# Citrus College Dedicates New \$19 Million Visual Arts Building

**GLENDORA**—After several years of planning and nearly two years of construction, Citrus College visual arts faculty and students have a new place to call home. During the dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremony held Tuesday, September 6, college officials, faculty, staff, students, dignitaries and community members celebrated the much-anticipated opening of the Visual Arts Building.

The \$19 million project brings nearly 37,000 square feet of educational space online for the college. The facility replaces the original Arts Center, built in 1964. The new Visual Arts Building, home to Citrus College's rapidly expanding arts programs, features studios equipped for drawing, painting, printmaking, digital design, transmedia, animation, mixed media and photo and video production, a 150-seat lecture hall, an art gallery, computer labs, a ceramics lab, general purpose classrooms, faculty offices and a space for Citrus College's student newspaper, the Clarion.

"I can only imagine the future artists who will be educated in this very facility," said Geraldine Perri, Ph.D., superintendent/

president of Citrus College. She said the building's development reflects the college's deep commitment to the arts industry and its emerging occupations. "While the Visual Arts building will surely contribute to developing talented students who will

make their mark on society, Citrus College's dedicated faculty and staff have a long record of success, having prepared hundreds of outstanding artists for thriving careers."

Faculty and staff began moving into the new building in August, eager to turn the aesthetically pleasing facility into a highly effective learning environment. "The new Visual Arts Building at Citrus College was designed to create unlimited collaborative opportunities for visual and performing arts students," said Robert Slack, dean,

Visual and Performing Arts. "The expansion of design, production and interactive media curriculum can now be successfully realized."

Throughout the years, Citrus College has earned a reputation as a leader in visual and performing arts education. "We have created a legacy that will have a lasting impact on generations to come. This extraordinary new Visual Arts Building is part of that legacy," said Dr. Perri.

The three-story project was funded by Measure G, a general

obligation bond measure approved in 2004 by voters in the Citrus Community College District. "The Visual Arts Building is an example of 'Your Measure G Dollars at Work' and I thank you, members of our communities, for supporting Measure G in 2004," said Mrs. Susan M. Keith, president, Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees. "I also want to express my heartfelt gratitude to our elected officials from all levels of government and our partners in education for their steadfast support of Citrus College," added Mrs. Keith.

During the dedication, Citrus College received certificates of recognition from Congresswoman Judy Chu, 27th Congressional District; Congresswoman Grace Napolitano, 32nd Congressional District; Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich, Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, 5th District; Senator Carol Liu, 25th Senate District; Senator Dr. Ed Hernandez, 22nd Senate District; Assemblymember Chris Holden, 41st Assembly District; Assemblymember Roger Hernandez, 48th Assembly District; the City of Azusa and the City of Glendora.

After the ribbon-cutting ceremony, guests enjoyed refreshments, listened to a live performance from The Castaways, a Citrus College student musical group, and were led on tours of the new Visual Arts Building by student ambassadors.

# Felon Confesses to 1976 Murder of Glendora Girl

**COVINA/GLENDORA** - Back on Aug. 26, 1976, an 18-year-old girl, Cynthia May Hernandez of Glendora went missing. She left her home that evening to see a movie at the Fox Twin Theaters in Covina, to see "The Omen." She never returned

and was never seen again.

Family members went looking for her and found her car, a 1963 white Chevrolet station wagon, still parked behind the theater at 211 N. Azusa Ave., with personal belongings on the front seat.

Police did an extensive investigation and could never come up

with anything concrete to move on. Sadly it became a cold case, but looked at often.

After 40 years, there was a break in the case. A convicted felon Larry James Allred, 62, confessed to the killing of Cynthia May Hernandez. He took a plea deal and he pleaded guilty on Friday, September 16, 2016 at the San Bernardino County Court hearing. Allred had been convicted in 1975, of kidnapping a woman at gunpoint in San Bernardino County and raping her. A quick release for some reason had him kidnapping Hernandez in 1976. A short time later, and while on parole in 1978, he was convicted of kidnapping two teenaged girls, 16 and 17, where he brutally raped them over the next seven days. These are the crimes they know about.

The plea bargain to the first-degree murder charge will most likely result in a life sentence at the October 17 sentence hearing.

Finally, after all these years, there will be closure for the family.

