

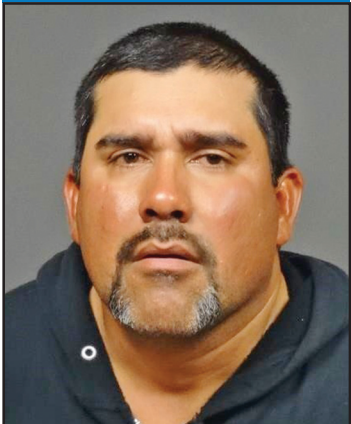

# Early Results of Antibody Testing Suggest Number of COVID-19 Infections Far Exceeds Number of Confirmed Cases in LA County

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - USC and the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) released preliminary results from a collaborative scientific study that suggests infections from the new coronavirus are far more widespread - and the fatality rate much lower - in L.A. County than previously thought.

The results are from the first round of an ongoing study by USC researchers and Public Health officials. They will be conducting antibody testing over time on a series of representative samples of adults to determine the scope and spread of the pandemic across the county.

Based on results of the first round of testing, the research team estimates that approximately 4.1% of the county's adult population has antibody to the virus. Adjusting this estimate for statistical margin of error implies about 2.8% to 5.6% of the county's adult population has antibody to the virus- which translates to approximately 221,000 to 442,000 adults in the county who have had the infection. That estimate is 28 to 55 times higher



than the 7,994 confirmed cases of COVID-19 reported to the county by the time of the study in early April. The number of COVID-related deaths in the county has now surpassed 600.

"We haven't known the true extent of COVID-19 infections in our community because we have only tested people with symptoms, and the availability of

tests has been limited," said lead investigator Neeraj Sood, a USC professor of public policy at USC Price School for Public Policy and senior fellow at USC Schaeffer Center for Health Policy and Economics. "The estimates also suggest that we might have to recalibrate disease prediction models and rethink pub-

lic health strategies."

The results have important implications for public health efforts to control the local epidemic.

"These results indicate that many persons may have been unknowingly infected and at risk of transmitting the virus to others," said Dr. Barbara Ferrer, director

of the L.A. County Department of Public Health. "These findings underscore the importance of expanded polymerase chain reaction (PCR) testing to diagnose those with infection so they can be isolated and quarantined, while also maintaining the broad social distancing interventions."

The antibody test is helpful for identifying past infection, but a PCR test is required to diagnose current infection.

"Though the results indicate a lower risk of death among those with infection than was previously thought, the number of COVID-related deaths each day continues to mount, highlighting the need for continued vigorous prevention and control efforts," said Dr. Paul Simon, chief science officer at L.A. County Department of Public Health and co-lead on the study.

The study's results have not yet been peer reviewed by other scientists. The researchers plan to test new groups of participants every few weeks in coming months to gauge the pandemic's trajectory in the region.

## A Partnership with Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center Results in Optimum Design of PPE's for Healthcare Workers

DOWNEY - The rush is on to provide protective gear to essential workers as COVID-19 cases rise. Students at ArtCenter College of Design are working around the clock to 3D print and assemble face shields for hospitals in L.A. County and around the world.

After a two-week Designstorm conducted in partnership with Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center and funded by a grant from VentureWell, ArtCenter, students began production to create the ideal face shield for medical professionals.

Informed by the results of the Designstorm, students took the initiative to launch a website as a resource for anyone who wants to get involved. Businesses or households with a 3D printer and the right materials are encouraged to join the project. The goal is to expand the operation and generate more donations of materials in order to provide as many face shields as possible.

The site, shieldmakers.org provides outsourced designs and instructions. Visitors select a design and fabrication

method depending on what type of 3D printing equipment they have on hand.

Many local corporations have supplied funds, materials and volunteers to help boost production. Anyone willing to help is encouraged to visit the site to find out what is needed and how to become involved.

Shield Maker Facts:  
The students, known as Shieldmakers, have printed, assembled and supplied approximately 900 shields so far in Los Angeles County. Facilitated by one student's global network, a manufacturer in Jakarta has used the open source designs to make more than 2,000 protective face shields for area hospitals:

3. LAC+USC Medical Center
4. Adventist Health, Glendale, Calif.
5. Kaiser Permanente
6. Huntington Hospital, Pasadena, Calif.

The Numbers:

- 900 face shields created
- Shield Makers is on track to produce 5,000 within the next few weeks
- Anticipated output of 300 to 400 produced each day, once running at full capacity
- 30 ArtCenter College of Design students are dedicated to the Shield Makers project
- Additional students at Caltech and California State University Dominguez Hills have assisted with the effort
- 25 donated 3D printers are set up in a warehouse at Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center producing 200+ parts per day

## Michael Allawos Takes Reins as New Glendora Mayor

GLENDORA - Mayor Pro-Tem Michael Allawos was unanimously selected by his colleagues last week to replace retiring Mayor Judy Nelson as the new Mayor of Glendora, the Pride of the Foothills.

On Tuesday April 14th at the Council meeting, it marked the first time in history that the changing-of-the-guard ceremony was not conducted in person at Glendora City Hall, as Glendorans joined the rest of the nation in social distancing and virtual civic meetings in response to the Coronavirus 19 pandemic.

Mayor Allawos was elected to the City Council in 2017 on his second try. His election was preceded by decades of his community service as a leader with the Leroy Haynes Boy's Home, Knights of Columbus, and St. Dorothy's Church; as well as grass roots community groups advocating for preservation of the historic Fairmount Pioneer Cemetery and saving Glendora's historic high building standards and low-density zoning from outsiders trying to build massive, dense new developments in our small town.

Allawos is a native Californian who has lived his entire life in Los Angeles County. He was born and raised in Downey and then moved with his family to

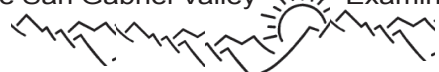

# COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma And New Treatments

As the researchers are still scrambling to find answers to the ongoing COVID 19 crisis, there seems to be a glimmer of hope regarding a bridging treatment before an effective medication or vaccine is found. Historically Convalescent Plasma treatment has been used in the world pandemics including Spanish flu, SARS, MERS, Ebola, H1N1 outbreaks with encouraging outcomes. The most promising results were revealed from 1950's Argentine Hemorrhagic fever (Weil's Disease) where the death rates drastically dropped from 43% to under 3% with convalescent plasma. Weil's disease, also known as Leptospirosis, is transmitted to humans by small rodents. It was also used in Diphtheria (in 1892), Scarlet fever (in 1920) Pertussis (till 1970) which were all bacterial infections that caused deadly outbreaks.

The researchers are making great strides with other definitive treatments as well. Phase 3 randomized clinical studies published on Gilead's Remdesivir, the antiviral medication that was used in Ebola and SARS outbreaks, showed early promise. University of Chicago study showed robust results which further complimented a previous small study published in NEJM with 68% clinical improvement in China. Randomized trials involving alternative medications like Ivermectin, Nitazoxanide, BCG vaccine etc. are conducted in various centers with some encouraging results so far. Hydroxychloroquine continue to be useful in hospitalized patients with Zinc sulfate and high dose Vitamin C supplementing their action. The randomized clinical trials conducted on Hydroxychloroquine did not show robust results thus far.

