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Mission Accomplished, West Covina Veterans Memorial is Complete

WEST COVINA - A few years after a Veterans Wall was completed in West Covina, Glenn Kennedy teamed up with VFW Commander George Ogden (about 10 years ago) with the idea of a Veterans Memorial. Kennedy did research on all those that gave their lives while serving in the military during combat related operations. He came up with all the names and did this without much help of a computer.

After a little time passed, a proposal was presented to the city council to "test the waters" with the idea of a Veterans Memorial to remember all those who died from West Covina. Council considered this. Soon, Lloyd Johnson (present councilman for West Covina) joined the duo and this became the signature Memorial Committee members. They would work with the city on this project. This was about 7 years ago. During the last year, John Solis joined the team.

Kennedy also went out to seek those that may donate to the cause. There were a number of commitments and it appeared

that there would be enough funding to make this happened. Much of the labor and materials were to be donated. Just needed the land. It was hopeful that area by City Hall was made available and it was.

Ogden designed the original planned memorial and paid for an architect to create the drawing for the memorial out of his own pocket. The specs were given but the architect came back with something huge. According to Commander Ogden, "He presented us with a monument. It

was huge, way too big and would price us out of the project."

Ogden then presented the concept for the Memorial and after reviewing a number of other concepts, Ogden's was adopted and presented to the city and council members

Some donations started coming in, however, the flow was much slower than expected. Donations dried up and some commitments were drastically reduced. This slowed the project. The city, monitoring the progress had concerns that the project might get started and then be held up and not completed. The project stalled.

The VFW raised money with donations and events for the project as well as the city receiving

donations for the memorial. The VFW decided to transfer their money to the city with two presentations. This way all the funds would be in one account.

The previous council members along with the present council member supported the project. Former Council Members Steve Herfert, Mike Touhey and Shelley Sanderson were the big push at that time, with the present council giving the project the final shove for completion.

It was hoped that the no "city funds" would be used. However, something interesting came into view. Developers within the city would put money into a fund "Arts in Public Places" when they built projects in the city. Since

this was not "tax" money from the citizens, but money from the developers, this could be used. Mayor Pro-Tem Corey Warshaw worked on this part of the funding with council and staff. An artist was brought in, Michael Amescua, who made modifications to the original concept to make it more economical and accommodating, but just as effective for the honor.

On this past Memorial Day, the dedication of the Veterans Memorial was presented to a large crowd. Mayor James Toma opened the ceremony with the West Covina Jr. AFROTC presenting the colors and the National Anthem sung by the West Covina HS Choral Department.

The guest speakers were Robert Leong and Rosemary Rodriguez who both gave inspirational messages. Councilman Johnson called out all of the names on the Memorial while Rosemary Rodriguez rang a bell in their honor. Many of the family members whose relatives names were on the memorial attended the event. This was tear jerking and they were extremely honored that the city now has a Veterans Memorial honoring their loved ones.

As was posted on Facebook by Commissioner Glenn Kennedy, "Mission Accomplished".

Senate Acts to Protect and Improve Open Enrollment Act

Huff Measure Gives Students Equitable Opportunity for a Quality Public Education

SACRAMENTO: The California State Senate took action today to unanimously approve legislation, SB 1156, authored by Senator Bob Huff (R-San Dimas) that will help preserve and improve the public education experience that California students receive by revising transfer opportunities provided under the Open Enrollment Act (OEA).

Originally enacted by the State Legislature in 2010, the OEA (SBX5 4) was designed to provide additional options to students who live in zip codes with low achieving schools and give them an option to transfer to a higher performing public school in another school district as measured by the Academic Performance Index (API).

"The California Department of Education (CDE) used the API test results to identify the 1,000 low achieving schools whose enrollment assignment would trigger a student's eligibility for the OEA," said Senator Huff. "But the

last published list of 1,000 schools is now outdated because no new API test results have been produced in the past two years. SB 1156 ensures this program can continue in absence of the API."

