinese car company. All seem to take precedence over education.

Monterey only one day after taking control.

Without any word from Fremont and the United States, Commodore Sloat waited 25 days contemplating what to do about taking Monterey. Finally, Sloat realized that the heralded Captain John C. Fremont would never have acted alone and so he decided to land 250 men to take control on the town.

On July 7, 1846, without a single shot being fired, General Jose Castro fled with his forces, and the United States Navy was now in possession of Monterey. Eventually, Fremont rode into Monterey and he informed Sloat that he had acted on his own and war had not been declared on Mexico. Commodore Sloat had proclaimed that California was now a part of the United States but neither President Polk or any other United States official had made a similar announcement.

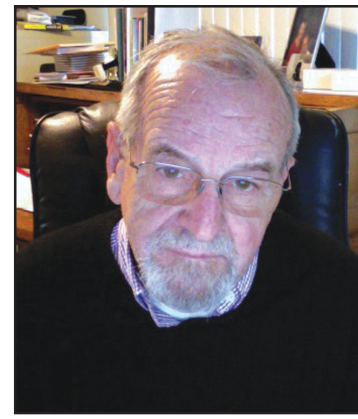
For 22 days, Sloat acted as Military Governor of California and awaited official word that the United States had acquired California or he had repeated another embarrassing action. Eventually Commodore Robert S. Stockton arrived announcing the United States declaration of War against Mexico and was assigned to relieve Sloat of his duties. Commodore Sloat remained in the Navy for another 20 years until he retired with the rank of Rear Admiral.

Wood's point confronts us with the reality that racism is not an attitude one might hold, but a social condition. It not therefore anything we change by having friends of other races or fighting the bigots who live on the fringes of our liberal lives. Racism is not conquered by creating occasions for conversations across racial lines or welcoming those of other races into our churches, clubs or social gatherings. Among liberals it is not an attitude to be corrected, but a societal reality we cannot escape by any of our more benevolent impulses.

So what do we do? We probably should begin by admitting that white privilege is our reality, and has been for a long time. While we cannot escape it, we must recognize its existence. "TIME JOCKEY" - Sloat's Landing

Reluctant... The acquisition of California by the United States was not as politically planned as we may have thought. James K. Polk was the 11th President of the United States and was the last of the Jacksonian era leaders. Considered a strong, no-nonsense leader, Polk sought to drive the United States to the Pacific Ocean. Without wanting to aggravate Mexico, our southern neighbor, Polk secretly designed a plan to take the California territory by force. Former Captain John C. Fremont was building a small battalion to march to Sonoma, seize it and start an uprising seeking to establish California as an independent republic. But President Polk could not offer direct military support to Fremont as it would seem like a United States sponsored rebellion. Fremont with 190 men overtook the Mexican forces at the Sonoma garrison and the new California Bear Flag was unfurled announcing a new government of California. But War against Mexico had not been announced by either Fremont or the United States.

Prior to Fremont's assault on Sonoma, Polk had devised a plan in case the United States sought to acquire the California territory.

He assigned Brigadier General Stephen Kearney to lead an expedition from Lawrence, Kansas, west along the Gila River trail to the Spanish town of Santa Fe, New Mexico. Kearney would take control of New Mexico and then proceed west to Southern California. Commodore John D. Sloat would take his Pacific Squadron of the U.S. Navy and seize the most important ports of California. Word reached Sloat that Fremont had succeeded in taking Sonoma in the name of a new California Republic, but he still had no word that War had been declared on Mexico. Sloat waited in the vicinity of Monterey for word from Polk to proceed with the defined plan of action. He was fearful that the British would attempt to land forces first at Monterey and if that were to happen a conflict between a major international power would surely result. But Sloat was also fearful of repeating the same mistake of Commodore Thomas ap Catesby Jones, who four years earlier as Commander of the United States Pacific Squadron seized Monterey. He had mistakenly thought that the United States had declared war on Mexico, and after realizing his mistake he vacated

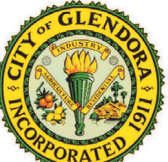

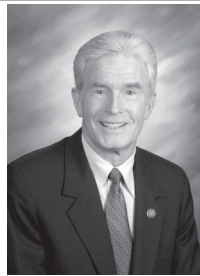

One Of Wall Street's Biggest Fears

The headlines that everyone feared crossed the tape in the middle of last week, when it was reported that a resurgence of Covid-19 cases was hitting Texas, Arizona, Florida, and California. That unwelcome news offered a motive for some aggressive profit-taking in equity markets. And, Wall Street expects volatility to continue. The key data point investors seem laser focused on now is the rate of new hospitalizations. If this data remains relatively stable, and death rates continue to decline in the USA, the bears may have to go back into hibernation until some other market-rattling headline triggers the overnight futures market. (Note: It should be expected that as COVID-19 testing continues to expand in the USA, many more cases will be confirmed, but America's death rate should also continue to decline.)