Every recovered patient of COVID 19 harbors a pool of neutralizing antibodies that could potentially save 3-4 patients who are sickened by the virus and not fully recovered. Their plasma is a precious commodity rich in life-saving antibodies. Because we are still in infancy era of other treatments, we need to encourage more and more recovered patients to contact American Red Cross and other facilities to donate plasma. The optimum time for such donations is 28 days after recovery and the donors need to be free the active disease which can be confirmed with two negative PCR tests. They also need to have adequate neutralizing antibody

gently on vaccines which can be available as early as September 2020. The NIH in collaboration with Moderna biotech company already commenced their vaccine trials in Seattle few weeks ago. Unfortunately, we are already hearing negative sentiments about mass vaccinations without clear science to back them up.

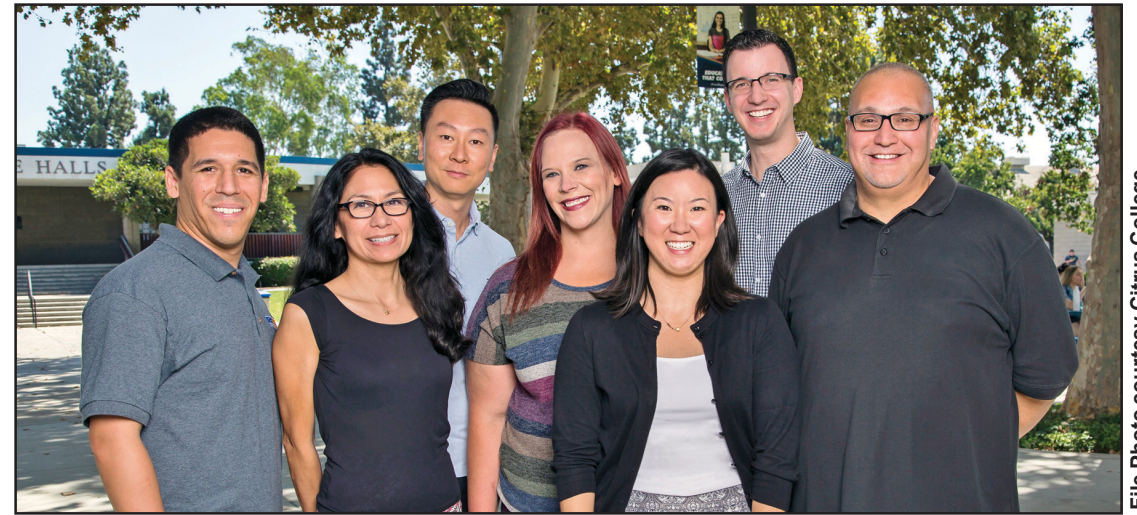
In addition to recent promising data from Remdesivir and convalescent plasma trials, we shifted and drifted our critical care protocols in severe COVID 19 patients with encouraging results. We transitioned from early intubation to step-wise use of oxygen delivery systems like high-flow oxygen; thereby minimizing ventilator use and ventilator-related complications. The intensivists are applying proper anticoagulation measures to COVID patients in order to prevent microthrombi formation that could potentially cause renal and other end-organ damage. All these vital and timely measures are saving valuable lives.

## Board of Supervisors Expands Eviction Moratorium, Rent Freeze to Protect Additional Renters Across LA County

*Temporary Rent Freeze Protection Now Covers Mobilehomes in Unincorporated Areas*

**LOS ANGELES COUNTY** – On Tuesday, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors issued an executive order which expands an existing temporary rent freeze and moratorium on evictions in parts of Los Angeles County in response to the coronavirus/COVID-19 health emergency.

The new order expands the temporary eviction moratorium to cover all residential and commercial tenants in Los Angeles County, except those who live or conduct business in cities that have already enacted their own eviction moratoria.

The moratorium includes a ban on evictions for:

- Nonpayment of rent, if the tenant can show they have been financially impacted by the health emergency
- No Fault reasons, such as owner/relative move-in or Ellis Act evictions

• Violations due to additional occupants, pets or nuisance related to COVID-19

The expanded temporary rent freeze now prohibits owners of mobilehome parks in unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County from increasing the space rent for their tenants during the moratorium period.

These actions, which are retroactive from March 4 to May 31, 2020, unless extended, are the latest in a series of protections the Board has enacted to protect renters in Los Angeles County, many of whom have been severely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Los Angeles County Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (DCBA), at the directive of the Board of Supervisors, will work to educate renters and property owners of these new rules.

“Renters in Los Angeles County have faced extraordinary financial difficulties due to the COVID-19 health emergency. Many tenants simply cannot pay their rent on time and desperately need the additional protections the Board of Supervisors have issued today in order to remain housed,” said Joseph M. Nicchitta, Director of DCBA. “Our department knows landlords are struggling, too. We are expanding our L.A. County Disaster Help Center services by providing foreclosure protection to assist mom-and-pop landlords in L.A. County.”

A partial list of today’s actions includes:

• Renters will have 12 months after the moratorium ends to pay any back rent (Previously six months)

• Landlords may not impose any new passthroughs or charge interest or late fees for unpaid rent during the moratorium period

• Landlords may not attempt to collect interest and late fees incurred during the moratorium period after the Executive Order is terminated for renters covered by the Rent Stabilization Ordinance and the Mobilehome Rent Stabilization Ordinance

• Payment plans that allow landlords to accept partial payments from tenants during the moratorium are encouraged

• Tenants may provide self-certification of their inability to pay rent, and landlords must accept this as sufficient notice

• Landlords may not harass or intimidate tenants who choose to exercise their protections under this moratorium

## LA County WDACS Launch \$500,000 Employer Assistance Grant Fund

**LOS ANGELES COUNTY** - The Los Angeles County Department of Workforce Development, Aging and Community Services (WDACS), with support of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, announced that the LA County Employer Assistance Grant Fund launched on Wed., April 8. The LA County Employer Assistance Grant Fund will provide a total of \$500,000 to local businesses. Individual businesses may be awarded up to \$10,000 based on demonstrated need. Approximately 25% of awards will be reserved for social enterprises that demonstrate a need and ability to serve vulnerable populations. Applications will be processed on a first-come-first-served basis, and will close once 150 applications are received.

“The coronavirus pandemic has impacted residents and businesses throughout Los Angeles County,” said Supervisor Kathryn Barger. “It is vitally important that we pursue every resource available to support local business and help maintain good job opportunities throughout the region.”

“Thank you to Gov. Newsom and EDD for providing this critical funding for LA County’s businesses, and to the Board of Su-

pervisors for their support of this essential program,” said Otto Solorzano, Acting Director of WDACS. “The Employer Assistance Grant Fund will provide some of our local businesses with desperately needed capital at a critical time, allowing them to retain workers and remain in business. We are proud that the LA County Employer Assistance Grant Fund is the first of its kind to be offered in the State of California.”

In order to qualify to apply for the Employer Assistance Grant Fund, the business must:

- Be a for-profit corporation, partnership, or non-profit with a for-profit activity in Los Angeles County. Social enterprises and non-profit (501(c)3) firms qualify.
- Application review priority will be given to businesses in the unincorporated areas of LA County: <http://planning.lacounty.gov/znet>
- Have between 2 and 50 full-time employees. (Note: Applicants that serve high barrier and/or vulnerable populations may exclude transitional employees from this count).
- Have less than \$2,000,000 in gross receipts or annual revenue
- Demonstrate significant economic hardship as a result of COVID-19. (Businesses that have demonstrated evidence of a

loss of revenue of at least 20% will have met the burden of demonstrating significant economic hardship)

• Have been established at least one quarter prior to March 4, 2020 (on or before December 4, 2019)

• Be able to produce tax returns

Funding is not guaranteed. Factors that will be considered when determining grant awards will include (1) impact of the COVID-19 crisis; (2) best use/highest impact; (3) years in business operation; (4) number of employees impacted; and (5) ability to leverage alternate funds. Compliance with the grant will be monitored for three years.

