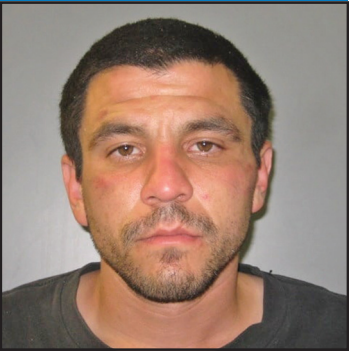

# West Covina Unified Celebrates Newly Completed Edgewood Sports Complex



West Covina Unified Board of Education members celebrate the newly completed Edgewood Sports Complex with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Sept. 22.

**WEST COVINA** – West Covina Unified high school athletes dove into a new Olympic-size pool on Sept. 22 to celebrate the completion of a state-of-the-art sports complex as West Covina Unified Board of Education members, administrators and community leaders cheered.

The Edgewood Sports Complex is the District's latest Measure ES-funded project to be completed in 2020, thanks to steady construction progress made during school closures prompted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Board President Camie Poulos, Vice President Eileen

Miranda Jimenez, Board Clerk Dr. Rose Lopez and Board Members Michael Flowers and Daniel C. Monarrez encouraged the District to proceed with construction while following county public health guidelines.

"Thank you to the West Covina community and the Board of Education for supporting our endeavors to support student success by creating high-quality learning environments," WCUSD Superin-

tendent Dr. Charles D. Hinman said. "Our students and community will enjoy the benefits of these outstanding facilities when it is safe to do so."

When students are permitted to return to campus and resume athletic activities, they will enjoy an aquatic center with an Olympic-size swimming pool, four locker rooms, two digital scoreboards capable of video playback, a high-quality sound system, and updated basketball courts.

The CIF Southern Section sanctioned-sized swimming

pool features a movable bulkhead that will allow multiple activities and competitions to occur simultaneously, thermal shade structures that will reduce pool heating costs and bleachers that can accommodate 350 people.

The Sports Complex is one of two new Measure ES-funded facilities at Edgewood IB Schools. The second is the Edgewood Event Center, which District officials celebrated during a Sept. 8 ribbon cutting. Together, the projects cost an estimated \$31.9 million.

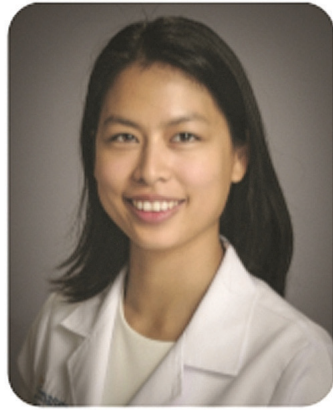
Velez-Dalla Tor. “The complexities behind these clinical challenges will only help to make them better doctors.”

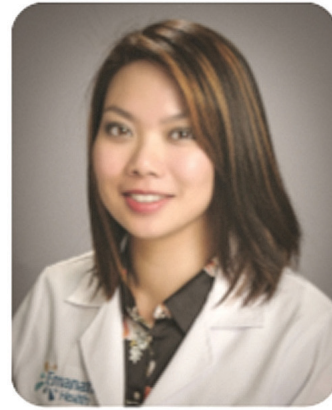

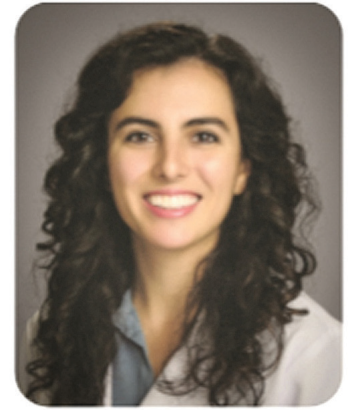

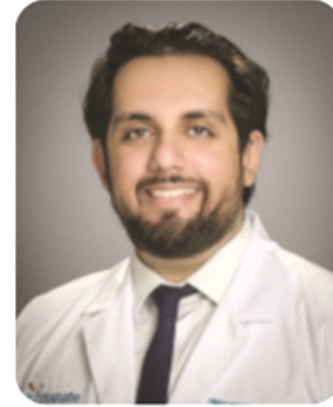

## Repeat Offender Arrested Again in Azusa with Loaded Gun

**WEST COVINA** - On Tuesday morning, Sept. 22nd about twenty minutes after midnight, an Azusa PD officer conducted a traffic stop in the 100 Block N. Alameda Ave. The officer contacted the driver, Brandon Sharmar Johnson, 31, a male black, during the traffic stop. For the officer's safety as well as the safety of the subject, the officer requested permission to do a search. During a consent search, the Officer located a bag of Methamphetamine in the suspect's pocket. The officers then found, during a search of the vehicle, a loaded 45 caliber Colt 1911 semi-auto

handgun in the passenger compartment, which was within reach of the suspect.