The State Legislature recently took action to adopt a new assessment system called the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress, and suspended the use of the API to gauge student performance in the classroom. SB 1156 is designed to safeguard the OEA, by updating the definitions from the recently passed federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) for identifying the lowest performing schools in California. With the revised list pursuant to ESSA, students stuck in low performing schools can continue to use the OEA to transfer to a higher performing school. The measure also prioritizes students in certain categories (students in poverty, English learners and stu-

dents in foster care).

"SB 1156 helps protect the rights of every student in California by fulfilling the constitutional guarantee of an equitable opportunity to access quality public education," said Senator Huff. "In addition, my measure gives the highest priority to students who live in poverty, English learners and foster care students."

SB 1156 is sponsored by EdVoice, an organization that believes parents, not zip codes, are best suited to determine the best public school for their child. The measure now moves to the State Assembly.

"When you give parents and students a choice, all schools tend to improve," concluded Senator Huff. "A 2012 national study found that academic achievement improved when students attended a school of their choice. The study also found that students at the affected public schools did better after choice was introduced."

California Assembly Approves Tampon Tax Repeal

States Across the Country Continue Effort to Ax the Tampon Tax

SACRAMENTO — Assembly Bill 1561, bi-partisan legislation to end sales tax on tampons, jointly-authored by Assemblywoman Ling Ling Chang (R-Diamond Bar) and Assemblywoman Cristina Garcia (D-Bell Gardens), passed unanimously in the State Assembly today.

"Today is a huge step in the right direction for women – we are a lot closer to ending this targeted tax on women," Chang said. She added, "Women in California pay over \$20 million a year in taxes on feminine hygiene

products." "I'm proud to be leading the discussion in California as an advocate for women, and as an advocate for tax relief."

Currently, state law exempts "necessities of life," from sales tax. Products like candy and other health items are currently exempt from sales tax. AB 1561 adds health necessities exclusive to women like tampons and sanitary napkins to the exemption list.

Chang added, "This positive legislation will put money back in the pockets of women

throughout the state and create greater access to an important health product - especially in low-income and homeless populations."

This legislation, which previously garnered support from the State Board of Equalization and the Assembly's Committee on Revenue and Taxation, now heads to the Senate for their consideration. California joins over 11 states, including New York and Illinois most recently, to exempt tampons and feminine hygiene products from sales tax.

Gladstone Park Backstop And Fencing Project

AZUSA - At their May 16, 2016 meeting, the Azusa City Council directed the Recreation and Family Services Department to delay the Gladstone Park Backstop and Fencing Project.

The proposed project, which included the installation of new fencing and netting down of the entire first base line, fencing and netting down part of the third base line to the double service gate and backstop and canopy improvements, was intended to address the concerns of residents living near the park regarding foul balls.

The City Council's decision to suspend the project was based on the results of a competitive bidding process, in which the City received just one bid for the project. That bid exceeded the project's budget of \$193,800 by more than \$100,000. In addition, because the cost of the proposed project exceeded \$155,000, which is a threshold set by the

State of California, the City would have also been required to complete various accessibility upgrades to the park to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The cost of these upgrades, which include improvements to the restrooms, drinking fountains and sidewalks, are estimated to cost an additional \$500,000. As part of the City Council's action, City Staff was also directed to explore other sources of funds for the project including a grant and/or a proposed parks measure that the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors is considering for the November 2016 ballot. Once additional funding can be secured to complete the project including the ADA upgrades, City Staff will bring the matter back to the City Council for their consideration.

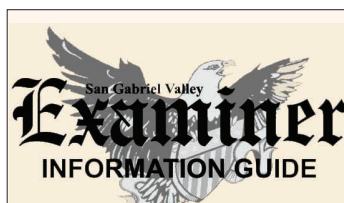
Arcadia Named One Of The Best Places To Live In California

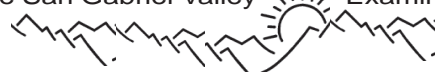

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America's Angry People

Americans are angry! And there are plenty of reasons why they should be.