Grant funding may be used for the following:

- Mortgage payments
  - Bridge funding to other lending or financial resources (e.g. SBA Payroll Protection)
  - Working capital costs
  - Inventory
  - Rent
  - Utility expenses
  - Other debt obligations incurred before the covered period
- Funds cannot be used to satisfy any outstanding tax liens, legal judgements, any lobbying activities, employee payroll, or fringe benefit expenses.

## Same-Day COVID-19 Tests Now Available For LA County Residents Showing COVID-19 Symptoms

**LOS ANGELES COUNTY** - Free, same-day tests are now available for all LA County residents who have symptoms of COVID-19. Symptoms include fever, cough, and difficulty breathing.

The following factors do not affect eligibility for a COVID-19 test:

- Immigration status
- Insurance status
- Age
- Underlying health issues

Health equity is central to Los Angeles County’s mission to build a network of free COVID-19 testing sites. There are currently 29 operational sites throughout the County. There are both drive-up and walk-up sites. To ensure the sites prioritize people who need it most, only people who are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 are eligible for these testing services at this time.

Appointments are necessary. Here are the steps for getting a test appointment:

- Visit the website [lacovidprod.service-now.com/rrs](http://lacovidprod.service-now.com/rrs)
- Answer a series of questions. The answers determine if you are eligible for an appointment.
- If you are eligible, you will

receive an appointment confirmation number by email.

• Bring the confirmation number and photo ID to your appointment.

• People with no access to the Internet can dial 2-1-1 for help making an appointment.

• People without a car can be tested as long as they have an appointment. The sites can accommodate pedestrians.

• There are NO walk-up appointments available for people who do not register.

Test results may take up to 3-4 days. Positive test results will be notified with a phone call. Negative test results will be notified by email.

## 11 Critical Home Inspection Traps to be Aware of Weeks Before Listing Your Glendora Home for Sale

**GLENDORA** - According to industry experts, there are over 33 physical problems that will come under scrutiny during a home inspection when your home is for sale. 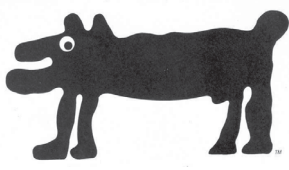

# Don't Blame Cities, County - Call Newsom

All cities have some homelessness and are concerned. But they didn't create the problem and don't have the resources or the authority to solve the problem. The latest frustration-creator from Sacramento is Governor Newsom and his Project Roomkey that descended upon local government unannounced with no guidelines or a who-is-responsible-for-what chart. The determination of the homeless population could become a hotbed of COVID 19 and spread the virus rapidly has led to this effort to get them off the streets.

The Roomkey Project was devised to pick up the slack, or failure, for the state to provide shelter or housing for those relegated to live on the street because of mental health issues, drug or alcohol addiction or simply no job or one that did not pay enough to provide them some form of housing or shelter. And there some of them have been for literally years until COVID 19 came along and forced action to be taken.

First, it is not our city governments, nor even our county government, that should be named responsible for creating the problem and certainly, when the reasons for the problems on our streets are explored, not responsible for cleaning up the disaster it has become.

On March 19th, L.A. Times described the events in L.A. Federal Court with Judge David Carter, L.A. Alliance for Human Rights and those ordered in court to find ways to get the homeless into safe quarters due to the lawsuit filed by the Alliance the week before. L.A. City leadership officials, including Mayor Garcetti, and L.A. County Supervisors Chair of the Board, Kathryn Barger, were sent by Carter to huddle in a corner of that court room and come up with a solution to get the homeless off the streets. Noticeably missing from that group was Governor Gavin Newsom and his Attorney General Javier Becerra.

Attending was L.A. County District Attorney, Jackie Lacey who has been working with the Sheriff to mitigate the spread of the virus in the county jails leading to more releases and this time another 2,000 may be pending.

The solution of that group were hotels and motels to secure the homeless. And, it appears from what is happening now, the

responsibility to implement was laid at the feet of the Counties absent any state leadership.

Initially word went out to average citizens over Facebook about the County booking rooms in local hotels. Several of our East San Gabriel Valley activists started asking questions and discovered the booking arrangements were made without consultation of city management staff or Council Members.

Project Roomkey is looking for 15,000 rooms ASAP to take the "most vulnerable" or "at risk," (defined as persons 65 years or older and/or those with pre-existing medical conditions) off the streets and place them into those hotels. The Daily Caller reported these accommodations come with a set of "wrap around services" including laundry, custodial, security and support staff services but no curfew requirement. Reportedly, FEMA will be reimbursing state and local governments up to 75% of these costs. That leaves 25% still to be funded.

On March 18th, the signature on the Executive Order and the day before the court hearing, Gov. Newsom released the order that said: California is working across government to get homeless Californians - among the most vulnerable to spread of COVID-19 - safely into shelter & housing... granting local flexibility on spending and building shelters. In that Order, EO N-32-20:

- Declared \$1.5 billion has been allocated to local partners through three programs to provide a variety of resources to combat homelessness;
- Signed SB 89, \$1.1 billion package, authorizing \$500 million to support local governments fight against COVID 19 among homeless;

- Removed "regulatory barriers" for establishing shelter and hygiene protocols.

- Of the \$500 million, \$100 million to local governments for shelter support and \$50 million for travel trailers and "lease rooms in hotels, motels and other facilities to provide immediate isolation placements..."

The State created custom-made lists of hotels and motels available to lease and even offered to contact those places and negotiate leases for the counties. In Alameda County the state executed leases for two properties and then turned the responsibility for anything further over to local governments. There are leases now in Glendora, Covina and West Covina but I have not seen any paperwork.

In one situation, hotel owners are receiving \$1,000 a month to rent those rooms for the homeless but I don't know if that includes the "wrap around" services and who is writing the check. What hasn't been mentioned is the response services from police and fire paramedic responders given the fact these are elderly and high-risk individuals.

It appears this is a Gov. Newsom contrived solution to a problem he has been unable to solve and has decided to relegate implementation of last-minute efforts to counties and cities. It is difficult for local government officials, elected or staff, to respond because they weren't contacted to coordinate the effort and there are no contracts available binding enforcement of the all the promises made. Is there any paperwork / contracts for those being placed so our police and paramedics know how to respond?

- What happens if room service and maintenance fail to show up?
  - How will they eat sheltered in those rooms?
  - Support staff services is rather nebulous and emergency responders should know what they are up against.
  - Are these homeless people ones who have been in our cities or are we finding those "most vulnerable" and "at risk" taking priority from outside our area and leaving those on our streets still on our streets?
  - Are they restricted to shelter in place like all of us?
- Stay tuned in. I'm sure there is more coming out on this one.

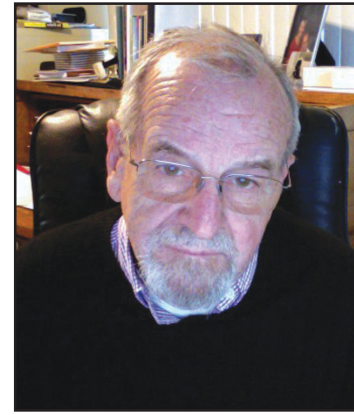
Here is the second.

