West Covina City Council Recognizes Police Explorers Post 499

WEST COVINA - At the March 15 City Council meeting, the West Covina Council and Police Chief David Faulkner recognized the West Covina Police Explorers Post 499 for the recent achievements with their competition in Chandler, Arizona.

Chief Faulkner gave a little history on the police explorers. They were started back in 1967 by then officer John Shimanski, who later became Assistant Chief for the department, and the program has been going on ever since.

The explorers consisted of 30 young men and women who competed in Chandler, Arizona against 55 other Posts. The competition consisted of everything from tactical maneuvers to traffic stops. Individuals within the West Covina Post scored first place with a "pistol shoot" competition as well as, "shoot and don't shoot" competition. They also scored third in a tubular competition where they team together to resolve a problem or situation. Overall, the West Covina team of

explorers came in third with some very tough competition with the other posts.

Chief David Faulkner was proud and honored to introduce and recognize the explorers. He spoke very highly of the explorers and the officers who give them guidance through the program.

Mayor James Toma also was honored to be able to recognize them at the Council meeting and gave them accolades for their very positive accomplishments.

The explorers have been very helpful with assisting police officers in the city with various duties. This would include everything from assisting with vehicle checkpoints to flag presentations for the city and at special events. Often, the explorers move on to become cadets with the police department and some often decide to become police officers themselves. The West Covina Police Department has a number of officers that have started off as explorers and cadets.

The cadets themselves were very honored to be recognized by the city at the Council meeting.

Monrovia Cub Scout Pack 66 Honored



MONROVIA - At Trask Scout Reservation in Monrovia, WeBelos Members of Pack 66 of Monrovia Cub Scout Pack 66 were honored on Sunday, February 28, 2016 as Pack 66 leaders along with the Order of the Arrow Emcee Dave Sargent and Scoutmasters Ed Stegman (Duarte Troop 185) and David Van Slooten (La Canada Troop 398) held a cross-over ceremony where WeBelos Scouts officially became Boy Scouts. As they crossed the bridge, both in a metaphorical and literal sense, these young scouts left the Cub Scout Pack to join their new colleagues as Boy Scouts.

Over several years Cub Scouts are taught the importance of building character, learn the responsibilities of citizenship and develop personal fitness. As they demonstrate their ability to follow and achieve these ideals, the boys work their way through the Bobcat, Tiger, Wolf and Bear Cubs and receive badges.

After completing the requirements of those packs, the boys join the WeBelos, the fifth and highest rank of a Cub Scout. WeBelos help the boys make the transition into Boy Scouts as they learn how to take more control

of their pack and increase their responsibilities and decision making skills. By earning their Arrow of Light Award requirements, including the Readyman and Outdoorsman Activity Badges, Cub Scouts are then prepared to cross the bridge to become a Boy Scout. The Arrow of Light is the Cub Scouts highest award second only to a Boy Scouts Eagle Scout award. Individuals that received their Arrow of Light include Adrian Guerrero, Elias Mulheim, Jacob Buan, Riley Dial Ward, Roman Bonilla, and Willem Aponno.

Their den leaders are Jessica Mulheim-Ward and Assistant Cubmaster Erick Bonilla. Den Leader Jessica who volunteered for the Pack for 4 years, crossed them over into Troops 185 and 398. The Boy Scouts will receive patches they can sew onto their uniforms to display Arrow of Light and Super Achiever awards.

The Arrow of Light is much more difficult to obtain than a belt loop, an activity badge or even one of the other rank patches. To obtain this award these scouts have met a number of requirements, including completion of eight activity

badges, participation in camps, hikes and boy scout activities, the memorization of the Scout Oath and the Scout Law, and the commitment to live by these principles. The ceremony is in essence a 'coming of age' ceremony symbolizing that Cub Scouts are now ready to become Boy Scouts.

The WeBelos were honored with numerous certificates, City of Los Angeles Mayoral Recognition, City of Monrovia Mayoral Recognition, City of Monrovia Fire & Rescue, City of Monrovia Police Department Commendations, US National Park Service, and US Fish & Wildlife Service.