We are stuck in a nasty series of meaningless wars in which we can inflict enough destructive power to substantially decimate entire nations, but cannot decide who are our allies, or who is the enemy. And we cannot even pretend we are winning. Like an encounter with the tar baby, every time we hit it we get stuck tighter.

The vast middle-class is without any wage increases in a generation, while those at the top continually rake in multi-million dollar windfalls. Millions are in prisons and hundred of thousands live on our streets. Our roads, schools, bridges and sewers are slowly collapsing. Jobs, and the industries which provided them, are drifting overseas. Oil, gas and coal—the traditional fossil fuels—are less and less to be counted on to provide the appropriate ways to generate the energy we need to operate this complex national machine.

The nation's control, traditionally in the hands of white males, is giving way to a demographic in which this cohort is increasingly being outvoted and outflanked.

Eight years ago we elected a President who promised to offer remedies to these and other serious problems. But a new group of obstructionists, called the "Tea Party," got elected to Congress, and practically nothing since has been accomplished. Washington is hated for not solving any of these critical problems, and

"Obama, we want you to solve all of them, but whatever you try we will turn down as soon as we hear about it."

Any emotional analysis of the nation's mood will include at the top of the list, "angry." The American people are angry! Anger is not all bad. There are things that don't get done until some degree of anger is woven into the will to act. When I am angry enough to analyze a problem, and that anger motivates me to take the appropriate steps to, it can be very helpful. Anger is a legitimate motivator. It may rivet my attention and cause me to both think and feel my way toward a solution to whatever got me riled up in the first place.

But there are occasions when the degree of anger is so overwhelming I might find myself just flailing without any thoughtful remedy motivating me to address what has caused the emotional disruption.

So what is America doing with this present angry avalanche? On one hand it has produced the campaign of a democratic socialist.

Bernie sees the major problems and has outlined an intelligent way to address most of them. But he has only a remote chance of being nominated and if he got elected the possibility is at best slight that any of his proposals would make it even with a more liberal Congress.

On the other hand the nation is faced with a wealthy businessman whose every speech is just one more effort to flail away without even understanding let alone analyzing the nature of the problems. He is not even popular with many in his party, and while he has offended practically everybody, his mob loves him. Along the way he has capitalized on the undifferentiated anger in the land, even though he hasn't a clue as how to address any of these national concerns. His followers wallow in his anger, not caring what he says or whom he insults. His background and his rhetoric are not why he is idolized. No matter how ridiculous he continues to become, his followers do not seem to care. What they eat up his bodacious hostility.

My guess is that despite the undifferentiated anger now deep in the spleen of the American psyche, we are a mature enough, wise enough people that most of us will see through the façade covering the vacuity of the Trump candidacy, and we will not be saddled with a President that neither we nor the rest of the world can respect.

Dems Support Jailed Felons Right to Vote

Last week all California Assembly Democrats supported AB 2466, a bill to allow convicted felons the privilege to vote while still incarcerated. All Republicans voted against it but the question remains will the California Senate support this bill.

Up until that vote took place, it was unquestionable. The Constitution provided "the mentally incompetent or imprisoned or on parole for the conviction of a felony" gave up their right to vote. The county elections clerk was required to cancel the affidavits of registration of those convicted. Arguments have been written vaguely insinuating those in County jail or on parole are being disenfranchised from their right to vote and a key rehabilitation factor is reestablishing their voting rights.

A little backtracking here ... the Supreme Court ordered California to reduce its prison population to 137% of capacity by May 24, 2013. With California in another budget crisis once again, Gov. Jerry Brown, in response to the Court order, signed A.B. 109 in 2011 transferring responsibility of non-serious, non-violent and non-registerable sex offenders to counties. This became known as "realignment".

