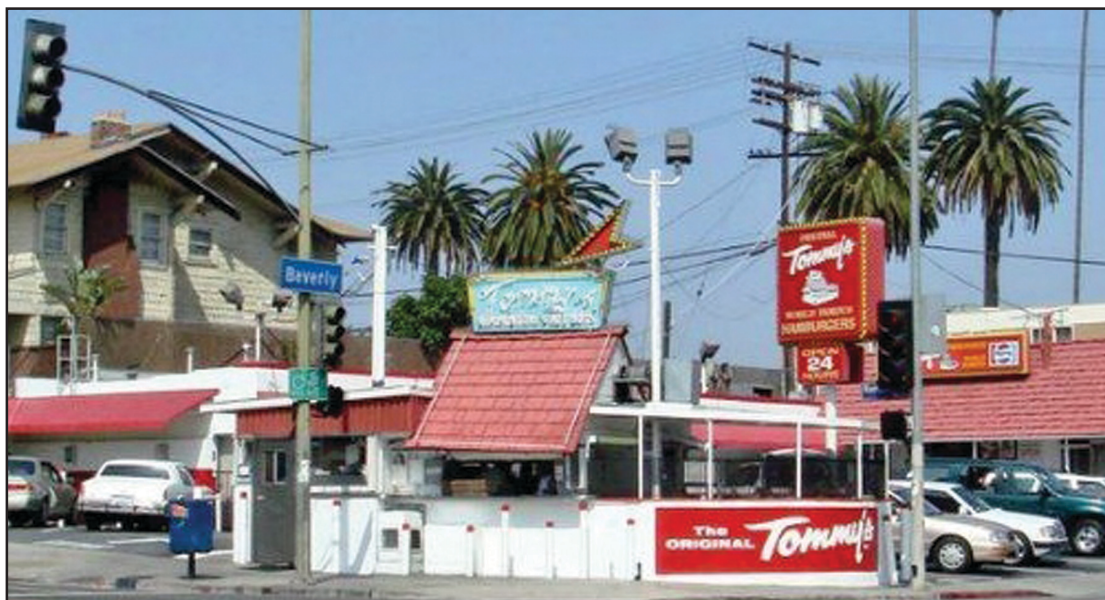

L.A. County Wage Enforcement Program Reaches Nearly Half-Million-Dollar Settlement with Restaurant Companies for Underpaying Workers

Companies Operating Original Tommy's and Pizza Hut Agree to Pay Back Wages, Fines Following Investigation by Department of Consumer and Business Affairs

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – The County of Los Angeles Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (DCBA) is announcing settlements with three Southern California-based companies that operate two popular restaurants—Original Tommy's and Pizza Hut—for violations of the County's Minimum Wage Ordinance, which covers work performed in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County. The settlements include the payment of \$476,777 in back wages and fines to 132 low-wage workers and the County of Los Angeles.

"During the pandemic, it is crucial that our essential workforce is paid what they are owed. As a former U.S. Secretary of Labor, I am well aware that a smaller paycheck at this critical moment means that some households may have to decide between putting food on the table and paying rent," said Los Angeles County Chair Pro Tem Hilda L. Solis. "I am pleased that our Department of Consumer and Business Affairs has protected the livelihoods of our essential workers at these two establishments."



Original Tommy's World-Famous Hamburgers, have agreed to pay \$397,775 in back wages and fines for underpaying 96 of its employees over three years dating back to July 2016.

Inc. and Koulax Enterprises Inc. DBA Original Tommy's World-Famous Hamburgers, have agreed to pay \$397,775 in back wages and fines for violating the ordinance. DCBA wage investigators found that the companies had underpaid 96 of its employees over three years dating back to July 2016. The companies agreed to pay \$147,775 in back wages and \$147,000 in fines directly to the affected employees, plus

\$103,000 in fines to the County. Based on the review of payroll records of Southern California Pizza Company, a franchisee of Pizza Hut headquartered in the City of Orange, DCBA wage investigators cited the company for violations at six Pizza Hut locations in the County's unincorporated area, including \$19,002 in back wages owed to 36 employees, most of whom worked at the

company's location in the unincorporated community of Los Nietos. The company agreed to pay back wages and total fines of \$60,000 to aggrieved workers and the County. "Wage theft always causes harm, but during a pandemic, economic injury and inequity are compounded," said DCBA Director Joseph M. Nicchitta. "I am proud of our wage enforcement program for helping underpaid workers recover what they are owed during this time of economic uncertainty."

DCBA offers resources to ensure employers have the tools they need to understand their responsibilities and to comply with minimum wage laws in unincorporated Los Angeles County. The current minimum wage for workers who perform more than two hours of work in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County is \$15.00 an hour for larger businesses (with 26 or more employees) and \$14.25 for small businesses (25 or fewer employees).

Cecil Baumgartner Turning 100 Years Old Celebrated With Parade of Cars

GLENDORA - A parade of cars drove by the home of Cecil Baumgartner at 10 a.m. on Labor

Day Monday, September 7, 2020. There were in excess of thirty cars participating, some of them with signs reading "Happy 100th Birthday Cecil." The parade consisted of family, friends, bowling buddies and just people who had heard that Cecil was celebrating his 100th. Cecil stood under a tent and waved at the parade, while the occupants of the cars tooted their horns. The parade

started at Cecil's church, United Methodist Church on E Bennett Avenue.

It was a festive, yet patriotic sight to see "young" Cecil waving in the US Navy based on the USS Caldwell in the Aleutian Islands during World War II. He was in the Navy for 4 years. It was at Purdue University in Indiana, that he met Bernetha McGinnis, whom he married and had six children.