"I could not be more honored to be a part of these young Scouts transition and as their Cubmaster. No matter where they go in life I will always be their Cubmaster and blessed to have been part of their Scouting career." Stated Cubmaster Mark Peters and "These young Scouts are our future and I hope with the experiences they have learned in Pack 66 will challenge them to lead their own Pack one day."

WALNUT - The Mt. San Antonio College Forensics Team recently won back-to-back tournaments, winning a total of 34 awards at the two tournaments.

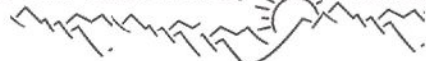

Survey Shows Veterans Are Desirable Candidates For Civilian Workforce

As U.S. companies continue to find new and innovative ways to conduct business, produce better products, offer the most efficient customer service, or unveil the latest gadget, one skill set employers look for is experience, or, more specifically, readiness.

The U.S. military is a tremendous example of a "readiness incubator," instilling within its members leadership, problem-solving and technical skills that translate well into private-sector employment. And the word is out among corporate America that hiring a military veteran is a good strategic move.

An online survey conducted by Harris Poll on behalf of University of Phoenix® in fall 2015 of more than 500 hiring managers found that 80 percent of those hiring managers have employed a military veteran, and approximately 82 percent recognize the ways in which the skills of employees or applicants with military experience are superior to those who have never served. Approximately two-thirds of hiring managers cited teamwork (69 percent) and responsibility (65 percent) among the top military skills that would contribute to the leadership of their organizations.

"Military veterans are well disciplined and possess an incredibly strong work ethic," said Adam Such, University of Phoenix Military Relations vice president and retired Army lieutenant

colonel. "Hiring managers have definitely taken notice of the skills that military members bring to the civilian workplace as a result of their service, which is critical now that many of our nation's service members are returning home from overseas."

This is good news for the 24,000 to 360,000 men and women who are transitioning out of the U.S. military each year. The reason is simple: Corporate America is not only looking, but hiring more than just a few good men and women. The same University of Phoenix survey found that when compared with civilian counterparts, hiring managers noted that discipline and the ability to work both under pressure (47 percent) and as part of a team (43 percent) set veteran candidates apart.

"These are individuals who served their country honorably.

The discipline and hands-on experience they've learned in the military are qualities that are very much sought after and translate to civilian life," said Such. "What's more, hiring a veteran carries an intrinsic value to a company—former service members have faced and met challenges that few others have; they perform well under pressure, and their sense of purpose can serve as examples to others in the workplace."

Baldwin Park Officials Reinstate Spring Egg Hunt Event

BALDWIN PARK - A special hunt is coming to Baldwin Park just in time for spring! After a three-year hiatus, the city's traditional Spring Egg Hunt celebration will return to Morgan Park, 4100 Baldwin Park Blvd., on Saturday, March 26.

The event, which is open to families and their children, is free of charge. It will begin at 10 a.m.

Mike Salas, a program supervisor with the city's Department of Recreation and Community Services, said officials are bringing back the traditional spring kickoff event, which was last held in 2012. Organizers are excited to reinstate the spring festivities that will bring residents out to enjoy some time with other locals.

"This allows families to gather, to create community, and to have a great time," said Salas.

On tap for the Egg Hunt celebration are arts and crafts activities, as well as a visit from the Spring bunny, who will also make an appearance on a fire truck to help kick off festivities. Photos

with the bunny will be available for purchase for \$3 each.

The event highlight, of course, is children's scavenger hunt for treat-filled eggs. Salas said thousands of eggs and healthy snacks will be peppered across the park lawn in order to be claimed by participants when the egg hunt officially begins on March 26.

Unique to this year's egg hunt are a series of "diamond eggs" that will be included in each hunt, to commemorate Baldwin Park's 60th anniversary according to organizers. Diamond eggs are similar to "golden eggs" typically incorporated into some large-scale egg hunts; they are special to Baldwin Park, since the city is celebrating its diamond anniversary this year. Youth who discover a diamond egg will be awarded a special basket filled with a slew of goodies and treats.