Bloomberg Economics waved goodbye to the V-shaped recovery and hello to a U-shaped recovery. One issue is the rising number of confirmed COVID cases, potentially threatening more economic reopening and a return to normalcy in the entire country. Unfortunately, some blue state governors likely will continue to look for excuses to avoid a complete reopening for businesses until after November elections. One specific concern (noted by Bloomberg News) is that consulting firm Allen Andrews and Associates estimates 10% of the 22 million restaurants worldwide will go out of business before September, while an additional 20% or more will go through a restructuring process. OpenTable estimates the failure rate will be even higher. "Another wave of China's originated pandemic may take the numbers higher in the absence of further bailouts." Restaurants employed 15.6 million Americans before COVID.

In the meantime, there will still be plenty of economic charts that look V-shaped, as the economic restart from almost nothing suggests that rapid increases in employment and activity should be expected (at least in the near-term). We saw it in employment and retail sales earlier this month. Nevertheless, Wall Street apparently agrees with the Bloomberg Economics diagnosis: What started as rapid recovery is likely to stall if people don't feel safe (which is what I am hearing from friends in virus resurgent states). Ongoing Antifa / BLM civil unrest is also not helpful to the economy! Hopefully sane minds will prevail, and that lawlessness can be significantly reduced.

One phenomenon of COVID-19 (that we are starting to see) is the beginning of the Great Savings Release. Due to store closings while most of us were still working (or at least being paid), plus up to \$10 trillion in stimulus from the Federal Reserve and Congress, most American's are overflowing with savings. The personal savings rate skyrocketed from 8.2% in February to a record 33% in April, as the national piggy bank bloated from a lean \$1.4 trillion in February to \$6.1 trillion in April. That money was frozen in April, since stores were mostly closed and the IRS said, "Please don't send us money on April 15. Please delay your taxes until July 15."

While some unfortunate

Americans may still be in bad financial shape (due to suddenly losing their jobs, or not receiving unemployment or stimulus checks in a timely manner) in the aggregate, Americans have become a nation swimming in liquidity. Millions of households are sitting on a pile of cash, which has helped fuel a "V-shaped" (50%) stock market recovery. This cash could also fuel a similar (but potentially slower-motion) V-shaped economic recovery during the second half of 2020 (assuming we elect to spend more of our saved money).

One reason that the stock market has been so resilient is that the Fed allowed the 10-year Treasury bond yield to rise from 0.66% to 0.91% in the first week of June. Although the 10-year Treasury bond fell to as low as 0.652% intraday last week, many fixed income investors were spooked by the fact that the Fed allowed Treasury bond yields to rise in early June. As a result, more fixed income investors are turning to dividend paying stocks (because they could lose a lot of current value in bonds if long-term Treasury yields continue to rise).

Until the larger issues play out (namely realignment of relations with China and the November elections) the market will likely absorb most of the other risks as not nearly outweighing what the Fed is currently doing (including what Fed Chair Jerome Powell has promised to keep doing). As of last week's press conference it was confirmed that there won't be any increases in interest rates until 2023! What a grand promise, especially benefitting the equity markets!

Is the stock market going to go up, or is it going to go down?

Yes. It is going to go up, and it is going to go down. Consider diversifying your investments into specific annuities and/or a fixed-indexed life insurance policy.

With my Stocks and Bonds, I'd like more safety. With my CDs, I like the safety, but I'd like a higher return. I'd also like a guaranteed income when I retire. My peers give me a big chuckle and look at me like I'm crazy. Can I have what I want?

Others might tell you, "You're dreaming! Face reality! Can't happen!" I'm here to tell you, they are wrong. You can have better returns than you're getting with your CDs and still have the safety you enjoy. You can have index-like returns without the worry about losses. And, you can have a guaranteed, lifetime income when you retire.