Judicial Council on Criminal Justice Services provides information at Criminal Justice Realignment and asserts:

"The primary objective of the realignment legislation is to change the place where many felony sentences are served when the defendant is not granted probation. Instead of being sentenced to state prison, many defendants will be serving their "prison"

term in county jail." Realignment changes nothing else according to the Judicial Council. These people have committed a felony act and are felons in one of 58 county jails.

AB 2466 redefines the term "imprisoned" as serving time in a state or federal prison allowing convicted felons in County jails, under realignment, to retain their right to vote or register to vote. The bill, authored by Assembly Member Shirley Weber (D-79th AD - La Mesa, San Diego) ignores the true reason for and definition of parole. Instead she and Sacramento democrats that voted for this bill rename those on parole as those under "mandatory supervision" or "post-release community supervision" creating another circumvention of the Constitution and allowing convicted felons, now on parole, to vote or register to vote.

The California State Sheriff's Association argues, "When Realignment altered where thousands of felons would be housed, it did not change the felony status of their crimes. A felony is still a felony regardless of where the felon is housed. As such, to allow the restoration of a convicted felon's voting rights based on his or her custodial location is not only inconsistent but insulting to law-abiding citizens."

Some seem to constantly be making excuses for those who don't play by the rules and rewarding them for failure hoping it will cure their ills. Or some are just playing a political game to acquire votes to maintain themselves and their political party in a position of power. The Washington Post reports: "Gov. Terry McAuliffe's decision to

restore the voting rights of more than 200,000 felons [in Virginia] has set off a frenzied effort by advocacy groups to register them in the hope they can swing not just the presidential election but also state politics for the next decade. More than 2,000 ex-offenders have registered to vote in two weeks ..." Should AB 2466 pass in California, estimates are about 50,000 would immediately register to vote.

Just a quick reminder, California now has three Democratic State Legislators charged or convicted with felony offenses spanning from trafficking firearms to voter fraud. They'll be serving time and I don't think anyone should be enabling those three felons to vote. If the Democrats in Sacramento think it is an important enough issue, then they should put it on the ballot and let the people make that decision. Don't disenfranchise the law-abiding citizens by passing a law that has such a huge impact on their rights and possible lifestyle.

Those supporting AB 2466 are American Civil Liberties Union of California (ACLU), League of Women Voters of California, Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) Legal Services for Prisoners with Children, and Homeboy Industries, just to name a few.

Assemblyman Ed Chau (D-49th AD), Assemblyman Chris Holden (D-49th AD), and Roger Hernandez (D-48th AD) voted to support AB 2466. No vote was recorded for Assemblyman Roger Hernandez in Appropriations Committee where cost to Counties to implement was considered "minor and absorbable".

Finding a Deeper Sense of Renewal

Renewal. Does it come naturally to you?

Or does your sense of renewal itself need renewing?

For instance, have you ever traveled down pathways you thought would lead to a sense of renewal and found only flimsy and superficial change as a result - by trying to promote self-renewal through engineering a "change of scene," for example?

Now, there's nothing wrong with having a change of scene. But how do you keep experiencing moments of renewal when instead of being permanent they seem to be fleeting and transitory?

My own sense of renewal was renewed when I learned that it is building on a deeper, spiritual foundation that galvanizes the reawakening and rediscovery process of true renewal.

"Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me." writes David in the book of Psalms, illustrating how this yearning for renewal has been felt throughout the history of mankind.

In my own experience of striving to meet a higher standard as a better citizen, husband, and professional, I have felt energized as I have continued to search for greater clarity, resolve, mission, purpose, and depth in my life. This includes embracing the true, spiritual idea of human existence as never being limited by what seem to be our current circum-

stances. Through my spiritual practice as a Christian Scientist I have found that even our bodies can be renewed through a new perception of ourselves. And I love how physical scientists such as Dr. Oyle are also beginning to uncover this idea. He has said: "Disease doesn't just happen to us, nor does health. Our power to heal ourselves is greater than we've been led to believe."