Organizers anticipate as many

as 800 people to attend the special Egg Hunt, which is designed for children age 12 and under. To accommodate young visitors, egg hunt participants will be divided into four groups: those age 3 and under; 4-6 year olds; 7-9 year olds; and those age 10-12. To help children capitalize on their hunting techniques and fun, parents will not be allowed in the hunt areas.

"For kids, this event really allows them to enjoy their parks, and, this year, it also allows them to know about the 60th anniversary of the city," said Salas. "We plan on putting in a special touch and allowing the next generation of Baldwin Park residents to appreciate the community."

Gatto's Legislation to Protect Children From Identity Theft Passes First Test

SACRAMENTO - The Assembly's Banking and Finance Committee passed legislation by Assemblyman Mike Gatto (D-Los Angeles) and Assemblywoman Jacqui Irwin (D-Thousand Oaks) to protect children from identity theft, by a 12-0 vote. AB 1580 will allow parents to freeze their children's credit with the three credit bureaus, to prevent identity thieves from opening fraudulent credit accounts and ruining credit scores.

"In an era where hackers have stolen millions of records including names, birth dates, and social security numbers, belong-

ing to children AB 1580 will give parents needed tools to protect their child's financial future," said Gatto.

Current law only allows parents to freeze a child's credit only after the child has become a victim of identity fraud. However, since children don't typically have financial accounts or check their FICO score, often the damage by fraudsters is not discovered until a child turns 18. Twenty-three states including, Idaho, Texas, and Maryland, have already successfully passed and implemented similar laws to AB

1580. "Children start out with a clean slate, which has made them the most sought-after target for cybercriminals. In fact, a recent child-identity theft study found that 10.2% of the children in the study had someone else using their social-security number, a rate 51 times higher than adults in the same population sample," said Cybersecurity Select Committee Chair Jacqui Irwin.

"It is time for California to protect its youngest citizens. This change is long overdue," said Gatto.

Assemblyman Mike Gatto Introduces Legislation Giving Law Enforcement Vital Resources to Investigate Cold Cases

AB 2440 Provides Additional Funding for Solving Old Crimes Where DNA is Present

SACRAMENTO - Assemblyman Mike Gatto (D-Los Angeles) introduced legislation to strengthen law enforcement's ability to investigate cold cases in which DNA evidence is present. The legislation, AB 2440, provides needed funding for law enforcement agencies that will be used to help link stored DNA samples to biological evidence from cold cases. DNA is most often used to solve rapes and murders.

"State mandates have put pressure on law enforcement to expedite criminal investigations in

which DNA has been collected," said Gatto. "However, massive budget and personnel cuts have strained law enforcement agencies, and criminals who might otherwise be identified through DNA hits remain free to commit additional crimes."

Technological advances have sparked an increase in the amount of DNA evidence that can be identified and processed, and this has the potential to solve cold cases. However, there isn't sufficient local funding to support follow-up investigations for these serious crimes.

AB 2440 will add an additional penalty of \$4 to every \$10 of every criminal fine, excluding traffic infractions. These new funds will also be available to help law enforcement investigate cases in which a DNA match has resulted in the identification of a suspect or a match to DNA profile from another crime scene.

"No cold case in California with clear DNA evidence should go unsolved solely because of a lack of funding. AB 2440 will and help bring closure to victims, and take criminals off the street," said Gatto.

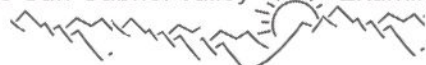

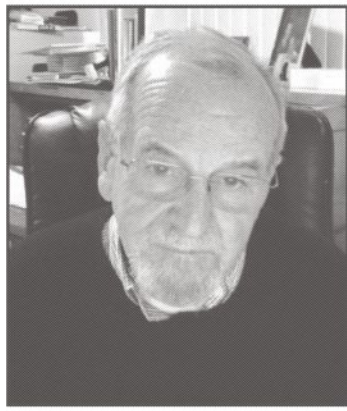

To a life of love in action help us rise and pledge our word.

Lead us, Most High, into freedom; from despair your world release,

Show us how through care and goodness fear will die and hope increase.