I went to the bank to withdraw my savings and the bank limited the amount they would give me. They said I needed to contact them two days ahead and schedule the withdrawal. A friend of mine is refinancing,

and the bank said the loan would close and fund on a specific date. It closed, but did not fund. The bank said it'll probably fund two or three days after the weekend. This is scary! What's happening?

Some banks are limiting the amount you can withdraw, saying that they have to order money and await delivery. Certain branches are limited on the amount of money they have available to pay withdrawals. More and more banks are putting a 'hold' (waiting period) on access to funds when you deposit cash or a money order. None of this seems right, nor logical, but it is what you have to plan for. It raises concerns that if there was a run on the bank (customers closing their accounts and taking large sums of money) there would not be enough cash to pay everybody. Regarding the late funding on a refinance loan, the borrower should contact the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) to find out if closing, but delaying funding, is even legal.

Are the contents of my safety-deposit box at my bank FDIC insured?

No. FDIC does not insure the

contents of safety-deposit boxes. You can contact your homeowner's insurance company agent and purchase your own insurance for this purpose. An alternative would be to purchase a good-quality safe for your home, and add to your homeowner's policy the value of whatever you put into your home safe.

Why do you only recommend certain annuities?

I recommend Fixed and Fixed-Index annuities, with very little or no fees, up to 100-percent participation (percent of your money that participates in potential growth), and guarantees* that you cannot lose your principal, locking in any growth each contract anniversary. (Some "Riders" for additional benefits can have an annual fee, but this is clearly disclosed to you before you invest; it's something you decide to include or not.) A good reason I don't recommend Variable annuities: The SEC warns people about the dangers of Variable annuities due to their costs, expenses, and risk to potential principal. *Guarantees are based on the strength of the insurance company issuing the annuity policy.)

\$3 Million Dollars in Small Business and Non-Profit Grant Assistance to be Deployed Through New Los Angeles-Area COVID Recovery Fund

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - As businesses and non-profits across the Los Angeles region continue to face challenges in response to the public health and economic crisis of COVID-19, the County of Los Angeles, the City of Los Angeles, and philanthropy have partnered to deploy \$3 million dollars in grants for small businesses, non-profits and microentrepreneurs in a newly launched LA Regional COVID-19 Recovery Fund.

The \$3 million dollar Recovery Fund, established as a joint effort by the County of Los Angeles, who have contributed \$2 million dollars, and the City of Los Angeles, who have contributed \$1 million dollars, as well as additional support from philanthropic partners, aims to assist small businesses, nonprofits, and microentrepreneurs that have been adversely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, providing \$5,000 grants to microentrepreneurs, and \$15,000 grants to non-profits and small businesses. To ensure equitable access to capital across various demographics throughout the region, grants will

be distributed through an equitable lottery system.

Given the urgency for assistance, the Recovery Fund will be deployed in two phases and make technical support immediately available throughout the application process. The first phase will consist of a grant program, and a second phase will consist of a loan program that will launch at a later date. Starting on July 6, 2020, the first phase will deploy \$3 million in grants available at \$5,000 for micro-entrepreneurs and \$15,000 for small businesses and non-profits. Both phases of the Recovery Fund will be accompanied by support from diverse technical assistance partners, funded by philanthropic and private sector partners. Support for these efforts include \$1.1 million from the Wells Fargo Foundation, \$100,000 from Citi, and funding from MUFG Union Bank Foundation.

The public-private partnership will be administered by national community development financial institution partner, Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC). LISC will administer the

grant process and work through local partners to reach businesses and nonprofits who may not have received Federal relief funds.

Local partners providing technical assistance with proven experience in serving the County's most vulnerable communities include the API Small Business Program, Inclusive Action for the City, LA Area Chamber of Commerce, New Economics for Women, Pacific Asian Consortium in Employment (PACE), Pacific Coast Regional (PCR), The Center by Lendistry, and Vermont Slauson Economic Development Corporation.

Those who need assistance are encouraged to call (833) 238-4450, LA County's Disaster Help Center and one-stop for local emergency resources. The Disaster Help Center will connect callers to LA Regional COVID Fund partners and provide the most updated Fund information.

Is It Hot Enough For You?

How many times do you hear that phrase in the course of the summer? We hear about the importance of taking care of ourselves during hot weather on the news and read about it in various publications. We are told to drink lots of water to keep hydrated, especially when exercising or doing physical labor.