He was arrested and charged for the felonies and bail was set at \$65,001.00. One of the charges showed a bail of just \$1.00.

He has an extensive arrest record over the last couple of years. This included arrests from a number of agencies, Arcadia, Monrovia, San Dimas Sheriff's, Temple City Sheriff's, and Azusa. The suspect had more than one arrest with some of these agencies. More than 25 charges have been filed during this time. He has served both jail time and prison time. He is considered an extremely dangerous criminal.

## Azusa Unified School District Receives a \$35,000 Grant from the Canyon City Foundation

**AZUSA** - COVID-19 has changed the face of education overnight. Teaching methods have gone virtual, and now students are faced with needing much more than just textbooks and paper. Internetready devices and internet connectivity are vital for Azusa Unified School District (AUSD) students to fully engage in Distance Learning. For some AUSD students, lack of internet connectivity would have posed a significant barrier in their ability to join virtual classes.

Thanks to a generous \$35,000 donation from the Canyon City Foundation (CCF), our students will now have the internet connectivity needed to engage in learning. The CCF grant provides 'seed' money to ensure that all AUSD students have internet access. For some, this means installing a WIFI connection in their home. For others, this means access to a hotspot to use with their District issued Chromebook.

Assistant Superintendent of

Education Services, Dr. Dayna Mitchell, said, "We are extremely thankful for the generosity of the Canyon City Foundation. The Internet has become a critical resource in the educational process for our students. It is amazing to have community partners such as the Canyon City Foundation recognize that need and help us to meet it."

AUSD students who do not have access to the internet can call the District Office at 626-967-6211 to receive assistance.

## Baldwin Park Police Department Awarded \$103,000 Grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety

**BALDWIN PARK** - The safety of everyone traveling is the focus of a grant awarded to the Baldwin Park Police Department.

The \$103,000 grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) will assist in the Baldwin Park Police Department's efforts to reduce deaths and injuries on Baldwin Park roads.

"These are trying times, and now more than ever, it is important that we are at the forefront of traffic safety," Baldwin Park Police Department Commander Andrew Velebil said. "This funding allows us to educate and enhance the safety of all residents."

The one-year grant is for the 2021 federal fiscal year, which runs from Oct. 1, 2020 to Sept. 30, 2021.

The grant will fund a variety of traffic safety programs, including:

- Patrols with emphasis on alcohol and drug-impaired driving prevention.
- Patrols with emphasis on awareness and education of California's hands-free cell phone law.
- Patrols with emphasis on

education of traffic rights for bicyclists and pedestrians.

- Patrols with emphasis on awareness and education of primary causes of crashes: excess speed, failure to yield, failure to stop at stop signs/signals, improper turning/lane changes.

- Community education presentations on traffic safety issues such as distracted driving, DUI, speed, bicycle and pedestrian safety.

- Collaborative efforts with neighboring agencies on traffic safety priorities.

- Officer training and/or recertification: Standard Field Sobriety Test (SFST), Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) and Drug Recognition Expert (DRE).

"Through education and behavior changes, we hope to create an environment that is safe and equitable for all road users in our community," Baldwin Park Police Department Commander Andrew Velebil said.

## Police Officer, Exposed to Drugs During Investigation, Sent to Hospital

**BALDWIN PARK** - On the afternoon of September 22, 2020, Baldwin Park Police officers were dispatched to assist a woman slumped over the steering wheel in her car parked in a residential neighborhood. During their investigation officers discovered a small container with narcotics inside. When the container was opened by one of the officers, he immediately became light-headed and dizzy. The woman told officers the narcotics were methamphetamine, heroin,

and fentanyl. Paramedics arrived on the scene to treat the officer and he was taken by ambulance to the hospital for the narcotic exposure. He was treated and later released to go home and has returned to work the next day.

Due to COVID-19, the woman was booked in the field on charges of possession of controlled substances. She was issued a citation and immediately released with a court date in the near future.