Consider this dove that sits on a shelf in our apartment. I could tell its story, but why not hear it first hand? Let the dove speak for herself.

*and this apartment's bookshelf. During the years my owners lived in Australia I was stored in a Missouri attic.*

*I am powdered marble that was mixed with water and an adhesive, and dried in a mold. So I became an expensive stone sculpture. At my creation I was a brilliant white. But look at me now.*

*I was given by one of the church members in response to my owner's series of sermons on peace. You got it. Yes I am a genuine dove of peace, even if I don't look like it now. Oh, what I've gone through!*

*In Chicago I was placed on a shelf in the church library. It was an exciting time during which the church was the center of protests about the Vietnam war, and at the same time the safe meeting place for the two large rival street gangs. One night one of the gang's regulars arrived at the coffee-house that was part of the church's ministry, waving a loaded gun. No guns were allowed in the building, so my owner took it from him, — I thought he was going to get shot— but he calmly put it with others he had confiscated in the*



*office safe, and told the young man that for the next month he was not welcome in the building.*

*As you might imagine, this didn't go over very well, and in the middle of the night my owner was awakened by a phone call from this young man informing him that the church, just a block away, was on fire, and I was one of the casualties. This pure white dove of peace was scorched! People would thereafter come in and look at me, but for some reason no one asked how I had gotten to be in such a disreputable condition. This is the first time it has been described.*

*"Peace" may appear to be a gentle safe retreat from the hard violent world, but I am a stone testimony that it is not. So if you visit our apartment or see my image displayed with this column, you may realize the risk of trying to make peace between The Blackstone Rangers and the Devil's Disciples, gangs who were at war on Chicago's South Side.*

I imagine there are objects in your dwelling that have stories to be told, but if they can't tell them, I guess it's up to you to become their voice.

# Is the World on Lock Down or Not?

With there being ten million experts on the Corona Flu Virus, most of which are elected officials, what are we supposed to believe? The numbers don't match anywhere. One person on social media (Facebook) stated about 300 people in L.A. County died in one day from the Coronavirus. That is so not true. This is the kind of comments that sends "panic" out into the community. As of April 19, there have been 577 deaths in L.A. County since December that may be related to the Coronavirus. Many of these are confirmed and many had other medical complications prior to catching the virus. Now don't get me wrong, but siding on the "Side of Caution" is most likely the best policy. However, over reacting is not the answer. More than a third of the planet's population is under some form of restriction according to the WHO (World Health Organization) and the CDC (Centers for Disease Control). Spain, Italy, Denmark, Austria, Poland, and the Czech Republic - that have previously imposed restrictions have started lifting lockdown measures, although they've had varying levels of success in tackling their respective outbreaks. If you remember, Italy was hit hard with the virus to start with.

Don't forget, that many countries have or had "National Quarantines" but were not locked down. This meant you could not travel to or from the boundary area. This could be the entire country or within the country itself, example, China which quarantined Hubei province which has about 60 million people. However, they were quarantined, they were never locked down.

Going over the WHO and CDC information statistic for various countries around the world on how they are handling this is very interesting. Example; China "never" had a lockdown, just a quarantine and "local recommendations" for their country. Sweden, never had a lockdown and again, just a quarantine of the country and "local recommenda-

tions" and it was business as usual for their country.

There are countries out there that I never heard of, but they are in the statistics. 72 countries had national lockdown at one time and many have lifted these restrictions. 47 had local lockdowns (areas within their country) again with some of these being lifted. 34 countries had recommendations where areas within their country could implement restrictions if they wanted, but basically business as usual. Just to name a few of these, China, Japan, South Korea, Sweden, Vietnam, and a few others. Countries with absolutely no lockdowns or recommendation are: Cambodia, Mongolia, Belarus, and North Korea.

It appears the United States is the Gold Medal Winner for more deaths worldwide for the Coronavirus than any other country. Why is This? This is because of our huge population of 330 million people. Now if you go by per capita or the average per million people... our numbers are extremely low, in fact one of the lowest.

When you take in all the factors and numbers and compare them with past issues like this, we are rather lucky that our results are this low. Part of our history includes the Spanish Flu back in 1918 where over 650,000 Americans died. We had a population of only 103 million people at the time. How did they fight this back then? Shut-downs and masks. Yep, just what is going on right now, but not with the over-kill that is happening today. Another thing that I just found out, doctors felt that aspirin contributed to the inci-

dence and severity of viral pathology, bacterial infection, and death, because physicians of the day were unaware that the regimens (8.0-31.2 g per day) produce levels associated with hyperventilation and pulmonary edema which ended up killing many sick people. Pulmonary edema was found at autopsy in 46% of 26 salicylate-intoxicated adults. Experimentally, salicylates increase lung fluid and protein levels and impair mucociliary clearance. In 1918, the US Surgeon General, the US Navy, and the Journal of the American Medical Association recommended use of aspirin just before the October death spike. If these recommendations were followed, and if pulmonary edema occurred, then this may have been a cause for a significant proportion of the deaths may be attributable to aspirin. Just so you can compare. Today, the recommended dosage would be 500 to 1000 mg per 6-8 hours. Back in 1918 they were giving 8,000 mg to 32,000 mg which obviously contributed to the illness killing more people.

Over the years, we have had other flu epidemics that killed a lot of people, but nothing like 1918. This approach today may be over-reacting, but it was a direction that was taken.

Now we see protesters in the streets demanding that we get back to normal. Many of the leaders and/or participants are doctors and educated medical experts in the field.

Sweden's approach is business as usual but with recommendations and the country quarantined from allowing people into the country. Continued group gatherings are called "Herding" where their theory is, if you get sick, get over it. Get it out of the way and move on. Is it working? Well a bunch of people got sick and the numbers are dropping. So, who really knows?

The bottom line is, be safe and do what you think is best for you and your family.

# "TIME JOCKEY" - Memorial Day

**Guadalcanal...** With Memorial Day a short five weeks away, I thought it would be appropriate to start remembering those who gave their life for our country and our freedoms. As we continue to follow "Stay At Home" orders during this COVID-19 crisis, let us not lose sight of the world around us and the special days and people which still need to be honored.

The Battle of Guadalcanal was one the most hardest fought and grueling battles ever engaged by the United States military and the United States Marines. The island of Guadalcanal is 90 miles long and 25 miles wide and is the largest island of the Solomon Islands. It is located just north of the equator in the South Pacific, it is drenched by monsoons in the spring and thunderstorms in the fall. Its jungles are infested with deadly spiders and snakes, crocodiles and a rain forest canopy. But its most deadly occupants are the malaria carrying mosquitoes.

The battle started on August 7, 1942 and it wouldn't end for another six months. It may have been the only World War II battle to combine assaults on land, sea, air and between aircraft carriers. As the Japanese were advancing on their way to Australia by hopscotching every island in its direction, the United States

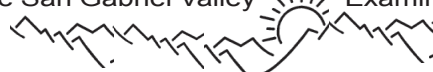
forces decided to make its stand at Guadalcanal to prevent further advancement by the Imperial Forces of Japan. The Marines were assigned to capture the island using thousands of men to storm its beaches. Strong resistance was met on the sands of Guadalcanal but the more desperate fighting would take place inside the dense jungle.