Take a moment and think about your car...it gets hot too! We often take for granted just how hard it does work for us in all kinds of weather. When you see a car sitting on the side of the road with steam rising from the hood, that is an overheated vehicle!

Many things will cause a car to overheat... a hose, radiator, head gasket, thermostat, water

pump or even the computer controlled electric fans may not be functioning. With so many critical components that have to work together to keep the engine cool, we recommend an inspection every 3 to 4 months of these items.

I keep repeating this statement and here it is again, it is always less expensive to maintain your car versus waiting for it to break and then fixing it. Most newer cars have a warning system to alert you of a failure. Please don't ignore these warnings. We have many customers who kept driving after a warning light came on and destroyed the engine.

If you think your car is overheating, get to the side of the road quickly and safely. Turn

off your radio and air conditioner, then turn your heater on to high while keeping the engine idling. If no heat comes out, turn the car off as soon as possible, no heat means no coolant in the engine.

Beaches Closed, Fireworks Displays Prohibited During 4th of July Weekend to Prevent Spread of COVID-19

LOS ANGELES COUNTY—The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health is ordering L.A. County beaches closed from July 3 through July 6 at 5:00 a.m. to prevent dangerous crowding that results in the spread of deadly COVID-19.

For that same reason, the department is also prohibiting fireworks displays in the County this July 4th holiday weekend.

During the holiday weekend, beaches will be totally closed to all recreational activities. Beach parking lots will be closed, as well.

Key metrics continue to show steep increases in community spread of COVID-19. Today, the department announced more than 2,900 new cases of COVID-19, the single largest one-day case count since the pandemic began.

Data show increases in people testing positive for the virus and increases in hospitalizations as a result. Projections by the Department of Health Services show a marked increase in hospitalizations in the coming weeks, which could cause a surge in our healthcare system.

“Closing the beaches and prohibiting fireworks displays during this important summer holiday weekend was an incredibly difficult decision to make, but it’s the responsible decision to protect public health and protect our residents from a deadly virus. The Fourth of July holiday weekend typically means large crowds and gatherings to celebrate, a recipe for increased transmission of COVID-19,” said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health.

“We all need to take this virus more seriously and residents and business owners must do their part. Physical distancing isn’t optional, wearing a face covering isn’t optional, spending time only with those you live with isn’t optional — these are requirements in the Health Officer Order and are the tools we have to protect each other, our families and those most vulnerable in our communities.”

All public beaches, piers, public beach parking lots, beach bike paths that traverse that sanded portion of the beach, and beach access points will be temporarily closed to the public as of 12:01 a.m. on July 3, 2020, until 5 a.m. on July 6, 2020. Long Beach has its own health department and this announcement does not apply to that city, at this time.

Los Angeles County Bars Closing

LOS ANGELES COUNTY—Following the directive of Gov. Gavin Newsom’s, all bars in the County were ordered closed on Sunday, June 28.

The County Health Officer Order was amended Sunday, June 28 to require that all bars, breweries, brew pubs, pubs, wineries and tasting rooms in L.A. County close unless they are offering sit-down dine-in meals. This includes closing bar areas in restaurants.

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health is guided by science and data and the key metrics monitored are showing concerning trends.

There has been a sharp increase in new cases and hospitalizations. The timing of these increases is in line with the reopening of key sectors, including bars, which are places where people remove their face covering to drink while they may be socializing with people not in their households.

“While it’s disappointing to take a step back on our economic recovery journey, it’s critical that we protect the health of our residents and protect the capacity in



our healthcare system,” said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. “I implore that our residents and businesses follow the Public Health directives that will keep us healthy, safe and on the pathway to recovery. Otherwise, we are quickly moving toward overwhelming our healthcare system and seeing even more devastating illness and death.”

The State-mandated closing comes as the Department of Public Health is reporting significant increases in COVID-19 hospitalizations and the testing positivity rate.

Forty-one percent of cases are

now among individuals between the ages of 18 and 40. While cases in this age range typically have low risk for serious illness or death, Public Health is concerned they may unknowingly infect parents, grandparents, and friends and family who have underlying health conditions and who are at greater risk for serious illness and death. Everyone must continue to follow physical distancing and infection control directives and wear a clean cloth face covering that securely covers both your nose and mouth when in contact with other people not in your household.

Great Online Content Can Let You ‘Visit’ a Museum This Summer

If you are looking for new things to this summer do while staying home or social distancing, the Smithsonian’s National Museum of the American Indian has you covered.