## Man Pleads No Contest to Beating Ex-Girlfriend

**ARCADIA** - An Arcadia man pleaded no contest to beating the mother of his two children when she visited his home last year, the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office announced.

Deputy District Attorney Lisa Tanner said Robert Michael Mendez, 28, entered the plea to one count of injuring a girlfriend or child's parent.

Sentencing is scheduled on November 10 in Department D

of the Los Angeles County Superior Court, Pasadena Branch. Mendez faces four years in state prison as a result of the plea.

The defendant assaulted the victim on Sept. 29, 2019, at his Arcadia home, the prosecutor said. When the victim attempted to escape, the defendant followed the woman and dragged her back to the home while beating her, the prosecutor added.

## Assault with a Deadly Weapon Investigation

**MONTEREY PARK** - On September 26, 2020, at approximately 5:37 p.m., Monterey Park Police officers responded to a call of shots fired in the 300 block of South Garfield Avenue. Upon arrival, officers found a male suffering from a single gunshot to the abdomen. He was transported to the Los Angeles County USC Medical Center where he is undergoing surgery

for his injuries.

A perimeter was established with the assistance of the Alhambra Police Department, Montebello Police Department, and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. A search was conducted and a suspect was located. The suspect was arrested; no other suspects are being sought at this time. The investigation is ongoing.

## Key Indicators Show Progress in Response to COVID-19

**LOS ANGELES COUNTY** - The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) continues seeing progress in key indicators, including daily hospitalizations and deaths. Public Health remains vigilant in monitoring the metrics that show L.A. County's progress in slowing the spread of COVID-19 and reducing the disproportionality in highly impacted groups.

Deaths have continued to decline since the peak seen two months ago. In late July, the average daily reported deaths was 43, and on September 9, the average daily reported deaths was 20. While deaths continue to decrease, if there is an increase in cases as a result of Labor Day activities, this will likely translate into more hospitalizations and deaths in the coming weeks. We have seen a slight increase in cases recently which we are watching closely, especially since these increases happened after the Labor Day weekend.

The County's percent test positivity or the percentage of tests that are done that come back positive has fallen significantly from an average of about 8% in July to about 3% in September. A decreased test positivity rate is often a sign of reduced community transmission.

Data continues to expose disproportionality in COVID-19 health outcomes by race, ethnicity and area-poverty. However, Public Health sees signs gaps are starting to close.

Latino/Latinx residents continue to die at rates higher than other groups and experienced a death rate of 6 deaths per 100,000 people at the peak of transmission in July. This was 4

times higher than the death rate for White residents at 1.4 deaths per 100,000 people. The death rate among Latino/Latinx residents has dropped to 2 deaths per 100,000 people, and the gap has narrowed so that Latino/Latinx are 2 times higher than White residents at 1 death per 100,000 people.

Black residents had a death rate of 4 deaths per 100,000 people during the peak of transmission in July which was over 3 times higher than White residents. Now, the death rate for Black residents is 1 death per 100,000 people, similar to White residents.

Asian residents had a rate that was 2.7 deaths per 100,000 people in mid-July. Now, the mortality rate for Asian residents is 1 death per 100,000 people, similar to White and Black residents.

At the July peak, the mortality rate for people living in communities with the highest levels of poverty was 6.5 deaths per 100,000 people. This was over 3 times higher than that of people who were living in communities with the lowest levels of poverty. As of September 13, the mortality rate among people living in areas with the highest levels of poverty dropped to 3.2 deaths per 100,000 people, which while much lower than the July rates, remains 3 times that of people living in the lowest levels of poverty.

There is still much work to do to close these gaps, and we will continue to work with partners who are addressing the inequitable distribution of resources and opportunities that are essential for optimal health and well-being.

"We are thinking every day of the many people across L.A. County who have lost a loved one or friend to COVID-19. We are so sorry for your loss," said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. "For so many people, COVID-19 has resulted in serious illness and death. These people are our friends, our neighbors, our colleagues and our loved ones. Each of us can commit to doing what we can, using the tools we have, to slow the spread of COVID-19. It saves lives - yours and the other people in our community. I say this often, but it is worth repeating, please remember: Keep physical distance of at least 6 feet and wear a cloth face covering when you are out of your home and around other people. Wash or sanitize your hands often. Get tested if you are having symptoms of COVID-19. Isolate if you have COVID-19. And quarantine if you have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive."