This kind of breakthrough thought is akin to finding new ways to solve mathematical problems by understanding that the law behind those numbers never changes. Understanding is enriched by continuing to recognize what has always been true - and that's my kind of renewal.

A vivid example of renewal based on uncovering what is already divinely true is found in the writings of Mary Baker Eddy, a 19th century woman who consistently turned to biblical teachings for health and guidance in her life. After a fall on the ice, many of her friends believed she would not survive the night. Instead, after reading one of Jesus' healings in the Bible, she was able to get out of bed, get dressed, and live her life free of those injuries. She lived for another 45, very active, years.

This was not a miracle healing that just occurred out of the blue. Eddy had been searching for an understanding of the mind-body relationship for a couple of decades, increasingly concluding that the healing agent in all thera-

peutics was the thought surrounding the treatment. But this instance of bodily renewal through purely spiritual means galvanized Eddy to even more intently study the Bible for insights into mankind's spiritual identity, which would promote health and healing without resorting to material methods.

The healing method she discovered proved so viable that she went on to write a book on it, which became a bestseller, and taught and lectured on it while healing many people through its application. She also founded a religion based on the idea of restoring this healing method that had been practiced by the earliest Christians, as well as launching a publishing society and a nationally acclaimed newspaper that are still going strong.

"Spiritual sense is a conscious, constant capacity to understand God," says Eddy.

She realized that renewal is not found within the material arena of thought and action but in the spiritual realm of consciously relating to the Divine. And I've found that when all daily actions are defined and placed within this spiritual context of cultivating a relationship with God, renewal is not fleeting, but becomes a moment by moment experience with both depth and permanence.

Out June Fed Hike

Nonfarm payrolls rose 38k in May; the Street was expecting a positive number of 160k. Together with a 37k downward revision to April and a 22k downward revision to March, hiring was both unexpectedly weak and statistically more consistent with the sharp first quarter slowdown in the economy.

THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY

Employment sometimes lags economic activity, which means the weakening trend in the first five months of this year may simply reflect the sharp slowdown in the economy in the first quarter, exacerbated in April and May by a shift of some seasonal hiring in construction and retail from spring to the unusually-warm winter. Consumption accelerated in April, suggesting a second quarter bounce in economic activity. Hiring could rebound this summer.

So far, the evidence of a rebound is thin. Employment was downright weak in the first five months of the year, and has slowed consistently since February. The drop in temporary employment, a leading indicator, is particularly troubling. Given 18 months of declining corporate earnings, what we see in the employment data makes perfect sense, however. Corporate leadership is under tremendous pressure to preserve margins.

On balance, the May employment report wake-up call justifies putting Fed policy tightening on hold until after the June meeting. In July, the Fed will have a considerably better idea of spending and employment in the second quarter. Plus, the Brexit (UK vote to leave the EU) vote will be behind us and we'll have a better idea of how China is weathering its summer cash squeeze.

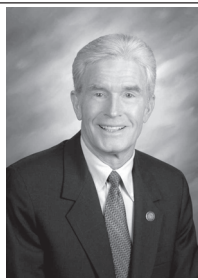
No hike in June. PRODUCTIVITY MATTERS IN A RECOVERING ECONOMY

How bad is weak productivity growth, really? The worst of the recent weakness appears to be seasonal, which is why this conversation seems to come to life in the spring. Falling productivity at the start of the year is not the primary cause of concern, however. Rather, it is persistent low average annual productivity growth since 2009, the slowest since the early 1980s. The last time it was this weak was in the double-dip recessions of the early '80s, when the nation lost much of its heavy manufacturing, including the steel industry.

Productivity measures output (units of GDP) per hour worked. Productivity growth implies output is growing faster than aggregate hours, which in turn means growth in income per hour worked. The faster productivity

rises, the faster per-capita potential income can grow without negative impact to business profitability. It is the source of all good things in the working world: including higher living standards and a shorter workweek. It made possible the development of the weekend in the late nineteenth century and middle class retirement in the 1950s.