All that kills abundant living, let it from the earth be banned:

Pride of status, race and schooling, dogmas that obscure your plan.

In our common quest for justice, may we hallow life's brief span.

You, Creator God, have written your great name on human-kind;

For our growing in your likeness, bring the life of Christ to mind;

Thus by our response and service earth its destiny may find.

The real liberals in the world have been people who imagined a future about which they could only dream. But their lives were dedicated to reaching into that future and bringing back into the present what they could. These were and are society's visionaries. Jesus called his vision, "The Kingdom of God." Martin Luther King Jr. spelled out his vision as a dream, and called the nation to

dream with him. Nelson Mandela envisioned a new South Africa. Most of his life was spent in prison. Jesus was executed and King assassinated. My horror at the likely nomination of Donald Trump or Ted Cruz comes from their oft-repeated racism, super-nationalism, trust in enlarged wars, torture as a national policy, and the prostitution of Christian morality for the sake of political advantage. For Christians who have really thought about what is happening, I believe the political decisions are becoming clear.

Let's Get Our Teachers on Track

As the adage goes, knowledge is power. And certainly, we should be using every bit of knowledge available to empower California's schools to provide the best educational opportunities for our children.

A recent report from the Legislative Analyst points out the shortfalls our public schools face because we lack a statewide teacher database. When considering legislative proposals, California policymakers rely on research based on other states' data, or on generalized federal data. Both are useful, but neither is as helpful or significant as would be California-specific data analyzed

considering California's particular circumstances. With a statewide teacher database that tracks teachers over time, we could evaluate the outcomes of an individual policy, or make comparisons of two or more different policy options, in a way that would be directly relevant to the unique conditions that exist in California. I fully support implementing such a database as quickly as we can.

Let me be clear from the outset that I am not advocating some kind of draconian, "Big Brother" program to spy on teachers. California already tracks the performance of our public school students with individual, discrete

numbers which don't identify students by name. The idea is to monitor students' performance as they move through the school system to help determine how efforts such as different academic approaches, teacher incentives, classroom settings, and distribution of resources impact student success.

The data that becomes available from this kind of objective tracking process is invaluable for determining the best practices all of our schools can use, based on the results from select programs already underway.

It's just common sense to apply this same student data track-

ing process to our teachers.

According to recent published reports, California is facing a teacher shortage crisis. Classroom staffing concerns are expected most in some of the toughest areas of teaching expertise to fill: special education, science and math. Sadly, the impending shortage of teachers will likely hit the worst schools in our lower-income neighborhoods the hardest, where our students already suffer the most.

Part of the problem is that so many idealistic young people who have spent the time and money needed to earn their teaching credentials end up leav-

ing the public school system in the first few years of their teaching careers. As many as 10,000 people in California who have earned their teaching credentials are not teaching. That's a horrific waste of valuable human resources. We can do better, and empowered with the knowledge of what works best, we will.

Teacher tracking is not a new idea. In fact, the State Legislature passed a framework for a teacher database ten years ago, around the same time student tracking got underway. But because of a combination of technical issues and what I would call misplaced priorities, teacher tracking has yet

to roll out statewide. With a teacher shortage crisis looming, it's time for this to change. It's time for teacher tracking to get back on track.

Teaching tracking can help guide the much-needed reforms our public education system so desperately needs. It will help what should be our ultimate goal, providing the opportunity for a quality education for every California student.

Before You Reject the System, Understand It

If there's a theme that sets this political season apart, it's the voters' utter disdain for most of the people who practice politics. They're fed up with politicians, they've lost faith and confidence in the political elite, and they don't believe that the realm where politicians ply their craft — government — works.

The two presidential contenders who have most channeled this frustration, Donald Trump and Bernie Sanders, have electrified many voters who want to get this message across. They've mobilized new voters, people more mainstream politicians haven't reached. The involvement of more Americans in the political system, though it unsettles the old order, is bracing.

There are many legitimate reasons for these people to be turned off by the political system today. But I'd argue that if you're hell-bent on shaking up the system, you also need to understand

it — and understand that certain features are likely to persist no matter how hard you try to change them.