Ninety-two percent of the people who died from COVID-19 had underlying health conditions. Of those who died, information about race and ethnicity is available for 6,044 people (99 percent of the cases reported by Public Health); 51% of deaths occurred among Latino/Latinx residents, 23% among White residents, 15% among Asian residents, 10% among African American/Black residents, less than 1% among Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander residents and 1% among residents identifying with other races. Upon further investigation, 65 cases and nine deaths reported earlier were not L.A. County residents.

## County Begins Mailing Sample Ballots for Presidential General Election

**LOS ANGELES COUNTY** - The Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk (RR/CC) begins mailing Sample Ballots to voters for the Presidential General Election.

Sample Ballots contain critical election information related to candidates, measures, and how to safely vote by mail or in-person in this election.

Voters can easily access their Sample Ballot online using the new Interactive Sample Ballot. The Interactive Sample Ballot is

an optional tool that allows voters to review their ballot online and make their selections before voting in-person. Learn more about the Interactive Sample Ballot on LAVote.net.

A new addition to the Sample Ballot book is the Quick Check-in Code on the back cover. Voters who choose to vote in-person should detach the panel or take their book with them to reduce time checking in at a Vote Center.

In mid-October the RR/CC

will issue a personalized Vote Center postcard to every registered voter that lists the four Vote Centers near their home.

To ensure voters have convenient, accessible, and safe voting options, we will mail every registered voter a Vote by Mail ballot. We encourage all voters to participate in this election by safely returning their mail-in ballot. Information on how to Vote by Mail can be found on LAVote.net.

## Public Health Sees Steady Decline in COVID-19 Deaths Associated with Skilled Nursing Facilities

**LOS ANGELES COUNTY** - Public Health is seeing a steady decline in COVID-19 deaths in skilled nursing facilities in Los Angeles County. Skilled nursing facility COVID-19-associated deaths peaked in the beginning of May with 190 deaths a week. By mid-September, deaths in skilled nursing facilities dropped to 22 a week. Skilled nursing facilities did not experience an increase in COVID-19 deaths in July and August as Los Angeles County did overall.

Public Health remains in regular contact with skilled nursing facilities and provides facilities with education, technical assistance, guidance, emergency supplies of personal protective equipment, and COVID-19 testing support. Public Health also continues to survey skilled nursing facilities in the County for compliance with mandated COVID-19 testing and reports of COVID-19 cases and outbreaks. All 341 skilled nursing facilities are conducting testing of residents and staff; between September 6 and September 12, 30,000 COVID-19 tests were completed among staff and residents. The

percentage of residents that tested positive during this time period was 1.3% and for staff was .4%. Ninety-nine percent of skilled nursing facilities reported having adequate staffing and 94% reported having adequate PPE. Out of the 341 facilities, 164 were reported as having one or more cases and 177 facilities reported no positive cases. Public Health continues to conduct on-site inspections at skilled nursing facilities that are reported to be in noncompliance with infection control practices, or those that have reports of non-compliance that caused serious harm or death to a resident. These inspections occur within 24

hours of reported complaints. We encourage anyone who receives a call from Public Health to speak to our contact tracers. If a contact tracer calls, it will display on your phone as "LA Public Health" or as 833-641-0305.

Public Health has a dedicated call line for confirmed cases of COVID-19. If you are positive with COVID-19 and have not yet connected with a public health specialist or need more information on services, call toll-free at 1-833-540-0473. Residents who do not have COVID-19 should continue to call 211 for resources or more information.

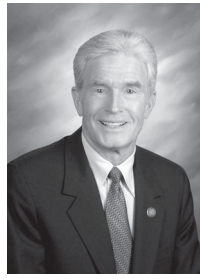
# Why Were Riots, Looting And Burning Allowed To Continue?

State Governors often do not want help from the Federal Government to address out of control problems. While federal authorities can protect federal property and government employees without a governor's request, federal agents are limited in helping control riots and related property damage until asked to do so by a state. Last month Wisconsin's Governor rejected early federal help to stop Kenosha area riots. While significant damage began on 8/23, Governor Evers finally agreed to accept federal help in controlling lawlessness on 8/26. Unfortunately, many local businesses and Kenosha residents suffered significant riot damage before federal assistance was accepted.