The good news about the past five year's productivity growth is that at 0.5%, slow growth is better than no growth. Business income growth is lagging only a bit behind the last two cycles, though wage and salary growth lags way behind. In other words, what little productivity growth there is has benefited the owners of capital more than it has benefited labor, which is what tends to happen when there is slack in the labor force.

Because companies continued to cut payrolls after the recession was over, productivity numbers appeared to boom.

Many businesses, however, found themselves short-handed when orders recovered. Once business confidence started to rise again, employment growth accelerated, appearing to depress productivity. But productivity looked weak in part because 2008-10 gains were overstated. Indeed, productivity growth proved unsustainable as peoples' job responsibilities multiplied in the short-handed economy.

This is part of what Yellen refers to when she says weak productivity is a cyclical problem.

Cyclicity is also evident in the extraordinarily low labor-force participation rate, which suggests it might be cheaper to boost output with employees than investment. After all, a huge pool of potential workers waits in the wings. As long as there is abundant labor slack, investment in capital improvement doesn't always make sense, as is evident in the business investment numbers in GDP, which have never been as weak as they are now (outside of a recession).

One way to smooth data and avoid the pop-and-drop pattern of productivity in expansions is to compare cumulative productivity growth from the start of recessions through the expansion.

What it reveals is that despite the extreme swings in GDP and employment, and apparent huge mismatches between growth and

employment in individual quarters, the ratio of GDP to aggregate hours worked--or productivity--looks virtually identical through the recession and first one-and-a-half years of recovery when comparing the current cycle and the same time period in the 1980 and 1990 cycles. The only stronger early cycle was the one that began in 2001. In other words, the ratio of job losses to the drop in GDP in the Great-Recession was typical.

Productivity growth slowed after 2004, which is about the same number of quarters from the start of the recession as in the start of the slowdown in the current cycle (after 2010). However, productivity accelerated at the same point in the 1980s and 1990s cycles.

In other words, unusual productivity weakness today is not the result of the violence of the recession at all. On the contrary, what is most unusual about this expansion and the last one, as it turns out-is the lack of productivity's failure to accelerate in the late cycle, possibly because it is taking much longer to wring slack from the labor market.

Bottom Line: This Time Is Different

The productivity slowdown that began in the US in the middle of the last business cycle has gone global.

It cannot be entirely explained by cyclical factors. A decline in global trade volumes and falling returns on investment strongly suggest a secular component.

Lingering slow productivity growth is a real problem for policy makers, because it implies lower growth. But maybe they should relax. The disparity between wage and salary growth and other income growth has been so wide for so long that income and wealth gaps are at an all-time high in the US and in the world. However, a few years of rapid wage growth would help close the gap.

It also, ironically, might help end the productivity drought. If labor costs rise, companies would have an incentive to invest in equipment again. We've already seen it on a macro scale in fast food restaurants in cities that have raised the minimum wage. In the meantime, the whole thing is moot if growth fails to rebound. The unemployment rate, after all, has been stalled within a tenth-of-a percent of 5.0% for nine months. There's no need to significantly increase wages if labor slack has become permanent.

A collection company keeps calling me. I cannot afford to pay the \$2,200 balance. I feel bad, but what can I do?

Answer their call. Since your credit is already harmed, ask them if they can offer you a "settlement" amount instead of the whole \$2,200. When they tell you a dollar amount, hesitate, groan, and tell them it'll take you a couple of days to figure out if you can come up with that amount. Sometimes they'll come back with an even smaller settlement, and often they'll post-date the payment until the end of that month, or freeze the account and let you make steady, small payments. If they refuse to negotiate, consider a balance transfer to another credit card with zero or low interest. Then review your budget and pay it off as quickly as possible. This will take discipline, but you can do it!

We got an FHA loan in early 2009. We'd like to refinance. What do you have to offer?