The Japanese were seeking revenge for their humiliating loss at Midway and had come up with a plan to only fight at night, a plan which startled the young Marines who would be deprived of sleep for months on end. The Japanese would fight until their death in their defense of Guadalcanal, a challenge that the Marines realized during the frenzied attacks upon their positions in the evening hours. The climate was always wet from constant rain, plus it was humid and hot, making the conditions problematic for survival.

In the days before satellites, the only way for the Marines to identify the movements of enemy troops was to use patrols to see what was happening in real time. For the Marines on patrol, they had to crawl through the thick jungle while dodging the sharp shooting snipers hiding in the trees. It was a deadly mission which only netted a couple hundred yards each day. Japanese

troops had dug a network of tunnels and hid below ground most of the day making it difficult for Marines to find and attack their enemy.

The fighting was endless but on February 3, 1945, the Japanese withdrew from the island, giving the United States their first victory in the South Pacific. The War with Japan would go on for another 2 ½ years but Guadalcanal would set the trend for future battles in the South Pacific. The losses were heavy on both sides. The U.S lost 1,598 men on the ground with 1,152 of them being Marines. On the seas, 5,041 men were killed as both sides tried to maintain control of the offshore arsenal and aircraft support. Thousands more were wounded. On the Japanese side, 25,000 soldiers were killed fighting to the death while trying to protect their homeland. War will always result in deaths, deaths of soldiers fighting for their country and a cause, protecting their homes and freedoms. It is the reason that we must continue to remember them, including the soldiers who died at Guadalcanal, and observe holidays like Memorial Day, a day established to honor those who gave their lives for their country, all of us and our freedoms ....

ORDINANCE NO. 2052

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GLENORA, CALIFORNIA, ADDING SECTIONS 9.20.090 AND 9.20.100 TO CHAPTER 9.20 "PARKS AND PUBLIC PLACES", OF TITLE 9 "PUBLIC PEACE, MORALS AND SAFETY", OF THE GLENORA MUNICIPAL CODE, TO REGULATE AND PROHIBIT CERTAIN CONDUCT AND CONDITIONS TO PROTECT PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY**

**THE CITY COUNCIL**  
City of Glendora, California

WHEREAS, there is a need to update the Municipal Code in order to better regulate the storage of bulky items, tents and personal property in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property by all residents and visitors;

WHEREAS, the storage of bulky items, tents and personal property in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property has become increasingly common;

WHEREAS, this practice has had a negative impact on public access to such city facilities and poses a risk to the health and safety of the users of such city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property;

WHEREAS, the City seeks to regulate the storage of bulky items, tents and personal property in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property by all residents and visitors to promote the general welfare of the community and to protect the health and safety of the users of such city facilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GLENORA DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1.** The facts set forth in the recitals in this ordinance are true and correct and incorporated by reference.

**SECTION 2.** Section 9.20.090 is hereby added to Chapter 9.20 "Parks and Public Places", of Title 9 "Public Peace, Morals, and Safety" of the Glendora Municipal Code to read as follows:

"9.20.090 Free passage shall not be obstructed or hindered.

A. No person or persons shall stand, sit, or linger on any street, alley, sidewalk, park or other public place, or in or about the entrance or exit of any business establishment or public building, either on foot or in an automobile or other vehicle, in such a manner as to obstruct or hinder the free passage of persons along such public way, or obstruct or hinder persons entering and exiting from any business establishment or public building.

B. No person in violation of this prohibition shall refuse or fail to disperse or move when directed to do so by a police officer or city employee."

**SECTION 3.** Section 9.20.100 is hereby added to Chapter 9.20 "Parks and Public Places", of Title 9 "Public Peace, Morals and Safety" of the Glendora Municipal Code to read as follows:

"9.20.100 Bulky items, tents and storage of personal property in city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property.

A. Purpose. City pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property should be accessible and available to residents and the public at large for their intended uses. Bringing bulky items, personal property, or tents in or onto such pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property, together with the use of such city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property for the storage of personal property interferes with the rights of other members of the public to use the same for their intended purposes and can create a public health or safety hazards that adversely affects the users of such city facilities. The purpose of this section is to maintain such city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property in a clean, sanitary, and accessible condition, to prevent harm to the health or safety of the public, and to promote the public health and safety by ensuring that such pathways, sidewalks, passageways, city parks, and other city property remain readily accessible for their intended uses.

B. Definitions. The definitions contained in this subsection shall govern the construction, meaning and application of words and phrases used in this section.

1. "Administrative procedure" means the city's procedures as set for in this ordinance and in Sections 1.18.020, 1.18.040, 1.18.050(a), 1.18.060, 1.18.070(a)-(c), 1.18.080(a), and 1.18.100, of Chapter 1.18 of Title 1 of this Code, entitled "Administrative Citations."

2. "Bulky item" means any item that is too large or a group of items that cumulatively are too large to fit in one 60-gallon trash container with the lid closed, including, but not limited to, a mattress, couch, chair or other furniture or appliance. The following items shall not constitute a bulky item: a portable, collapsible picnic chair or table, bicycle or any item approved for a city-authorized special event.

3. "Personal property" means any and all tangible property, and includes, but is not limited to, goods, materials, merchandise, tents, bedding, sleeping bags, hammocks, and personal items such as luggage, backpacks, clothing, documents, medication and household items.

4. "Store," "stored" or "storing" means to put aside or accumulate for use when needed, to put for safekeeping, to place or leave in a location.

5. "Tent" means any tarpaulin, cover, structure or shelter, made of any material which is not open on all sides and which hinders an unobstructed view behind or into the area surrounded by the tarpaulins, cover, structure or shelter.

C. Prohibition on bulky items in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property. No person shall bring in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property any bulky item unless the City Manager or City Manager's designee approves in writing the bulky item for a city-authorized special event.

D. Prohibition on erecting a tent in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property. Except for areas expressly designated for camping, no person shall erect, configure or construct a tent in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property.

E. Prohibition on attachments. No person shall erect any barrier against or lay string,

thread, or filament or join any wires, ropes, chains or otherwise attach any personal property to any of the city's real or personal property or trees or plants in a park, including, but not limited to, a building or portion or protrusion thereof, playground equipment, sports equipment, exercise equipment, fencing, netting, trash can, gazebo, pagoda, pole, post, bike rack, drinking fountain, sign, table, bench, tree, bush, shrub or plant, unless the City Manager or City Manager's designee approves in writing the bulky item for a city-authorized special event.

F. Prohibition on storage of personal property; removal of the same from city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property. No person shall store personal property in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property.

G. Citation, Seizure & Storage. Following the issuance of an administrative citation as provided for in Sections 1.18.040 or 1.18.050(a), the city may remove bulky items, personal property, or tents from any city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, city , and other city property in violation of this Section. This section shall not apply to bulky items or personal property that remains in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property pursuant to statute, ordinance, regulation, permit, contract or other authorization by the City Manager or City Manager's designee.

H. Summary Seizure & Destruction. In the event that bulky items, personal property, or tents placed in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property in violation of this Section that poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of the public, the city may remove and destroyed the same without prior compliance with Sections 1.18.040 or 1.18.050(a).