Ongoing out of control lawlessness continues in Portland, Seattle, New York and other blue state riot locations because those state leaders do not want federal help in restoring peace to their communities. The federal government has been actively helping states and cities return to more normal and safer times whenever specific locations have requested federal assistance. Federal Operation Legend has recently been making a positive difference for citizens and businesses in at least 9 cities.

Missouri officials were the first to ask the Justice Department to help combat its summer surge in violent crimes. Kansas City became the first location for Operation Legend to help local law enforcement get control over expanding violence. This federal initiative had expanded to 9 "out of control" cities as of last month. In addition to Kansas City, the other 8 cities request-

ing federal assistance were Chicago, Albuquerque, Memphis, St. Louis, Detroit, Cleveland, Milwaukee and Indianapolis. Homicides and shootings in those cities were up significantly during the first 7 months of 2020 (versus the same time period in 2019) which motivated requests for federal crime control help.

In Kansas City at least 43 people were charged with federal crimes and 17 people were arrested for state homicide charges as of last month. As explained by AG Barr, Federal charges are helpful in keeping violent criminals off the streets, since they can be kept in custody pending their trials. An August 20th EP-OCH TIMES article added that so far Operation Legend had resulted nationally in approximately 1,500 arrests, including 217 individuals charged with federal crimes, plus 400 firearms being taken away from criminals. Ongoing criminal and rioting unrest in many locations cannot be helping the economy.

Jay Powell recently told the House Financial Services Committee "The US faces a long, uncertain recovery". He asked for more fiscal help, saying "The path forward will depend on keeping the virus under control, and on policy actions taken at all levels

of government." Fortunately, the economy has been growing during the third quarter. There is rapid growth in the four factors used by the National Bureau for Economic Research (NBER) to judge the length of US recessions - production, sales, income, and employment. Yet the NBER is not yet ready to call the recession over.

While related committee deliberations are secret, it's easy enough to imagine what they are worried about. Employment growth has slowed and income will likely drop now that pandemic aid is drying up. Third quarter growth will still be a record, but the China coronavirus driven drop in Q2 was also a record (unfortunately a lot bigger than the Q3 rebound will be). If GDP were to retreat again in the fourth quarter, this coronavirus created recession could prove to be longer than expected.

The Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) held a post-meeting press conference last Wednesday, in which Fed Chairman Jerome Powell signaled that the Fed will keep key interest rates near zero through 2023 - which adds a year to the Fed's previous guidance. Estimates are that the federal government has an annual \$3+ trillion deficit and the U.S. Treasury debt is approaching over 100% of annual GDP, providing federal incentives to keep key interest rates at or near 0% for the rest of my lifetime!

# Your Money - Ask Julia

*What are my options for getting my money out of my annuity that is about to mature?*

It depends on your annuity policy contract. With some annuities, you can take a lump sum upon maturity. With others, you leave the money alone during the growth period, and then you're required to take it out over a period of years. Some annuity policy contracts allow limited access to your money, usually starting at the beginning of the thirteenth month of the annuity policy. Annuity contracts are commonly supportive of government requirements for Required Minimum Distributions upon reaching age 72, regardless of other contract rules.

*Is this a good time to sell our home?*

Real Estate is currently in a "seller's market" phase (as opposed to a "buyer's market" phase). There are not enough houses on the market for all the buyers who are anxious to purchase a home. Mortgage interest rates are low. As soon as a house comes up for sale that is priced to match the market (comparable to similar properties), buyers quickly submit their offers. (Be aware of this if you plan to buy another home.) Now is a great time to sell your home. Homes that are priced right are often getting multiple offers.

*What is a buy-sell agreement?*

It is a way to transfer business assets to a partner or to a family. These agreements are usually set up to take effect under specific circumstances such as death, re-

irement, or total disability. Life insurance or annuities are typically used to offset the potentially cost-prohibitive endeavor of buying out a partner or family member. There are two types: the cross-purchase agreement in which business partners set up a contract to purchase the business from each other, and the entity-purchase agreement in which the business agrees to purchase the partner's or family's share.

*You've mentioned that life insurance is an important part of an estate plan. How?*

Nowadays, there are two basic ways that life insurance is important in your estate plan. First of all, there's a type of life insurance that can accumulate money that is accessible while you are alive - funds to use for anything you want. Second, life insurance helps your heirs. Life insurance normally pays quickly, and most often these funds are income tax free. This money helps to pay taxes, administrative costs, debts, or keep business operating while the estate is being settled. If the survivors have lost the income of a paycheck or Social Security

check, life insurance can help to fund an income stream. And, finally, life insurance can increase the family's wealth after the death of a loved one. Fixed-indexed annuities also pay quickly, but can also be set up to pay out over a longer timeframe, thus limiting the heirs from wasting their windfall in a short period of time.