The museum has lots of free content available for both adults and kids, including digital learning tools for students of all ages and online versions of many of its most popular exhibitions. Access to this content is through the museum’s website: AmericanIndian.si.edu.

For Students
Native Knowledge 360° (NK360°) is the museum’s national education initiative to inspire and promote improvement of teaching and learning about American Indians. NK360° provides educational materials and teacher training that incorporate Native narratives, more comprehensive histories and accurate information to enlighten and inform teaching and learning about Native America. The initiative’s

website has digital lessons for K-12 students, teacher guides, videos and websites. Several lessons are also available in Spanish.

Online Exhibitions
Many of the museum’s most popular exhibitions are available to explore online. “Americans” shows how American Indians have been part of the nation’s identity since before the country began. Visitors can click on some familiar images and learn why images of American Indians are everywhere in our country.

The bilingual exhibition “The Great Inka Road: Engineering an Empire” examines why the Inka Road was built more than 500 years ago, and how its construction—without the use of metal or iron, the wheel or stock animals to pull heavy loads—stands as one of the greatest engineering feats.

The exhibition “Infinity of Nations: Art and History in the Collections of the National Mu-

seum of the American Indian,” which features some 700 works of Native art from throughout North, Central and South America, demonstrates the breadth of the museum’s collection and highlights the historic importance of many of these iconic objects.

“Developing Stories: Native Photographers in the Field” is the museum’s newest exhibition. It features the work of two Native photojournalists who are using photography to break down stereotypes and portray stories that show the diversity and complexity of their contemporary lives.

Explore the Collections
Through its online search, visitors to the museum’s website can learn more about the history of the museum’s holdings, which have their foundation in the collection largely assembled by George Gustav Heye, beginning in 1897. The collection currently contains more than 800,000 items from across the entire Western Hemisphere. And for more from the collections, visit the museum’s new Google Arts & Culture website.

On June 12, 2020 a long time Bugler passed away. Bernie Cain played TAPS at veterans' graveside funeral services and other special events for well over 4 decades. He was a longtime member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was 95 years old and still playing TAPS at graveside service when he passed away. He became ill a couple of months ago and basically, he was just running out of gas. There were no complications from any virus or anything like that, it was just time for this old veteran.

As a World War II and Korean War veteran, Bernie was often out there doing his thing for our veterans. He would attend special events such as Memorial Day, Fourth of July, and much more.

He attended and played TAPS for well over 3000 funerals for our departed veterans. Often times being at Riverside Memorial Cemetery where they can easily do 5 ceremonies per day. He felt our veterans deserved a proper sendoff. He was there to make sure this happened.

The picture with Bernie playing TAPS by the Navy sign was during the time when the city of West Covina dedicated a wall to be known as the veteran's wall. This was about 30 years ago. Later the Veterans Memorial was built but the

day of the dedication he was at Riverside Memorial Cemetery playing TAPS for 5 veterans being buried that day. He would later come on his own to the new Veterans Memorial in West Covina and play taps in honor of those who gave their lives that were from West Covina.

As a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, he was originally with the 6th District, then it changed to the 4th District, and then it went to the 11th District.

Sadly, he lost his longtime love of 70 years a couple of years ago. They lived in their Lakewood home for 70 years.

He was buried on June 24 at Riverside Memorial Cemetery. Family and friends attended as well as the commander for the VFW in West Covina, who spoke at the services. The chaplain who was at the services had worked with Bernie for years involving veteran burial ceremonies. Many wondered who would be playing TAPS for Bernie. Two other buglers offered their services. They played the Echo TAPS.

Because of the existing situation in California and the restrictions that they have, a Memorial reception will be set at a later date.

He was liked by everyone and will be sadly missed by all.

Kids are Online More These Days, Here is How to Keep Them Safe

Children are spending more time online due to social distancing measures caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. And while the internet can be an amazing gateway to knowledge and a tool to connect with family and friends, if parents and caregivers don't follow certain precautions, it can also pose safety hazards.

• Update Devices: Be sure to keep your family's devices safeguarded from hackers and malware by installing the latest updates.

• Use New Tools: New tools can help parents effectively keep screen time in check. For example, by using OurPact, a screen time management solution, parents can limit app access automatically for recurring activities like school or bedtime, and can block or grant internet access on a child's device any time. U.S. Postal Service Offers Tips To Stop Dog Attacks On Mail Carriers

Can you picture a member of your family attacking a mail carrier? Of course, you couldn't, but it happened 5,803 times last year across the nation.