The first is that it is very hard to make our representative democracy work. We make progress incrementally, over years if not generations. The first president to press hard for affordable, accessible health care was Harry Truman. It's taken us that long even to get close — and no one would argue that the work is done.

So you have to approach politics with great patience. Our system discourages the rush to judgment — it puts a premium on including as many voices as possible, which takes time in a complicated country. The process is inevitably slow, noisy and messy, the results fully satisfy no one, and more often than not the best we can do is to muddle through.

Which is why in our system, there's rarely a sense of completion. The work — on health care,

taxes, the environment, you name it — is never done. Nothing is ever finally settled. There is no ultimate solution.

Many people are also turned off by what lies at the center of our system: deal-making. This involves a clash of ideas in the public arena, compromise, and negotiation, which make a lot of Americans uneasy. Yet it's how we resolve our differences — and has been since the first day of the United States' existence.

So politicians who insist on purity impede solutions. There ought to be a healthy tension between idealism and realism, but we have to find a pragmatic way to combine them. We have to consider different points of view, the intense involvement of special interest groups, and in many cases the robust interest shown by ordinary citizens. This makes it challenging to come to an agreement on complicated issues, but it's necessary to keep the country from coming apart.

Congress in recent years has reached new levels of polarization and failure to address the major issues of the day. In public meetings, I often encounter a yearning for leadership to solve all our problems, usually along the lines of, "Where are the Abe Lincolns of our day?" Sadly, it's a false hope. Our problems are made by us and have to be resolved by us. Abraham Lincoln's not around any more.

We cannot look to government to solve all our problems. Indeed, we live in an era in which government faces more and more problems it cannot effectively deal with. Increasingly, citizens

have to step forward and fill the void that government leaves. The relevance of the citizen increases every day as power is more diffuse, technology empowers individuals, and social media allows more citizens to express their views, vent their frustrations, and to mobilize organizations.

We may well be moving into the century of the citizen. I think of the woman who got rail-crossing signals fitted out at dangerous intersections in Indiana, after her daughter was killed at a rail crossing with no signals. Or of my neighbor, who helped build a movement to press for accurate labeling of food ingredients, be-

cause he was diabetic and had no way to know the sugar content of goods. Our communities and lives are better because of citizen action. Indeed, unless citizens boost their involvement and contributions, many of our problems will not be solved.

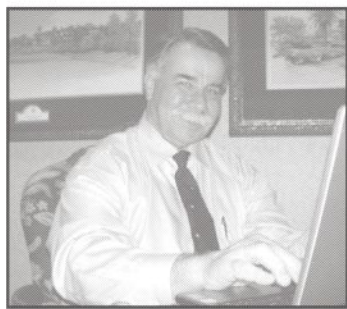

Schiff's NRA Hands Land Over to Santa Monica Mountains NRA

National Parks Services Rim of the Valley Special Resource Study has been released and reviewed proposing another National Recreation Area with Rep. Adam Schiff writing the legislation that mirrors Rep. Judy Chu's efforts to hijack not only forest land, but water and private property in the San Gabriel Valley. Schiff's proposal would add approximately 173,000 acres to the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area (SMMNRA).

There is no interactive map that clearly identifies areas and cities included in the proposal, and the acreage numbers are not consistent from report to report leaving the public to guess what the real boundaries are for this latest proposal by NPS that is suffering approximately a \$11 billion backlog in maintenance nationally. In California last numbers show NPS has a \$1.7 billion maintenance backlog.

The area that would be absorbed by Santa Monica Mountains NRA would be portions of the Los Angeles River and Arroyo Seco corridors, the Verdugo Mountains - San Rafael Hills, the San Gabriel Mountains foothills, Simi Hills, Santa Susana Mountains and Conejo Mountains ar-

reas. Other areas considered portals to the Rim of the Valley include Hansen Dam, Griffith Park, Sepulveda Basin Recreation and Wildlife Reserve, El Pueblo de Los Angeles Historical Monument and Los Angeles State Historic Park. No clear definition of portal is found or impact on those sites or adjacent areas.