I. Adoption of Administrative Procedures. Adoption of Sections 1.18.020, 1.18.040, 1.18.050(a), 1.18.060, 1.18.070(a)-(c), 1.18.080(a), and 1.18.100, of Chapter 1.18 of Title 1 of this Code, entitled "Administrative Citations," are hereby adopted as the administrative procedure for enforcing the provisions of this ordinance.

a. Pre-removal notice. In the event that it is determined that any bulky items, personal property, or tents are being stored in or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property in violation of this Section, an administrative citation shall be issued pursuant to Sections 1.18.040, 1.18.050(2), and 1.18.060 of Title 1 of this code which shall include, among other items noted in Section 1.18.060, a demand to remove the same from city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks, and other city property within the time specified in such citation. Service of such administrative citation shall be as provided in Section 1.18.070 (a), (b), or (c) of Title 1 of this code.

b. Failure to remove stored personal property. Failure of any person to remove any bulky items, personal property, or tents are being placed or stored in violation of or upon city pathways, sidewalks, passageways, parks in violation of this Section within the time specified in the notice provided in sub-section (a) above shall result in the seizure and storage of the same by the city as provided hereinafter.

c. Repossession. The owner or other person entitled to possession, custody or control of any bulky items, personal property, or tents seized and stored as provided in sub-section (b) above, may repossess the same within sixty (60) calendars of its seizure by providing proof to the reasonable satisfaction of the City Manager or City Manager's designee of ownership of the same.

d. Abandonment. Bulky items, personal property, or tents seized and stored as provided in sub-section (b) above not repossessed within the time specified in sub-section (c) above, or following the expiration of any appeal as provided in Section 1.18.100 of Title 1 of this code shall be deemed to have been abandoned.

J. Prohibition on illegal dumping. Nothing herein precludes the enforcement of any law prohibiting illegal dumping, including but not limited to, California Penal Code § 374.3, or any successor statutes proscribing illegal dumping.

K. Limitation on applicability. This chapter is not intended to violate and shall not be applied or enforced in a manner that violates the United States or California Constitutions and applicable state or federal statutes.

L. Violations. Any person who violates this Section shall be subject to administrative fines as set for in Section 1.18.080(a) of this Code except that such administrative fines shall always be treated as an infraction and shall not be subject to citation or penalty as a misdemeanor. As an additional remedy, a violation of this section is hereby deemed to constitute a public nuisance, and may be subject to abatement summarily by a restraining order or injunction issued by a court of competent jurisdiction."

**SECTION 3.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect. The people of the City of Glendora hereby declare that they would have adopted each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of this Ordinance be declared invalid or unenforceable.

**SECTION 4.** The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published and/or posted in accordance with applicable law.

**SECTION 5.** The Mayor shall sign this Ordinance and the City Clerk shall attest and certify to the passage and adoption thereof and cause same to be published at least once in the San Gabriel Valley Examiner, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of Glendora, which newspaper is hereby designated for that purpose (Government Code § 40806); and thereupon, and thirty (30) days after its passage, this ordinance shall take effect and be in force.

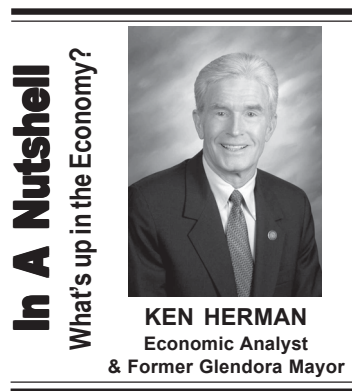




# Negative News / Difficulty Staying Positive

I pointed out previously how America's media makes bad news sound even worse. Unfortunately, negative news still dominates much commentary. Psychologists refer to America's interest in bad news as *negative bias*. Few listeners want to see stories about kids helping the elderly cross the street. But sadly, viewership spikes when a tragic accident or terrorist attack happens. We see emotional pitfalls in the markets too. Even during strong markets, many commentators are negative. With weaker markets, most become extremely bearish. Usually markets do well after periods of bearish sentiment, especially after *extreme negativity*. The time to "watch out for" is when nearly everyone seems to be *bullish*. I hate the main street media's "news". I avoid emotional responses in investing, and remain data driven. Data supports my opinions when a near-term bottom exists. Data allows me to tell you, "Hang in there, we will get through this together." Hopefully "slowing of selling" will be pointing to the light at the end of the tunnel. Decision making today, with the Wuhan coronavirus keeping us in "our caves", and all trading being done remotely, can be problematic. There are no traders on the floor of the NYSE. There is no professional human interplay, which usually makes up an important part of market sentiment.

On Thursday we got our first glimpse into the rebooting of America (directly from our President). At the same time China's Communist Party continues to make up financial as well as health reports intended to show how superior the Chinese Communist Party is versus the free world (and our capitalist economies). While China continues telling its unbelievable success stories, a Wall Street Journal article on 4-17 stated: "New Chinese export restrictions have left American companies' US bound face masks, test

kits and other urgently needed medical equipment stranded. Health-care equipment maker PerkinsElmer based in Massachusetts is unable to ship 1.4 million test kits for Covid-19 from its Suzhou factory because it lacks a certification required by China's new rules. A Shanghai vice mayor told 3M that the city relies on 3M's locally produced equipment for its Covid-19 prevention efforts and lacks viable alternatives." So much for China's credibility about having everything under control!

A casual approach to reality may also be represented by what the media feeds us. On Thursday (the day the USA rebooting was announced), *Bloomberg News* ripped into the President for claiming he and only he could decide when to reopen the country. Then, Friday morning they criticized the White House reopening plan for leaving the tough decisions to the states. That's one nice thing about *Bloomberg* coverage of the White House, it is consistent (ALLBAD).

In fact, the 3 phase plan — which clearly was drawn up by the CDC, not Donald Trump — makes a lot of sense. It is divided into three sections.

- **Criteria**, data driven conditions each region or state should satisfy before proceeding to a phased opening;
- **Preparedness**, what states should do to meet the challenges of a viral resurgence; and
- **Phase guidelines**, responsibilities of individuals

and employers during all 3 phases.

States will have to decide how to implement guidelines. States with a lot of interconnectedness can and should work together. (NY and surrounding states have been doing this for weeks.) Companies will still be responsible for ensuring the safety of their workers. Given the unique differences between the 50 states, as well as individual employers, Trumps announced delegated approach makes a lot of sense.

It becomes clearer that the USA recession could be deep and the recovery may be slow. I think most people are starting to sense this on an intuitive level — how can it be otherwise given the tenacity, contagiousness, and severity of this virus? The medical advisors underscore that intuition. Many believe that the USA will not get back to anything close to the old normal until there is a vaccine or herd immunity (maybe not even next year).

However, there is more than a glimmer of hope for the market (with recent good news concerning trading volume). The stock market's daily gyrations should now be much less dramatic. Another important takeaway is that the 10-year Treasury bond now yields only 0.587%, which is great news for investors, since dividend growth stocks now yield three or four times as much. After all the recent market turmoil, the first full week in April saw averages (S&P) recover over 25% - the greatest upward weekly swing since 1974!

**While there's still way too much terrible "news commentary", and we continue to be facing challenging times, American's will get through this together!**

# Your Money - Ask Julia

*I'm now unemployed and will not be able to pay my mortgage. What can I do?*

Go to your lender. Apply for a forbearance. Some lenders will temporarily reduce your mortgage payment amount or require no payments for up to 12 months. At the end of that forbearance period, the lender will require you to repay with interest, either in a lump sum, or an amount in addition to your regular mortgage payments. Usually a forbearance would be negatively reported to the credit bureaus. However, due to the Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, lenders are not making that report. IF you discover that your lender did report it negatively, contact them and each credit bureau.