*We've done our own financial planning, and now that we are approaching retirement, we'd like some additional guidance. Is there a way to get some financial advice without being pressured into moving our money unnecessarily?*

It's never too late to get a second opinion. An ethical, licensed professional will look at your entire financial picture, talk to you about what you want your money to do for you, and design a plan that is in your best interest and is most suitable for you. You are under no obligation, but if that pro points out something that you feel would be beneficial to you, it would be logical to utilize them as your agent; at least give them some good referrals.

## California Property Tax Postponement Program Applications Opens October 1

Do you or a loved one need help keeping up with residential property tax payments?

The Property Tax Postponement (PTP) Program allows eligible homeowners to postpone payment of property taxes on a primary residence.

To be eligible for PTP, you must:

- Be at least age 62, or blind, or have a disability;
- Own and occupy the home as your primary place of residence;
- Have a total household income of \$45,000 or less;
- Have least 40 percent eq-

uity in the property; and

- Other requirements.

The interest rate for taxes postponed under PTP is 5 percent per year. A lien will be placed on the real property, or a security agreement filed with the Department of Housing and Community Development for a manufactured home, until the account is paid in full. Funding for the program is limited. Applications will be accepted from October 1 to February 10 each year, and will be processed in the order received. Only current-year property taxes are eligible for postponement.

Repayment under the PTP Program become due when the homeowner:

- Moves or sells the property;
- Transfers title;
- Defaults on a senior lien;
- Refinances;
- Dies;
- Obtains a reverse mortgage.

## Foothill Gold Line Three Active Grade Crossing Reconstructions; First Rail Delivery Complete

**GLENDORA** - Kiewit-Parsons (KPJV) crews are now actively reconstructing three railroad crossings along the corridor: Barranca Ave. and Glendora Ave. in Glendora, and Gladstone St. in San Dimas.

As part of the Gladstone St. crossing reconstruction, which began in mid-July and will continue through the end of October, crews have made significant progress relocating and protecting numerous underground utilities, including storm drains and water, sewer, gas and communications lines.

At the Barranca Ave. and Glendora Ave. crossing reconstructions, which began in late August, crews successfully demolished the curbs, gutters, medians, roadways and sidewalks on both sides of the railroad crossings, while maintaining access to the freight track for continued service. At Glendora Ave., the unused south-

ern freight track was also removed. Crews are now relocating and protecting underground utilities at both crossings.

A tremendous amount of work, time and effort is required to rebuild each grade crossing. We appreciate the patience and understanding of project neighbors and the larger community who have been impacted by the construction.

**Closure of Gladstone St. at Railroad Crossing Extended to October 30**

The Gladstone St. grade crossing closure is being extended four weeks to allow for all necessary improvement work to be completed during this first street closure. Initially, KPJV had planned to come back later in the project to install the light rail tracks and complete related work, which would have required a second extended closure. With the recent delivery of rail, KPJV will be able to complete all crossing work during this first closure, eliminating the need for the second closure.

**First Rail Delivery Complete**

Recently, a 2,000-foot-long specialty rail delivery train was brought to the project to deliver

and place 50, 1,600-foot-long sticks of rail at various locations along the 9.1-mile corridor. This first delivery was mostly comprised of rail for the freight track relocation, with just a few sticks for the light rail system. Two more rail delivery trains are anticipated for the project; the next one is anticipated late next year.

**Upcoming Long-Term Closure of Wheeler Ave. at Railroad Crossing**

Beginning October 13, crews will be reconstructing the railroad crossing at Wheeler Ave. in La Verne. This activity will require a full closure of the street at the railroad crossing for vehicles and pedestrians for three months. Look out for a Construction Alert in your inbox in the coming weeks with more information on the work ahead, including available detours. Local access to homes and businesses on Wheeler Ave., north and south of the closure, will be maintained at all times.