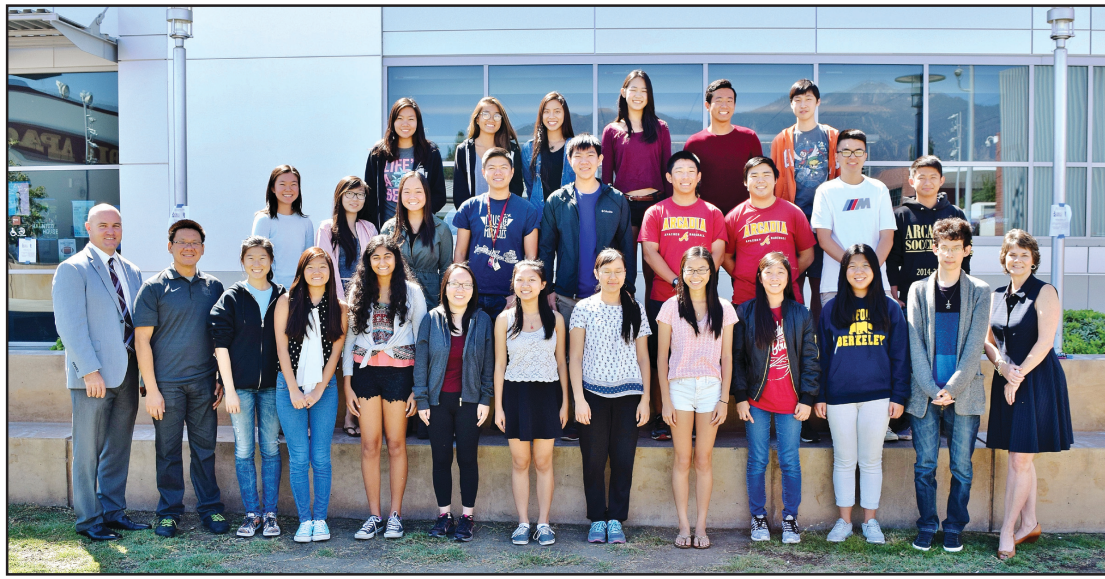

# 27 Arcadia High Students Named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists

ARCADIA - A remarkable 27 students from Arcadia High School have been named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists. This prestigious recognition represents less than one percent of high school seniors in the United States. The semifinalists will have an opportunity to compete for roughly 7,500 National Merit Scholarships worth about \$33 million.

"Going into the test, I wasn't sure what to expect, because the class of 2017 was the first to take the redesigned PSAT/NMSQT," said Arcadia High Senior Simone Chu. "I'm really glad that the education I've received in AUSD prepared me for anything and everything that might come my way--and I'm ecstatic to have been named a National Merit Semifinalist! The long wait for results was nerve-wracking, but finding out that the work I put in had paid off made it all worthwhile."

Approximately 1.6 million juniors in more than 22,000 high schools entered the 2017 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2015 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), which served as an initial screening of applicants. Of the 16,000 semifinalists named, about 15,000 are expected to advance to the finalist level. Last year all 15 Arcadia High School

semifinalists were named finalists. In 2014 all 31 Apaches who were named semifinalists were also named finalists. The same trend occurred in 2013 with the 22 Arcadia High students who were recognized.

"This is always such an exciting and distinguished honor for our students," said Dr. David Vannasall, Superintendent of Arcadia Unified School District.

"It also speaks volumes to the quality of teachers we are fortunate to have throughout the entire district."

To become a finalist, the semifinalists and their high schools must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the semifinalist's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities,

employment, honors and awards received, and satisfy other academic criteria.

More than half of the finalists will be awarded a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar distinction. In February the finalists will be notified, and scholarships will be awarded starting in April and concluding in July.

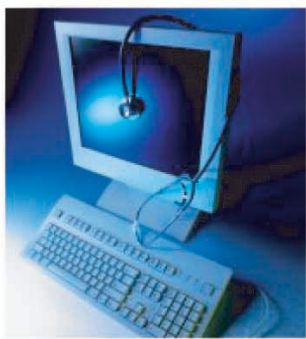

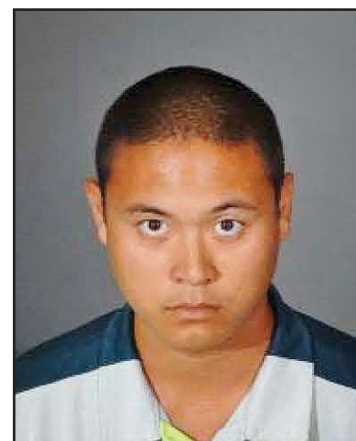
Captain Curley will assume

LA PUENTE - A party in La Puente, where it has been stated, that gang members were attending, broke into a fight that spilled into the street in the 15200 block of Flagstaff Street in La Puente.

Around 11 p.m. Saturday night Sept 17 at a party at the house became violent when two men got into a fight. The fight continued until it got into the street when one man tried to kill the other man with a knife and stabbed him.