If your FHA mortgage was endorsed on or before May 31, 2009, you might ask your loan originator about an FHA Streamline refinance. It has minimal qualifications and paperwork. Or, you might want to look into a non-FHA, Conventional loan, especially if you have enough equity, or qualify for no MI (mortgage insurance).

Is there a way for us to help our children pay the taxes when inheriting our estate?

The income-tax free benefit from a life insurance policy is typically paid quickly to the

heirs, thus providing them with the funds to help with final expenses and estate taxes that exceed the prevailing exemption amount.

I currently rent a 2 bedroom, 1 bath apartment for \$1,800 per month. This includes water and trash. I have about \$10,000 in savings, and my parents said they could help with another \$10,000. I'd love to be a homeowner, but how do I figure out if I could afford the payments?

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Assemblyman Mike Gatto's CPUC Reform Measure Passes Clears Assembly with Bipartisan Support

SACRAMENTO – Assemblyman Mike Gatto's (D-Los Angeles) proposed constitutional amendment, ACA 11, to restructure California's regulatory agencies gained momentum as it passed the Assembly by a 61 to 9 vote. Major reforms like this, constitutional amendments that require a supermajority vote, have been rare and elusive. The measure to allow for reforms to modernize the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), reassign regulation of industries unrelated to the CPUC's core functions to more appropriate state bodies, and provide greater accountability to Californians, received praise from colleagues on both sides of the aisle.

"The CPUC is spread too

thin, and has too many issues within its jurisdiction," said Gatto. "It is time to make the commission more focused, specialized, and accountable."

The CPUC has received criticism across the state for the way it handled investigations for the San Bruno gas line explosion and the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station settlement agreement. The recent gas well leak in Aliso Canyon, which displaced thousands of residents in Porter Ranch, Granada Hills, and surrounding communities and resulted in over 87,000 metric tons of methane being pumped into the air, has reinvigorated concerns that the CPUC has too much on its plate. And most recently, there has been an alarming number of train fatalities in the

Bay Area, which is another area the CPCU regulates. Californians are hesitant to trust that CPUC regulators are able to properly exercise oversight of utilities or act decisively to protect communities under the current system, which cannot be changed without this initiative.

"ACA 11 will be the first step in making sure that, no matter where you live in California, you can sleep safely at night knowing that a gas line won't explode and that necessary protections have been put in place so that our electrical infrastructure is safe and reliable and not subject to risks from terrorist attacks to cyber mischief," stated Gatto.

The measure will now head to the Senate.

Hilda Solis to Address Mt. SAC Grads

Grad candidates file more than 2,700 petitions for associate degrees

WALNUT - County Supervisor and former U.S. Secretary of Labor Hilda Solis will be the feature speaker at Mt. San Antonio College's 70th commencement on Friday, June 10, 6:30 p.m., at the college's Hilmer Lodge Stadium.

Solis will deliver the commencement address to the Class of 2016. Solis worked in the Carter White House Office of Hispanic Affairs, was first elected to the Rio Hondo Community College Board of Trustees in 1985, was elected to the California State Assembly in 1992, was elected to the State Senate in 1994, and served several terms in the U.S. Congress. In 2009, she was confirmed as the Secretary of Labor, making

her the first Latina to serve in the U.S. Cabinet. She returned to California and was elected to the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors in 2014. In her career as a politician, she has been an advocate of issues involving the environment, immigration, labor, and minority and women's rights. In 2000, she was the first woman to receive the John F. Kennedy Profile in Courage Award for her work on environmental justice issues.

At commencement, Mt. SAC will recognize former student athlete Tobie Hatfield with the college's Alumnus of the Year Award. A member of the Class of 1983, Hatfield was one of the top three pole vaulters in the country while he was a Mountie. Today, he is the Athlete Innovation Director for the Nike Corporation. He helped to design and build specialized products and works closely with many sports superstars, including Michael Johnson, Maria Sharapova, Stacy Dragila, and Ti-

ger Woods. He joined Nike in 1990 and worked in the corporation's research and development center in Taiwan for five years. He was promoted to Senior Engineer of Advanced Projects and designed some of Nike signature models, including the Michael Johnson Olympic "Gold Shoe," the ACG Trail Running Line, the Nike Free, and PV Lite.