He studied Aeronautical Engineering at Purdue University and used this knowledge in his career for the many years af-

ter. Cecil worked at some of the major Aeronautical Engineering companies in the United States, such as Curtis-Wright in New Jersey, Aerojet General in Azusa, Beckman Instruments, Rockwell Industries and TRW. He worked on many projects with these companies, including the Viking 1 and 2 rockets, the nuclear Trident missile. He even designed the "scooper" used on one of the missions to Mars.

Cecil Baumgartner has lived in Glendora for 58 years. His wife Bernetha passed away in 2018 at the age of 91. His children are Rochelle Caballero, Michelle Baker, Annette McCusker, James Baumgartner (deceased), Tom Baumgartner and (Nanette) Renee Miller. It was Renee that was mainly responsible for organizing this celebration. Cecil is taken care of by two excellent caregivers, Lisa and Laura. Cecil is still an active champion bowler, at Chaparral Lanes in San Dimas. He belongs to 4 Bowling Leagues.

Los Angeles County Supervisors Approve First Year of Funding for LASD Body Worn Camera Program



The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department received its first shipment of body-worn cameras Wednesday, one day after the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors voted to transfer \$25.5 million to the sheriff's department to fund the rollout of body-worn cameras to patrol deputies.

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors have voted to transfer \$25.5 million to the Sheriff's Department for implementation of the new body worn camera program. The motion was authored by Supervisor Janice Hahn and co-authored by Supervisor Kathryn Barger and will cover the first year of the program at five stations across the county starting as early as October.

"Body worn cameras are an important tool for transparency and will give us a clearer understanding of the interactions between our deputies and members of the public," said Supervisor Janice Hahn. "However, we need to recognize that body-worn cameras do not prevent violence or, in themselves, guarantee ac-

countability. This move needs to be accompanied by real accountability, real reform, and real reflection."

Over the past four years, the Board has set aside a total of \$35 million to purchase body worn cameras. On August 11th, 2020, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department finalized an agreement with Axon Enterprise, Inc. for enough cameras to equip 5,200 deputies and security officers with the devices over the next two years.

"To build trust between our law enforcement officers and community members, transparency is key," Supervisor Barger said. "Allocating funds for body-worn cameras to Los Angeles County Sheriff's deputies is a critical step to rebuild relationships and

accountability. Because of persistence from the Board of Supervisors and commitment of communities, 5,200 deputies and security officers will have access to these necessary devices."

The motion authorizes \$25.5 million (which includes \$12.3 million in ongoing funding and \$13.2 million in one-time funding) of the funding set aside to be given to the Sheriff's Department for the first year of the body-worn camera program. This will allow the Sheriff's Department to move forward with implementing the cameras in October starting with 5 stations: West Hollywood, Lancaster, Lakewood, Industry, and the Century Station. The next phase will include ten additional stations beginning January 1, 2021.

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Unhealthy Air Quality Declared due to Smoke from the Bobcat Fire

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – According to the South Coast Air Quality Management District, smoke from the Bobcat Fire burning in the region has caused unhealthy air quality in the following areas:

- East San Gabriel Valley
- West San Gabriel Valley
- South San Gabriel Valley
- Pomona-Walnut Valley
- San Gabriel Mountains
- Central Los Angeles Area
- Southeast LA County
- South Central LA County

“It is difficult to tell where smoke, ash or soot from a fire will go, or how winds will affect the level of these particles in the air, so we ask everyone to remember that smoke and ash can be harmful to health, even for people who are healthy,” said Muntu Davis, MD, MPH, Health Officer for Los Angeles County. “If you can see smoke, soot, or ash, or you can smell smoke, pay attention to your immediate environment and take precautions to safeguard your health. These precautions are particularly important for children, older adults, and people with heart or lung diseases.”

These precautions include avoiding unnecessary outdoor exposure and limiting physical exertion (whether indoor or outdoor), such as exercise. Children and people who have air quality sensitive conditions, such as heart disease, asthma, and other chronic respiratory diseases, should follow these recommendations and stay indoors as much as possible even in areas where smoke, soot, or ash cannot be seen, or there is no smell of smoke. If your condition worsens, contact your health care provider immediately for medical advice or call 911.

Wildfire smoke is a mixture of small particles, gases, and water vapor. Small particles are the primary health concern. These small particles can cause burning eyes, runny nose,

scratchy throat, headaches, and illness (i.e., bronchitis). In people with sensitive conditions, they can cause difficulty breathing, wheezing, coughing, fatigue, and chest pain.

“We are also advising day camps that are in session in smoke-impacted areas to suspend outside recreational activities, such as hiking or picnics, until conditions improve,” said Dr. Davis.

People can participate in indoor activities in areas with visible smoke, soot, or ash, provided the indoor location has air conditioning that does not draw air from the outside, and it has closed windows and doors to protect the cleanliness of indoor air. If not, it is recommended that everyone follow these guidelines as if they were outside.

The following recommendations will help you protect yourself and your family from the harmful effects of unhealthy or poor air quality:

- If you see or smell smoke or see a lot of particles and ash in the air, avoid unnecessary outdoor activity to limit your exposure to harmful air. This is especially important for those with heart or lung disease (including asthma), the elderly and children.
- If outdoor air is bad, try to keep indoor air as clean as possible by keeping windows and doors closed. Air conditioners that re-circulate air within the home can help filter out harmful particles.
- Avoid using air conditioning units that only draw in air from the outside or that do not have a re-circulating option. Residents should check the filters on their air conditioners and replace them regularly. Indoor air filtration devices with HEPA filters can further reduce the level of particles that circulate indoors.
- If it is too hot during the day to keep the doors or windows closed and you do not

have an air conditioning unit that re-circulates indoor air, consider going to an air-conditioned place, such as a cooling center, to stay cool and to protect yourself from harmful air.