41.5% of the +/- 170,000 or 173,000 acre proposal are currently protected by other land management agencies and organizations that include conservation, open space and/or recreation. The Angeles National Forest and San Gabriel Mountains National Monument, once proposed to be part of Schiff's NRA, have been removed from the proposed boundaries of Rim of the Valley NRA.

The study proposes the newly added areas would initially be supported by existing SMMNRA operational funding and new

staffing would primarily be for park planning, outreach, and coordination with other agencies and organizations. The 2012 operating budget for SMMNRA was \$8.6 million; and, the NPS operational budget for the expansion could range from \$9.5 to \$10.5 million, an increase of \$1 to almost \$2 million above the SMMNRA 2012 budget.

State of California, Department of Finance, Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy Fund, August 2012, under Chapter 1087 (1979) provides an appropriation of \$100,000 from the State General Fund to the Conservancy fund along with separate federal grants per the Public Resources Code. With the current proposal by NPS for increased funding for the Rim of the Valley SMMNRA expansion, subsidized by the SMM Conservancy, concerns are raised about the impact on the state budget and particularly the general fund.

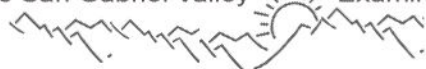

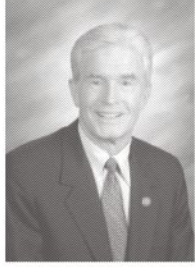
No Surprises With No Rate Hike

The question and answer period after the FOMC meeting last Wednesday was an eye opener for Wall Streeter's as they listened to the hard-to-believe testimony from Chairperson Yellen. She stated more than once that each committee member had their own way of looking at the economy and their own way of interpreting the future of monetary policy related to increasing or decreasing interest rates. That kind of sentiment does not build credibility. Wednesday morning, there were two rate hikes priced into the market. In the afternoon, the Fed released its new statement of Economic Projections showing two rate hikes this year and the market immediately repriced for just one. Of course, the Fed's forecast has been falling for years. As many have said in the past, trading the Fed is like duck hunting, you have to aim in front of them. Clearly, traders have figured that out from the response on Wall Street.

Of course, the Fed's credibility problems may also stem from their own apparent lack of faith in their forecasting ability. As the NYT's Binyamin Appelbaum wrote last week, "The Federal Reserve has once again pared its plans for raising interest rates, citing the weakness of the global economy as a reason for greater caution about the prospects for domestic growth." Yet he also quotes Yellen, who explained the Fed's forecast thus: "What you see here is a virtually unchanged path of economic projections and a slightly more accommodative path for monetary policy."

In A Nutshell

Wednesday, Appelbaum tweeted this: "Yellen devotes roughly equal time to highlighting the economic projections and to explaining why everyone should ignore them."

The Fed would likely explain the inconsistency of a lower path for Fed funds despite an unchanged forecast by pointing out the forecast reflects what has been telegraphed to Wall Street. In other words, growth and inflation forecasts would have been cut if there were still four rate hikes in the Fed's median forecast. With just two rate hikes, however, the anticipated effects of the global slowdown are offset.

With that said, however, consider this: If one had listened to every speech by Fed officials and read all the research published by their economists since the last meeting, one would have expected the Fed to make a stronger case for rate hikes, not a weaker one, especially after higher-than-expected core inflation in both January and February. This Fed's guidance has been of little value to anyone, and not just in the past two months.

Highlights from the statement:

- "Information received since the Federal Open Market Committee met in January suggests that economic activity has been expanding at a moderate pace despite the global economic and financial developments of recent months."

- "Market-based measures of inflation (in) compensation remain low; survey-based measures of longer-term inflation expectations are little changed, on balance, in recent months."

- "However, global economic and financial developments continue to pose risks."

- "The Committee is maintaining its existing policy of reinvesting principal payments from its holdings of agency debt and agency mortgage-backed securities in agency mortgage-backed securities and of rolling over maturing Treasury securities at auction, and it anticipates doing so until normalization of the level of the federal funds rate is well underway."