The fight was only a few blocks from the Sheriff's sub-station

when they got calls and responded to the area. Deputies found the stabbed victim who was around 20 years old but not identified. Paramedics were able to stabilize him and transport him to a hospital. He is expected to survive.

The suspect was described as a Latino man in his 20s, with a beard, about 5 feet 9 inches tall and weighing 250 pounds. Deputies suspect the stabbing may have been gang-related.

Event features keynote address by president of No Excuses University

BALDWIN PARK - Baldwin Park Unified's 10th annual College Fair will provide families with college and career guidance through workshops, panels featuring alumni and their parents, and visits with college representatives on Saturday, **September 24** at Sierra Vista High School.

The event, which typically draws more than 1,000 students and their families, features programs that address the needs of high school, middle and elementary students who are exploring college and career choices.

This year's keynote address will be given by Dr. Dan Lopez, president of No Excuses University, a program that fosters the creation of a college-going culture at public schools.

"Our college fair offers an inclusive array of options for students to consider, from our excellent local community colleges and career training programs to extraordinary colleges and universities in California and across the U.S.," Superintendent Froilan

This year's workshops include guidance on filling out the University of California application and its series of short essays, private and out of state college options, a financial aid overview and information for undocumented students who qualify for programs under California's Dream Act.

One panel features graduates from each Baldwin Park Unified high school who are now attending college; another features parents of former students who now attend college.

In addition, representatives of 21 colleges have already confirmed their attendance, ranging from Rio Hondo College to Harvard and from UC Santa Barbara to USC.

Career fields are also well represented, with a panel scheduled to discuss fields in information technology and representatives attending from Baldwin Park Fire, Baldwin Park Police, the U.S. Army and the Marine

Corps. Representatives from Baldwin Park Adult and Community Education will be on hand to discuss its career training programs in barbering, cosmetology, culinary arts, medical pharmacy technician, HVAC systems and automotive technology.

The day includes entertainment by Sierra Vista High School's music programs and food sales benefitting campus clubs.

"It's truly overwhelming how many resources are available at this one single event," Board of Education President Christina Lucero said. ## Azusa Library Empowers Residents with Free Citizenship Classes

AZUSA - Azusa City Library's Inspired Citizenship Program is empowering residents by creating a pathway to citizenship. According to the U.S. Census, 31 percent of Azusa's population was born outside of the United States. Immigrants often face barriers to citizenship given their low or interrupted education and limited English proficiency. Inspired Citizenship helps residents break barriers to fully engage in their community as U.S. citizens.

Citizenship applicants must be able to speak, read and write enough English to pass the naturalization exam. The citizenship classes concentrate on civic and history lessons. Students gain

knowledge and understanding of the fundamentals of U.S. history and government. Students are encouraged to attend a citizenship class in combination with an English as a Second Language (ESL) class where they can focus on their English skills.

The Inspired Citizenship Program also partners with community resources such as legal clinics to help residents complete the naturalization application and to answer questions. Our residents benefit significantly from these services.

Citizenship Classes are free and advance registration is not required. Classes are held on Tuesday mornings from 8:30 AM

to 10:30 AM, and on Tuesday evenings from 6:15 PM to 8:15 PM.

Volunteers --- The Program is seeking volunteer adult tutors for both the ESL and Citizenship programs. Past volunteers have described the experience as "life-changing" - for both them and their students. Tutors are not required to speak a language besides English or have any prior experience. Training is provided.

After graduation, there will be an opportunity for the students to do a ride-along with an officer to see firsthand what it is like to be on patrol. # School Spin is Costing Billions to Trillions

How many school bonds, committing how much money, does it take to make California school systems the best in the nation? Or even just provide our California kids with a competitive edge going into college or out into the real world?

In June this year, there were 45 local school bonds on the primary ballot with a face value of \$6 BILLION. 40 of those 45 bond requests were approved.

November ballot will be no different. 184 school districts I've heard are asking for \$25 BIL-

LION – face value – in school improvement bonds. That's face value, not the actual cost of those bonds. Rule of thumb on bonds, actual cost is almost double the amount of face value when you add in the interest.

On the November ballot, aside from the local requests made by school districts, is a \$9 BILLION bond requested by the State of California. That \$9 BILLION turns out to be a total cost of \$17.6 BILLION or \$8.6 BILLION in interest over 35 years. That bond will cost the California general fund \$500,000 a year initially, increasing in later years.

That's general fund money that will not go to law enforcement, money that will not keep criminals in jails and prisons and not be used to build more incarceration units, leading to more and continual early release of criminals. Question – how old will your children and grandchildren be when that bond is paid off in 35 years?