- Do not use fireplaces (either wood burning or gas), candles, and vacuums. Use damp cloths to clean dusty indoor surfaces. Do not smoke.
- If you have symptoms of lung or heart disease that may be related to smoke exposure, including severe coughing, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, wheezing, chest tightness or pain, palpitations, nausea or unusual fatigue or lightheadedness, contact your doctor immediately or go to an urgent care center. If life-threatening, please contact 911.
- When smoke is heavy for a prolonged period of time, fine particles can build up indoors even though you may not be able to see them. Wearing a mask may prevent exposures to large particles. However, most masks do not prevent exposure to fine particles and toxic gases, which may be more dangerous to your health.
- Practice safe clean-up following a fire. Follow the ash clean-up and food safety instructions at: http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/d_o_c_s/ReturningHomeAfterAFire.pdf. The following is recommended for pets:
 - Avoid leaving your pets outdoors, particularly at night. Pets should be brought into an indoor location, such as an enclosed garage or a house.
 - If dogs or cats appear to be in respiratory distress, they should be taken to an animal hospital immediately. Symptoms of respiratory distress for dogs include panting or an inability to catch their breath. Symptoms for cats are less noticeable but may include panting or an inability to catch their breath.

Man Sentenced In Covina Bar Attack Back in 2018

COVINA - A Glendale man was sentenced to 11 years in state prison for an attack on a bar customer back on Aug. 17, 2018, at the Clancy's Sports Bar in Covina. Vidal Larios Jr., now 42, followed a bar customer into the men's room. He carried a heavy empty beer mug. His intent was to attack the man with the beer mug.

It appears that there may have been words exchanged between the victim and the suspect, who is a gang member. The suspect accused the victim of checking out his girlfriend.

After entering the bathroom, the suspect used the beer mug to smash in the victim's skull. It appeared that he was trying to kill the victim as he struck him 6 times and fracturing his skull in 6 different places and leaving him for dead. The suspect simply left the bathroom and placed the mug on the floor outside the bathroom door. He left the victim in extreme critical and/or grave condition. He was not expected to live at that time.

There were surveillance recordings of the suspect and of two heavy set individuals, a man and a woman, who immediately left the bar after the attack. It showed a woman along with a man waiting outside the restroom while the suspect with a beer mug entered the bathroom. With help from the community, police were able to track down and arrest

three people on Sept. 20, 2018 in connection with the attempted murder and assault at a Covina bar the month before.

The two other suspects were identified as Baldwin Park residents Elizabeth Franco, then 40, and Angel Franco, then 23. Bail was set at \$50,000.00 each for the Francos and no bail for Larios. Later, the charges were dropped per 849(B)(1)PC A DETENTION ONLY as there appeared that the DA's office would not be able to get a conviction on the Francos for their complicity in the crime and it also had been determined that neither participated in the ac-

tual attack. However, bail was secured for Larios and set at \$50,000.00. He was able to make bail and within a year he was arrested by El Monte PD and his bail was revoked because he committed a crime while out on bail.

On Tuesday, Sept. 1st, of this year, Vidal Larios Jr., 42, appeared in court and plead no contest. He was sentenced immediately after entering that no contest plea to one felony count of assault with a deadly weapon - a glass beer mug - and admitted causing great bodily injury to the victim during the Aug. 17, 2018, attack.

La Verne Fire Department Service Deployment Review Overview

LA VERNE - The City engaged a third-party consultant, Messina and Associates, to evaluate a report provided by LA County Fire on the services they could provide to La Verne and the associated costs, as well as to conduct an analysis of the City's current fire operations by the La Verne Fire Department (LVFD). Messina and Associates completed their analysis, culminating in the release of the City of La Verne Fire Department Service Deployment Review.

The fundamental findings of the Review surface a key question for the Council's consideration and represents a fork in the road for options for the community: shift to a highly functional fire department in a relatively short time frame with a move to LA County Fire but experience increased costs for services; or, maintain local control of the City's fire services and spend additional funds to implement reforms, improve staffing levels and address an array of management issues.

The Review was initially discussed by the mayor and council members at the August 25, 2020 City Council Meeting. Understanding the significance of this matter to the community, during this meeting the Council committed to:

- Finding the best fire service delivery model possible to satisfy both the needs and interests of the La Verne community, while also acknowledging that no solution will be perfect.
- Exploring additional fire service delivery models beyond what is covered in the Review, including reaching out to LA County Fire on the feasibility of creating a hybrid service model that leverages the strengths that both LVFD and LA County Fire have to offer.
- Engaging with LVFD firefighters and the La Verne Firefighters' Association to gain an understanding of their position on the matter and establish a collaborative path forward.

will be made on fire service delivery model options. The City Council and Staff are working with stakeholders and awaiting feedback from the community before determining how to move forward.

Residents and other stakeholders are highly encouraged to provide feedback and comments on this matter. This will help the City Council determine community priorities that, mixed with the options, advantages, considerations and challenges detailed in the Review, will allow the Council to make a decision regarding what service delivery model is best for the La Verne community.

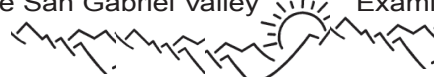

Public Health Highlights the Importance of Worker Protections and Reporting Workplace Outbreaks of COVID-19

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) highlights the importance of worker protections and reporting workplace outbreaks. Supporting work-sites experiencing outbreaks are a crucial part of slowing the spread of COVID-19 and protecting the health of communities.

In July, the County experienced sharp increases in cases, hospitalizations and deaths due to the reopening of many sectors and holiday-related activities. Not surprisingly, this led to increases in outbreaks at workplaces, which spiked the week of July 13, nine days after Independence Day on July 4th.

People can pass this infection two days before having symptoms, if they have symptoms at all. People that became infected with COVID-19 dur-

ing this time likely and unknowingly exposed their coworkers when they went to work, which contributed to the spike in workplace outbreaks. Businesses must follow the critical infection control protocols in place to decrease the risk of transmission in their workplace.