Bond yields fell further overnight. The US 10-yr Treasury is at 1.86%.

As for stocks, they have made a tremendous comeback and are currently in the black for 2016.

As one trader said to me on Thursday, "I would not be surprised if the 10yr Treasury got to 1%".

What are the different investments in relation to when I have to pay taxes on them?

On savings, checking, CDs, mutual funds, stocks, bonds, and treasuries, you pay taxes NOW (annually). Pay taxes LATER on an IRA, a 401k, a 403b, other pension plans, variable and fixed annuities, and savings bonds. Pay taxes NEVER* on Roth IRAs, Municipal bonds, and life insurance cash value accounts. (*You already paid taxes on the money before investing in these.)

I have about \$150,000 that I'd like to invest, but it has to be safe. I don't anticipate needing any of the money for at least 5 - 10 years, and even then might not need it. I'm leaning toward putting it in CDs, a money market account, or municipal bonds. Are these low-interest earning accounts the only safe places to put my money?

No. You might want to consider putting your money into one of a couple of products which could offer you a potentially higher rate of return, defer taxes, be every bit as safe, and offer some great additional benefits you might take advantage of later in life. These products also fulfill some aspects of retirement and estate planning.

When my little sister inherits my 401k, she'll have a terrible tax burden. Is there something I can set up so that the taxes are paid?

You have several choices depending on your circumstances.

If you are no longer working at the company holding your 401k, I can help you roll it into an IRA so that you don't trigger a taxable event. IRAs have much more flexibility on distribution than funds from a 401k. Additionally, you could purchase a life insurance policy with your sister as the primary beneficiary. Since the payout from life insurance policies are income tax free, that money could be used to pay the taxes on taxable inherited monies.

My husband lost his job and our health insurance. We can't afford Cobra. And, the Affordable Care insurance is very expensive, too. What do we do now?

Contact a licensed health insurance agent to help you navigate the health insurance choices available. Ask about short-term health insurance policies which frequently work out to be less expensive than the cost of annual policies. You could also check into using 401(k) funds to pay the

Cobra premiums. See if you qualify for MediCal.

We're homeowners, have debt, two kids in college, and recently our adult child moved back home. And this week, we've become caregivers for Grandma. Any advice?

You have now become part of the "Sandwich Generation" -- caught between caring for college-age children AND an aging parent at the same time. Set rules for your 'boomerang' adult child (one who leaves home and returns), possibly including rent. And, this adult child can be very helpful as an additional caregiver. Grandma's Social Security income and Medicare benefits should help. Look into Powers of Attorney for finances and medical. Contact your local Senior Center. You may want to talk with an Elder Law attorney. Avoid dipping into your retirement savings, but you might consider refinancing to improve your own cash flow.