During the ceremony, Mt. SAC will also recognize outstanding members of the Class of 2016 and award associate degrees to hundreds of graduates who actively participate in the ceremony. In all, 2,765 degree petitions were filed. The youngest graduate is 18; the oldest is 71. Additionally, 21 candidates will receive Bachelor of Science in Aviation Management degrees in conjunction with Southern Illinois University, and for the first time, 19 candidates will receive Bachelor of Science in Nursing degrees in conjunction with Mount Saint Mary's University.

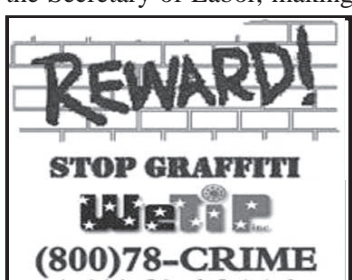

The old fire engine had been housed and stored at Hurst Ranch in West Covina.



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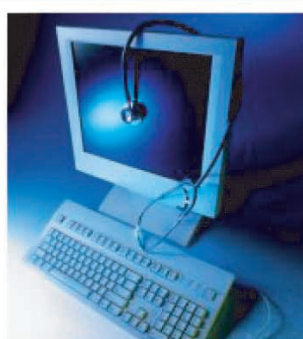

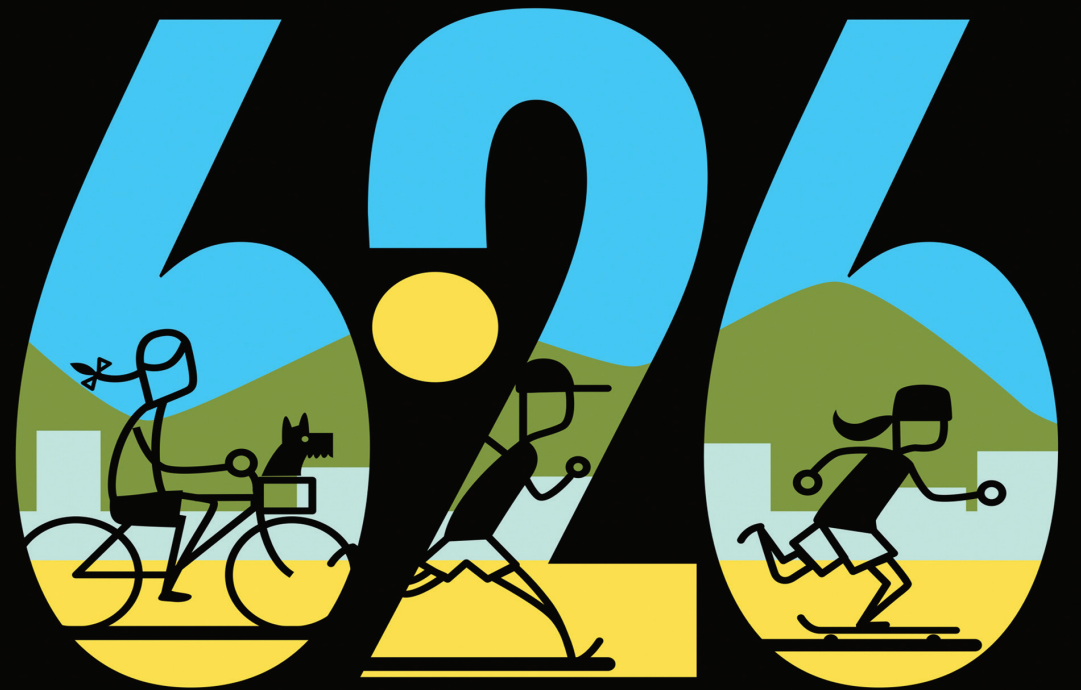