For Public Health to help determine and manage an outbreak within a workplace and to identify close contacts in the community, businesses must notify the department as soon as possible. Public Health is relying on business operators, employers, and workers to report clusters of cases as soon as these are recognized. If a workplace has at least three reported or confirmed COVID-19 cases in the workplace within 14 days, employers are required to call Public Health immediately at: 888-397-3993.

This reporting can prevent additional cases, protect the


workplace and keep people safe and healthy. It can also save people's lives.

Public Health supports worksites by assessing the worksite and providing guidance to prevent and control COVID-19 outbreaks. Public Health also monitors any ongoing outbreak and provides additional guidance, as needed, until no new cases have been identified for 14 days.

In addition, workers and employers can anonymously report COVID-19 outbreaks at worksites as well as violations of Health Officer Orders and Protocols. They can call the Environmental Health Customer Call Center at 888-700-9995, Monday - Friday from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m., excluding holidays. A complaint system to report violations is also available online at www.publichealth.lacounty.gov.

Public Health Revises Health Officer Order to Allow Schools K-12 to Offer Services for Students Most in Need of In-Person Learning

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health), in consultation with the Board of Supervisors, has revised the Health Officer Order to allow for limited, on-campus operation for schools in L.A. County, as well as limited in-door operations of Hair Salons and Barbershops.

Beginning Monday, September 14, schools K-12 may offer in-school services for small cohorts of students with Individualized Education Plans

(IEP), students requiring instruction for English as a Second Language (ESL) or students needing assessments or specialized in-school services, as long as the school is able to fully implement the Health Officer's re-opening protocols.

Public Health will not be opening the waiver program for instruction of students in grades TK-6 as the department monitors the implementation of this effort to safely get students needing specialized in-school services back to school.

Hair salons and barbershops can re-open for indoor services at 25% occupancy provided they are in full compliance with the Health Officer's protocols. The Order encourages these businesses to continue outdoor operations when possible, and to offer in-door operations for those services that cannot be provided outdoors. This Order is in effect beginning immediately.

All other current restrictions remain unchanged at this time.

Monterey Park to Offer Home Delivery of Library Materials to Local Seniors

MONTEREY PARK - Starting in mid-September, the Monterey Park Bruggemeyer Library will launch a new monthly home delivery service for patrons who are homebound due to age or disability.

Monterey Park residents ages 60 and older and disabled residents who are not able to physically visit the library are eligible to receive monthly delivery of up to five books, CDs or audiobooks to their homes. An application and a valid Monterey Park Bruggemeyer Library card are required to sign-up for this program.

Through the Library's Home Delivery Program, eligible patrons will be paired with a

Monterey Park Bruggemeyer Library staff member to assist them with materials selection and scheduling delivery service. This service is offered in partnership with the City's Recreation and Community Services Department and delivery of materials will be provided by drivers with the City of Monterey Park's Dial-a-Ride Service.

LA County Library Offers Laptop & Hotspot Loans at Select Libraries

Printing Pickup Will Also Be Offered at All 46 Sidewalk Service Locations

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - LA County Library is pleased to announce two new services developed to assist those without computers, internet, or printers at home—a Laptop & Hotspot Loan at select libraries, and Printing Pickup at all Sidewalk Service locations.

The Laptop & Hotspot Loan kit includes a Chromebook laptop and a wireless hotspot for internet connectivity. The pro-

gram is currently being offered at 10 locations, as a pilot program. The Library hopes to add more locations as soon as additional devices are procured. Kits can be picked up as part of the Library's contactless Sidewalk Service.

Reserved for cardholders 18 and up, the kit can be borrowed for 3 weeks—just like a book—with the opportunity to renew up to 3 times if there are no holds. Like all materials borrowed via Sidewalk service, Laptop & Hotspot Loans will be quarantined for 96 hours after being returned, to ensure customer and staff safety.

While many libraries nationwide have offered hotspot loans and various tech checkouts, LA County Library is among the first in the Los Angeles area to offer a take-home kit that includes a laptop (Chromebook) along with the mobile hotspot. The hope is that, when paired, these devices will more fully enable those negatively impacted by the digital divide.

The libraries that will be piloting the Laptop & Hotspot program reside in communities that have an internet subscription rate of between 57% and 63%, meaning that roughly 40% of the population in these areas is without internet at home. Many of these areas have also seen some of the most substantial job loss during the time of COVID-19.

The Library is also adding a Printing Pickup service at all 46 locations currently offering Sidewalk Service. Up to 10 pag-

es daily can be printed using the Library's wireless printing app (LACountyLibrary.org/print), and picked up like any other item.

"The digital divide has far-reaching consequences, especially during this unprecedented time," said Library Director, Skye Patrick. "No connection to the internet means no way for the unemployed to find employment or participate in virtual interviews, no way for isolated older adults to receive telehealth or keep in touch with loved ones, no way for caregivers to access information for homeschooling or support their kids' digital schooling needs. We see Laptop & Hotspot Loans and Printing Pickup as two ways the Library can help to bridge the digital divide for these communities."

While Laptop & Hotspot Loans are currently limited to the 10 pilot locations as a first phase, the Library is pursuing expansions of this and other programs, including purchasing devices to make kits available at all libraries; working to identify funding to expand Wi-Fi access in all Library parking lots, to allow connectivity beyond building walls; and developing ongoing Virtual Programming for workforce development, including workshops on resume and cover letter writing, and interviewing skills.

Close to 70,000 Voters Request Election Materials in Alternate Language for Presidential General Election

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk (RR/CC) Dean C. Logan announced that nearly 70,000 voters responded to a recent countywide mailing and submitted requests to receive election materials - including their Vote by Mail ballots for the November 3, 2020 Presidential Election - in a language other than English.