When Prop 13 passed limiting property taxes, there was a provision allowing school districts to pass additional taxes through voter-approved bonds but only if a supermajority or 2/3 voted to pass the measure. In November

2000, voters passed Prop 39 reducing the 2/3 requirement for passage to 55% thereby making it easier for these bonds to get approved. General obligation bonds are for capital improvements only, not for staffing or operational costs.

One local school district in a June ballot measure managed to get an \$850 MILLION bond passed that will end up costing property owners in that district \$1.9 TRILLION when paid off. While property owners were promised an estimated maximum of \$25 annually per \$100,000 of assessed property value, were they reminded they already pay \$38.25 per \$100,000 on a previous bond? That's \$63 and some change each year on their property tax bill for the next 25 years for each \$100,000 their home is worth. And if they live in a college district and unified school district both with a bond on the ballot, how much more will eventually end up on their tax property tax bill?

To sell the voters on one district's bond they used a "little spin" or sympathy grabbing words like "improving resources for vets", "expanding partner-

ships with area employers to fill local job placement" and "meeting earthquake safety standards". You need a TRILLION dollar bond issue for the first two on the list? And, the third means you've allowed students, our kids, to go to a school that doesn't meet earthquake standards? Why is this school still open? And, the one reason that really fascinated me – "When Secretary of State Hillary Clinton visited, it was really difficult for us to host large groups of community members and students". Of course none of those "spin" items, including Hillary Clinton, appeared on the official bond statement.

I found a website thanks to HJTA (Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association) called Big Bad Bonds TM. They have listed all the school districts, including college districts, and what they have and are proposing in the way of bonds. They also warn to watch out for the buzz words, "the spin", used to sell these projects like leaky roofs, asbestos and aging facilities. They encourage you to read "the plan" which your school board should have adopted and should explain ex-

actly what you are voting for and should get for the money your board is asking you to spend.

Introducing themselves and the site as the Clearinghouse Opposing the Coming Deluge in School and Community College Bonds, Big Bad Bonds want all to be aware:

*"There is a full-fledged, multi-billion industry that has grown up around school construction bonds, primarily Proposition 39 bonds because of the low rate of voter approval needed. Some of these firms are consultants or advisors whose main purpose is to manipulate voters into passing bonds from which the firms profit immensely. The starting point for these firms is not what a district needs, but how much it can persuade the local taxpayers to buy off on. Therefore, I classify these firms as parasites."*

If your district is looking at a bond, don't shut them out but ask questions, look at the plan and don't settle for a lot of "spin" from a consultant firm turning big bucks and asking you to pay for it. Check it out: <http://www.bigbadbonds.com>.

## Our Vote Does NOT Count!!!

For those of you that think that our vote counts, you better think again. The Electoral College is a total of 538 votes. Breaking this down, 435 are Congressional votes. This covers about a population area of 710,000 people (today). Each state has 2 Senators that can vote and the District of Columbia with 3 votes. Total is 538 votes and this is what actually votes for a president. A candidate can win the vote of the people by getting the majority of the votes, but that won't guarantee the presidency.

Here are some examples, and this isn't something new, as our history shows. In the year 2000, George Bush and Al Gore. Did you know that the majority of the people voted for Gore, but the Electoral College voted in Bush? Gore had 50.9 million votes and Bush had 50.4 million votes and he won. Electoral College vote was 271 Bush and 266 Gore. So it appears that a few Senators didn't care for Al Gore. Our vote did not count.

Back in the late 1800s, there were also controversies. In 1888 Ben Harrison beat Grover Cleveland, but Cleveland won the popular vote. In 1876 Rutherford Hayes won over Samuel Tilden, when Tilden won a ton more of the popular votes.

One interesting election was between Kennedy and Nixon. Kennedy had 303 Electoral votes and Nixon had 219 votes. Kennedy barely won the popular vote by around 100,000 votes out of the 68 million votes cast by the people. Why such a "huge" spread of electoral votes???

Here is how it works... There is no Constitutional provision or Federal law that requires Electors to vote according to the results of the popular vote in their states. Some states, however, require Electors to cast their votes according to the popular vote. These pledges fall into two categories-Electors bound by state law and those bound by pledges to political parties.

1. The outcome of the vote in each state determines a slate of electors who then, in turn, make the actual choice of president and

vice president. Each state has as many electors as it has senators and members of the House of Representatives, for a total of 538. (The District of Columbia gets three electors even though it has no representation in Congress.)