# Azusa Kidnapping Suspect Arrested

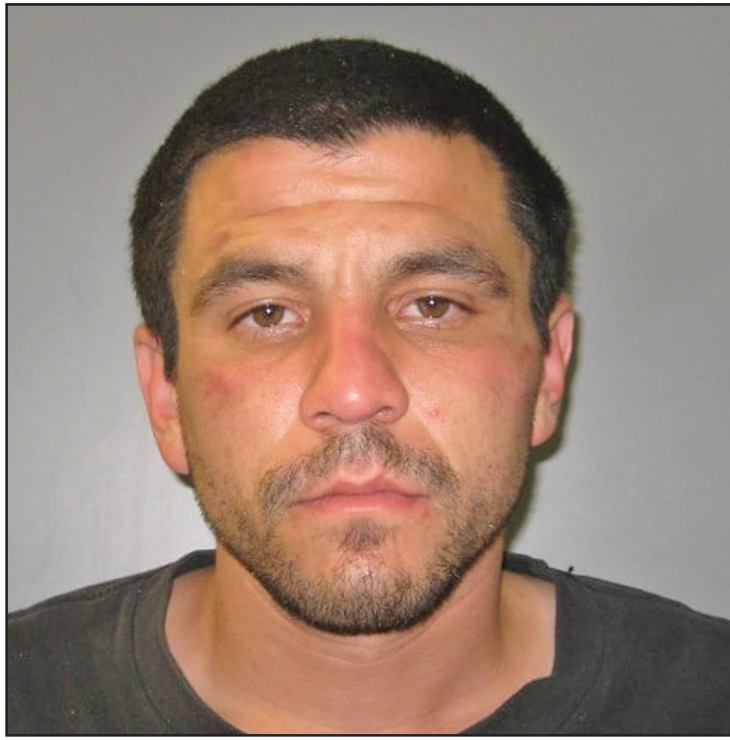
**AZUSA** - On Thursday, September 24th around 9:30 pm, Azusa Police Department officers responded to 855 S. Citrus Ave. regarding a kidnapping which had just occurred.

Once officers contacted the victim who alleged her ex-boyfriend, Christopher Porter, 25, of Azusa had assaulted her inside of her home. After the assault, he then took her young 4-year-old daughter with him as he fled the scene. It is unknown if he is the father or not.

A short time later Porter released the child to family members in a different area of the city and fled the area.

Once the 4-year-old girl was located, the young child was medically assessed and it was determined she had not sustained any physical injuries.

Azusa Police Department Detectives were able to locate and arrest Porter the next day without incident. He is currently on active parole, and is being held for various charges including domestic violence, attempted murder, kidnapping and a parole hold. Bail was set

at \$1,000,000.00 and also a no bail hold is in place on two of the charges. He is being held at the Azusa Police Department Jail and will be moved to another holding facility until his next court date.

Back in February of 2020 Porter was arrested by Azusa PD and in March he was sen-

tenced to one year in jail. He had an early parole and wasn't long before he committed another serious crime.