"Sending a Vote by Mail ballot to every voter is a critical step for voter access in 2020, but it means that millions of California voters will lose that moment when a poll worker asks them what language they would like their ballot in. Mailers like LA County's help ensure language stands as a barrier to the ballot for as few voters as possible," said Jonathan Mehta Stein, Executive Director of California Common Cause. "Every county in the state should use their remaining mailings, before Vote by Mail ballots go out, to share language access information."

In late-July, the RR/CC mailed a notice to all registered voters with new information that all registered voters will be mailed a Vote by Mail ballot to ensure a safe and accessible voting option during COVID-19. Included in the notice was a postage-paid Language Request Form with simple return instructions for any voter who would prefer to receive their materials and ballot in a language other than English.

"In a jurisdiction with an electorate as richly diverse as Los Angeles County, it is essential

that voters are aware they have options to receive election materials and their Vote by Mail ballot in their preferred language," said Logan. "It's critical for civic participation and the response to this mailer by close to 70,000 voters is a strong response to our voter outreach and education efforts."

In 2006, federal legislation passed, extending the minority language provisions of the Voting Rights Act (VRA) of 1965. Any county with more than 10,000 residents whose native language is not English and who indicated on their U.S. Census form a lack of proficiency in English, is required to provide election materials in the identified languages. A language is covered by the VRA as mandatory for the County's translated election materials if (1) more than 5% of

the citizens of voting age are members of a single language minority and are limited English proficient OR (2) more than 10,000 of the citizens of voting age are members of a single language minority and are limited English proficient.

Los Angeles County provides fully translated voting materials in Armenian, Chinese, Cambodian/Khmer, Farsi, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog/Filipino, Vietnamese, Hindi, Japanese, Thai and Russian. Additionally, facsimile ballots are available upon request in Burmese, Telugu, Gujarati, Indonesian, Mongolian and Bengali.

Registered voters can still request to receive their election materials in one of 18 different languages by calling 800-815-2666, option 3.

Supervisor Barger Seeks To Expand Telehealth Services

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - The Board of Supervisors unanimously passed a motion by Supervisors Kathryn Barger and Sheila Kuehl to examine Los Angeles County's use of telehealth services during the COVID-19 pandemic and to evaluate opportunities to expand these promising programs into the future.

Since the Safer at Home public health orders were implemented in March, the Departments of Mental Health, Health Services, Public Health, and Fire, in addition to community-based organizations and service providers, have shifted to virtual con-

sultations and evaluations. Medical consultations, mental health services, alcohol and substance abuse treatment, preventative care, and other essential services have all adapted to serve those in need through video appointments.

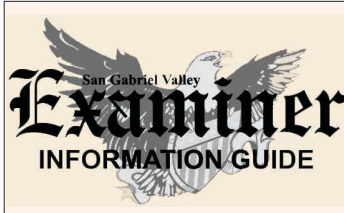
"During the COVID-19 pandemic, telehealth operations in the Los Angeles County health-care system have served a critical role to ensure community members receive the care they need," Supervisor Barger said. "While we have had to make adjustments during the Safer at Home directive, these advanced-

ments could allow us to better reach our communities in a way that is innovative, convenient, and - most importantly - accessible to those in need."

Video platforms have enabled patients to connect with services from the comfort of home while ensuring providers remain HIPAA compliant. Health care services are now available for patients who may have had difficulty attending in-person appointments in the past. Telehealth programs have also supplemented costly services and decreased the use of emergency response and health care facilities.

Through the board's action, the Chief Executive Office will evaluate if hard-to-reach communities have benefited from increased access to telehealth services and identify which programs would be effective in a standard health care situation once the pandemic has subsided. They will also identify available funding sources, such as the County Information and Technology Fund or state and federal grants, and determine any legislative opportunities or barriers.

The CEO will report back to the Board of Supervisors in 45 days with their findings.



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Sacramento Chaos Creates 2-Year Bills

I heard Sen. Melissa Melendez (R-Lake Elsinore) online who gave credence to the articles in every newspaper about the chaotic rush to pass bills before midnight on August 31st, a night emblematic of the majority leadership's organizational skills and bad time management this entire year. This legislature took a two-month paid COVID sabbatical while the Governor ordered up November vote by mail ballots for everyone in this state, alive or dead, and millions of dollars of masks from China, both questionable acts under the California Constitution because neither action was confirmed by the legislators until after it happened. Not authorized by legislators before the Governor acted because there was never a protocol established for doing business during COVID like remote voting, or other option. An option that would hold up in court.

The Democrats have reigned over this state but their inability to come up with a functional plan to do day to day business is appalling. Republicans and Democrats meet in their Caucuses for dinner to assess pending actions. Republicans met, found out Brian Jones (R-Santee) tested positive for the virus and was quarantined. But not expected was every Republican who had

Former Mayor of Glendora attended would be banned from the Capitol and required to vote remotely except Jim Nielson (R-Gerber) who did not attend the dinner. All present were masked up and obeyed social distancing, had no fever or indications they were sick and still barred from that last night and final votes.

Sen. Brian Dahle (R-Bieber) has been in opposition to remote voting since it was initially offered up as an option to combat the virus. Remote voting was approved, but Dahle requested an opinion from legislature's counsel as to the constitutionality of remote voting and received only "...we cannot counsel the Legislature to engage in remote legislating with a sense of security that such a practice would ultimately be upheld by the courts."

Democrat Assembly Speaker Rendon made it mandatory for Buffy Wicks (D-Oakland) recovering from a C-section to masked up and show up for voting with her one-month old baby wrapped in a blanket. Rendon's comment: If there was a close vote on any bills, it could turn into litigation and a challenge to remote voting. But all Republicans, under the Governor's COVID guidelines, were required to be isolated and voted remotely.