*What do you suggest we do if there's a really bad recession?*

For it to be called a recession, there must be an economic downturn that lasts for two quarters, or six months. We are not there, yet. The good news is that you have a little time to prepare. Focus on getting out of debt and saving up for those rainy days. If the recession is joined by inflation, there could be fewer jobs, everything will cost more, and adjustable rates on credit cards will rise. Adjustable mortgage rates now have built-in limits on the frequency (usually annual) and a cap on the amount of rate increase.

*As I get older, what ages are really important for retirement planning?*

At age 59 1/2, as long as cer-

tain conditions are met, you can start taking withdrawals from qualified retirement plans and IRAs without incurring a 10% penalty. Since these have been growing tax-deferred, you'll now have to pay ordinary income taxes. At age 62, you could start collecting reduced Social Security benefits. Depending on what year you were born, you could take full Social Security benefits when you reach "full retirement age" (65 for some, 67 for others). At age 65, you're eligible to enroll in Medicare. (If you want coverage at the earliest possible date, the Social Security Manual suggests enrolling about 2 - 3 months before turning 65.) For those eligible for Social Security, Medicare Part A Hospital Insurance benefits are automatic. There's a monthly premium if you decide you want Medical Part B Insurance benefits. At age 72, you are required to take minimum distributions from most tax-deferred retirement plans if you want to avoid a 50% penalty on the amount that you should

have been withdrawing. The federal government determines your life expectancy, which is what the annual required minimum distribution is based upon.

*Our financial advisor talked to us about doing a reverse mortgage so we could fund a deferred annuity. We really don't want to use the equity from our home at this time, and we're concerned about tying the money up in an annuity. What would you advise?*

It's time for you to change financial advisors! Any ethical financial advisor knows that, for the protection of seniors, the industry insists on a six-month or longer waiting period after a reverse Mortgage before discussing investing those funds. The purpose of a reverse mortgage is to increase cash flow, or to fund long-term care. ## As It Battles COVID-19 Crisis, Los Angeles County Braces For Major Decline In Sales Tax Revenues

**LOS ANGELES COUNTY** - Los Angeles County's economic outlook has taken a hard hit from the COVID-19 crisis, with officials forecasting a \$1 billion decline in sales tax revenue this fiscal year ending on June 30, 2020.

Looking ahead, the sales tax decline is expected to surpass \$2 billion between now and the end of the next fiscal year on June 30, 2021.

At the same time, Los Angeles County is incurring heavy expenses in responding to the crisis and will be working closely with the state and federal government in the months ahead on issues of potential reimbursement.

"The budget outlook is critically important for Los Angeles County to allocate resources effectively and to plan for the essential programs and services residents rely on in all of our communities," said Supervisor Kathryn Barger, Chair of the Board of Supervisors. "As we continue to collaboratively address the COVID-19 public health crisis, we remain committed to meeting the needs of residents across L.A. County."

In anticipation of the economic challenges ahead, Chief Executive Officer Sachi A. Hamai has imposed hard freezes on hiring and purchasing and has directed County department heads to prepare for a range of potential program reductions in the coming fiscal year.

"These are significant losses which, unfortunately, will have a major effect on programs that the County administers on behalf of our 10 million residents," Hamai

said. "Our aim is to work with our departments and the Board of Supervisors to prioritize needs and ensure that Los Angeles County continues its vital role as the safety net for our most vulnerable residents."

The recommended budget for fiscal 2020-21—prepared in large part before the COVID-19 crisis was declared a global pandemic—will be presented to the Board of Supervisors on April 28. Extensive adjustments are ex-

pected in future budget phases to address revenue shortfalls and rising expenditures due to the crisis.

In a media conference call hosted by the National Association of Counties on Wednesday, Los Angeles County leaders called on Congress to provide additional assistance, including enabling local municipalities to use federal relief funding to address lost revenues suffered due to COVID-19.

## CDTFA Offers Immediate Interest-Free Payment Plans

*Small Businesses May Defer Up to \$50,000 of Sales and Use Tax Liability for 12 Months*

**SACRAMENTO**—Governor Newsom announced a new relief effort that gives all businesses with less than \$5 million in annual taxable sales the ability to defer payment on up to \$50,000 in sales and use tax liability without incurring any penalties or interest. This new relief effort builds on Executive Order N-40-20, issued by Governor Newsom on March 30, 2020, which provided all small business taxpayers an additional 90 days to file and pay taxes administered by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA).

Under the program, qualifying businesses can enter into payment plans to distribute up to \$50,000 of sales tax liability over a 12-month period, interest-free. For taxpayers choosing to defer their 1st quarter 2020 liability, for example, up to \$50,000

of the obligation would now be paid in twelve equal monthly installments, with the first payment not due until July 31, 2020.

"Small businesses are the backbone of California's economy. Our hope is that these interest-free payment plans provide a much-needed bridge until small businesses can get up and running," stated Director Nick Maduros. "The Governor's action today allows small business owners to spread out their financial obligations over a full year, without paying any interest or penalties."

Businesses not within these parameters can contact our CDTFA Customer Service Center at 1-800-400-7115 or their local CDTFA office. CDTFA retains administrative flexibility to assist businesses needing relief in the case of disasters.

## How Drivers Can Keep Their Car's Value High!

**4. Color!** I have seen everything under the rainbow when it

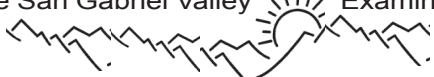

## SBA Disaster Assistance in Response to the Coronavirus

The U.S. Small Business Administration is offering designated states and territories low-interest federal disaster loans for working capital to small businesses suffering substantial economic injury as a result of the Coronavirus (COVID-19). Upon a request received from a state's or territory's Governor, SBA will issue under its own authority, as provided by the Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act that was recently signed by the President, an Economic Injury Disaster Loan declaration.

Any such Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance declaration issued by the SBA makes loans available statewide to small businesses and private, non-profit organizations to help alleviate economic injury caused by the Coronavirus (COVID-19). This will apply to current and future disaster assistance declarations related to Coronavirus.

SBA's Office of Disaster Assistance will coordinate with the state's or territory's Governor to submit the request for Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance.

Once a declaration is made, the information on the application process for Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance will be made available to affected small businesses within the state.

SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans offer up to \$2 million in assistance and can provide vital economic support to small businesses to help overcome the temporary loss of revenue they are experiencing.

These loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that can't be paid because of the disaster's impact. The interest rate is 3.75% for small businesses. The interest rate for non-profits is 2.75%.

SBA offers loans with long-term repayments in order to keep payments affordable, up to a maximum of 30 years. Terms are determined on a case-by-case basis, based upon each borrower's ability to repay.

SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are just one piece of the expanded focus of the federal government's coordinated response, and the SBA is strongly committed to providing the most effective and customer-focused response possible.

After a disaster, price increases can occur at grocery stores, gasoline stations, housing, emergency and medical supply stores, and construction or repair services.
- 2 IDENTIFY**  
If you think a store or service provider is committing price gouging, compare prices prior to the state of emergency and in areas not affected by the disaster.

Consumers are protected from a price increase of 10% or more for 30 days on goods and services and for 180 days on contractor-related services. Keep detailed records of purchases you make during a declared emergency.
- 3 REPORT**  
If you believe you were a victim of price gouging, contact our department to file a complaint by calling (800) 593-8222 or visit us online at [dcba.lacounty.gov](http://dcba.lacounty.gov).

# Walmart Fire in Covina is Arson, Arrest Made

COVINA - Covina police were on scene before the fire department arrived at a fire behind Walmart at 1275 N. Azusa Ave., at about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 15. The fire consumed a forklift, a number of pallets and stored items. No one was injured in the fire.