2. In December, the electors meet in their respective state capitols to cast their ballots for president and vice president. States may or may not require their electors to vote with the popular majority, and they may or may not give all of their electors to the winner of the statewide popular vote.

Isn't that just great? NOW, here is something else you may not know... Your vote does NOT count when it comes to the Senate and Assembly. Here is an example. The City of West Covina had on the ballot to "form voting districts within the city". This would mean that each district would have an elected councilmember... Only "that" district would vote for their own personal representative. This would break West Covina up into four or five individual sections independent of each other. Therefore, the people would be subject to taxation without representation. Some districts would get funding from the city coffers and the people outside of that district would have "no say so" on how THEIR tax money is spent. This is wrong. The people saw this and this ballot proposition was hugely voted down. They clearly said "NO" to this horrible idea. Assemblyman Roger Hernandez supported this idea and when it was voted down by the people he authored and/or supported an assembly bill that would require cities with a certain population to be required to

do districting within their city whether the people wanted it or not. This appeared to be more of a racial implementation because of statements thrown around that certain people were not represented. Hernandez was once on the council for West Covina. He claimed that "His people were not represented on the West Covina Council." The fact of the matter is, all races seemed to have been represented one time or another.

When people didn't care for that statement, feeling that it was racist in nature, the tone change. In an attempt to clean up the statement, it was referred to the South-side of West Covina. This was questioned as there have been in fact people from the south-side elected to council including Roger Hernandez himself. The problem is people from that area don't run for council. The people of West Covina will be forced into Districting with the passing of an Assembly Bill. ## On Living With Losers

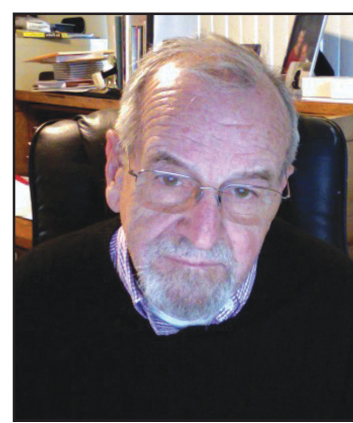

## School and Drug Usage - What Can Be Done?

For my grandkids and others, going back to school is a time of excitement and potential as they reconnect with friends and get back to a learning environment. But for some, especially college students, returning to school can have a dark side as alcohol consumption and drug abuse continue to adversely affect many students' school experience. According to a recent report by the US Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, on any given day 1.2 million full-time college students drink alcohol and more than 703,000 are using marijuana. Consumption by high school students is also a concern. And statistics show that US prescription drug overdoses kill more people than car crashes.

Although for years studies have encouraged moderation in consumption, recently the call to

address these disruptive behaviors before they develop at early ages has become more pointed.

I'm sure each of us can understand the myriad pressures that a student faces - to fit in, get that scholarship, perform well athletically, etc. To help, I've always been in the designated driver group. From that point of support, I have always had a deep desire to help those around me, because I've found that turning to spiritual truths about our identity leads to lasting health and satisfaction.

A few years ago, I explored spiritual ideas to help those struggling with painkiller addiction. While the Food and Drug Administration supports a shift to medication alternatives, and holistic and even regular medical practitioners advocate using alternatives to pain medication, I have found holding to spiritual truths

in prayer, and sharing these truths - such as one's innate innocence and freedom as the expression of divine Love - able to bring about complete healing.

For example, years ago my wife and I were leading a group of students through Europe, and on the last evening an adult leader from another American group contacted us and told us that he had a girl they were preparing to send home, as she had been troublesome. She had been drinking and doing everything she shouldn't while on the trip. They knew she was of the same faith as my wife and I, and requested that we go to her room and try to help her. We went to her room and found her ill and semi-conscious from alcohol consumption. As we prayed about this situation, we realized we had to see the pure, spiritual identity of this girl - created and cherished by

God. We took out a copy of the Christian Science Sentinel, which included an account of healing of a person in a similar situation, and crossed out that person's name and put this girl's name in its place. We left the article under her pillow, and continued to cherish her spiritual identity as we traveled back to America, knowing her group would get her safely back to the States.

A year later back home, we attended a church that we hadn't been to in quite some time. As we walked into the edifice, this girl that we had met in France was ushering. She came down the aisle and gave us each a big hug, and after the service she told us how she had awakened from her stupor in Paris the morning after our visit and was a changed person. Her parents told us that the only similarity to the daughter

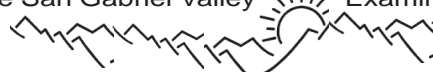
that left them for Europe was the picture on her driver's license. She had found her real, God-given self without a single vestige of drug use or immorality remaining.