AB 5 "fix-it" bills passed to mend, piecemeal, that horribly botched bill by Lorena Gonzalez (D-S.D) converting independent contractors, working flexible hours and earning a living, to employees with benefits many employers could not afford and

possibly to the unemployment line. AB 2257 deals with youth sports coaches, artists, interpreters, freelance writers and appraisers allowing them to work as independent contractors. AB 323 gives newspapers one year to comply with the regulations set under AB 5. Voters will decide on November 3rd when they vote whether Uber, Lyft and other rideshare services will be operating as independent contractors or employees. Employees or unemployed.

There were what some called successes and others, failures.

Failed to pass was SB-731 (D-Bradford) that would have created a statewide process to automatically revoke the certification of a peace officer following the conviction of certain serious crimes. The bill was shuffled back and forth between committees for second and third readings indicating sliding support from the Democrats. It will be back again next year.

Two bills aimed at law enforcement did pass though. One requiring the California Attorney General to investigate more interactions between police and a suspect when that suspect dies. Another bill allows voters to approve oversight boards or commissions for county sheriff departments and provide that entity with subpoena power. L.A. County voters approved Measure R in the March creating an oversight board for the Sheriff's Department but not sure what that board will look like when appointed. Jasmyne Cannick, led that campaign to Reform L.A. Jails and is co-founder of National Black Justice Coalition.

There are at least 22 bills up for consideration that weren't discussed or passed for various reasons, one of which was they ran out of time. Some will be come two-year bills and back up for discussion on December 7th as the new term begins unless, of course, some fail to win re-election. Perhaps it is time to clean out the House of Sacramento.

What Is Biden's Agenda?

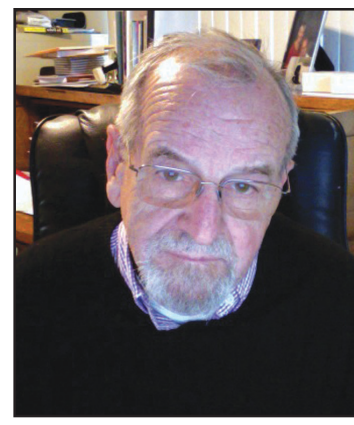

"TIME JOCKEY" - San Francisco de Asis

Patron Saint... Each of the California missions was named after a popular religious figure or event. The final name selection was bestowed by the Spanish Viceroy of Alta California and perhaps recommended by another Spanish church official or member of the royal family. San Francisco de Asis was the Spanish priest who as a young Francis was raised in a very wealthy family. His future was already mapped and he was destined to live a life of wealth and prosperity while being placed into a position of authority in the military. But Francis saw the poor as needing his help and even though he could have taken the easy road and live a life of luxury, he felt his call was elsewhere.

Francis gave up his life and accepted a life of poverty. He started an order of men called the Friars' Minor which committed themselves to poverty, obedience and chastity. Soon he had a number of disciples and the good deeds of the order were eventually noticed by the papal order leading to the establishment of the Franciscan Order, an order

committed to living the life of poverty while helping those who also were living in poverty conditions. The order's clothing consisted of a simple brown robe, tied around the waist with a rope and a pair of leather sandals. But Francis also had a unique fondness for nature and living creatures and is depicted embracing animals and nature showing his appreciation for the simpler things in life.

When the California Missions were founded, Father Junipero Serra was a member of the Franciscan Order and he and the other priests with him traveled throughout California seeking locations for their Missions while walking most the way in leather sandals. After the first three Missions were identified, (Mission San Diego, Mission Carmel and Mission San Antonio), Father Serra asked Spanish Inspector General Jose de Galvez why a Mission had not been named for Saint Francis. The Inspector General replied that when a great port is located, the name of Francisco will be placed on the Mission overlooking the port. When the San Fran-

cisco Bay was discovered, the name Francis was placed on the bay, settlement, presidio, mountains and river within the vicinity. Mission San Francisco de Asis was founded on June 26, 1776, the 6th of the California Missions and the town eventually became known as San Francisco and nicknamed the "City by the Bay".

In time, the Mission was completed but it was too small for the large contingency of converts and a new church was built next to it. The name of the new church was called Mission Dolores and it eventually was identified as a basilica due to its large size and structure. When one of its administrators felt the conditions were too cold and too damp, he suggested that the Mission be moved to a warmer climate. But the hierarchy of the Mission only told him to go North and find another location for a "warmer" mission. The site he identified was in Sonoma and he chose to the name of Mission San Francisco Solano after Saint Francis Solano, a Franciscan missionary who served for 20 years in Peru and Uruguay.

It was the last of the California Missions, and the second to carry the name of San Francisco. Saint Francis became known as the Patron Saint of the Missions after his popularity of being the only saint who is depicted with a sculpture or painting at all the California Mission altars, and most of the time with Saint Dominic....

Wake up America. The Silent Majority must be silent no more.

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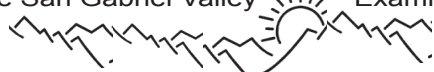

Perception Can Become Realty

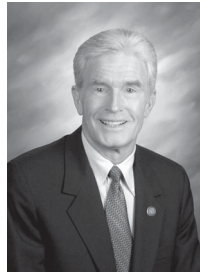
Perception becomes reality, regardless of actual reality. That can also be true with stocks. Because many investors want a reason for everything they often ask "Why is this stock up so much?" Some people don't like hearing the frustrating answer: "Stocks rise because more investors are buying than selling". More interesting reasons might appeal to our human nature, since most individuals think there should be an observable reason for prices to do what they do.

The real answer may lie in America's currently huge money supply. The true mover of stocks going up and down is simply significant Money moving into that specific market or out of it. It's crucial to be able to buy right when the big money starts flowing, while they are trying to keep it quiet. It's all about putting odds in your favor. Identifying big money flows early on can be one big key to unlocking high-odds success in stocks. At least in the short-term.