There had been a rash of arson fires lately in Covina and Azusa. While firefighters were putting out the Walmart fire, two other smaller fires were started, one in Covina and the other in Azusa. One took place behind a business at 422 W. Arrow Hwy., and the other burned in a dumpster at Hollenbeck Park, 1250 N. Hollenbeck Ave. which is just south of the Arrow Hwy fire.

When authorities and crews arrived at the Walmart fire, they immediately had everyone evacuated from the building. The fire was a little stubborn but firefighters manage to keep the fire from spreading to the inside of the building. The covered storage area was heavily damaged by the fire.

When Covina police responded to the area and spotted a familiar face. They made contact with the individual. He was identified as Jose Javier Salgado, 39 years of age. He is a transient in the area and is known for starting fires. He is considered a serial arsonist. Over the last 6 months he has been in the area, he was arrested six times by both Covina and Azusa police departments. He was given jail time but got out on short time served. On another arrest, his bail was set at \$10,000.00 and somehow, he was released only to start more fires. He was arrested April 4 on sus-

picion of igniting 6 fires and cited out. On one day, Feb, 27th, he was arrested at 5:11 a.m. and processed by Covina PD. He was cited out and he was arrested again that same day again by Covina PD for starting another fire at 2:15 p.m.

He is now being held on a mental health hold and will be arrested when release from that facility.

Covina Police Chief John Curley pointed out the alleged crimes as "an example of a failure of California's legal system. 10 arson fires in less than 2 weeks and unfortunately in California, 'serial arson' is not considered 'violent crime', just like

human trafficking of a child, rape by intoxication, and many others. Disgraceful to our community..." he posted on social media. He had overwhelming support from all over. He obviously hit the nail on the head with a hammer on this one.

# Homeless to be Housed in Covina by L.A. County

COVINA - Homeless were planned to be housed in Covina by L. A. County. City officials didn't have a clue until the last minute.

The plan was to put about 200 at risk people into the Vanlee Hotel and Suites, formally the Park Inn by Radisson Covina. This is located 1211 E. Garvey in Covina. The Hamilton Restaurant is located at the same location.

The county made this decision without any prior contact with the City of Covina until the very last minute. The city leaders, council and staff are extremely concerned and not happy as well as the citizens of Covina who live right next door to the north of the hotel. West Covina is directly west of the Hotel with a number of residents as well.

The Covina City Council had a meeting to discuss this issue that

was dumped on them. At the meeting, "The City Council unanimously approved the initiation of litigation in one case," City Attorney Candice Lee reported after a closed-door session. "The action, defendant and other particulars will be disclosed to any person upon inquiry once the litigation has been formally commenced."

This is the same action that took place with a city in Orange County, which had to go to court and the judge sided with the city. The citizens are concerned for their safety, their family and their homes. They feel that the homeless are being dumped in Covina without any concern for the people of Covina and the surrounding area.

# DCFS Calls on Community to be the Voice for Children Amid School Closures

LOS ANGELES COUNTY - On the heels of the announcement that students will remain out of school for the remainder of the academic year due to the current public health crisis, the Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) is calling on residents to help ensure that children remain safe.

During this unprecedented time, families may experience higher levels of stress and uncertainty and the department is asking that community members be observant of children who may be experiencing neglect or abuse.

DCFS Director Bobby D. Cagle said that with children out of the line of sight of mandated reporters, such as teachers and medical personnel, the concern for child safety has significantly increased.

"Social workers rely heavily on mandated reporters to initiate contact with our department in order for us to protect children," Director Cagle said. "With this safeguard now gone, I am calling on Los Angeles County residents

to be the voice for children who may be experiencing physical abuse, severe food insecurity or other forms of neglect."

April marks National Child Abuse Prevention Month, an observance that strives to bring awareness of tools and resources available to families in need of support. The most common type of maltreatment is neglect. Federal statistics reveal that in 2019 an estimated 678,000 children were found to be victims of child abuse or neglect nationwide and, the year before, 4.3 million reports were made involving some 7.8 million children.

For those who work with families at risk of becoming involved with the child welfare system, the goal is to help foster healthy relationships by imparting coping strategies to navigate difficult circumstances that can lead to neglect or abuse.

This objective, dovetails with DCFS' prevention and aftercare services. During the 2019-2020 fiscal year, DCFS invested nearly \$20 million in services including provision of basic goods,

parenting education, financial literacy and peer support groups. These services are available regardless of age, immigration or insurance status, for as long as needed.

Recognizing that family dynamics may be challenging even on the best of days, Director Cagle stressed the need for child abuse prevention awareness and community involvement now more than ever.

"This situation is sure to test the limits of even the most patient individuals," he said. "But I want to emphasize that there are services available in the community to help. If you or someone you know is in need of extra support during this time of heightened uncertainty, please contact DCFS to find out what services are available in your area."

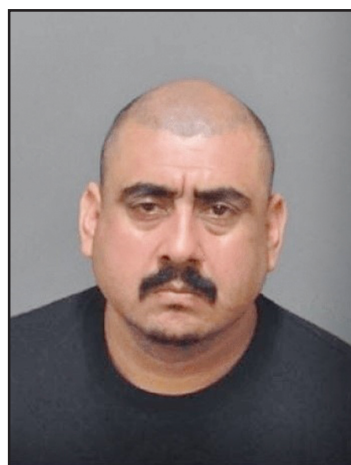

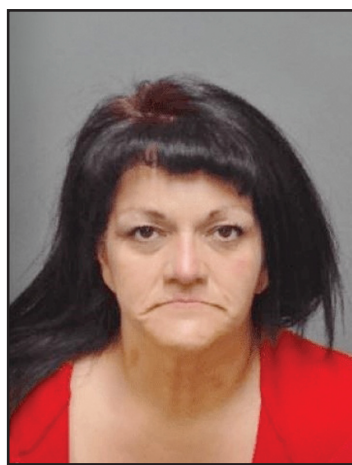

# DPH Reports Two Duarte Senior Health Facilities Have Cases Of COVID 19

DUARTE - The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health is reporting that two senior healthcare facilities in Duarte have patients and/or staff that have tested positive for COVID-19. The two facilities that have reported positive tests are Santa Teresita Nursing Home and the Monte Vista Healthcare Center. The City and County are working closely to prevent the further spread of the virus into the community at large. Approximately 1/3 of Duarte's population is over 55 and the community is home to nine different senior living facilities. These include nursing homes, 55 and over housing, and assisted living environments.

To ensure the safety of this demographic and the community at large, County public health

is providing daily interactions with a Public Health Nurse to communicate with the staff to provide regular infection control recommendations including insuring site staff is properly trained and has the necessary equipment to prevent the spread. Specifically, actively identifying and isolating possible COVID patients, monitoring healthcare personnel regularly for possible exposure, and preparing to successfully manage, if necessary, a larger outbreak.

Overt changes in facility operations will include symptom screenings such as temperature checks for all; limiting access points to the facility, ensuring all facility personnel and visitors regularly wear face masks throughout the facility, with med-

ical grade masks reserved for healthcare professionals and residents that are COVID-19-positive or assumed to be positive.

For the community at large, the County's "Safer at Home" order continues to provide guidelines that, over time, are slowing the spread of COVID-19 in the region. For this reason, wearing face masks when leaving home to perform essential activities, frequently washing hands, staying home whenever possible and practicing safe physical distancing are just as important now as ever before.