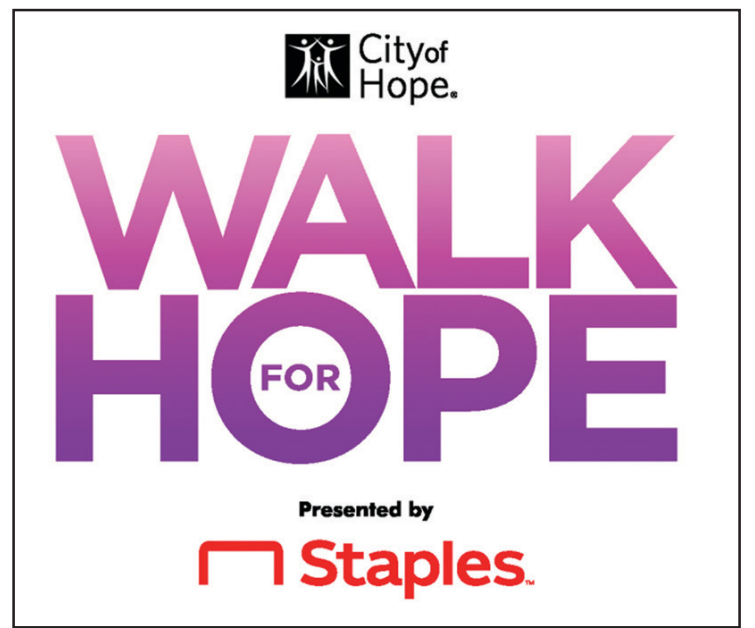

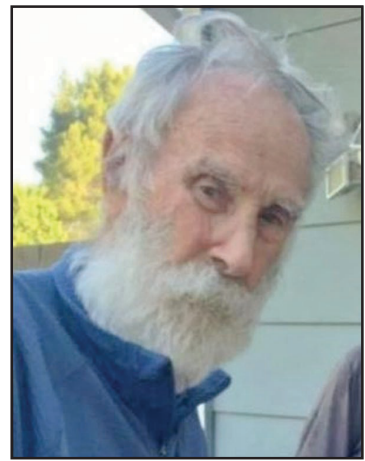

# Body Found Was That Of Critical Missing West Covina Senior

**WEST COVINA** - A body found 11 days after a senior was reported missing has finally been identified as the missing critical senior. On August 22nd the West Covina Police Department started searching for a missing male adult who was suffering from advanced dementia. Buddy "Bud" Merritt Saunders, 90, of West Covina was last seen at 7:00 PM the day before, August 21st at his residence located in the 1800 block of Molokai. He did not take his identification or money when he left.

Sadly, the body found Sept. 1st was in fact Mr. Saunders. On Sept. 22nd just after 5 p.m. there was confirmation of the identification of Buddy "Bud" Saunders.

It was 11 days since he vanished until his body was found. He lived on Molokai which "T"s into Oahu St. He was found along a fence line under a bush on Oahu St. It was re-

Sadly, this had a sad ending this time.

His daughter in Oregon wanted to "thank" all the police agencies who looked for her dad and all the people who were on the lookout for her father.

The City Hall location will host Los Angeles County's Household Hazardous & E-Waste collection event from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Acceptable waste includes brake fluid, paint, paint thinner, cleaners with acid or lye, pesticides or herbicides, household batteries and car batteries, pool chemicals, motor oil, oil filters, expired pharmaceuticals, and antifreeze. They will also be collecting household electronic waste and hypodermic needles, pen needles, syringes, lancets, and intravenous needles.

Bring items in a sturdy box (preferably in their original labeled containers) and be sure not to mix items together. There is a limit of 15 gallons or 125 pounds of hazardous waste per trip.

When arriving, make sure items are in the trunk of your car or bed of your truck, as the County will not be able to remove items from the backseat. Remain in your car and bring a mask. Please note that business waste will not be accepted, and neither will explosives, ammunition, radioactive materials, trash and tires, or any type of controlled substances. #### Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Report Metro Gold Line Foothill Extension Phase 2B (Azusa to Montclair)

Notice is hereby given of the availability of a Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Report (SEIR) for the proposed Project Modifications to the Metro Gold Line Foothill Extension Phase 2B (Project), also known as the Foothill Gold Line light rail project from Glendora to Montclair.

#### Proposed Project Modifications

The Construction Authority is considering modifications to the Project to construct surface parking lots (instead of enclosed parking structures, as previously approved) at the **Glendora, San Dimas, La Verne, and Pomona Stations**. Constructing surface parking lots would reduce the number of available parking spaces. To accommodate the reconfigured parking conditions, the Authority proposes increasing the property size of the **Glendora and San Dimas Station** parking facilities, and a property location change at the **Pomona Station** parking facility. No changes are proposed for the location or property size of the parking facility at the **La Verne Station**. Changed vehicle and pedestrian access and new or relocated turnabouts are also proposed. Additional changes are proposed that will result in a reduction of parking at the **Claremont Station**. Two **Claremont** options will be considered wherein reduced parking is accommodated either fully in a parking structure or via parking surface lot combined with leasing of additional parking spaces from available locations within 1/4 mile of the **Claremont Station**. Provision for parking structure or surface lot at the **Claremont Station** will occur within previously approved location and footprint. In response to these proposed changes, a SEIR has been prepared to evaluate the potential for significant impacts that may result from the potential changes at the five stations. Multiple scenarios that include interim and full build terminus station conditions have been evaluated.

The proposed changes do not alter the scope of the Project as previously approved by the Construction Authority. The Draft SEIR has concluded construction of the Project Modifications would not have new or more severe significant impacts or require new mitigation measures.

#### 45-DAY PUBLIC REVIEW & COMMENT PERIOD:

**September 25, 2020 - November 9, 2020**

The Draft SEIR is being made available for public review for a 45-day comment period. Public comments on the Draft SEIR will be received during this period. Hard copies or CD versions of the document can be made available upon written request to the Construction Authority and mailed to recipients for the cost of printing and shipping.