August is normally a scary month, but the good news this August was that money did not leave the stock market. When good stocks did dip, they bounced back in subsequent days. Our capital markets are now above where they were prior to this pandemic! The (exaggerated) news cycle is suddenly

all about the Postal Service not being able to process mail-in ballots in time for the November Presidential election. Many Democratically controlled states are mandating voting by mail. For instance, my state of Nevada has declared on-site voting "unsafe," so all households are now expected to get mail-in ballots.

The problem is that many voter lists are significantly outdated. Even though I vote in Nevada, I am expecting to receive more than one ballot in the mail. Although some states have long-established rules for mail-in voting, I have no confidence in Nevada and other states where unregistered or deceased voters are expected to get mail-in ballots. This will likely cause legal challenges to the election results, which would not be positive for the stock market, since any election challenge could promote endless uncertainty. All investors should hope for a decisive outcome!

Lingering, often overstated coronavirus concerns, the flight out of big cities, the ongoing violent protests, and California's annual summer brownouts and fires were all pointing to potentially lower in-person voter turnout for the upcoming November elections. Riots have now gone on in Portland for over 90 straight nights with the local government's apparent lack of con-

cern and maybe even ignorance of the facts. The blue state movement to defund the police is not inspiring voter confidence, or confidence in many city's ability or desire to reopen currently closed businesses, bars and restaurants. Many stores and restaurants may never return.

California's war against natural gas power plants and aggressive shift to alternative energy solutions are now causing rolling blackouts that may persist through October. All of these problems may not help local, extremely progressive politicians, so it will be interesting to see if there will be voter pushback in November (even in historically Democrat Party controlled states). This may be the biggest reason that blue states are pushing mail in voting, which will provide their easiest way to manipulate outcomes.

Allowing the far-left anarchists to take over the streets of many American cities cannot be good for America's future or the long-term future of American investments. The most important stock market concerns may really revolve around the November elections and the return of safety and civility in America. There are no guarantees that all of the big money will stay in the markets if social and political problems get worse (instead of better). If residential or agricultural property remains tax defaulted for more than five years, and commercial property or unimproved vacant residential lots remain tax defaulted for more than three years, we will offer the property for sale at a public auction in accordance with State law. The notice provides important information regarding Penalty Cancellation Requests and payment options, as our offices remain closed to the public during this COVID-19 pandemic.

Mr. Knox further said, "As a result of this mailing, property

owners may find it difficult to reach us on the telephone. They may obtain answers to the great majority of their questions, including how to request a copy of a property tax bill, obtain the amount due on any parcel, or find the tax payment history for the past three fiscal tax years from the Los Angeles County Property Tax Portal at propertytax.lacounty.gov. 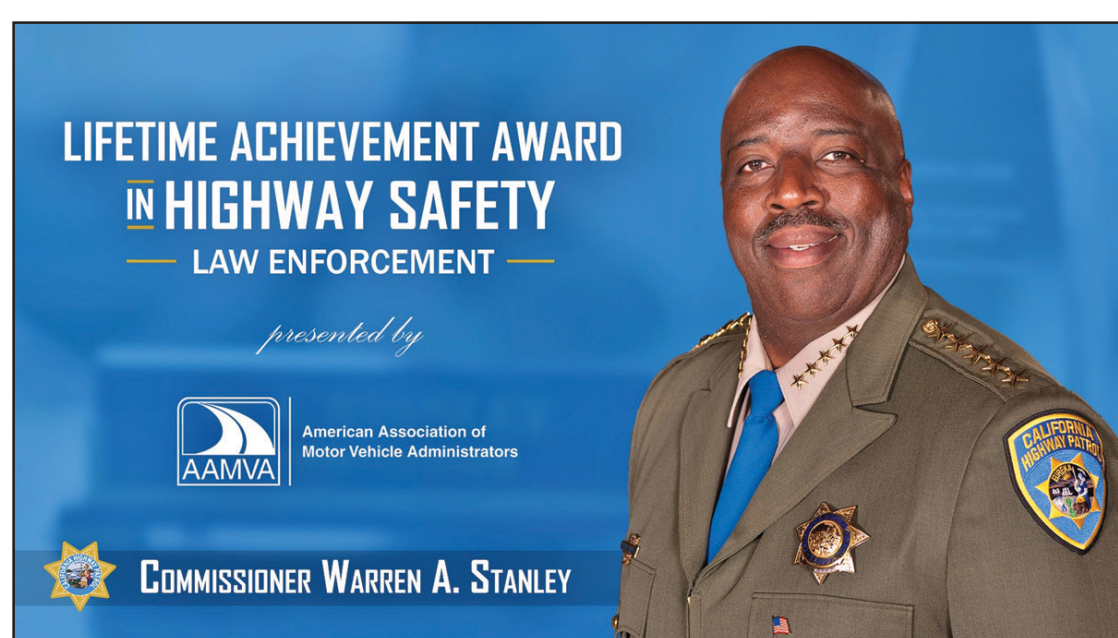

The firefighters were able to finally get the upper hand of the fire and saved the two mobile homes from being completely destroyed.

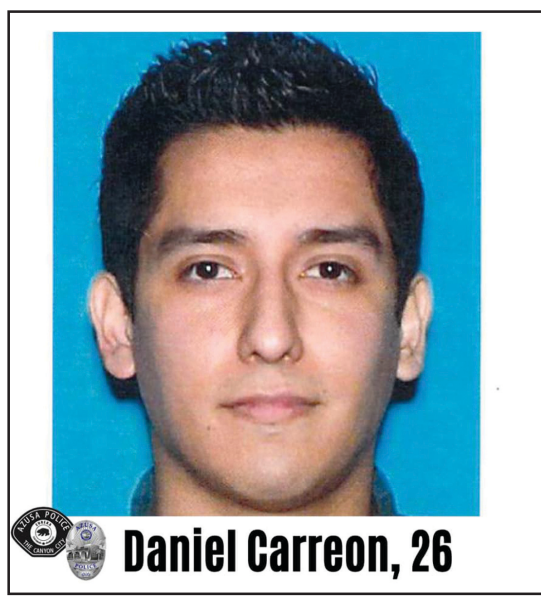
It is unknown what caused the fire and is under investigation.