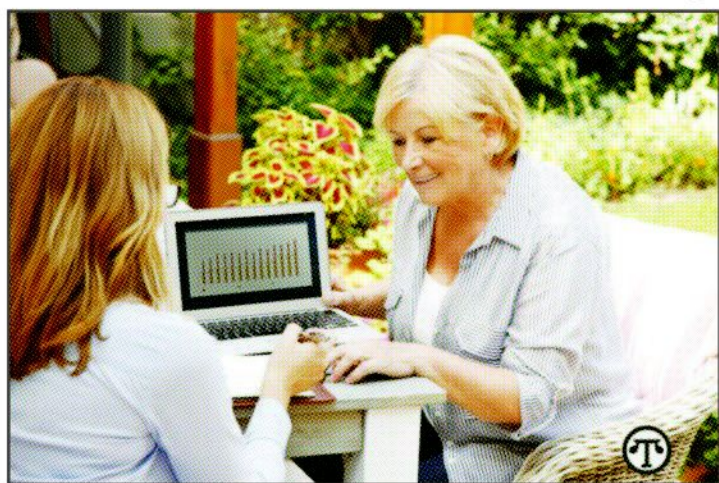

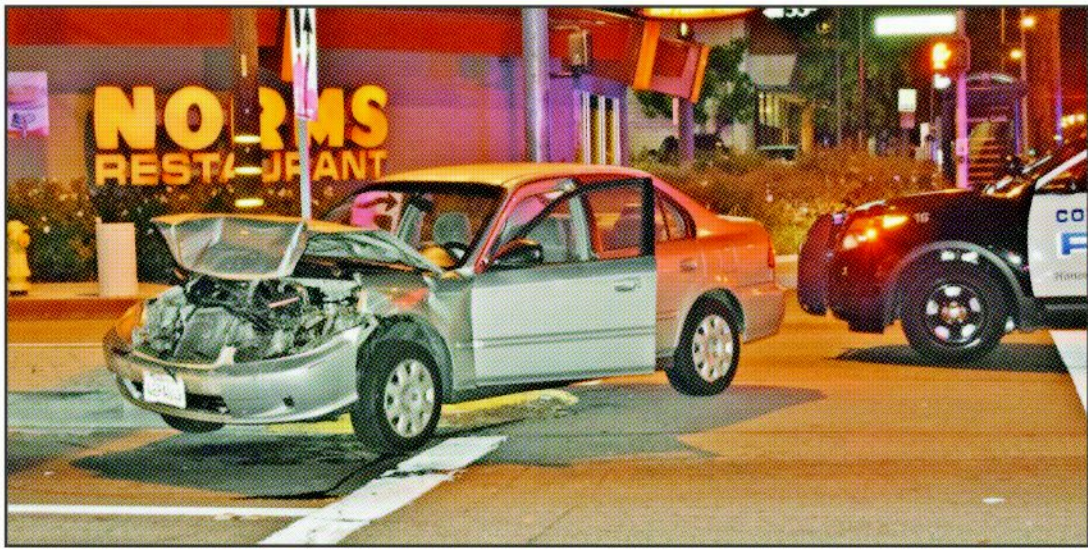

The suspect was not identified nor was a reason given why he did not stop for the first minor collision which caused him to run from the police. The investigation continues.

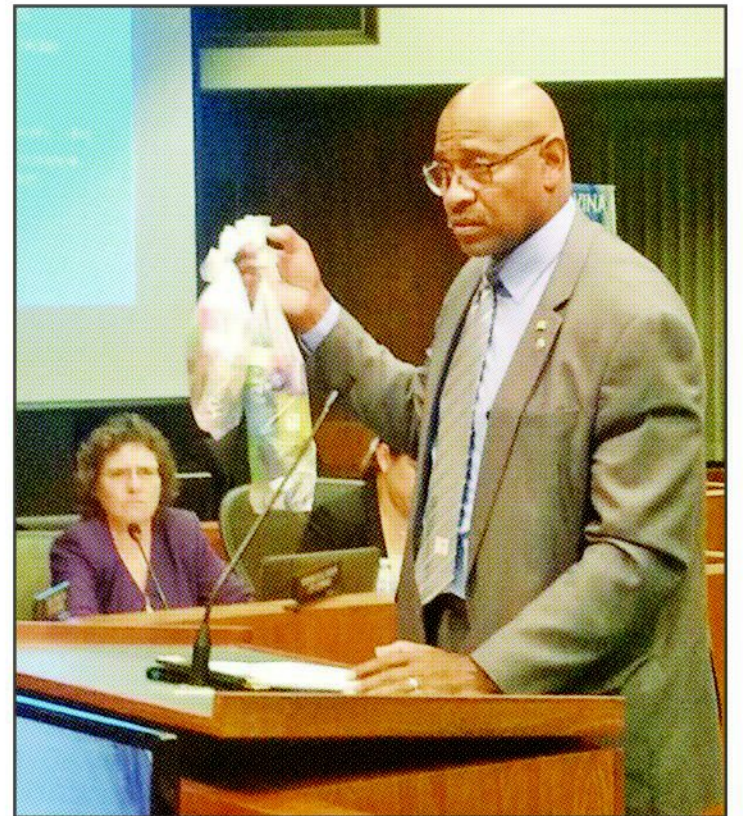
Former Mayor Concerned About Undesirables in West Covina Parks and Business Areas