That is one specific example of the joy and freedom that spiritual discovery can offer students. "It is our ignorance of God, the divine Principle, which produces apparent discord, and the right understanding of Him restores harmony," wrote Mary Baker Eddy in Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, a book that explains the relationship between spirituality and wellbeing. Eddy found that prayer can help us look beyond a limited, materialistic sense of self - a self apart from God, and that this is integral to restoring and maintaining health.

As this school year begins, my hope is that the spiritual dimen-

sion of each student's identity be cultivated in conjunction with his or her academic and intellectual abilities. Looking beyond the physical, social, and emotional aspects and bolstering the spiritual identity of the person would go a long way toward reducing the perceived need for and use of stimulants, thus improving individual health while imparting a satisfying feeling of joy and freedom.

# What Can We Expect From The September FOMC Meeting?

The next meeting is coming fast and the FOMC is once again falling victim to Murphy's Law. After weeks of jawboning markets into acceptance of a September hike, its justification has significantly diminished in the past week.

>Car sales. August vehicle sales were down 4.6% from July, meaning consumption likely fell, too.

>The jobs report. There were plenty of jobs in August to justify a hike based on what the Fed says, but not enough based on what the Fed has done in the past. The 151k payroll rise is not a deal breaker, but reduced the likelihood of tightening.

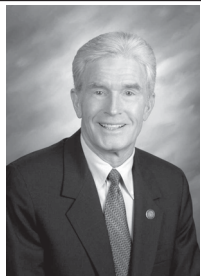
>The Institute for Supply Management numbers were super weak. These should have been a deal breaker if not for recent volatility casting doubt on their usefulness. A drop of a point or two in one or the other index is one thing. A seven-year low in the economy-weighted combined composite index is quite another.

>The Beige Book was awful. Richmond Fed President Lacker suggested the FOMC should ignore the ISM survey, and perhaps they will. Ignoring the Fed's own Beige Book survey will be more difficult as it sent a much clearer-than-usual message. After all, it's not just the book's cover that's beige. The contents are typically such a mishmash of conflicting signals, rendering its guidance boringly directionless.

Not this time, however. As Bloomberg's Richard Yamarone wrote, "Sitting on the sidelines would be the most prudent move given the lackluster details of this Fed report." According to the survey, consumer spending ranged from "modest gains" to "slowed noticeably." Prices ranged from "unchanged" to "modestly higher." The most telling result, however, was the perception of overall growth in the twelve districts, which was "unchanged," "flat," and "little changed" from the last period, when the economy grew just 1.1%.

>Stocks. The extreme volatility we have seen recently means little to the Fed in itself. If stocks

continue to trend lower, it will be one more reason to pass on a hike at this meeting.

Bottom line: It's not over until it's over with the FOMC, but a truly data dependent Fed should stand down unless there's compelling strength in the few remaining reports between now and the next meeting.

**Greenspan Has Retired but His Ghost Still Haunts the Fed**

Markets self-correct. So, why doesn't the Fed trust the labor market to self-correct? It's a question free market loving Alan Greenspan asked - rhetorically - in one of his first appearances as Fed Chairman.

He admitted no one really knew for sure, but then explained the prevailing theory: Wage inflation is different from other types of inflation. Think of rents as an example of normal price inflation. When rental demand exceeds supply, rents rise. But the rate of increase - the rental inflation rate - tends to stabilize. It isn't the same for wages, Greenspan claimed.

This speech was in the mid-80s, early in the first business-cycle expansion after Paul Volcker's painful three-year battle against inflation. Not surprisingly, Greenspan was more than a little preoccupied with the mistakes leading to the prior decade's inflation and the steep price paid to rein it in. The Fed still considers the cumulative policy decisions leading to double digit inflation its second biggest institutional mistake after tightening in the 1930s. Greenspan thought wage inflation is different because wages are income, and income powers consumption.

Hence, wage inflation might

fuel price inflation, and that price inflation might lead to more wage inflation. Economists call this a wage-price spiral. It was convincing at the time, and while there is still no statistical proof of the theory working over the long term, it underpins the Fed's fear of full employment.

And yet, the wage-price spiral hasn't happened since the 1980s. There was no inflation in the late '90s (Greenspan's "conundrum") and the only inflation in the late '00s was cost-push inflation easily traced to China's insatiable appetite for commodities. The Fed was able to keep rates lower than they expected in the '90s as a result, and could have kept them lower in the '00s too, as quietly acknowledged in recent downward revisions to the Fed's historical natural rate estimates.