Dearborn, MI, Letter Carrier Tameka Toliver recalls being pinned on a porch by a dog that bit her above her knee. "It happened so fast, even with all my training, I barely had time to react," Toliver told co-workers at an event at the Dearborn Post Office. "I'm still scared when I get close to that house because I remember the attack so vividly. It takes a long time to get over the fear."

When a dog attacks a letter carrier, the dog owner could be held liable for all medical expenses, repayment of lost work hours, replacement of the uniform and other costs, which can run into thousands of dollars. The Postal Service places the safety of its employees as a top priority and dedicates a week each year to Dog Bite Awareness. (about.usps.com/what/corporate-social-responsibility/activities/dog-bite-awareness.htm)

Here are four simple tips to prevent dog bite injuries that should be enforced all year round:

- **Door Delivery:** If a carrier delivers mail or packages to your front door, place your dog in a separate room and close that door before opening the front door. Some dogs burst through screen doors or plate-glass windows to attack visitors. Dog owners should keep the family pet secured. Parents should remind their children and other family members not to take mail directly from carriers in the presence of the family pet, as the dog may view the person handing mail to a family member as a threatening gesture.

- **Electronic Fencing:** Carriers may assume, when they see no

physical fence around a property, the property is animal-free. This can be a dangerous mistake. Postal officials request that you keep your dog restrained or inside when the mail is delivered. Although the electronic fence may keep your dog from wandering, it does not protect your Postal Service carrier, who must enter your property to deliver the mail. Even homes with curbside mailboxes may have oversized packages or signature-needed items that require the carrier to approach a doorstep and cross the boundaries of the electronic fence. This poses a serious risk to carrier safety.

- **Dog in Yard:** Make sure your dog is properly restrained on a leash away from where your mail carrier is delivering the mail. Mail delivery service can be interrupted at an address or neighborhood the carrier deems un-

safe because of an unrestrained dog. When service is interrupted at an address or neighborhood, all parties involved will have to pick up mail at their local Post Office. Service will be restored once assurance has been given that the animal will be confined during regular delivery hours.

- **Tracking:** Dog owners who have access to postal notification features such as Informed Delivery (informedelivery.usps.com) for letter mail and package tracking are urged to use this as a way to gauge when the carrier is on the way and to ensure the dog is properly restrained. Expecting a postal package delivery on Sunday? Postal officials urge dog owners to restrain their animals on Sundays as well, as more residences are receiving deliveries throughout the weekend. YMCA Blood Drives - Local & Long Distance Live Saving

MONROVIA - The Santa Anita Family YMCA is becoming "Blood Drive Ground Zero" in the northeast San Gabriel Valley since the COVID-19/Coronavirus pandemic struck in mid-March. The local YMCA has hosted 4 major blood drives in just 16 weeks, re-purposing their still closed gymnasium to accommodate hospital beds, blood bags and plasma processing machines instead.

The YMCA blood drive series began with an April 20th drive in partnership with and benefitting the American Red Cross. That was followed by a May 14 blood drive in partnership with and benefitting Duarte's City of Hope, and drives on May 18th and June 5th with the Red Cross as well.

Each of these critically important blood drives exceeded their goals in terms of attendees/donors and blood units collected! Red Cross blood goes all over the state of California, while City of Hope blood stays here on their Duarte campus. In total, Santa Anita YMCA has raised over 120 units of blood to help the ailing LA County blood supply. Since each pint/unit helps approx. 3 patients, some 360+ persons in need have been helped! But the Y is not nearly done. The next YMCA/Red Cross Blood Drive is Friday, July 17th. In addition to taking blood donations, the Red Cross also will be testing all

blood, platelet and plasma donations for COVID-19/Coronavirus antibodies.

"As organizations dedicated to helping others, they Red Cross and YMCA are fortunate to be able to step up to help during this pandemic by offering this service at our upcoming blood drives," said Eric Boyd, YMCA Executive Director. Boyd also reported that the COVID-19 antibody test used by the Red Cross is authorized by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and may indicate if the donor's immune system has produced antibodies to the Coronavirus, regardless of whether they developed symp-

oms. "The importance of this information cannot be overstated in terms of stopping the spread of COVID-19/Coronavirus," Boyd added.