Azusa Man Arrested For Possession Of Child Pornography

AZUSA - The Azusa Police Department Detective Bureau working in coordination with The Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force, received information in late August related to the distribution of child pornography within the city of Azusa. Between May of 2020 and July of 2020, an Azusa resident was allegedly transmitting images of child pornography via the Internet. Through investigative means Azusa Police Department Detectives were able to identify the alleged suspect as Daniel Carreon.

On September 2, 2020 the Azusa Police Department served a warrant at the residence of alleged suspect Carreon. Carreon was arrested for possession of child pornography and taken to the Azusa Police Department for booking.

The Azusa Police Department is a proud member of the ICAC Task Force. and will continue to work in partnership with them against the exploitation of children. This is still an ongoing Investigation by the Azusa Police Department

LOS ANGELES COUNTY — Supervisor Kathryn Barger joined Los Angeles County Fire Chief Darryl Osby, along with pilots, air crew members, and fire personnel to welcome two CL-415 Super Scooper fire-fighting aircraft that the County is leasing from the Government of Quebec.

“The Board of Supervisors is proud to support our Fire Department and help provide critical resources such as the Super Scoopers, to supplement our own aerial firefighting fleet during fire season,” said Supervisor Barger. “For years, LA County

has partnered with Quebec to provide these Bombardiers which are instrumental in our battle against large-scale wildfires. This is a great collaboration of shared resources between our two regions. I am grateful for the leadership of the LA County Fire Department and to the brave men and women who work valiantly each day to save lives and property,” she continued.

With increasingly dangerous fires and record-breaking heat in Southern California, fire safety is at the forefront of everyone’s mind. The Los Angeles County Fire Department leads the nation

in its ability to manage wildfires and it is necessary to support these efforts with top-of-the-line resources in firefighting aircraft. Los Angeles County has welcomed the Super Scoopers for 27 consecutive years.

With a capacity of up to 1,600 gallons of water, Super Scoopers exceed the capabilities of other aerial fire craft. Flying at high speeds just above the surface of a large body of water, the Super Scoopers are able to fill their tanks within 12 seconds. A full Super Scooper can last for fire operations of up to four hours.

Man Arrested by Irwindale Police for Vandalizing Lady of Guadalupe Church

IRWINDALE - At about 8:45 P.M. Friday evening, Irwindale Police Officers responded to Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission Church located in the 16200 block of Arrow Highway in the city of Irwindale regarding a subject vandalizing the property.

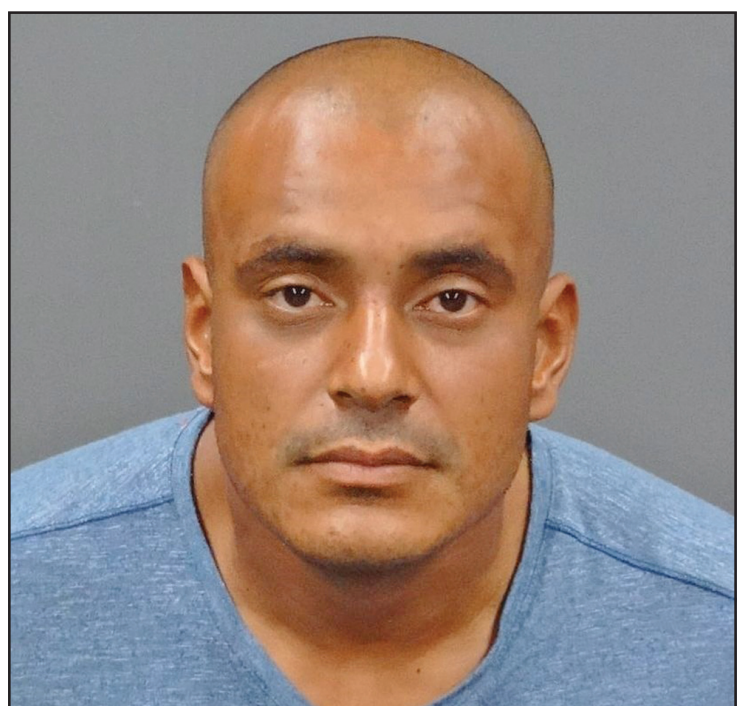
On arrival, the officers attempted to detain a male adult who was in the process of damaging the religious statues in front of the church. The subject fought with the officers and resisted arrest, however was ultimately taken into custody without injury.

The officers’ investigation revealed the suspect broke and damaged religious statues that were located in the front courtyard of the church, throwing the statues on to Arrow Highway.

The suspect, Noel Alejandro Rivera, a 34-year-old resident of Irwindale, was arrested and booked at a local jail. He was later issued a citation for vandalism and resisting arrest and was released pending his future court date.

The value of the damage done by the suspect is still being assessed.

The Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission Church is a local Irwindale landmark. Built by hand over 103 years ago, the small stone church was designed and constructed by parishioners who used donkeys, horses and wheelbarrows to transport thousands of rocks from the nearby San Gabriel River to construct the mission. Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission was completed and held its first Mass in 1917 using a

rough, handmade table as an altar and linens and candles borrowed from the nearby Azusa parish.

The church was damaged in the 1987 Whittier Narrows earthquake and was closed by the archdiocese due to structural

concerns. In 1990, the city of Irwindale purchased the mission, which they continue to maintain for occasional use by religious and secular groups with city permission.