Greenspan offered conjectural explanations for lower-than-expected late-cycle inflation - the global savings glut, China exporting deflation, etc. - that are also unproven but are also firmly woven into the Fed's policymaking DNA. In the meantime, the labor market is already showing signs of self-correcting.

The unemployment rate is stabilizing, labor force participation is stabilizing, too, and immigration is picking up as job opportunities grow. There is a little wage inflation, but there is not much. As for price inflation, it remains stubbornly low.

Of course, preventing inflation is not the only reason to hike rates. There's always the risk of too low interest rates fueling an asset bubble. Setting monetary policy is difficult, fraught with uncertainty and inevitable tradeoffs.

Keeping rates low risks asset price appreciation and upsets savers; raising rates risks a slowdown in the real economy and upsets job hunters. There is no silver bullet.

# Your Money - Ask Julia

*I know that term life insurance is the least expensive, and that whole life insurance is the most expensive. Is there anything in-between?*

What my clients like to do is get a life insurance policy that can, like whole life, build a cash account, and then add to it a term life insurance policy to cover the "what ifs" during the earlier years of life. The "what-ifs" usually include the possible loss of a breadwinner's income that is spent for housing and college educations. When the house is paid for, and the kids are through college, the term policy can expire with the whole-life-like policy still in effect.

*The stock market is doing okay, but I'm older now, and I don't have time to recover from another big loss. How can I keep that from happening to me again?*

If you leave your money where it is, you stand the chance of the same thing happening again. If you move your money to CDs and Money Market accounts, your money is safer, but when you factor in the low rates, taxes, and inflation, you're probably losing money. There are new and better places for your money. When you look at these, don't get caught up in "semantic biases." Here's what I mean. What's the first thing that comes to mind when I say, "Nitroglycerine." About half of you will say, "Explosives." The other half of you will say, "Heart-attack, life-saving medication." Neither is wrong; you're just expressing your "semantic bias." When looking at different places for

your money, it really doesn't matter what the product is named - focus on what it can do for you. The good news is that there are a couple of much safer places for you to put your money.

*Is there an investment that I can rely on to get payments for my whole retirement lifetime?*

You have several choices - some safer than others. My clients usually either decide to invest in fixed/fixed-indexed annuities, or with fixed-indexed universal life insurance. Both of these product lines have changed tremendously in the last 5 years. Insurance companies that issue of these product lines came to realize the negative points that scare folks away from investing in them, so they have re-written the book. Now these products are packed with a variety of living benefits, and most, if not all, carry a promise that you can receive income for life.

*We want to start a college savings plan for our children, but we've heard that some plans, including the 529, are failing. What else is there?*

There are a couple of ways for you to achieve your savings goal.

One way requires an investment of as little as \$50 per month, and allows you to take a month or two off when money gets tight. (This is especially convenient for Christmas and for teachers who don't have income for a couple of months.) # Duarte USD Receives Award With City Of Hope For Excellence In Educational Pathways

**Duarte** - Together with the City of Hope, Duarte Unified School District (DUSD) was honored with the Excellence in Educational Pathways Award by the San Gabriel Valley Economic Partnership at the organization's 25th Awards Gala held at the Sheraton Fairplex Hotel & Conference Center in Pomona, Calif. on Saturday, September 10, 2016.

DUSD was recognized for the innovative STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) programs that are currently being offered in partnership with the City of Hope Cancer Treatment and Research Center for students attending Duarte Unified schools in grades kindergarten - 12.

"It is a tremendous honor to receive the San Gabriel Valley Economic Partnership's Excellence in Educational Pathways Award with the City of Hope," stated Dr. Mucirino, Superintendent of Duarte USD.

"It is rewarding that we are being recognized for establishing a true partnership between a public school district and world renowned medical institution to provide authentic STEM learning delivered by industry experts in collaboration with our teaching staff. Together, we are creating the next generation of scientists, technicians, engineers and mathematicians.

"I am also excited that we will be expanding on the success of our current partnership to enlarge our programs with City of Hope to offer even more opportunities for the students of Duarte."

The goal of the collaboration between DUSD and City of Hope was to create a pipeline of students (especially underrepresented minority students) interested, engaged and prepared for biomedical research as a possible college and career choice.

This led to the development of a two-stage research education program for rising high school juniors and seniors, a professional development program for K-12 DUSD teachers and the establishment of a K-8 research education program now known as the San Gabriel Valley Science Education Partnership Award (SGV SEPA) Collaborative.

The SGV SEPA Collaborative programs offered by DUSD and City of Hope are funded in part by a five-year, \$1.3 million grant from the National Institutes of Health.

Other offerings resulting from the unique DUSD and City of Hope partnership include the development of a genetics curriculum for elementary and middle school students. The curriculum consists of three units: Unit 1 for

grades K-2, Unit 2 for grades 3-5 and Unit 3 for grades 6-8. Each unit contains four to five lessons. The genetics curriculum has been piloted in a DUSD elementary school, and is being finalized. The resulting curriculum will be available to all schools and districts.

Other professional development benefits afforded to DUSD instructors through the collaborative are teaching science in the context of Next Generation Science Standards and Common Core State Standards, and laboratory techniques and inquiry-based experiments for middle and high school classrooms provided by City of Hope staff.

The SGV SEPA Collaborative currently has programs in place for second, fifth and eighth graders in DUSD, which are incorporated into the students' curriculum and include school visitations and academic field trips to the City of Hope campus.

City of Hope scientists visit every second grade classroom to teach the concepts of genetics and inheritance, and introduce the students to careers in research. As a follow up, second grade students go to City of Hope at the end of the school year to learn more about genetics and to tour the City of Hope campus.

Every fifth grade student visits City of Hope to do hands-on, problem-solving activities related to the human body, and in eighth grade, every student visits City of Hope to solve medical mysteries through the use of inquiry based hands-on activities and critical-thinking skills.

In the Fall of 2015, the SGV SEPA Collaborative began offering a Girls Only! Science Technology Engineering and Math (GO! STEM) club for grades 3-5. The goal of the club is to engage girls in STEM activities, encourage girls to take courses in STEM fields and to consider pursuing STEM careers.

The SEPA Collaborative also has two programs for rising high school Juniors and Seniors. The

Summer Research Program provides students the opportunity to conduct innovative, original research in City of Hope's Community Teaching Laboratory during an eight-week program that runs from June to early August.

Students meet two days a week for three hours each day and learn to give high-quality presentations about their work and hear about college and career pathways in the sciences. Students who successfully complete the program receive a \$480 stipend. There is also a SGV SEPA year-long program for interested students who are partnered with a mentor-scientist in a field that the students are interested in exploring in greater depth.

DUSD Juniors and Seniors can also participate in the Career Technical Education (CTE) summer mentorship program at City of Hope that pairs DUSD students with staff members in all job positions at City of Hope to gain experience working in a variety of departments including human resources, library services and marketing.

"The City of Hope SGV SEPA Program is honored to receive the Excellence in Educational Pathways Award from the SGV Economic Partnership, stated Marisa Bowers, SEPAC Program Coordinator.

"During the last 4 years we have developed a close partnership with Duarte Unified School District, and would like to thank the District for working with us to reach thousands of Duarte students. We look forward to continuing and further strengthening this partnership as we move forward and develop new programs."

Additional programs resulting from this signature partnership include science summer camps and science Saturday programming offered by City of Hope for DUSD students throughout the year. Karl Benjamin was a painter of vibrant geometric abstractions and was known as a

"Hard Edge painter" whose work reflected the relationship between color and form. He enjoyed early success in the 1950s with showings at museums and community galleries in Southern California, but the exhibit that put his work under an international spotlight and gave it a lasting label was "Four Abstract Classicists" in 1959.

Subsequently, Benjamin produced a critically acclaimed body of work that explores a vast array of color relationships. The work in "Close Values" is notable in that it comes entirely from Benjamin's family and friends, and breaks out of his usual practices while still exemplifying his style. He was also a teacher and taught public elementary and middle school. He was later named the artist-in-residence at Pomona College and taught art classes at the Claremont Graduate School.

Because ITT Tech was accredited in a different manner than California Community Colleges, transferring credits from ITT Tech to Mt. San Antonio College will be challenging. However, administrators believe ITT Tech students can have a second chance by earning credit for equivalent Mt. SAC courses through a process known as credit-by-exam.

"This is the right thing to do," said Dr. William T. Scroggins, president and CEO of Mt. SAC. "When it comes down to it, Mt. SAC's mission

is to educate students and prepare them for rewarding careers. We share that mission with ITT Tech. They couldn't complete their commitment to these students, but we can help pick up the ball and make sure they can finish their education and earn a good living."

Mt. San Antonio College, a community college in Walnut, Calif., is working with the California Community College Chancellor's Office, U.S. Department of Education, the state Bureau of Private Postsecondary Education as well as ITT Tech administrators to assist the displaced students.

While the fall semester has already started, displaced students can begin planning their transition to Mt. SAC immedi-

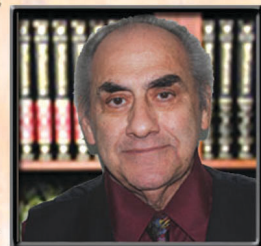
